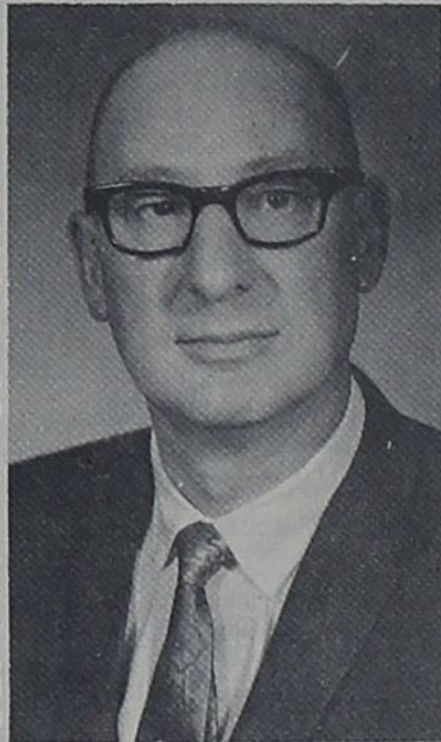
named county champion. She will attend the Amarillo Bee as a spectator. Carla Smart was second place winner in the junior division with Estelle Embry in third place. All of

Track And Field Meet --

Qualify For Regional

Seven members of the Farwell track and field team have qualified to participate in the regional meet to be held in Lubbock on April 18-19. The team tied with Kress for the district title last week in that meet, with a total of 97 points. Earlier in the season they were second in the Hale Center meet and third in the Kress invitational meet.

Qualifying for the regional are Gene Sheets, mile run; Craig Phillips, 220 and mile relay team; Danny Prince, 330 low hurdles; and Robert Curtis, Dean Stovall, Dennis Ensor and Mark Williams, mile relay team. At the district meet, Craig Phillips was second in the 220 dash, third in the 100 dash and on the mile relay team which placed first for the second consecutive year.

Al Phillips was third in the discus throw and shot put and fifth in the 120 high hurdles; Danny Prince was second in the 330 low hurdles and fourth in the 120 low hurdles, and is an alternate on the relay team. Mark Williams placed third in the 880 dash and is an alternate on the mile relay team. Also placing in the 880 dash were Carl Goettsch, fifth and Randy Crook, sixth.

Dennis Ensor was third in the 440 yard dash followed by Dean Stovall in fourth and Randy Johnson in sixth places. Robin Mahaney was third in the pole vault and fifth in high jump. Greg Hargrove was fourth in pole vault. Drake Bryant placed sixth in the mile run following behind Gene Sheets in second and Jay Herrington in fourth.

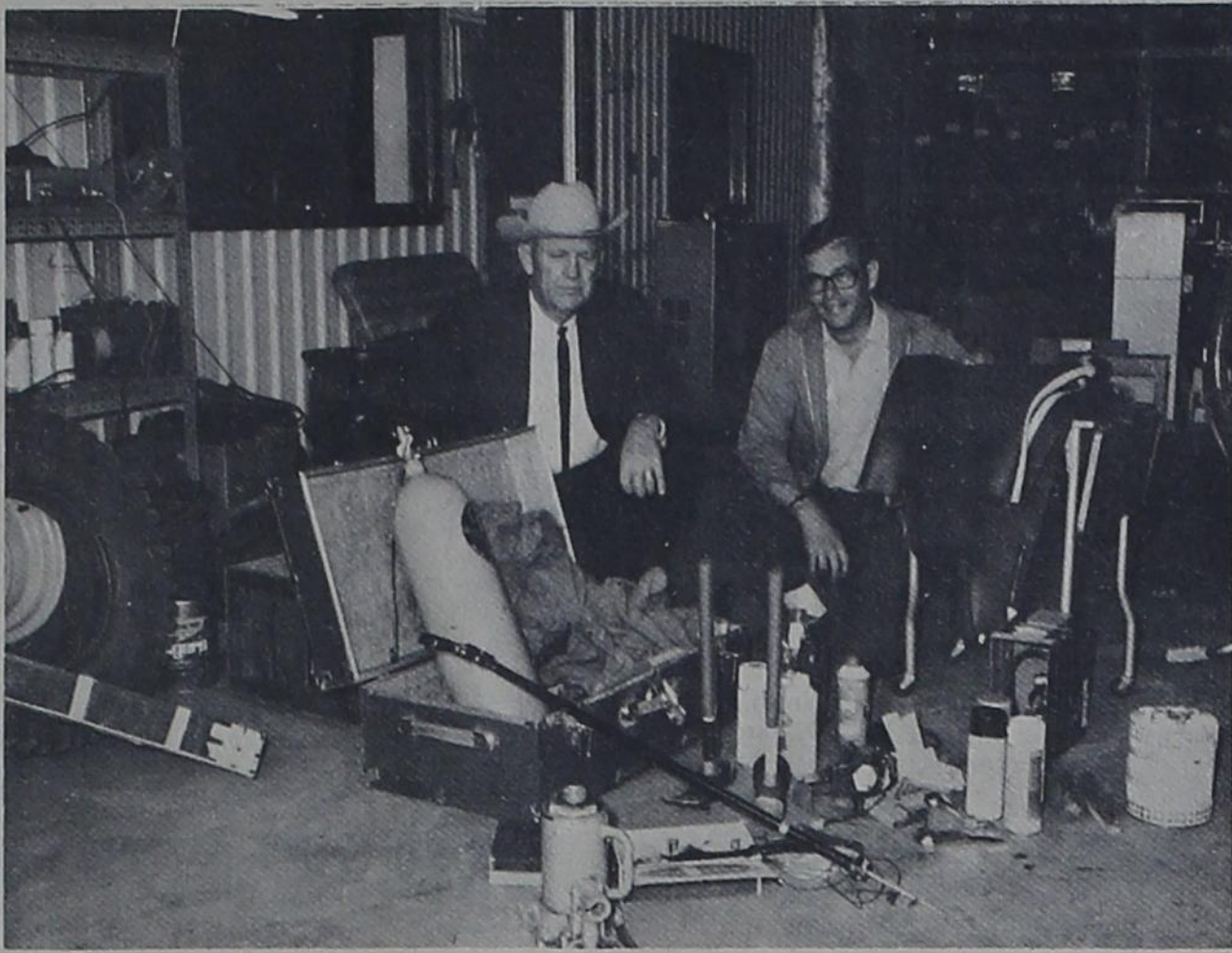
Little League Tryouts Set

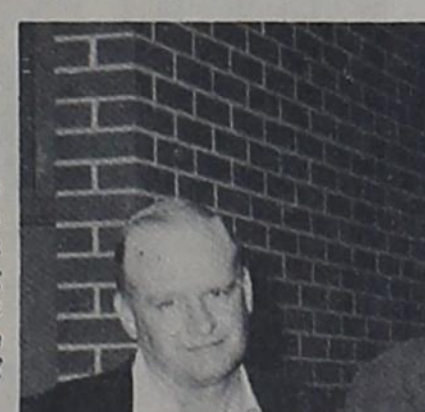

A sane voice is at last heard in Congress. It may be only a lonely voice in the wilderness but a voice nevertheless. We refer to our own 18th District Congressman Bob Price from Pampa. Congressman Bob introduced a bill to repeal the Gun Control Act of 1968. This is a good move on the Congressman's part as far as we are concerned.

In discussing the Gun Control Act of 1968, Congressman Price says, "The bill was the result of a wave of misguided emotionalism and a surrender to the bleeding hearts who believe that registering the guns of peaceful and law-abiding citizens will have any effect on the crime rate or act as a deterrent to any criminal who owns or wants to own and use a firearm. There is no evidence that even suggests that the present requirements are making any significant contribution to the fight against the criminal use of firearms. The new law has only subjected law-abiding citizens to harassment and inconvenience, not to mention storekeepers and legitimate gun dealers who have been injured or put out of business. The Federal Firearms Act, which this bill (Price's new bill) would restore, had all the safeguards of the Gun Control Act as far as deterrence of criminal ownership or use of firearms and that is the only basis for any firearms legislation," he concludes.

These were good words spoken by Congressman Price, but we wonder if he may not be out windmill tilting, as we are still firmly in the grip of the bleeding hearts and the wild-eyed Utopians.

Recently we in West Texas have been privy to an academic squabble between a literature instructor of the University of New Mexico and the Legislature of that state. We have felt rather removed from the squabble, but now feel moved to write a few words about the case. We do this because of an article in "The Chase", the student newspaper of Eastern New Mexico University. We have in the past mentioned ENMU as a good place for our local graduates to consider in furthering their educations, but now have second thoughts on the subject.

We are reading several apparent quotes by various English instructors of that institution and are amazed at the totally inconsistent arguments as to why common vulgarity should be disseminated under the guise of literature. To our uneducated mind, these comments are totally devoid of moral reason, completely lacking in basic relevance to the subject and are the bleatings of persons overly exposed to education and underdone in common sense.

Surely if these persons are representative of academic thinkers, we are lost as far as reason in the teaching profession is concerned. There isn't room in less than a small book to pick apart these statements and to expose the shallowness of mind and moral character contained in this type of thought.

This is sorry material to parade before the weary tax-paying public at a time when teachers' pay raises are being so vigorously pushed by the various teachers unions. We wonder how our neighboring state legislators like being called stupid, witch hunters, blue noses, etc., at the same time they are being asked to sock it to the public for more taxes to pay more wages to these apologists of filth???

Wage Rates Set For Sugar Beet Workers

Louis Welch, Chairman of Parmer County ASC Committee, announces the wage rates and requirements for sugarbeet work performed on or after April 7, 1969. The rates were determined by the Secretary of Agriculture following public hearings in the sugarbeet producing areas. The general provisions are the same as in previous regulation. A new hand labor operation of removing weeds following complete machine thinning and use of herbicides has been added. Eligibility for a Sugar Act payment depends upon the producer's compliance with these wage rates and requirements. The Chairman explained that workers employed on a time basis must be paid not less than \$1.65 per hour for each of the hand labor operations of thinning, hoeing, hoe-trimming, blocking, and thinning, weeding, pulling, topping, loading, or gleaning. Special wage and hour provisions cover the employment of workers 14 and 15 years old. When employment for hand labor operations is on a piece-work basis, the following minimum rates per acre apply: thinning \$12.00; hoeing, \$15.50; hoe-trimming, \$18.75; weeding (following thinning,

WEED CONTROL IN SORGHUM AND CORN
The following recommendations for chemical weed control in sorghum and corn for 1969 are made by Dr. Alen Wiese, Professor of Agronomy, USDA Research Center, Bushland.

SORGHUM
Preemergence Herbicides: (1). Propazine is formulated as MILOGARD (Propazine 80W), and 80% wettable powder formulation.

For season-long control of both grass and broadleaf weeds, use 1, 1-1/2, and 2 lb/A active ingredient on fine sandy loam, loam and silty clay loam, respectively. (Equal to 1 1/4, 1 3/4 and 2 1/2 lb/A of Milogard). If careless-weed or pigweed are the only weeds present, application rates for fine sandy loam, loam and silty clay loam should be 3/5, 4/5, and 1 lb/A ingredient, respectively. These rates are equal to 3/4, 1 and 1 1/4 of Milogard. Goatheads and devils claw will not be controlled with these low rates. Do not use propazine on fields with loamy sand or sandy soil because serious crop injury may result.

Because propazine must be absorbed by weed roots to be effective, application must be hoeing, or hoe-trimming or removal of weeds after machine thinning and use of herbicides) \$10.00; and removing weeds (following complete machine thinning and use of herbicides) \$10.00. The piece-work rate for any other hand labor operation involving the removal of beets or weeds and for pulling, topping, loading, or gleaning shall be that agreed upon between the producer and worker, provided the worker's earnings average not less than \$1.65 per hour.

made to the soil immediately after planting. Rain leaches it into the root zone. If rainfall occurs before chemical application, weeds germinate and grow through the propazine on the soil surface. Propazine will not control weed seed that germinate when sorghum is watered up with flood irrigation because weed roots are below the herbicide on the soil surface. Watering the crop up with sprinkler irrigation provides adequate movement of propazine into the soil to insure weed control.

Propazine persists in the soil for long periods. If more than 1 lb/A is applied, the only summer crops which can be grown the year following application are corn and sorghum. If 1 lb/A or less is applied, cotton can be grown the year after application. Winter wheat may be planted the second fall following application.

Propazine may be applied with 10 to 40 gallons of water per treated acre. Research results in 1967 and 1968, indicate that amount of water is not critical, provided that good coverage is obtained. When gallonage is lowered, adequate agitation is essential because the herbicide settles out in the spray tank easier when less water is used. A pump with a return capacity of 10 gallons per minute is satisfactory for agitation with a four-row rig. Aerial application of propazine has proven successful. A minimum of 1 gallon of water carrier for each pound of active ingredient is required.

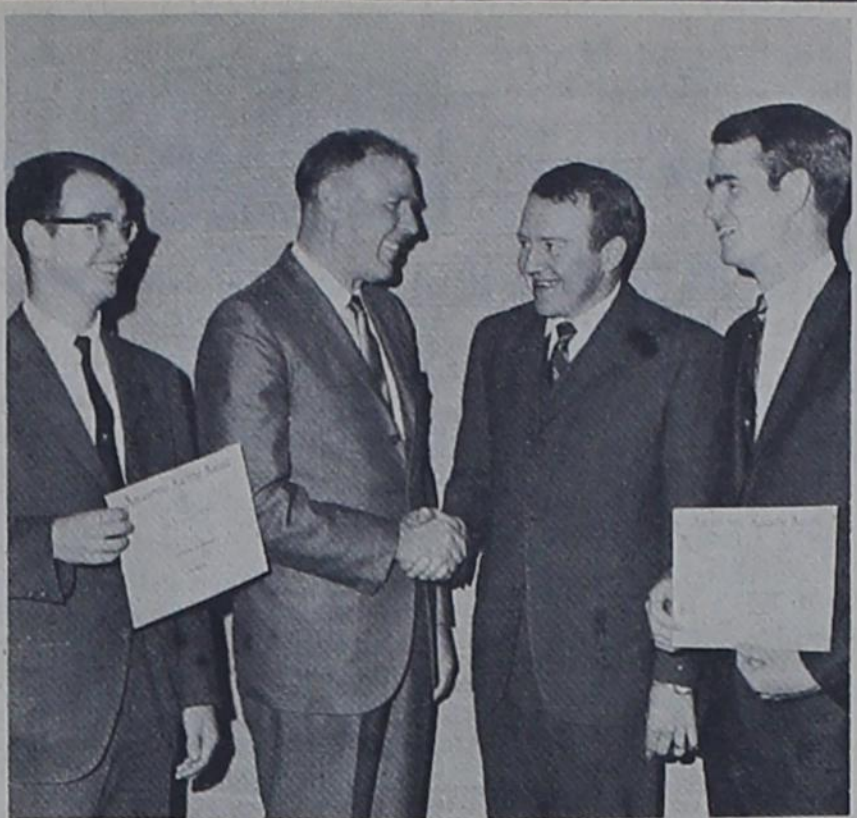

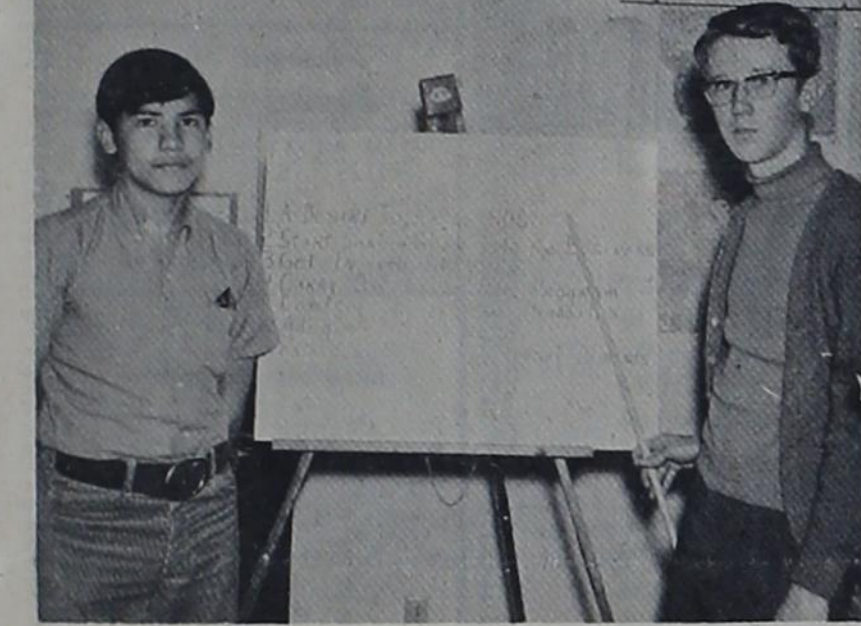
