HO HO and A HA! It comes time for the people to speak. However, we are afraid the peoples' voice will more nearly resemble the "poof" of a wet firecracker than a stentorian boom of an outraged public. Nonetheless, ye olde ed will remind the folks of this area of some thoughts from this column of June 14, 1968.

At that time we were concerned with the discontinuance of the Farwell to Houston passenger train and noted that the Texas Railroad Commission was the final one responsible for this discontinuance. We listed the members as Ben Ramsey, chairman, Jim C. Langdon, member, and Byron Tunnell, member, and gave as their salaries the sum of \$22,000 annually.

Now we receive a political ad from Ben Ramsey concerning his candidacy for re-election to the Railroad Commission. Along with the paid ad, he sent a press release extolling his stand on the federal policy of foreign oil imports. We appreciate Ben's position on protecting the Texas oil industry, but wondered (not really) why he did not include his position on cutting down on passenger rail traffic in Texas.

While we are on the subject of passenger train service, we will report that our good friend George Grader, PR chief in Amarillo for John Santa Fe, recently sent us a published interview with Santa Fe President John S. Reed. President Reed had some cogent thoughts about a railroad being forced to continue losing passenger service at the expense of needed freight service.

We got the message, George, but will write more on this later.

Somehow, occasionally, our column goes rather far afield and last week we again received proof of unexpected readership. On March 6th of this year we mentioned in a column that Lloyd Bentsen espoused a plan to speed de-urbanization by granting tax credits to industry that moves to rural areas. We congratulated Bentsen on this idea.

Now we receive a personal letter from Congressman George Bush, the Republican from Houston, who is running on the Republican ticket for the U. S. Senate. Brother Bush reminds us that the introduced legislation to this effect is far back as two years ago. Bully for Bush.

To give George his due we are carrying his reply as a letter to the editor on page two of this issue.

The bias of the liberal TV boys has showed again in the recent reporting of the turnout of Judge Carswell for the Supreme Court. We noticed that a lot of prime time was given to Senator Gore of Tennessee. Gore's remarks were dignified with all the hallowedness surrounding an Olympian pronouncement. It failed to mention that Gore, from a border Southern state, is running for re-election and he just might have a political hide to save, namely his own. These little tidbits of vital background information are always left out of TV interviews.

### Kindergarten Registration Set

Texico Elementary School principal Jim Rogers announces that registration for spring kindergarten at the school will be April 20, between the hours of 9 a.m. and 12:30 p.m.

All children who will be beginning school in August, 1970, and who live in the Texico School district are eligible to attend the classes. In order to attend school in the fall of 1970 a child must be six years of age before January 1, 1971, and live in the Texico School district.

The kindergarten classes will be conducted daily through May 29 from 9 a.m.-12:30 p.m. Lunches for the students will be provided; however, each parent must provide transportation for his own child.

Rogers encourages parents to be sure their child has had his immunization shots, (smallpox, DPT, and polio) since they must have them before beginning school.

According to Rogers, kindergarten children will need the following supplies: beginner pencil, crayons (eight colors), tablet (wide line), scissors (blunt point), white paste, cleansing tissues (small box) and a small box in which to keep supplies.

Parents who need additional information on the kindergarten classes are asked to contact Rogers at the Texico Elementary School.

The family moved to Texas in 1942 and for a number of years made their home in Farwell, where Mr. Meeks was employed as a school custodian and also as a road maintainer operator for Parmer County. They later lived in Lamb County where he was employed by that county

## Fine Arts Commission --

Mrs. Emily Whitesides, assistant director of the Texas Fine Arts Commission, will be in Parmer County to discuss the organization of an area Fine Arts Association with interested persons on May 4 and 5. A meeting will be held at the auditorium of the Farwell School at 7:30 p.m., May 4. All area persons interested in seeing a Fine Arts Association organized in this area are invited to be in attendance at the meeting.

Mrs. Whitesides has been assistant director of the Texas Fine Arts Commission since January 1969; however, for the past 20 years she has been active in community arts groups in the Mobile, Ala., area and more recently in Austin. She has written and directed puppet theatre, presented art lectures in elementary schools, and served as production chairman of the League Folies which provided support for Junior League's sponsored projects.

Her duties as Associate Director of the Fine Arts Commission include those areas concerned with the state-wide programs, assistance in the formation of local arts councils, and stimulation of greater support for the growth of the arts in Texas. In response to the statewide growing interest in arts councils, she planned and coordinated the Texas Community Arts Council Conference on the SMU campus in Dallas in 1969 and has published a report of the proceedings.

In order to form an area Fine Arts Council in this area the support of all individuals, civic organizations and schools will be needed. At the meeting with Mrs. Whitesides it is hoped by area people working out the details for organizing the Association, that a Board of Directors can be chosen and officers for the Association named. After the Association has officially been formed, the group can then begin working out plans for bringing some of the finest entertainment possible to schools and communities in the area. One such group, the Amarillo Symphony, is appearing in Muleshoe this Sunday, April 19, for a "pops" concert.

### Farmers Union Slates Meeting

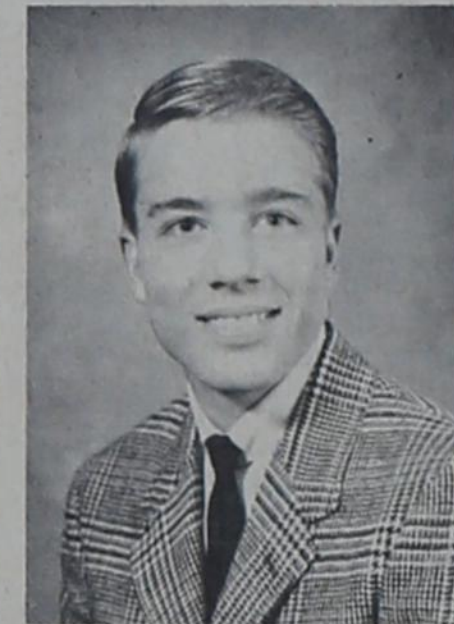

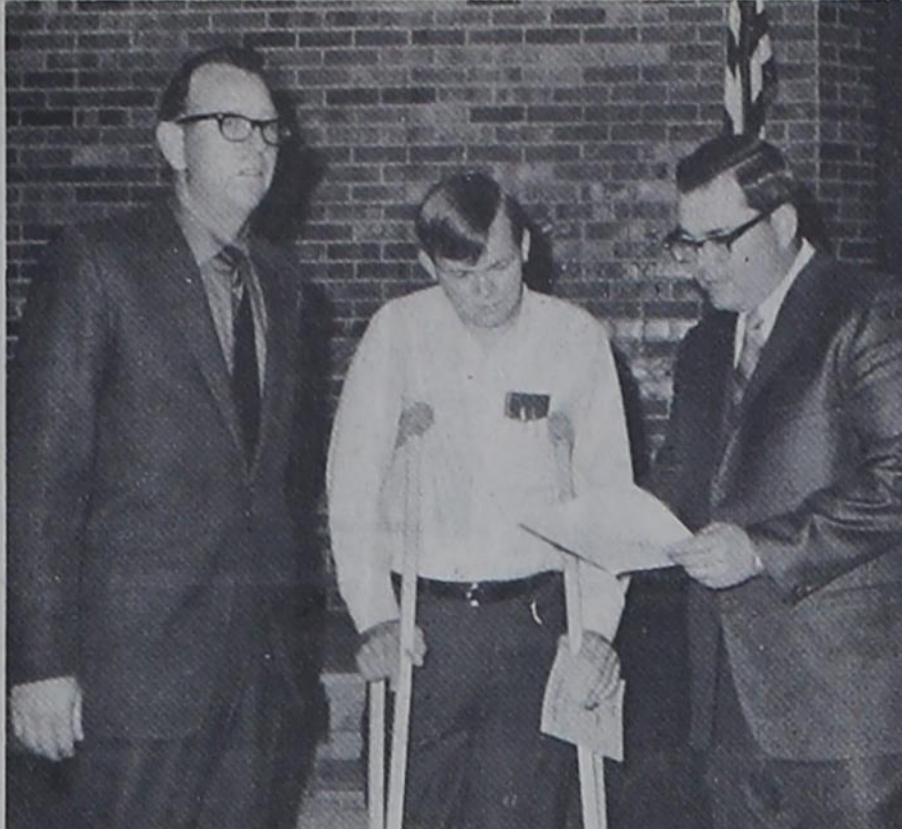

Petty Officer Chisman's devotion to duty, courage under fire and exemplary professionalism were in keeping with the highest traditions of the United States Naval Service."

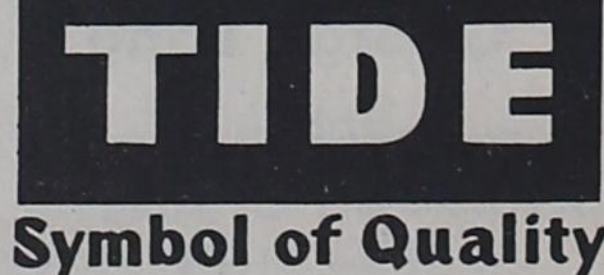

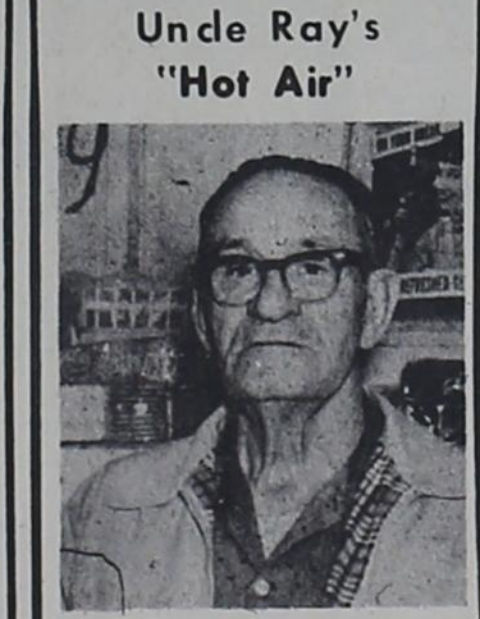
## Visit Antique Shops During Weekend
