



'Peace' Lovers - Riot Again

Last weekend, a "peace" demonstration took place in Florence, Italy. Hundreds of peace loving Italian youths gathered to make their desires for world peace known to Vice-President Humphrey who was in Italy for consultation with Pope Paul VI, How did these "peace" loving Italians demonstrate their desires for peace to the Vice-President? Did they hold silent prayer sessions or petition the Vice-President in an orderly manner as would befit a gathering of humanitarians? No. These "peace" loving youngsters made their desires for peace known by pelting Humphrey's car with a barrage of eggs, shouting anti-American slogans, and rampaging through the streets. A riot erupted when several hundred "peace" lovers tried to force their way through police barricades in order to bust in on the official reception planned for the vice-president. Local police used rifle butts and clubs to subdue the rampaging youths and prevent them from storming the building. All this, in the name of peace.

Such is typical for the so-called doves who would have the United States unilaterally suspend the bombing in Vietnam, thereby placing the American soldier in unnecessary danger. I make haste to qualify the term "dove" because a dove is supposedly a very docile, mild-mannered member of the class Aves which is generally accepted as the universal symbol of peace. One cannot correctly classify these rampaging monsters posing as peace lovers as doves, but I use the term anyway in a context which should be interpreted as to mean anyone who wishes a surrender on the part of the United States to the Communists

There is also a tendency on the part of the news media to refer to those who believe that a military victory is necessary in Vietnam, as "hawks." Here again, a massive misnomer has been committed, as a hawk is defined as a carnivorous bird of prey, who pursues its victims, kills them without mercy, and devours them in order to satisfy its own hunger. Surely even Bobby Kennedy could not truthfully say that Barry Goldwater is really one of these.

I feel secure in saying that most of the so-called hawks actually have a greater desire for peace than most of the socalled doves. The only difference is that the "hawks" are firmly convinced that a lasting peace cannot be achieved by allowing the Communists to walk off with a sizable hunk of what was once free real estate. They are convinced that only when Communism is made to realize the error of its ways, will American soldiers no longer have to go off to war in a foreign country, and they are convinced that the only way to accomplish this is to hurt the enemy and hurt him bad, wherever and whenever he rears his ugly head. They advocate the greater use of air power for one reason only -- to save the lives of American soldiers, and bring the war to a quick halt. They do not want war, they wish for peace.

"Doves", on the other hand, have not learned the one great lesson of history. They have not learned that the surest road to war is through appeasment of an enemy which is bent upon destroying you. How could they? They are spending too much of their time rioting and throwing eggs to read their history les-

I believe it was Al Capp who suggested a slogan for these "doves" to adopt, It read simply: "KILL-for peace." The shoe certainly fits.
