Frankly, we were a little disappointed with Kansas, the nation's leading wheat state. They have the wheat, all right, and plenty of it, but their state isn't nearly as attractive as some would have had us believe.

One thing which amused us was that although we traveled Kansas from end to end on two different routes, we didn't see a single sunflower. And Kansas is, you know, the sunflower state. It was quite a change to get back to Farwell and see the sunflowers blooming in our front yard!

We will never complain about West Texas sandstorms since going through Kansas. Nature must have just meant for that country to blow, because that's what it's doing, right here in the middle of

Even though rains have been abundant (we saw many fields standing in water) and a lot of wheat is already up, the dust blew something terrible while we were passing through Tuesday. The area around Salina and Hutchinson seemed to be the worst.

Our first corn field was sighted just outside of Emporia, Kans., (the town William Allen White made famous), and from there on, we were never out of the tall corn.

The corn belt is everything they say it is-and then some. Although the land is closely settled and there are a great many small farms with small acreages, the extent of the corn belt is fabulous when all the acreages of these thousands of small farms are added together.

Most of the corn is still standing, and is yet to be picked. We saw quite a bit of harvesting during our trip, but things didn't appear to be going "full blast."

The corn doesn't make as pretty a sight as we had anticipated. The leaves and stalk are discolored and shriveled, and matured corn doesn't make nearly as beautiful an appearance as matured grain sorghum, for in-

## Our Farm Markets Are Undergoing Changes

This past week we had opportunity to browse through several Midwestern newspapers. Some of the things they had to say about agricultural prob-Hems were quite revealing, and we thought that one quotation referring to markets was particularly significant for not only them, but our own Southwest as well.

"Population shifts are moving Wisconsin's and wother Midwestern states' farm markets to the West Coast," Prof. W. P. Mortenson, University of Wisconsin agricultural economist, said last weekend.

He pointed out that traditionally, farm products from the central states went to the East, but now marketing firms have to send their products twice the distance to get on the Western markets, which rare skyrocketing.

The Midwestern states, it should be remembered, produce one half of the nation's milk and beef, and two-thirds of its wheat, pork, and eggs. Those producers are looking to the great Far West, where population increases have created lucrative markets for their commodities.

The thing which is significant for us here on the High Plains is that we are BETWEEN the Midwest and most of its new-found customers in the West. That should, it seems to us, put the farmers in this part of the country at an advantage over the Midwest in serving this market, especially in Southern California which is undergoing a population "explosion" at the present time.

## INTRODUCTION

Much effort has gone into the preparation of this timely article, but we of the Farwell Chamber of Commerce, who have prepared it, feel sure that it has not been time and expense which will be wasted. The story of the tremendous strides of development which this community is making should be told, and we are convinced that this is the best method of doing it.

In gathering material for this article, we drew upon sources which are considered conservative, and furthermore, we have included a large number of pictures to point out and illustrate just what we mean when we say that the big, productive Farwell area is BOOMING!

Farwell, Texas, is a community of 1100 persons situated on the Texas-New Mexico border in Parmer County. Texico, New Mexico, is our western neighbor and our towns are divided only by the state line. Farwell is situated at the focal point of transcontinental transportation routes, both truck and rail, and is served by three national highways and two main lines of the Santa Fe Railway.

As the county seat of Parmer County, Farwell serves a vast and growing territory in both Texas and New Mexico. There are many good reasons which can be given to explain the rapid growth of Farwell, which for the past three or four years has been enjoying a phenominal business and residential expansion.

In the background of every rising statistic to which we can proudly point is our agricultural prosperity, and linked directly to this are our vast underground water supplies. Recent surveys tend to indicate that there are larger amounts of water-bearing sands under the area in which Farwell is situated than have previously been developed in now famous pumping areas to the south and east.

Because of this advantage, land values have soared beyond the wildest expectations of pioneers who moved here many years ago, and today an improved quarter section of land with an irrigation well will bring \$300 per acre or more. Undeveloped land, which sells for less, looks very attractive to investors from older irrigated areas, and buyers by the scores are moving in to purchase and develop Farwell area land.

Grain sorghums, cotton, and wheat are the major crops of the fertile acres around Farwell, and as irrigation wells continue to be drilled, larger and larger amounts of these commodities are produced locally. An estimated 800 irrigation wells are in the Farwell trade area, and virtually all of these wells are capable of pumping over 1,000,000 gallons of water per day throughout the growing season. The advantage of having natural gas lines in the area is also attractive to those who wish to economize costs of pumping.



This is the downtown section of Farwell, looking west from a high vantage point. Retail trade has enjoyed a large increase over the past several years for this shopping district.



Because of its location in the heart of a tremendous irrigation development on the High Plains, Deep Well Pumps, Inc. (subsidiary of the Layne-Bowler Pump Corporation) selected Farwell as its Texas distribution point.



A big scale feeding operation which takes advantage of locally produced feedstuffs is operated south of Farwell on a paved farm-to-market road by Jewell Castor.

The total storage capacity of elevators in both Texico and Farwell is in excess of 3,000,000 bushels, with over 2,000,000 of that amount being in Farwell. And 500,000 more are going up now. Two gins serve the cotton producing farmers of the area, and one of these gins was installed as brand new equipment in 1954.

Because of the large amount of traffic which is routed through Farwell, service station payrolls make a major contribution to the community, and there are 10 of these businesses, all modernly equipped and all doing good business.

Visitors to the community are impressed by the large number of fine homes in Farwell, and home owners take great pride in making the city one of the most attractive on the Plains. Forty-seven blocks of paving, including curbing and guttering, have enhanced property values and made it easier to present an attractive landscape.


A low residential irrigation rate encourages many fine lawns, trees, and other greenery to set off the many beautiful and well cared for homes in Farwell.

The Farwell School System is one of which all its residents are justly proud. Having completed a new high school building only two years ago, school patrons have just built a new gymnasium and band hall, also. Best news of all to patrons is the fact that natural growth has resulted in such a large increase in taxable property that it was not even necessary to raise taxes to pay for the school improvements.


Speaking of taxes—and that's a mighty important item when considering a permanent location—Farwell residents are enjoying rates that other cities envy in this day of rising taxes. The valuation of the city for tax purposes is only \$1,500,000—far below what many cities of comparable size find it necessary to assess. On top of that, the rate is only 60 cents per \$100 valuation, which means that the city collects only about \$10,000 per year in taxes. With that amount, however, a modern sewer system is being paid off, and the bonded indebtedness of the city is now \$24,000—the lowest in the county.

Citizens seem to feel that when improvements can be paid for out of their pockets, it is better to get them by this method rather than put the community heavily in debt for years to come. As an example, the paving before mentioned, which cost the city about \$120,000, was paid for by property owners without it being necessary for the city to float bonds to cover the improvements.


This philosophy, plus efficient administration of the city's business, has kept for Farwell a remarkable record of low taxes—even while enjoying growing pains. Such has not been the case in many other comparable cities. Small improvements, such as street marking, are paid for in cash, too. The Chamber of Commerce has donated money and individuals have donated time to make it possible for the town to be completely marked, and nearly all homes carry residential numbers.




Tremendous quantities of water lie waiting to be tapped to turn the soil of the Farwell area into productive fields even in time of drouth. Four dry years have proven that irrigation makes the Farwell area "drouth-proof."



Boasting 1,500,000 bushels of storage, Worley Grain completed its vast elevator holdings only the past year. Warehousemen have been quick to take advantage of tremendous feed production and ideal transportation in the Farwell area.



Newest addition to the Farwell grain storage facilities is the Sherley-Anderson-Pitman Grain Company in eastern Farwell with a capacity of 750,000 bushels. It is just now being finished.



This is the new Nickels' Gin. The two gins in Fawell turned out more than 6000 bales of cotton last year in spite of severe acreage controls.

With growing population and rising per capita income, the business district of Farwell has found it necessary to take on new growth, too. Within the past year alone, many businesses, both retail and industrial, have sprung up, and more developments are anticipated in the near future.





Farwell's newest church is this handsome cream brick building for the First Baptist Church. An auditorium to adjoin the right-hand corner in the picture is planned, also.




