## County Commissioners Set Tax Valuations

At a recent meeting of the Parmer County Commissioners, the tax valuations for the county were set for this year. Valuations approved by the commissioners are: Farm and ranch land: class I, \$10 per acre; class II, \$9.00 per acre; class III, \$8.00 per acre; class IV, \$7.00 per acre; class V, \$6.00 per acre; class VI, \$5.00 per acre; and class VII, \$4.00 per acre.

Farm improvements: class I, \$25,000-\$30,000; class II, \$20,000-\$25,000; class III, \$15,000-\$20,000; class IV, \$10,000-\$15,000; class V, \$5,000-\$10,000; class VI, \$2,500-\$5,000 and class VII, \$2,500 and less.

Cotton gins: class I, \$17,500; class 2, \$14,000; and class 3, \$10,000.

Pool tables, \$100 each; cattle \$30 per head; horses, \$20 per head; hogs, \$15 per head; sheep, \$5 per head; irrigation wells, \$500 each; merchandise, 25% of January 1 inventory.

Automobiles -- 1966, 1965, \$450; 1964, \$400; 1963, \$350; 1962, \$300; 1961, \$250; 1960,

\$200; 1959, \$180; 1958, \$160; 1957, \$140; 1956, \$120; and 1955, \$100. This tax is set on all motor vehicles including cars, trucks, pickups, tractors and combines.

Grain elevators 4¢ per bushel capacity and 20% of building cost on flat storage. Town lots, \$100 each; town property, residence 10% of cost of value; business, 20% of cost of value; NH3, \$600 each. Tax remains the same at \$1.25 per \$100 valuation for county purposes.

In other business, the commissioners accepted the bid of Security State Bank as county depository for the next two years 1967-68.

Election officials were also appointed. However, the names of election officials will not be released until a later date.

In the Monday meeting of the county commissioners only routine matters were taken care of due to the absence of County Judge Loyde Brewer who has been hospitalized for the past several days.

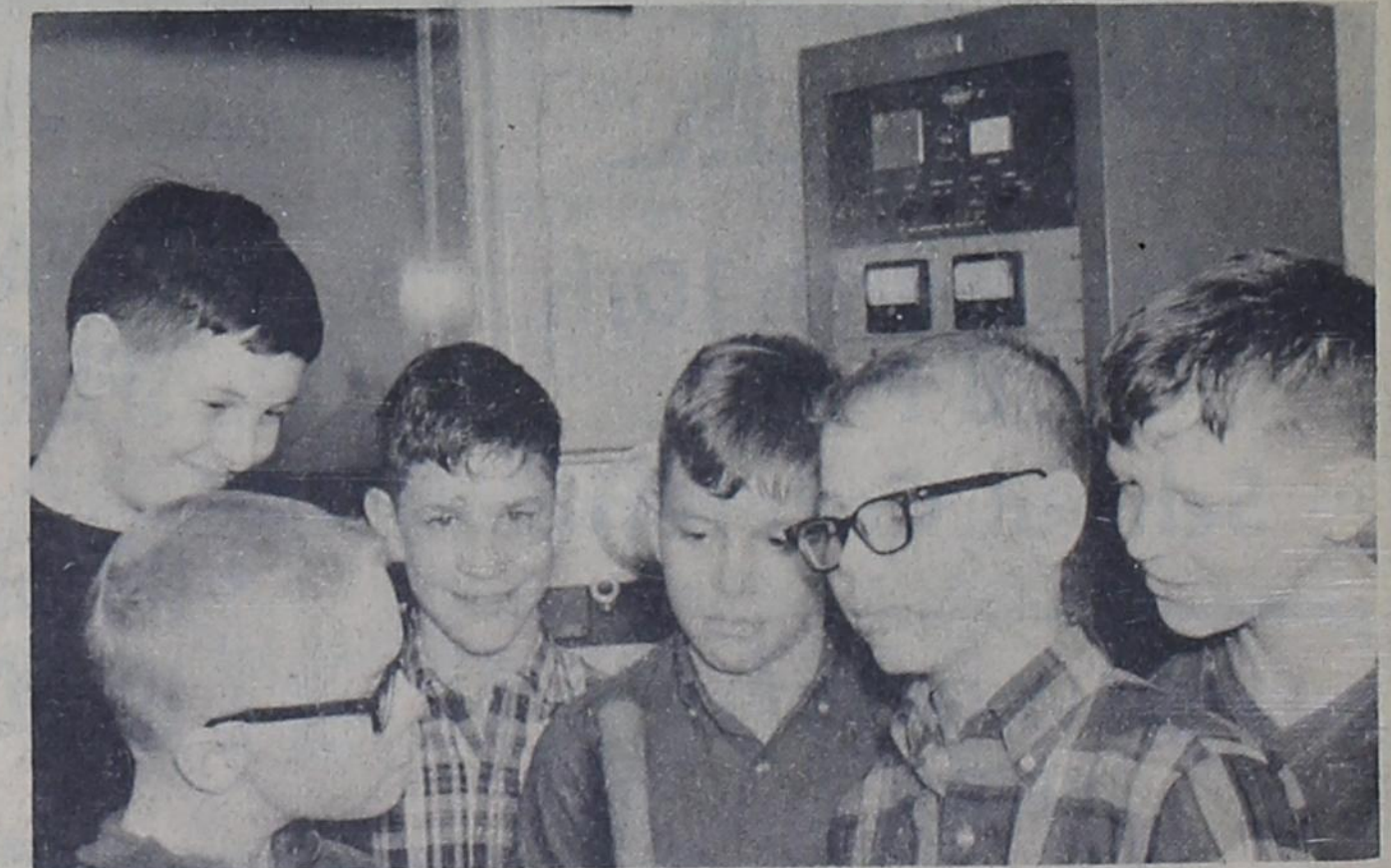

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## On The Farm In Parmer County

### GREENBUGS INCREASE

The greenbug population has increased in many wheat fields according to farmers visited within the county.

### WHAT IS A GREENBUG

Other names for the greenbug are lice and aphids.

The greenbug is approximately 1/16 inch in length, light to dark green in color, and round bodied.

Females give birth to living young. Most females begin reproduction in 6 to 30 days after birth and continue to produce two or three aphids a day for 20 to 30 days.

### DAMAGE

Greenbugs develop in large numbers under certain conditions, and may cause serious losses. The greenbugs suck sap from small grain plants and infested fields may have small deadened areas during the winter.

Greenbugs cause more damage when small grain crops are suffering from deficient moisture in mild winters and cool springs. Reproduction is rapid between temperatures of 55 to 75 degrees.

### HOW TO MAKE GREENBUGS INFESTATION COUNTS

Make a minimum of five random counts each consisting of one linear foot of row, while walking diagonally across the field. Larger acreages mean more counts. On small plants,

the greenbugs can be counted on the plants. On larger plants pull the plants to one side and shake the greenbugs onto a piece of paper for counting.

### WHEN TO SPRAY

The need for applying insecticides depends on the number of greenbugs present, size and vigor of plants, temperature, time of year, moisture conditions, state of growth, and presence or absence of parasites and predators. Irrigated crops can withstand larger populations without a marked loss in yield.

Results of experimental tests during the past eight years indicate that insecticidal applications made on wheat in March and April are the most beneficial.

The following guidelines concerning a need for treatment were taken from the bulletin MP-339 "Texas Guide for Controlling Insects on Grain & Forage Crops":

Month	Plant Height (inches)	Greenbugs /linear foot
February	3-6	100-300
March	4-8	200-400
April	6-16	300-800

Also recommendations for insecticides to use the control greenbugs are found in bulletin MP-339. The bulletin can be found at the County Agent's office in Farwell.

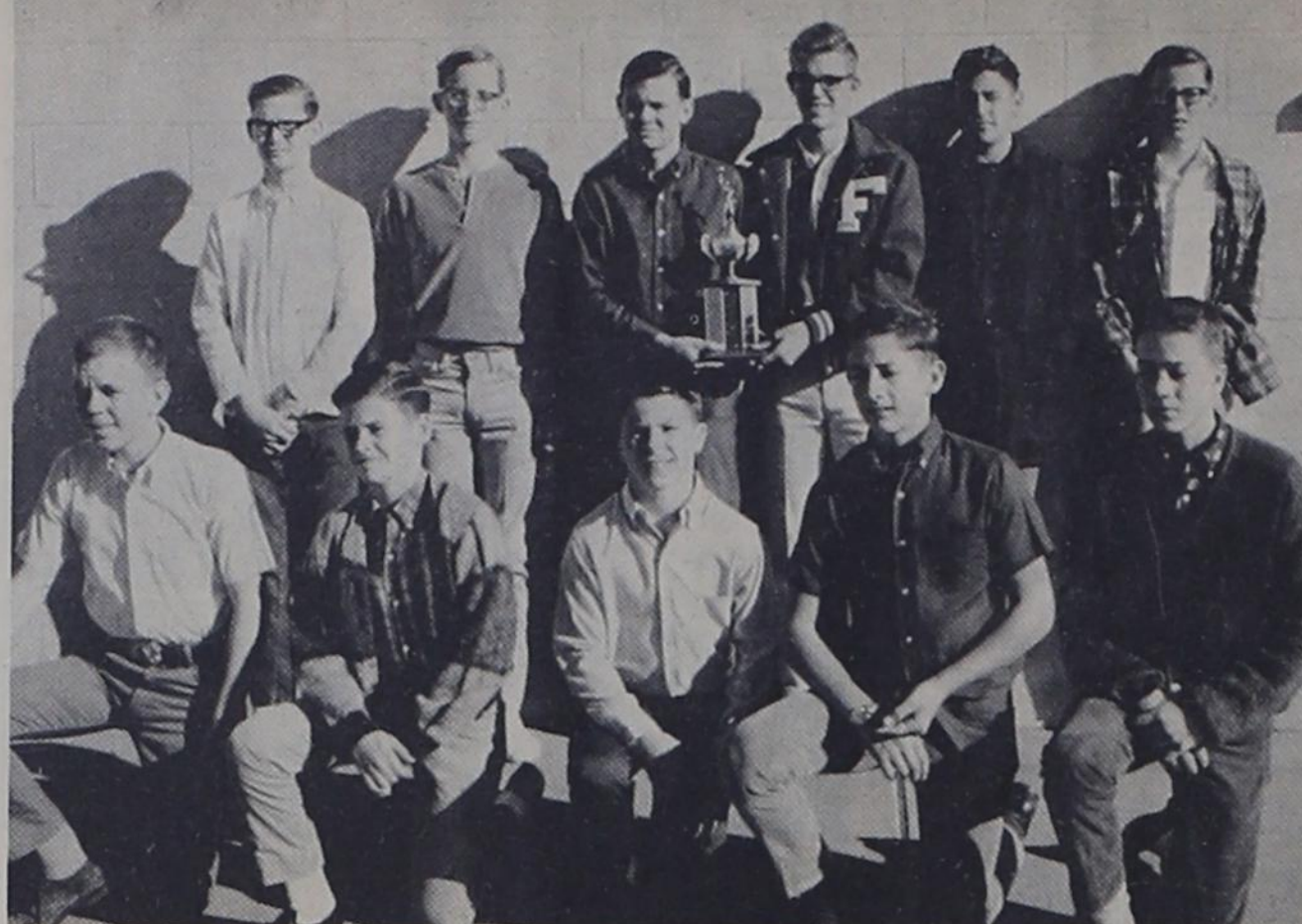

## Levels Measured In Water District

The High Plains Water Conservation District has recently completed measuring the water levels in the observation wells within the district, according to a news release this week.

The average decline for the wells located within the 13 counties of the Water District was 2.10 feet. This decline compares with the declines of 1964 of 2.49 feet; 1965, 3.99 feet; 1966, 3.51 feet. Also comparing this years decline to five year average declines, 1959-1964 of 2.07 feet, 1960-1965 of 2.39 feet. There are many factors which could have caused the 1966 decline to be less than the average decline in the past few years.

In August of 1966, heavy rains were received generally throughout the Water District.

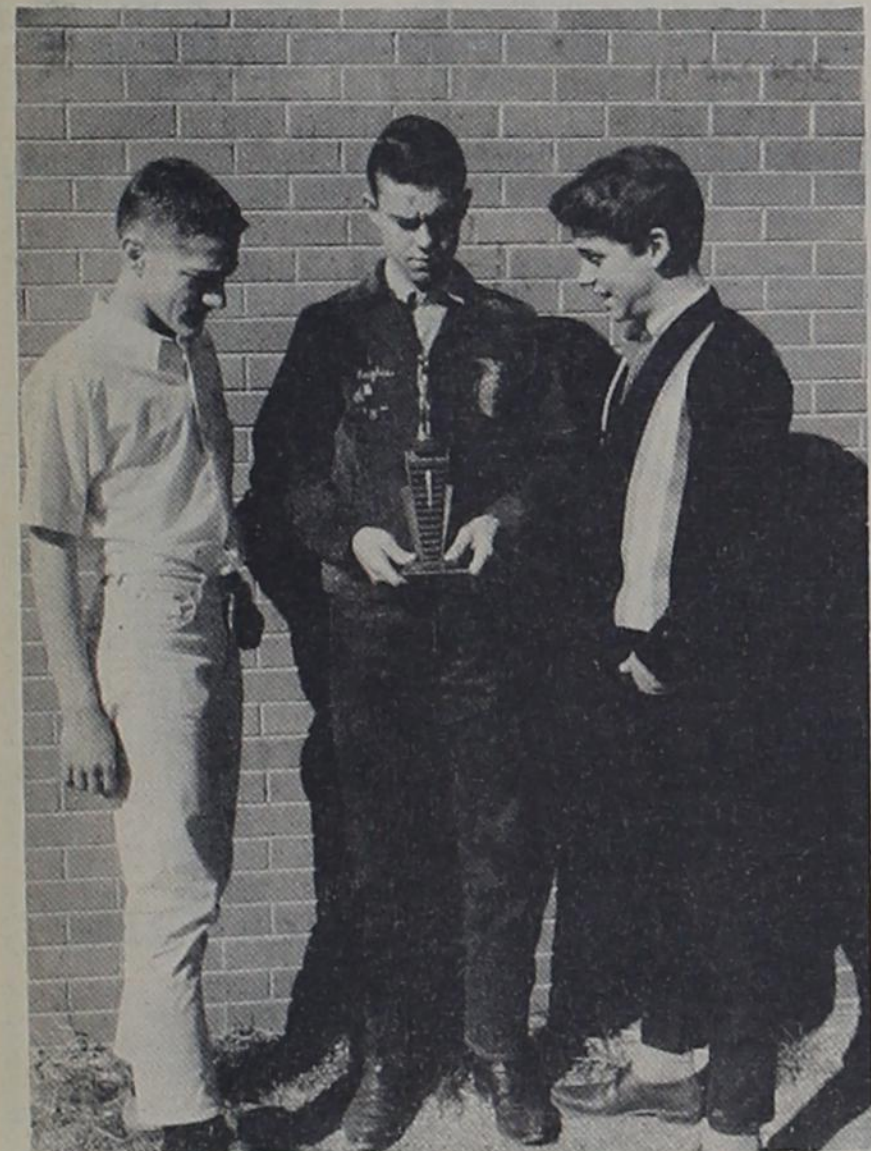
These rains virtually cut off all pumping of irrigation wells on grain sorghum, cotton, and soybeans. Some wheat and vegetables were watered in the latter part of November and December in the Northern part of the district.

Government acreage programs allowing farmers to cut their cotton acreage 35 percent and slight reductions in the grain sorghum acreage probably saved pumping a great amount of water.

There is a possibility that some recharge occurred in the sandy land areas of Lamb, Bailey, Cochran, Hockley, Lubbock and Lynn Counties where the water table is less than 150 feet below the land surface. The declines by Counties are as follows:

Armstrong, 1.90; Bailey, 2.20; Castro, 2.68; Cochran, 1.68; Deaf Smith, 3.38; Floyd, 4.40; Hockley, rise of .22; Lamb, 0.68; Lubbock, 1.89; Lynn, 0.34; Parmer, 3.53; Potter, 4.49; Randall, 3.03.

These declines are not to be used for tax depletion purposes. They are strictly County averages. Detailed decline maps will be prepared by the District for tax depletion use.





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

**CONSUMER IDEAS**  
Today, you, as a consumer, have almost unlimited choices as you select the interior surroundings for your family.

This also means that you are faced with many design decisions.

An article that is well-designed will be both functional and beautiful. Today, better design is available in lower priced furniture, fabrics, and accessories. A person with training in design, who has developed a keen sense of discrimination, can find well-designed furnishings at moderate prices.

Current or prevailing fashions change rapidly in home furnishings. You may be tempted to buy the latest thing only to find that it is soon out-of-date.
