School Vote Fails To Approve Bonds

In a moderate vote, patrons of the Farwell School District Saturday turned down a proposed building program for the school that would have been financed by \$200,000 worth of bonds.

The voting was close on all three ballots, but each one was defeated. It was necessary that three ballots be used because of special tax rate adjustments which could be made only by use of last year's state legislation.

Ballot No. 1 was defeated 102-119, ballot No. 2, 106-116; and ballot No. 3, 101-115. Only about 220

persons voted as compared with an eligible 475 persons in the district.

The school board, after canvassing the votes Monday night, made no decision on what will be their next move, but instead adopted a plan to send questionnaires to district patrons to determine their wishes.

Taxpayers will be asked if they would prefer to have the same election again with no changes; if they would prefer to vote on classrooms only (without the auditorium); or if they do not want any election now.

Farwell Has 21 Games On Cage Schedule

With the completion of a new gym for play this year, the largest number of basketball aspirants in Farwell history reported this week to coaches Murray, Young and Jobs.

About 35 boys are vying for A and B team suits and Coach Jobs reports that about 20 boys are coming out for the freshman squad.

The Steers, runners-up in conference 3B last year, have seven returning lettermen. Three first stringers are holdovers from last year's squad which won 26 games while losing only seven.

Bert Williams, Eddie Smith, Truitt Hardage, Troy Christian, Gerald Hardage and James Norton are the returning senior lettermen and David Willard is a junior returning letterman.

District 3B is made up of Adrian, Bovina, Farwell, Lazbuddie and Vega. The defending champion, Bovina, won regional honors and third place in the state tournament at Austin last year.

Coach R. B. Tucker has reported that 14 girls are holding daily workouts with the intention of bettering their 1955 district standing. Lazbuddie is the defending champion in this division.

Returning lettermen for the girls' team include seniors: Linda Kube, Dixie Turner, Betty Hubbell, Betty Curtis, Glenna Davis and Elaine Magness; and juniors: Phyllis Magness, Doris Pond and Mary Ann Walls.

Others competing for team positions this year include Jeanette Hughes, Carolyn Cantrell, Betty Smart, Naomi Hubbell and Angela Williams.

County Milo Crop Beats 13 Mil. Bu.

History's biggest harvest was a matter of record for nearly all grain sorghum producers of Farmer County by this week, and elevator operators report that only an infinitesimal amount of grain remains to be cut this fall.

Irrigation and increased acreage was the key to production on this part of the High Plains this year, and the total crop broke all records in size.

Tabulations garnered from 15 elevators in Texico-Farwell and Farmer County, plus figures obtained from the county agent's office and the county ASC office, put this year's production at 13,662,000 bushels.

This is conservative, believes County Agent Joe Jones, who estimated last year's crop to be around 12,000,000 bushels.

Actual receipts from local elevators were used in tabulating the amount hauled to the elevators, which was 13,462,000 bushels. Estimates were made in two instances where managers of the warehouses could not be contacted.

Farm-stored grain accounted for about 200,000 bushels, and one factor which was not even figured in because no accurate estimate can be made is the grain that was withheld by individual producers for feeding or some other reason.

HOME FROM HUNTING

Joe Helton and Buck, Jack and Orris Eshleman, all of Texico, returned Sunday from a deer hunting trip to the mountains of New Mexico. Helton was the only member of the party with a deer, returning with a small buck.

Also considerable quantity of grain from Farmer County farms was figured to have gone into Hereford, Summerfield, Muleshoe and Dimmitt.

Elevator operators report that the severe boxcar shortage, which cramped harvest for many weeks, is now easing somewhat, although the supply of cars is still in a "now you see 'em—now you don't" condition.

Grain which overflowed elevators at all major receiving points is slowly being picked up from the ground and shipped out to terminal storage.

Kress Kangaroos Thump Steers 26-7

Kress Kangaroos, already wearing the district 3B crown, wound up their season play with a clean slate Friday afternoon as they dropped the Steers 26-7 at Kress.

Larry Johnson, junior quarterback for the Kangaroos, led his teammates in their vicious attack. Shifting from a T formation to the spread, Johnson passed for three of the home team's touchdowns.

The Steers elected to receive the kick from Ellyson Williams. Eddie Smith took the kick and returned the ball out to the 22. Smith drove five yards on a keeper and Willard gained one yard on first and second down tries.

Smith's third down jump pass was intercepted by Larry Johnson and the Kangaroos were operating on the Steers' 29 yard line.

A Johnson to Williams pass was completed, but an offensive holding penalty set the Kangaroos back to the 44 yard line. Johnson's pass went incomplete and on second

down he kept the pighide for a gain to the 35 yard line. A shift to the spread and Johnson's pass was grabbed by Steer halfback, Truitt Hardage. A leg injury kept Hardage sidelined for the major part of the game.

Clipping was called against the Steers to put the ball back near their own 20. Troy Christian, fullback, went through right tackle for a six yard gain then Smith passed to Willard for a one yard pick up. Truitt Hardage lost one yard as he tried to go around left end before Smith punted on fourth down.

Ellyson Williams picked up the ball and raced 60 yards for the first Kangaroo TD. Williams' extra point kick was good to give Kress a 7-0 lead.

The Kangaroos drew a 15 yard penalty for clipping and after a short kick, the Steers were running from inside the 50 in Kress territory (Continued on last page.)

# THE TRIBUNE'S EDITORIAL COMMENT

## Acreage Controls Won't Work: Will "Soil Bank" Plan Do It?

The surprising announcement Tuesday, November 8, by the USDA that 1955's cotton crop will yield something like 14,843,000 bales, shot additional holes in the tattered banner of the group that says acreage controls are the means of controlling agricultural production.

With a production goal of about 10,000,000 bales at the beginning of the season, the USDA has continually revised its estimates upward, until it appears that the dizzying height of 50 percent overproduction may be attained, in spite of severe controls.

And, for the first time in years, the idea behind the "soil fertility bank" plan is beginning to snowball into national importance. It is apparent that farmers the nation over fear and distrust the allotment system, which has been especially damaging in this area.

Only the well-read and informed farmers as recently as a year ago knew anything about the soil fertility bank plan or had even heard about it. Now, it is getting big play in the nation's press, through radio commentators, and in farm magazines.

This "new" plan (which origin dates back at least a decade), hits at the problem of over production by retiring a certain percentage of ALL cropland on ALL farms in the nation. Unless hamstringed by politicians, this new plan would offer a partial return to the freedom that farmers once knew. It holds the promise of making the farmer less subjective to the whims of each convening congress.

A change in farm programs—a major change, that is—is not likely until at least 1957. But when that change does come, see if it isn't built around the "soil fertility bank" plan.

### Unjustified

An editorial appearing in last week's Bovina Blade provoked the ire of a good number of Farwell football fans, and understandably so. "The usual

inexpensive yells of unsportsmanship" attributed to local boosters by the editorialist was a criticism unjustified under the circumstances.

### ON SOUTHEAST COAST

NORFOLK, Va.—Taking part in a major amphibious exercise on the southeast coast of the U. S. aboard the dock landing ship USS Shadwell was Navy Lt. (jg) S. O. Bewley, of Route 3, Muleshoe.

The exercise, involving 80 ships, 347 aircraft and 42,000 Navy and Marine Corps personnel, began October 19 and was climaxed by an amphibious assault on Onslow Beach, N. C., November 3.

Supported by ships of the Atlantic Fleet, the Marines landed by helicopters, surface craft, sea planes, land planes and submarines. They were opposed by a simulated enemy force of Marine "aggressor" troops.

The maneuver provided realistic training in all phases of amphibious warfare, including the simulated use of offensive and defensive atomic weapons.

Walter Johnson, FHA Manager, called a meeting Thursday for the purpose of correlating procedures for the new type loans to farmers. Invited to attend the meeting, which was held on the John Underwood farm southwest of Friona, were bank representatives of Farmer County, SCS committee men and workers, the county agent and extension service advisory committee men, and the county ASC Manager. Preparation for a farm improvement loan is now a joint project of SCS and FHA.

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for you in your absence on a percentage basis, but there isn't. Please remember that this refunded money is just as good for spend as newly earned money. You wives know what to do about it if your husband is too busy to come in and take care of it. While you're here, pick up a nice 1956 calendar, for yourself and your neighbor, and a free supply of pocket combs for your family.

Your membership committee appreciates the steady, prompt stream of renewals that have been coming into the office the last few weeks. Farm Bureau membership is staying substantially above the same period of last year. Though no hand-out program is expected, Farm Bureau is looking forward to a national program that will present greater opportunity for agricultural people in the years to come.

We are interested in the study some individuals are giving to a "help ourselves" type of promotional program that would benefit farmers, ranchers, wholesalers, retailers, and others in the Plains area. It would be designed to market locally produced vegetables and other food products in their season, and provide supplementary products from other Texas areas the year 'round. We think it has possibilities and hope to see further study and progress on it in the near future. A secondary advantage the plan presents is that it provides opportunity for the cooperative promotional efforts of Chamber of Commerce groups and farm organizations.

Soak one envelope of plain gelatin in 1/4 cup cold water for 5 minutes. Dissolve in 1/2 cup hot water, mash 2 cups cranberry sauce and add hot gelatin. Mix well, chill until partially set. Then add the following: 1 small can well drained crushed pineapple, 1/2 to 3/4 cup diced celery, 1/2 cup nut meats, 1 small apple diced. Pour into molds and chill. Serve on lettuce leaf with fruit salad dressing.  
**Fruit Salad Dressing**  
1/6 cup sugar or 2 T and 2 t, 2 t cornstarch, 1/8 tsp. salt, 1/2 cup pineapple juice (use juice from salad), 1 egg beaten whole, 1 sq. philadelphia cream cheese, juice of 1/2 orange, 1/2 cup orange juice, 1/2 cup lemon juice.

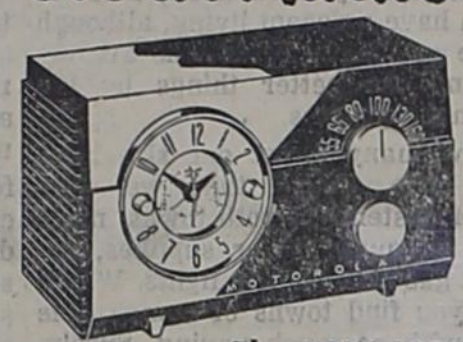

Christian picked up six yards in two carries then J. Barrett, Kangaroo right half back, intercepted a pass from the hand of Smith near the 27 yard line.

Barrett carried for four yards and Johnson was piled up for no gain. A pass from Johnson was knocked away on third down and a miscue by Eddie Smith on the punt gave the Kangaroos possession deep in Farwell's end of the field.

Johnson picked up two yards, but an illegal formation penalty cost the Kress squad 15 yards. Johnson carried again and was thrown for a six yard loss when hit by Christian and Walls.

Johnson, displaying the coolness of an old pro, hit Charles Reinhart with a pass that netted the Kangaroos another six point marker. Williams' kick for the point after touchdown was no good.

Smith returned the Kress kick to the 41 yard line. Farwell drew a five yard penalty on first down try then Jerry Henson carried for six yards. Christian picked up five yards then Derrell Garner grabbed a jump pass good for a short gain. Willard tried to no avail around right end for the first down before the Kangaroos took over on downs.

Williams was thrown for a minus one yard on his try through the line then Johnson took over for a four yard pick up. Johnson was stopped at the line for no gain and on fourth down the Steers were penalized for roughing the kicker to give Kress their first down.

Reinhart carried to the Steer 25 then a Farwell penalty put the Kangaroos on the Steer 10 for another first down. Johnson's carry for several yards was lost as the Kangaroos were pushed back to the 25 on an offensive holding penalty.

Johnson, shifting once more to the spread, connected with Charles Reinhart for another Kress touchdown to put the Kangaroos in front 19-0. Reinhart went on the ground for the extra point and a 20-0 lead over the Steers.

Williams' kick was returned by Smith to the 28. Christian picked up

three yards and Farwell was penalized five yards on second down. Smith was smothered on a pass attempt then Lovelace picked up seven yards.

Rousser carried the kick back and in this series of downs, Kress was penalized twice for clipping. Williams carried on first down try for six yard gain then Johnson picked up three. Barrett was hit at the line for no gain and the Kangaroos were forced to kick.

Willard plowed his way through the line for six yards then Christian went through the right side for two more. Henson lost a couple of yards around left end and Preston Cain punted to Kress.

A Johnson pass went incomplete and Williams picked up one yard on second down carry. Another Johnson pass was batted away by the Steers and Williams kicked a low one to Smith who brought the ball back to the Steer 36.

Truitt Hardage picked up five yards in two tries and Smith ran for seven and a Farwell first down.

Christian then went straight through the middle for a 40 yard gain and a penalty against Kress put the ball on the Kangaroo five yard line. Lovelace was thrown back three yards on his try through the line. Christian then took the ball for eight yards and a Steer tally. Smith kept for the PAT to make the scoreboard read 20-7, Kress.

Barrett, the man taking the Steer kick, was topped on the 35 yard line. Johnson was thrown for a 15 yard loss as James Norton charged through the line for the tackle.

On third down Johnson pulled a quick kick to give the Steers the ball. Lovelace took it for three yards then a fumble in the backfield, recovered by Christian, was good for about a yard. Lovelace then plowed through for nine yards and another first down.

Willard picked up four yards before a Lovelace to Hardage pass went incomplete. Lovelace passed again for another incompleton and a fourth down pass was intercepted by Johnson to end the first half of play.

Opening the third period, Kress received and began operating from the 40 in their own territory. Reinhart went through the Steer right side for three yards then a pass from Johnson to Barrett netted a

first down. Barrett picked up five more yards and Reinhart took the ball for another first down gain.

Barrett ran for eight yards on a delayed buck then Johnson was piled up for no gain. Williams carried for three yards and a first.

H. Foster was dropped for a 12 yard loss, then Johnson hit Williams with a pass on the 15 and carried to the 10 before being downed.

Barrett was stopped by Lemmon after a two yard gain. Johnson was hit hard by Jerry Owen and Mitchell Walls for no gain. Johnson went to the air again, but found no receiver on his first attempt.

Johnson again passed, this time to Jerry Jarnagin in the end zone. Williams was stopped as he tried for the extra point.

First down saw Reinhart stopped after one yard. Kress drew a five yard penalty then Williams couldn't get his hand on a long pass from the arm of Johnson. Walls knocked away a pass from Johnson on the third down. Smith raced to the 38 yard line from the 20 where he picked up Williams' kick.

Christian managed for two yards and a fumble on a pass from Lovelace to Smith left the ball in the same spot. Lovelace gained two yards then another fumble, recovered by Christian, failed to give the Steers a first.

An illegal receiver down field nullified the gain on a Kress pass in a first down attempt. Johnson again failed to complete his pass and then ran for 12 yards.

Kress kicked to begin the fourth quarter of play and Smith was downed on the 21 yard line. Lovelace was hit for no gain and Norton recovered a Steer fumble to make it still third down and 10. Lovelace carried for six yards over the right side.

The Steers recovered the ball after Smith's boot then Christian went for 25 yards. Lovelace was stopped at the line and Christian managed for three yards. A Smith pass went incomplete on third down. Fourth down try saw Smith back to pass and as he drew the Kress line in from the right side, Smith raced all the way to the 20 yard line around left end.

Lovelace went four yards on first down in this series and Christian made no gain on his try. J. Brinkley intercepted Smith's pass.

Barrett was stopped after a one yard drive then Henson was the man to break up Johnson's pass. Smith and Lovelace killed Johnson's next pass attempt and Kress kicked to the Steers.

# » News from Bovina «

## Bovina Burglars Nabbed by Sheriff

The individuals who broke into two Bovina businesses and attempted to break into another Sunday night, November 13, have been captured by Parmer County Sheriff Chas. Lovelace and Clovis police officials. The burglars—three of them—are in jail at Farwell.

Henry Hernandez, 17, who was released from Springer Industrial School for Boys on the third of November, Joe Palacio, 19, and Jake Vargas, 17, are the three that were involved in the break-ins. They are Latin-Americans and make their homes in Clovis.

They were taken into custody

Sunday. Lovelace picked the youths up in Clovis and also recovered some of the clothes that were taken from Esquire Cleaners and part of the merchandise that was taken from Wilson Food Store.

Lovelace said that he and the Clovis officials were suspicious of the youths. After the stolen goods were found in their homes, they signed statements admitting to the break-ins. They did not, however, admit that they had attempted to break into Wilson's prior to that time.

After the bond is set—and it was scheduled to be set Monday afternoon—the boys will be bound over to the grand jury.

A younger brother of Palacio's was sent to Gatesville School for Boys some three months ago for car theft in Parmer County.

A. M. Wilson, owner of Wilson's Food Store, estimated that \$150 worth of merchandise was stolen from his store. Five shirts and a coat were taken from Esquire Cleaners and two screens were taken off the windows of Paul Jones' Service Station but they did not enter the building.

No other reports of break-ins in Bovina have been turned in since that time.

## City Sells Land To Odis White

Odis White, owner of Bovina Electric, has purchased 20 acres of land including improvements on the 60 acres of land that the city had purchased from Tom Hudson some months ago to be used for the sewer disposal plant.

The city will not need the land that it sold to White for its sewer plant. Construction of the sewer system is scheduled to begin about the first of January.

A total of \$6,000 was paid by White for the 20 acres, the improvements, and the water rights. The sale was transacted by members of the city commission and White Wednesday November 16.

The commissioners also decided at a November 14 meeting to purchase a slightly used tractor from O. W. Rhinehart. The tractor, equipped with a scoop and blade will be used to cover ditches, for street cleaning purposes, trash hauling when needed, and many other jobs, according to Henry Minter, who will become city secretary December 1.

Minter also said that, in all probability, a mower would be purchased for the tractor in the spring to cut the weeds and grasses in town.

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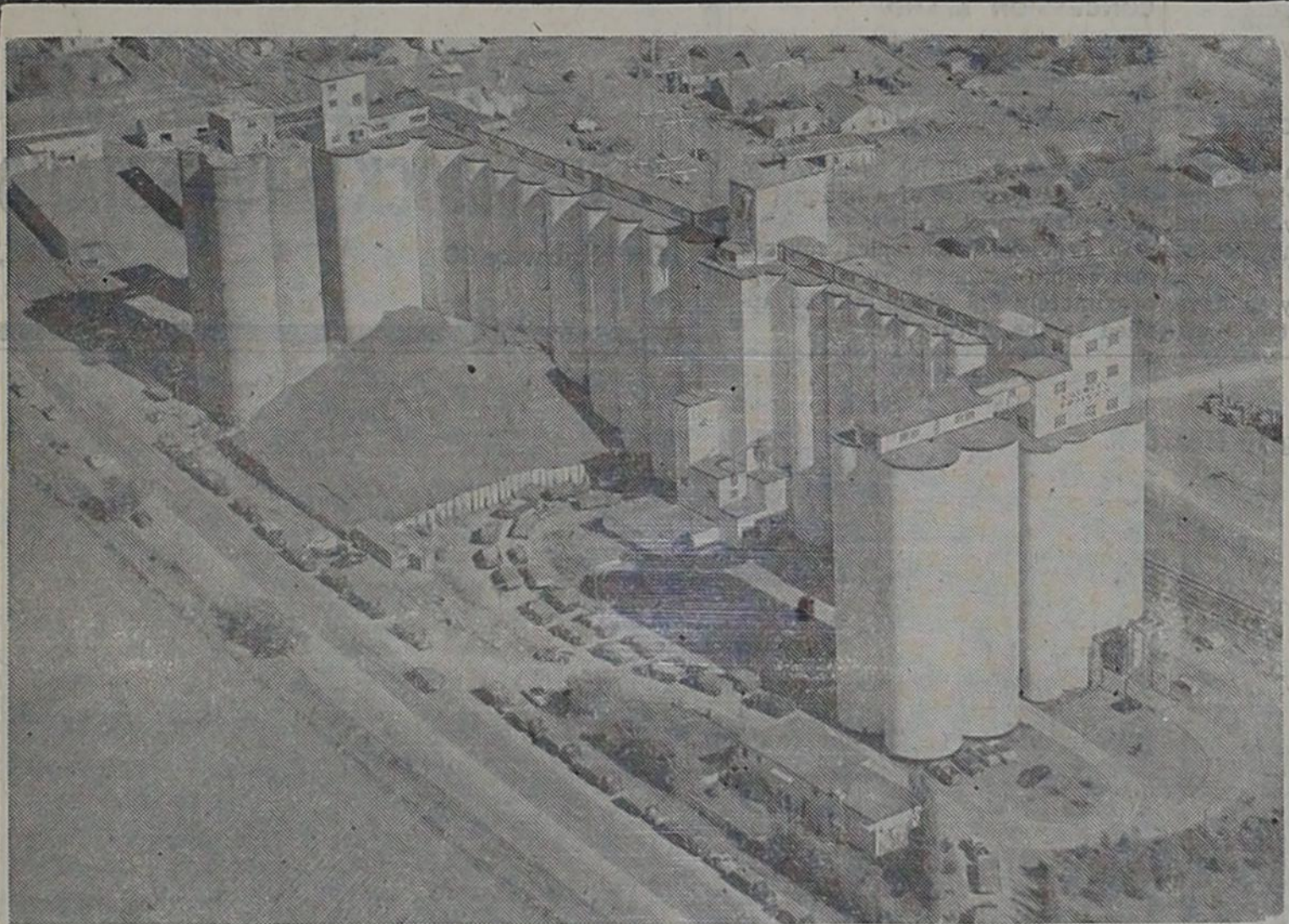
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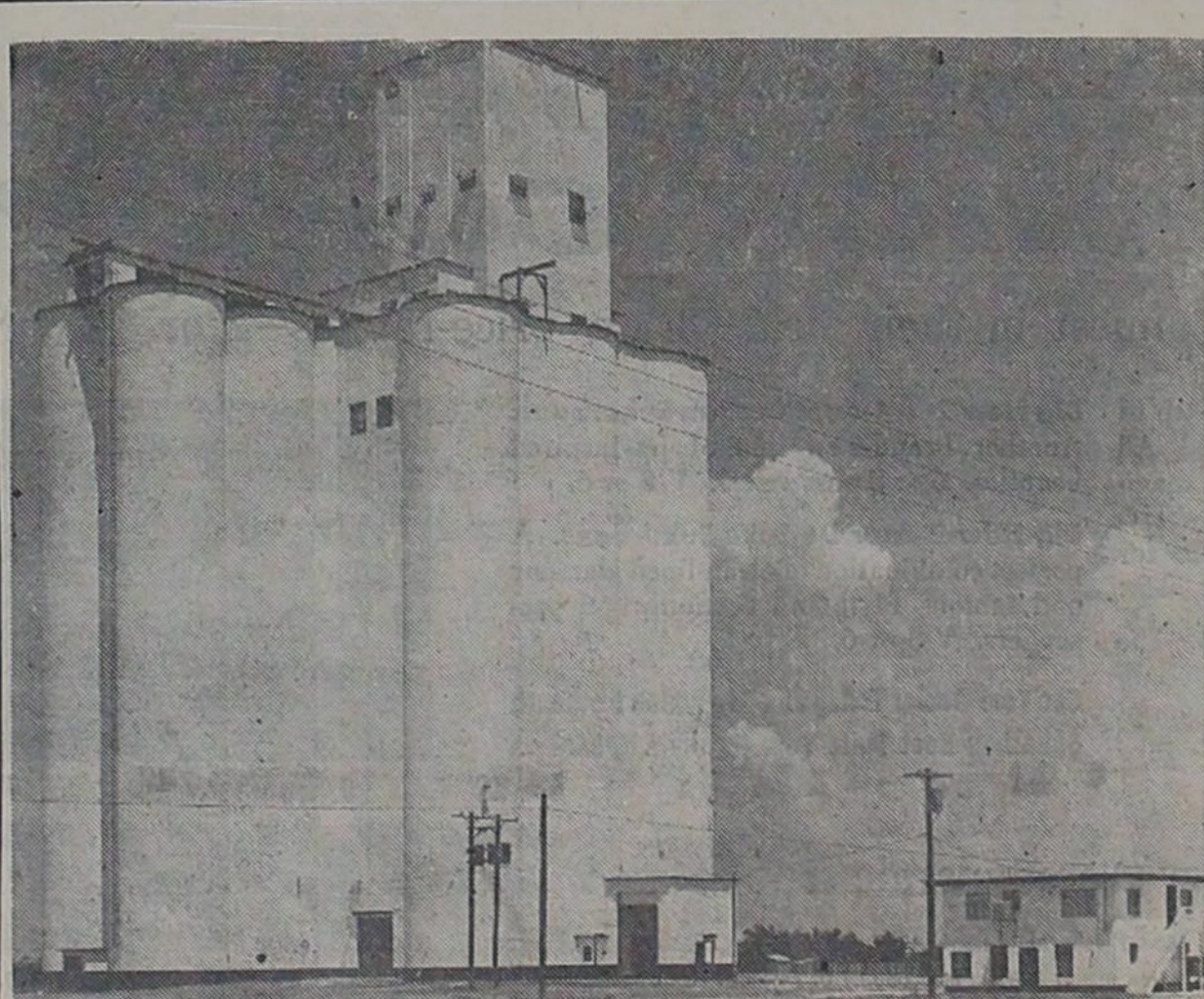
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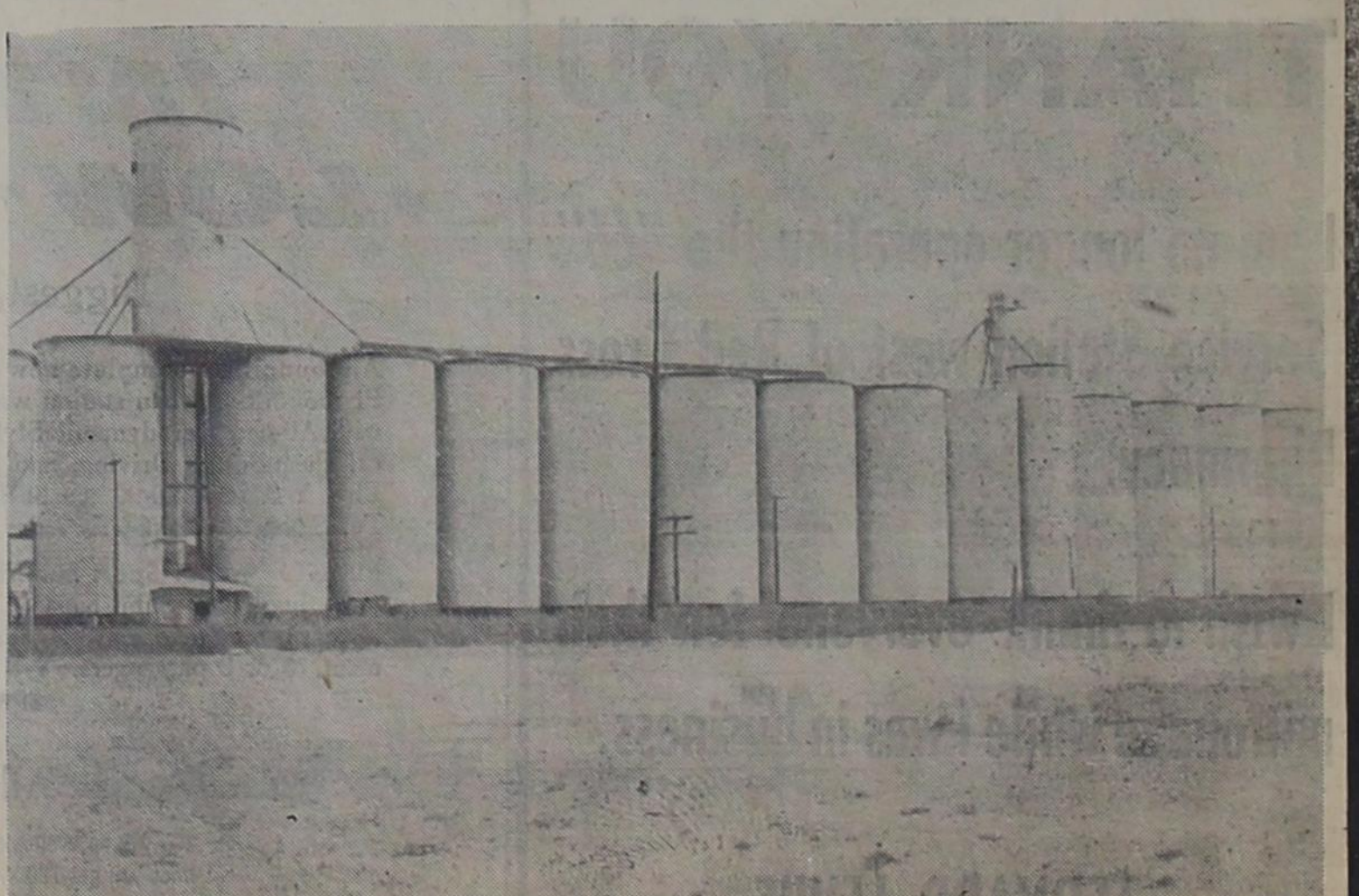
