With the Texas legislature convening in Austin, it has been announced that the legislation implementing the Governor's Committee on Education is being dropped into the legislative hopper. This means that sometime within the next 120 days, the fate of the majority of Texas' rural schools will be debated in the state legislature. This will include the schools in Parmer County, and more specifically, ours in Far-

If you are opposed to this mass consolidation of Texas schools, and incidentally araise in local taxes, now is the time to write to our state officials.

We suggest a letter along these lines: First, identify yourself as opposing the following recommendations of the Governor's Committee on Education. Specifically, write that you are opposed to the school district reorganization plan and also mention your opposition to State Aid being based on market value of property. Let the official know you will be following his actions and that you would appreciate his consideration of your viewpoint when he considers these portions of the bill as it is presented.

Try to avoid stereotyped words and phrases and do not be abusive; only firm in your convictions.

The people in Austin who might be influenced are Preston Smith, Governor; Ben Barnes, Lieutenant Governor; Jack Hightower, State Senator; Bill Clayton, State Representative; and Gus Mutscher, Speaker of the House of Representatives. A letter addressed to these individuals, in care of Capitol Station, Austin, Texas 78711, will reach them.



Nephew Of Local Man Plays In Bing Crosby Tourney



Beyond that, however, every person should uphold and participate in the Church because it tells the truth about man's life, death and destiny; the truth which alone will set him free to live as a child of God.

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
