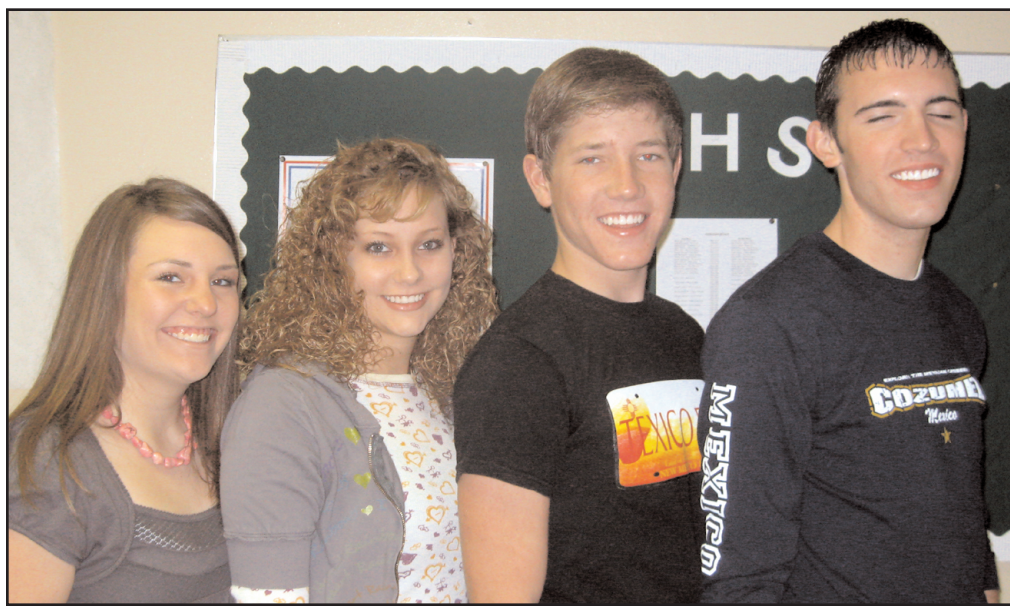

Steers lose district opener

The Farwell Steers lost their district opener Friday to Springlake-Earth, 19-15.

The Steers started with a bang when Bo Mitchell returned the opening kickoff on an electrifying 96 yard TD run. Seemingly surrounded at his own 10, he juke a couple of Wolverines, making it to the sideline where the Steers had set a wall. Johnathan Edwards kicked the extra point.

The teams traded possessions. Then S-E got good field position and drove to the Farwell 11. Trevor Owen had a QB sack for -7 yards and S-E was stopped.

Farwell moved the ball well, first on a 16 yard Landry Actkinson to Austin Wright pass, and then Danny Brown rambled for 20. But the Wolverines intercepted.

After a long gainer, S-E scored from the 10. The extra point kick tied the game at 7-all.

On the ensuing kickoff, Mitchell almost broke for another TD, but was tackled at the Farwell. On 4th and 6, Farwell tried a fake punt that was unsuccessful.

On the next two series, the teams traded punts. Then the Wolverines scored on a TD pass of more than 40 yards, taking a 13-7 lead in the 2nd half. The extra point failed when Mitchell tackled the holder after he bobbled the snap.

Lincoln Devault took the kick off 22 yards, giving Farwell excellent field position. Farwell made two 1st downs, but penalties set them back, forcing a punt. Edwards' punt pinned S-E inside its own 5. Wright intercepted, and Farwell again had great field position. Farwell ran the hook and ladder, with Mitchell latering to Danny Brown for 15. A 35-yard field goal try was partially blocked as time ran out.

S-E had the ball to open the 2nd half, but the Farwell defense shut them down. After Farwell also was stopped, S-E scored on a run after three completed passes. S-E went for 2 but hits from Brown and Zac Stancell stopped the conversion try.

The 4th quarter was bitterly contested, with S-E moving inside Farwell's 10. But the Steers held there.

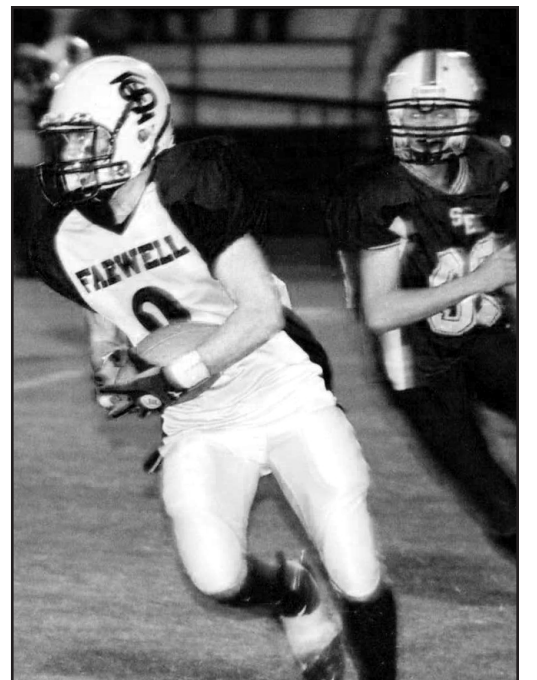
With less than three minutes remaining, Farwell marched 90 yards. Actkinson threw the ball extremely well, connecting with four different receivers before hitting Wright with a 20-yard TD strike. Edwards then bulled his way in for the 2-point conversion.

Team stats: 1st downs, Farwell 12, S-E 13; rushing yards, Farwell 44, S-E 148; passing yards, Farwell 111, S-E 213.

Brown led the team in rushing yards, 33, and receiving yards, 41.

The Latest

It's been awhile since the Tribune has reported on wind farm plans.

Jim Bob and Kay Stafford are still actively involved in seeking developers, but it has been tough getting something going in Parmer County.

There are a couple of major detriments.

Transmission lines are a problem and a solution may be to wait for the state to build what is needed.

And big companies have a tax credit problem because tax credits for big turbines has only been extended one year instead of a longer period by Congress.

So even though Parmer County offers a great potential for developers, it remains to be seen when actual development can begin.

The folks at Great Plains Ag in Friona want folks to know that despite the nation's current financial situations that Farm Credit is well

positioned at about 13 percent capital.

They point out that Fannie Mae and Freddie Mac deal with the nation's housing industry while Farm Credit's mission is to support agriculture.

They note that Farm Credit has its own insurance fund administered by the government, similar to the FDIC for commercial banks.

Xcel Energy says it plans to lower customer electric bills for November and December by 8 to 9 percent.

An additional surcharge starts Jan. 1 that will raise the average bill

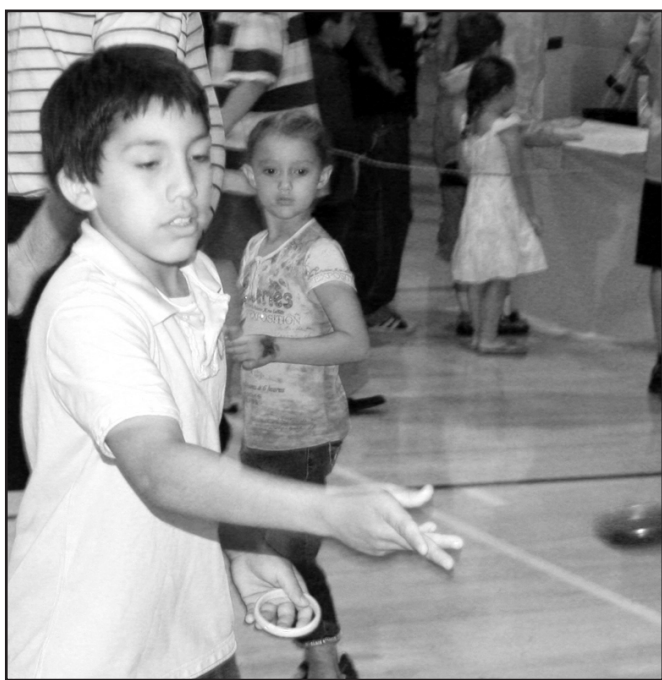

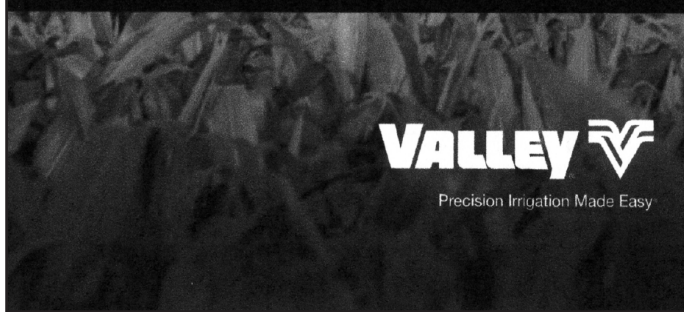

The Lazbuddie Longhorns lost their district opener to Amherst there on Friday, 43-38.

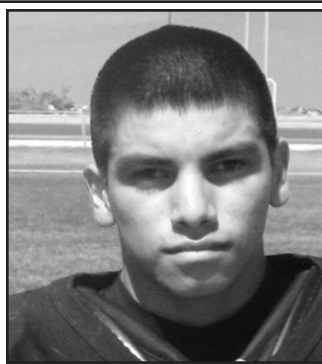
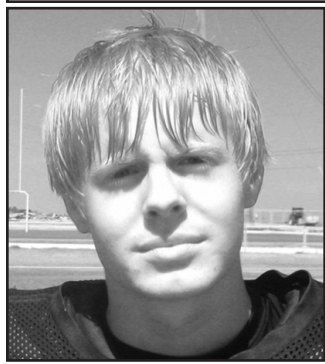
Coach Beau Thompson was most unhappy with the refereeing, but noted it was a problem for both teams.

After trying for many years to have children, the Lord blessed them with three beautiful daughters.

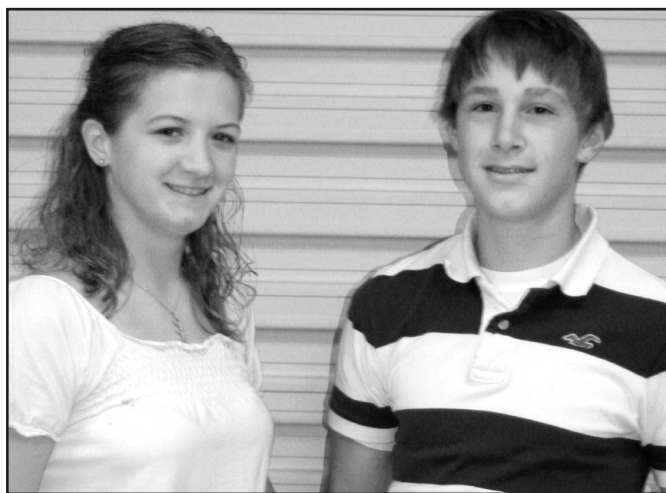
After several years, Kevin was called to the ministry where Cindy followed and served with him.

It doesn't take a crack shot to hit an electric insulator or transformer, just a crackpot. During hunting season, careless shooters taking pot-shots at electric equipment can cause major problems for your electric company.

Here's why:

- You are inconveniencing your fellow member-customers whose electricity has been disrupted.
- It could even be a matter of life and death to someone on a life-support system or to someone who is hit by a stray shot.
- Damage to electrical equipment is very expensive to repair. Lines may be cut or weakened from a shot, and they may sag or break, becoming a severe hazard for anyone who comes in contact with the line.
- Broken insulators can cause power outages that are hard—and expensive—to find. An insulator cracked by a bullet can remain online for a long time before it finally fails.

Enjoy your sport, but be a responsible hunter. Teach your children to respect power lines, electrical equipment and guns so that they, too, will be responsible hunters.

Capitan kicked off to begin the 2nd half and Texico played many reserves the rest of the game.

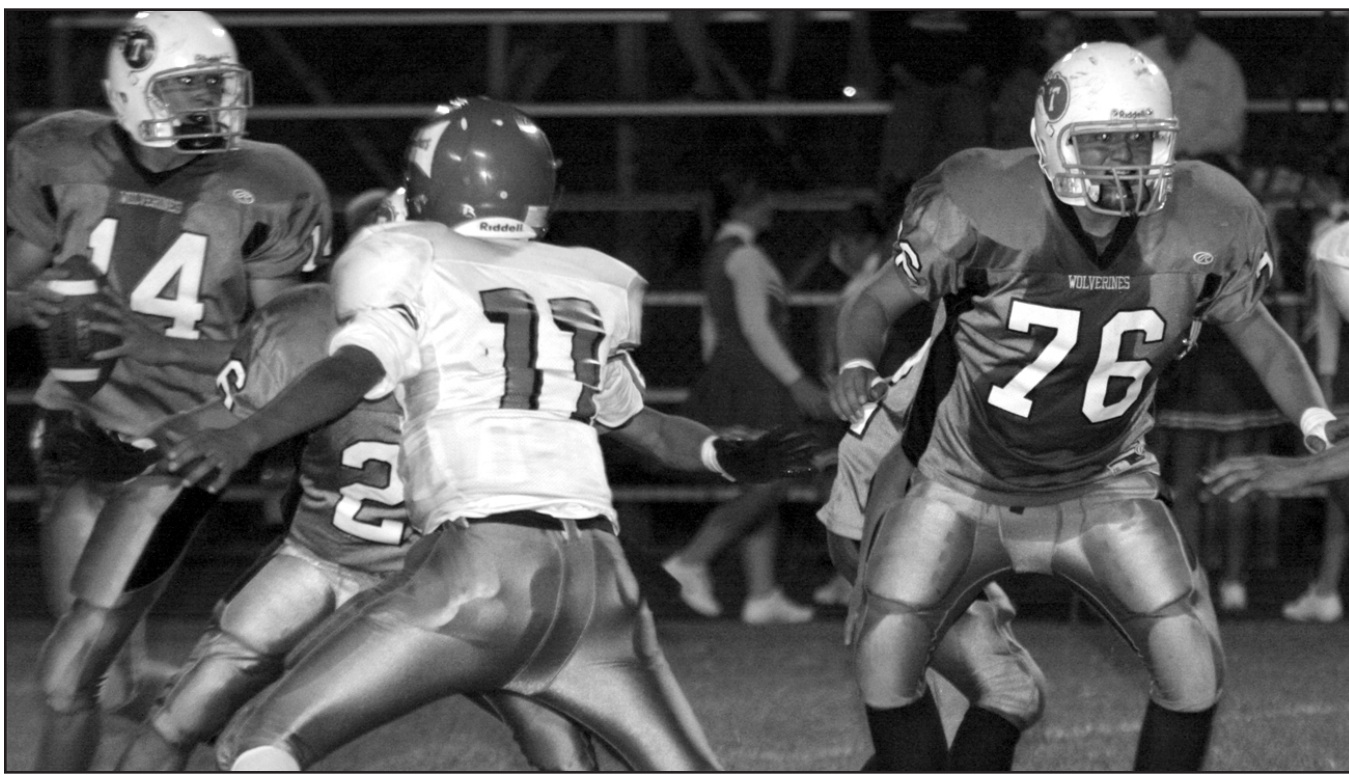
Texico lost a fumble, but then Vasquez and Anderson causing a Capitan fumble recovered by Jose Posada at the 20. Bailey was now at QB.

extension.

So why aren't we celebrating? The problem? Credit crunch.

"Capital for wind power projects is drying up as banks turn skittish (or disappear outright) and there aren't enough other players to pick up the slack", says Keith Johnson.

Overall, "the growth of the industry has to come down" next year, said Christopher Stolarski, senior vice president at Mizuho Corporate Bank., one of the leading wind project financiers

"...the few investors who would still fund a project seek only those that are "squeaky-clean," said Jack Cargas, managing director at Bank of America, which means basically the least risky, those with a power purchase agreement with a utility and lots of transmission.

Ed Feo, co-chair of Milbank, Tweed, Hadley & McCloy's Global Power, Energy & Utilities Group figures that despite good news on the tax-credit front, wind power in particular will be in the doldrums in the first half of 2009, though he expects it should also be among the first sectors to recover.

The Bill extends the Production Tax Credits (PTC) cutoff date by either one or two years, depending on the type of generating technology. Tax credits for wind and "refined coal" facilities are extended one additional year to Jan. 1, 2010. All other energy facilities, including solar, geothermal, and landfill gas, will continue to be eligible for the PTC for two more years, until Jan. 1, 2011.

In addition to extending existing PTCs, the Bill also expands the types of renewable generation facilities that can qualify. A marine or hydrokinetic generating resource, which was not previously eligible for the PTC, may now qualify, provided its nameplate capacity is at least 150 kilowatts and is placed into service before Jan. 1, 2012. Among the technologies that will be eligible under this new provision are generating resources that produce electricity from wave, tidal, and ocean or river current energy.

The Bill also amends the qualification standards for "refined coal", which is a fuel produced from coal or lignite intended for use in steam production. Under the new requirements, refined coal must achieve at least a 40% emissions reduction, up from 20%, when compared to feedstock coal. However, the Bill eliminates the requirement that the market value of the refined coal be 50% greater than the feedstock coal.

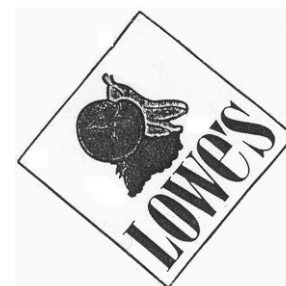
