

# Twin Cities Relays Set Saturday

Forty teams are entered in the Texico-Farwell Lions Club-sponsored Twin Cities Relays Saturday at the cinder track behind the fieldhouse at Farwell schools.

According to James Craig, coordinator of the Relays for the local Lions Club, five more teams have been added to the list of participants.

The five new teams are Ropesville girls, Springlake-Earth boys, Anton boys and girls and Hart girls teams. There are now 16 boys teams entered and 24 girls teams.

Other boys teams entered are Bovina, Friona, House, N.M., Texico, Three-Way, Ft. Sumner, N.M., Melrose, N.M.,

Floyd, N.M., Plains, Adrian, Happy, Shallowater, Nazareth and Farwell.

Other girls teams entered are Bovina, Friona, Lazbuddie, Sudan, Springlake-Earth, House, Texico, Ft. Sumner, Melrose, Plains, Adrian, Olton, Kress, Hale Center, Seagraves, Happy, Shallowater, Whiteface, Amherst, Nazareth and Farwell.

The track meet will begin at 8:30 a.m. with a 30-minute scratch session. Both running and field events are scheduled to begin at 9:30 a.m.

Running events for girls teams will be 440-yard relay, mile relay, 880-yard relay, 60-yard dash, 100-yard dash,

220-yard dash, 440-yard dash, 880-yard run and 80-yard hurdles.

Field events will be triple jump, shot put, discus, running high jump and long jump.

Running events for boys teams will be 440-yard relay, 80-yard dash, 120-yard high hurdles, 100-yard dash, 440-yard dash, 330-yard intermediate hurdles, 220-yard dash, mile relay and mile run.

Field events are shot put, discus, high jump, pole vault and long jump.

A roast beef dinner, prepared by wives of local Lions Club members, will be served from 11 a.m. to 1:30 p.m. in Farwell school cafeteria. Cost per plate is \$1.50. Relays participants

and spectators are invited to eat the noon meal.

The local Lions Club will also be in charge of a concession stand during the day.

According to Craig, afternoon events will probably get started at 1:30 p.m.

Joe Helton, local Lions Club member, will be driving a 1973 Chevrolet, compliments of Doc Stewart Chevrolet in Clovis, promoting the New Mexico District Lions Eye Bank raffle during the Relays.

of Legislative Affairs Committee of Amarillo Chamber of Commerce.

#### Fifth 72-Car Train Left Mon.

The fifth 72-car unit train bearing grain from Shirley-Anderson elevators left Farwell Monday for Galveston.

The train, containing 27 cars from Bovina and 18 cars from Farwell, stopped in Lariat for 27 cars before traveling on to its destination.

According to Fred Chandler of Shirley-Anderson-Pitman elevator in Farwell, this was the first train to be loaded with milo. The rest were loaded with wheat.

Each car of the 72-car train carried approximately 160,000 pounds of grain which came to 11,520,000 total pounds. The amount of grain transported Monday is equivalent to about three storage tanks at the elevator, said Chandler.

Lunch will be served in the school cafeteria beginning at 11:30 a.m. and will feature roast beef. The charge for the meal will be \$1.50 per person, a real bargain.

Along with the track meet, the Lions will have a special car where interested individuals will be able to sign cards authorizing the use of their eyes, at death, for corneal transplants which will restore sight to someone suffering from eye cataracts or similar diseases of the eye.

## Rain, Snow, Wind Hits Twin Cities

Rain mixed with snow fell on the Twin Cities and surrounding area last Saturday after intermittent rain fell Friday and Friday night.

The first of this week began with warm temperatures and light breezes which changed to clouds, wind and sand Tuesday. During the day Tuesday, country residents marveled at the amount of sand that blew through the air, while city residents were awed by wavering signs and tree limbs snapping off trees that had already been battered this winter by ice and snow.

Tommy Scaff of Sheryl-Anderson Elevator in Lariat reported from 2 to 2½ inches of moisture fell over the weekend with approximately 6 to 7 inches of snow. "It seemed like we had snowflakes falling that were as big as softballs," he said.

In Farwell and Texico, reports of 3 to 4 inches of snow were received with 1.7 inches of moisture. In other areas around the Twin Cities reports were similar.

South of Texico on the John Hadley farm, 1½ inches of moisture fell with 3 inches of snow. Mrs. O. L. Woody, north of Texico, reported 1½ inch of rain with "a lot of snow", approximately 2 inches.

On the Orie Jones place south of Farwell, 1½ inches of moisture was received with 3 inches of snow.

**New Drag Race Club NHRA-Sanctioned**

Ham also brought out in his talk that more money is made by local businesses on the three-day weekend that races are staged in Amarillo than on the three weeks preceding. Ham's program included a film, "The Pro".  
The club plans to meet every two weeks and a movie dealing with racing will be shown. Prizes are given at each meeting.  
Petree said the main purpose of forming the club was to promote driver safety. He added that it is hoped it would keep kids off the street and give them something constructive to do.  
According to Petree, plans are progressing for the club's growth at a satisfactory rate. A drag strip will be built as soon as possible that will be big enough to hold an car that runs under NHRA rules, such as pros, funny cars, stockers and rails. In the case of rails, a track must be a minimum of 4200 feet long and at least 60 feet wide.  
Petree explained that the name High Plains Race Club was chosen because the club not only represents interested

persons from Clovis, but from Cannon AFB, Tucumcari, Ft. Sumner, Portales and parts of Texas. Petree especially is interested in gaining support from the Texico-Farwell area.  
One advantage which Petree has discussed is races for various philanthropic organizations such as March of Dimes. Since the club is non-profit, Petree feels it can be of use in helping others.  
He mentioned that several local businessmen, seeing the advantages of having a strip, not only as a way to keep car racing off the street, but also in bringing more business to the Clovis area, have promised to donate time and equipment needed to build it.  
Now that the club is NHRA-sanctioned it will be following rules handed down by the association as well as rules made locally. Petree said several rules will be voted on by the club at its next meeting at 7:30 p.m. MST Thursday, March 15, at the Clovis High School auto mechanics shop.  
At a meeting of the High Plains Race Club Tuesday

evening, March 6, in the auto mechanics shop at Clovis High School it was announced by President Ken Petree that the club is now officially sanctioned by the National Hot Rod Association.  
Before the club could officially be sanctioned by NHRA a certain number of members had to be drag racing under NHRA rules and an organization had to be formed.  
The organization of the club occurred Tuesday night, Feb. 27, at a meeting in the auto mechanics shop. At that time, club officers were chosen.  
Tuesday night's meeting was attended by some 130 persons. Dale Ham, South Central Division director of NHRA, expounded on the values and virtues of drag racing.  
Petree commented on controlled drag racing by saying that cars are inspected before running on NHRA-sanctioned strips and classed in order to give the driver the best chance at fair competition.  
Petree stressed the importance of fair competition by noting that drag racing on the

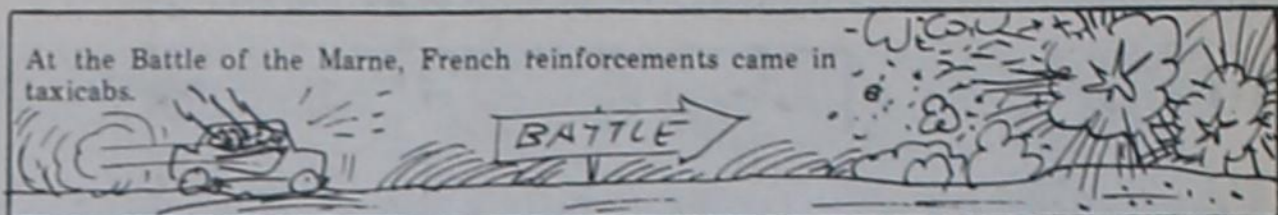
streets is not always the best for each competitor. He also mentioned the safety precautions taken on an NHRA-sanctioned strip versus the danger of street drag racing to the drivers and to other vehicles or pedestrians.  
According to Petree, the idea of belonging to High Plains Racing Club is to "save your driver's license" so you can drag on a controlled strip with good competition.

**"GRIEVE NOT THE SPIRIT"**

The first lesson each believer in Christ should learn is that immediately upon believing he is given everlasting life. Referring to this fact Ephesians 1:13,14 says:

"In whom (Christ) ye also trusted, having heard the word of truth, the gospel of your salvation in whom also having believed, YE WERE SEALED WITH THAT HOLY SPIRIT OF PROMISE."

Mark well, the believer is not sealed by the Holy Spirit, but "with" the Holy Spirit. The Spirit Himself is the seal. Every sincere believer in Christ, then, should rejoice in an accomplished redemption and rest in the fact that the Holy Spirit will keep him eternally safe.

But while we cannot lose the Holy Spirit, we can, and often do, grieve the Holy Spirit as we read in Eph. 4:30. This is why we read in Rom. 8:26 that the Spirit "helps our infirmities" and makes intercession for us, that we might live lives which please and honor God.

The wonderful fact is, however, that "nothing," not even an aggrieved Spirit, "shall separate us from the love of God" (Rom. 8:38,39). Thus in the same breath with which the apostle exhorts us not to grieve the Spirit, he again reassures us that this same Spirit keeps us eternally safe:

"And grieve not the Holy Spirit of God, whereby YE ARE SEALED UNTO THE DAY OF REDEMPTION" (Eph. 4:30).

Does this encourage careless living? Those who think so have missed the whole point of Paul's appeal. The apostle does not warn the believer that if he grieves the Spirit he will be lost. Rather, in grace he exhorts: "Do not grieve the very Spirit who in mercy and love has sealed you as forever His own. Do not repay such love with such ingratitude."

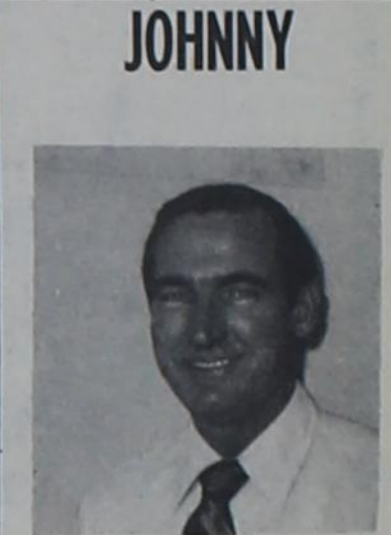

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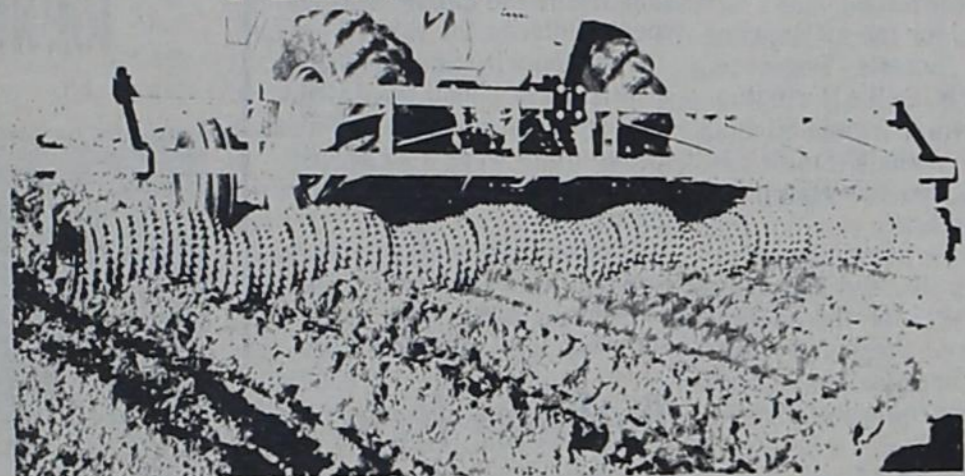
