

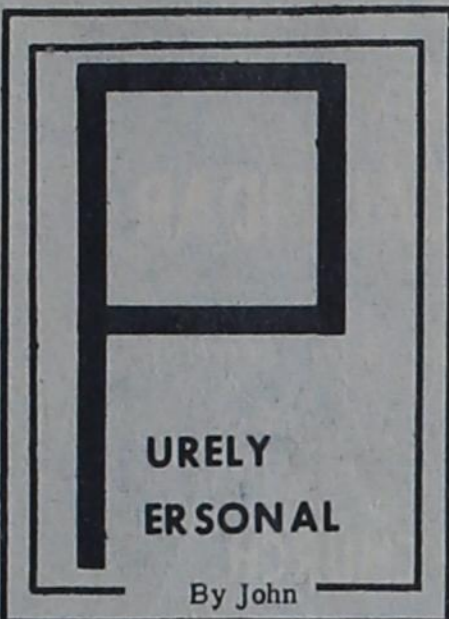

We are constantly exposed to government handouts from many and varied departments. They all have a trait in common. Their language is, generally speaking, quite obscure.

A friend of ours left a tongue-in-cheek memo on our desk. I thought it good and will pass it on for your interpretation of what it may or may not say: BULLETIN: LATEST REPORT ON USDA CONDITIONS

"The U. S. Department of Agriculture reports with some glee that sales and income figures show an easing up of the rate at which business is easing off, which is taken as proof that there is a slow but noticeable slowing up of the slowdown.

"In order to clarify the cautious terminology of the experts, it should be noted that a slowing up of the slowdown is not as good as an upturn in the down curve, but it is a good deal better than either a speeding up of the slowdown or a deepening of the down curve. And it does suggest that the climate is about right for an adjustment to the readjustment.

"Turning to unemployment we find a definite decrease in the rate of increase, which clearly shows that there is a letting up of the lerdown. Of course, if the slowdown should speed up, the deceleration in the rate of increase of unemployment would turn into an increase in the rate of decrease of employment. In other words, the deceleration would be accelerated.

"But the indicators suggest rather a leveling off, referred to on Wall Street as bumping along rock bottom. This will be followed by a gentle pickup, then a faster pickup, and finally a leveling off again.

"It is hard to tell before the slowdown is completed, whether a particular pickup is going to be fast. At any rate the climate is right for a pickup this season, especially if you are about 25, unmarried, and driving a red convertible."

I don't know when I have enjoyed a week any more than this past one. All the TV and radio mellow toned "know-it-alls" have been on strike. Frankly I could care less if some never did come back on the air.

I believe that if I were getting \$300 per week plus 25% of something, I would be quite interested in keeping that job. I see where Hugh Downs, who is striking, gets around \$125,000 for his Today program. If that isn't overpaying an over-rated non-entity, I don't know what is.

The Today program is always better off without him. Let's hope the network finds this out and saves that big salary. There are a few more "super stars" that we could get along without very well. Maybe this will be the first strike to benefit the public in a long time.

## Grand Jury

### Issues 16

#### Indictments

Grand Jury proceeding conducted last week produced 16 indictments on a total of 21 people. Grand Jury was held on Monday and Tuesday, March 27 and 28 in Parmer County courthouse.

Two persons, one now in custody, were indicted for burglary in connection with the recent thefts of Treflan, a highly concentrated form of weed killer.

In Parmer County, theft from the Tide Co. substation at Clay's Corner January 11 netted the thief or thieves approximately 50 cases of Treflan. The weed killer is packaged in quart containers, 12 containers to the case, and a case sells, retail, for approximately \$100.

Investigating officers have found some of Treflan stolen from Parmer County, as well as some from Bailey County. Sheriff Charley Lovelace reports this item is ordinarily hard to identify, but in these instances, Parmer County cases were marked and were positively identified.

Joe Pat Anders is in Parmer County jail here following indictment. His bail has been set at \$10,000 and he is charged with burglary in connection with these recent thefts. A total of 15 witnesses were heard on the case. Anders, of Anton, was arrested in that city on a Parmer County warrant.

Other action by the Grand Jury included indictments against James F. Boucher for car theft; Jerry Cooper and Roy Lee Blagg, burglary; Robert Murry Dressel and Pedro Garubuy, theft; Ronnie Jefferson, Charlton Bilbrey, Gerald Cross and Vickie Leatherwood, forgery and passing; and Gerald Arthur Mascho, Nancy Mascho, and Rossell Rozell for burglary.

Other indictments were issued against Billy Joe Meredith, forgery and passing; Gilbert Mireles, Julian Lopez and Joe Lopez, burglary; Erineo Rosaval Pedroza, second offense DWI; Drena Jean Stover, forgery and passing; Mac Murry Worthington, second offense, DWI; and Joe Pat Anders, burglary. The above are all in custody, either here or elsewhere, or out on bond. Four indictments were issued against people still at large. Their offenses include removal of mortgaged property, theft, forgery and passing and burglary.

She moved to Parmer County, settling with her family near Farwell in 1920 and resided in this community until 1938 when she moved to Friona. She resided there until 1960 when she returned to make her home in Texico upon her husband's retirement. She had resided in Texico since that time.

Mrs. Barker was a member of the Methodist Church and for many years was active in the Susana Wesley Bible Class in Texico-Farwell. She was also an ardent member of the Parmer County Extension Club and worked with 4-H Club groups for several years. For the past 17 years she had been ill much of the time and had been a semi-shut-in for this period. schools participating were Sudan and Kress. Judging the plays was Dr. Don Wilmet, head of the Drama Department of Eastern New Mexico University.

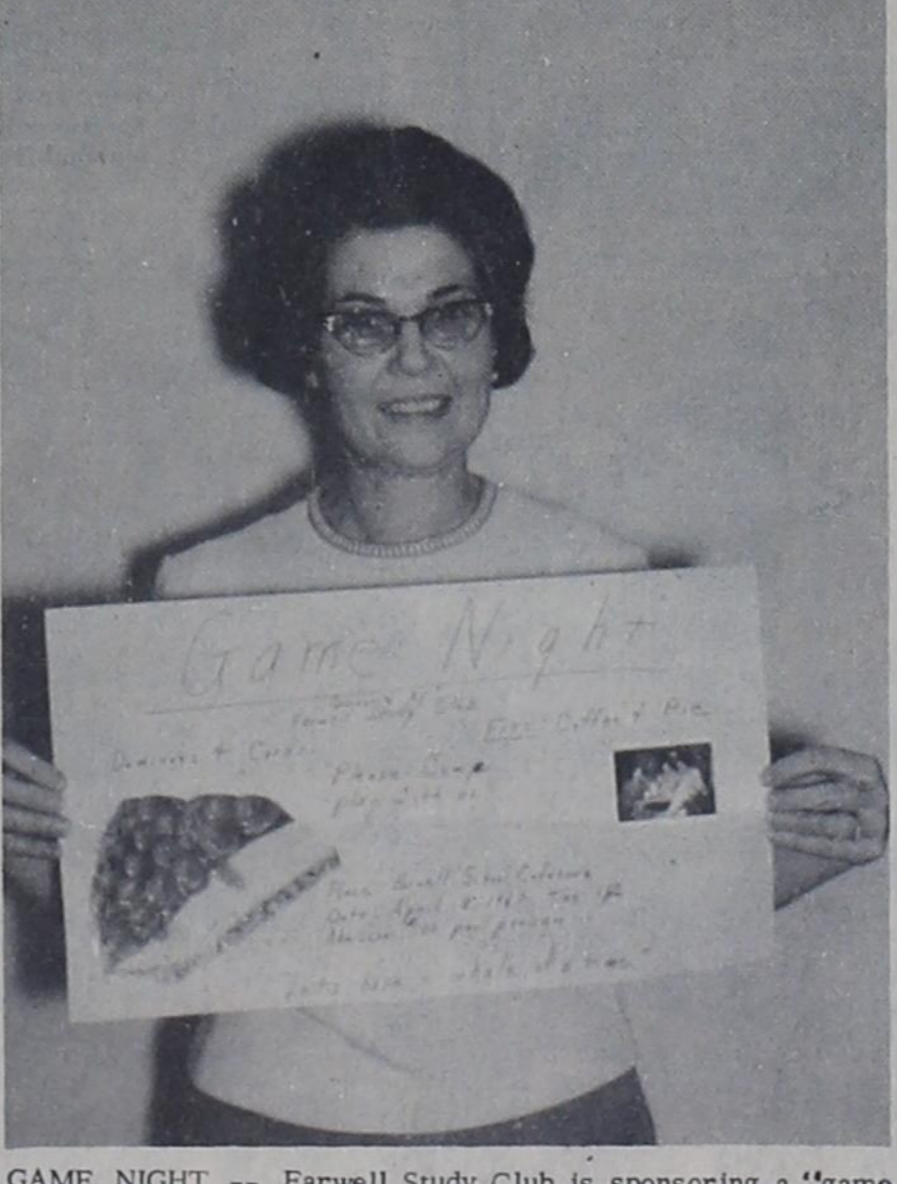

As second place winners, the Farwell students became alternates to regional interscholastic league events, to be held in Lubbock in mid-April. Farwell placed third in last year's district events.

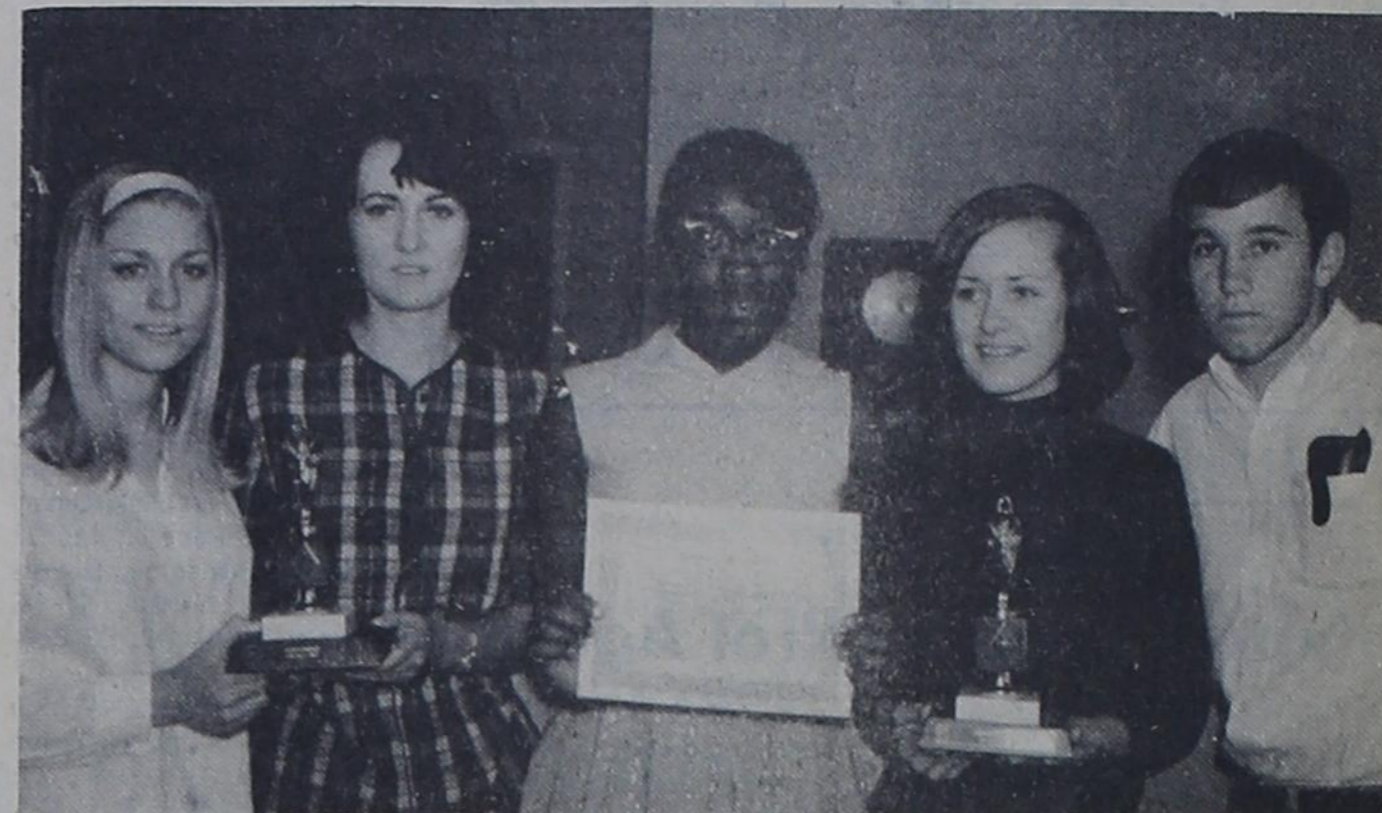
## Pre-Enrollment Clinic Planned For April 21

The "Little Texas" Officer Candidate, Danny Huffaker, husband of the former Linda McPherson of Quanah and son of Mr. and Mrs. C. J. Huffaker of Farwell, is due to receive a commission as an Army Officer at Fort Lee, Va., on May 25. He is one of seven men from the Lone Star State enrolled in Company A, Officer Candidate Brigade.

Huffaker, 20, completed his high school studies after enlisting in the Army a year and one half ago, in order to be eligible to attend the Officer Candidate School, he was required to pass a number of rigid tests and to have a good military record. He was admitted to the school after passing the tests upon recommendation of 11 officers of the company.

Other officer candidates include four businessmen, a lawyer and a teacher. Two of the group, Jerry Phillips and Bob Willis hail from Dallas. Candidate Phillips is holder of a Bachelor of Business Administration degree in Personal Management and is a former Red Raider from Texas Tech. He had just started his climb to fame as an executive trainee with Sears, Roebuck Co. when he entered the army.

'Peace' Lovers - Riot Again

Last weekend, a "peace" demonstration took place in Florence, Italy. Hundreds of peace loving Italian youths gathered to make their desires for world peace known to Vice-President Humphrey who was in Italy for consultation with Pope Paul VI.

Such is typical for the so-called doves who would have the United States unilaterally suspend the bombing in Vietnam, thereby placing the American soldier in unnecessary danger.

There is also a tendency on the part of the news media to refer to those who believe that a military victory is necessary in Vietnam, as "hawks." Here again, a massive misnomer has been committed.

I feel secure in saying that most of the so-called hawks actually have a greater desire for peace than most of the so-called doves. The only difference is that the "hawks" are firmly convinced that a lasting peace cannot be achieved by allowing the Communists to walk off with a sizable hunk of what was once free real estate.

"Doves", on the other hand, have not learned the one great lesson of history. They have not learned that the surest road to war is through appeasement of an enemy which is bent upon destroying you.

I believe it was Al Capp who suggested a slogan for these "doves" to adopt. It read simply: "KILL - for peace." The shoe certainly fits.

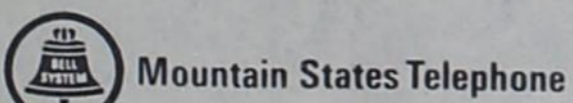
