Twin Cities Relays Scheduled March 17

Texico-Farwell Lions Club is sponsoring a gigantic track meet at Farwell cinder track south of the Farwell fieldhouse Saturday, March 17.

The Twin Cities Relays will include 14 boys teams and 21 girls teams from high schools in the Texico-Farwell area. Both Texico and Farwell boys and girls teams will be competing.

The track meet will begin at 8:30 a.m. with a 30-minute scratch session. Both running and field events are scheduled to begin at 9:30 a.m.

Running events for boys teams will be 440-yard relay, 80-yard dash, 120-yard high hurdles, 100-yard dash, 440-yard dash, 330-yard intermediate hurdles, 220-yard dash, mile relay and mile run. Field events are shot put, discus, high jump, pole vault and long jump.

Texico, Three-Way, Ft. Sumner, N.M., Melrose, N.M., Floyd, N.M., Plains, Adrian, Happy, Shallowater, Nazareth and Farwell.

Two Juveniles, Adult Charged With Felony

Parmer County Sheriff Charles Lovelace said this week that two juveniles and one adult, David Vargas, 17, all from the Oklahoma Lane community, were arraigned Monday on charges stemming from the shooting of three horses on a farm five miles south of Bovina Saturday night.

Bond for the three was set at \$1,000 each and they were bound over for Grand Jury action. All three have made bond. Tom Atkins, deputy, and Lovelace picked up the three persons on Sunday.

Three men charged with DWI over the weekend were tried Monday in Parmer County Court. They were each fined \$100 and costs. All of the men paid their fines and were released.

Lovelace said two of the horses were killed. They were valued at \$2,000. Owners of the horses were D. W. Pearson and Rev. Hunt from Muleshoe. The incident occurred on Pearson's farm.

Lovelace reported that three men charged with drunkenness were tried Monday in Justice of Peace court. One was fined \$50 and the other two were fined \$37.50 each. One man is still being held in Parmer County Jail, but the other two paid their fines and were released.

Parmer County officers are investigating vandalism of automobiles in Farwell which occurred Friday night. Two small children's bicycles were reported stolen last week from the Tim Campbell farm four miles east of Lariat. One was a girl's bike and the other a boy's bike. Officers are investigating the theft.

The calendar says that it is 18 days until spring. Last weekend would lead us to conclude that it has already unofficially arrived. Because we are naturally optimistic, we are again commenting on the delightful weather three full days before our remarks can see print.

At least we realize that nature's vagaries of weather are of short duration at this time of the year. Our area has had snowfall much later in the year than the first week of March, but we also have had some of our worst sand storms earlier than this time of the year. So possibly we can continue to trade Mother Nature a beneficent snowfall for the more destructive huffs and puffs of a duster.

Last weekend we took the opportunity to travel to Midland via the Morton, Plains, Denver City, Seminole and Andrews route through the oilfields. We could not help but notice that, to us, it appeared that about one out of two oil wells were not pumping.

We have been led to believe that oil production was at 100 per cent of capacity and that all wells would have their arms going regularly and monotonously up and down as the precious crude was brought up for refining.

We discussed this observation with some friends and received answers ranging from "there isn't an oil shortage, it's just a plot to raise prices" to "there is no oil shortage, only a lack of transportation and refining capacities."

We do not know the real reason for so many apparently idle wells but would appreciate more information on the subject. Oil, the lack of, transportation of, refining of and cost of, is going to be a subject brought increasingly closer to everybody in the near future.

Necessity is often the mother of invention. In the case of the new electronic timepieces, we are not sure whether this is because of the critical shortage of watchmakers or just the natural evolution of timekeeping in this computerized society.

Whatever the cause, it apparently is not happening too soon in the watch business. You may have noticed that getting the "ole Waterberry" repaired is no easy job. Our friend in the jewelry business, Andy Sutter, reminds us that a good example of the scarcity of watchmakers is found in Clovis.

Andy says that when Clovis was a town of about 18,000 population, there were 14 watchmakers to serve the trade territory. Today with Clovis nearing 35,000 population figure, there are just four watchmakers left to serve the almost double number of folks. Andy also points out that Clovis and this area is not unique in losing these valuable artisans. This is a nationwide situation.

To compound the woes in the future is the fact that the schools which taught watchmaking have closed due to lack of students. These schools did not just close with large numbers of students on hand. They closed because students stopped enrolling in watchmaking period.

What the solution to this problem is we do not know, but we do know that understanding and patience with your friendly watchmaker will probably get your repair job out sooner than jumping on the poor chap. After all, even if he is a disappearing breed, he's still a person who is trying his best to serve you.

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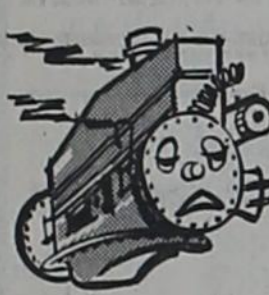
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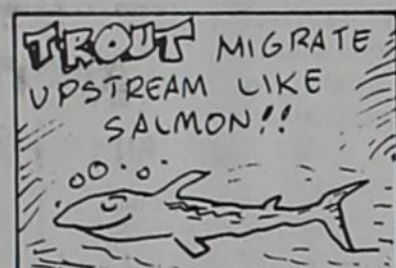

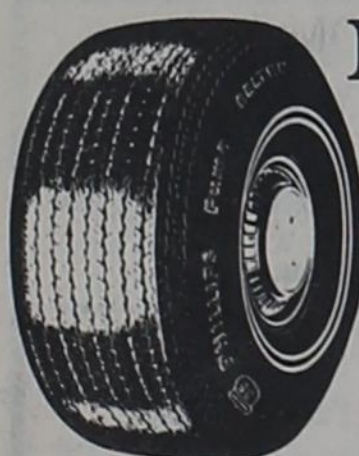

SCS Officials Discuss Good Use Of Windbreaks

The recent long siege of snow, ice and freezing weather has contributed to the deaths of over 1,000,000 head of cattle in the Texas Panhandle this winter - over \$25 million worth, according to Soil Conservation Service officials.

Could good windbreaks of trees and shrubs have reduced these cattle losses? Yes. Properly spaced windbreaks of adequate density could save the lives of many cattle each winter in Texas.

Shelter for livestock is just one of the many benefits of windbreaks. Improved wildlife habitat is another very important value, as well as beautification of the landscape.

Reduced air pollution and erosion, increased soil moisture, and greater crop yields are other benefits, to name just a few.

With all of these obvious benefits, why are so few trees planted in the plains regions of Texas? Trees and shrubs are inexpensive and often readily available.

Some kinds of windbreaks have more appeal than others. Those planted around farmsteads are most popular today. They protect homes and other

facilities from winter winds, drifting snow and dusty air. They reduce noise, create beauty and make homes more comfortable.

We also need more feedlot and field windbreaks. Feedlot windbreaks can reduce blowing dust. They can raise the daytime air temperature near windbreaks while lowering the temperature 20 to 50 yards away from an average 12-foot-high windbreak. They can reduce the windchill factor and reduce livestock suffering during cold weather. Warmer cattle in winter will make better daily gains and will remain healthier.

TRUE REVIVAL

In the days of Ezra the prophet, Israel was in much the same state as the Church today. Happily, however, some of the leaders became convicted that they had been neglecting the Word of God—especially that part which was addressed to them: the law of Moses.

As a result they made Ezra a pulpit on which to stand and read the Scriptures to the people (Neh. 8:4). "From morning until midday" he read to them, while others mingled with the audience and "caused the people to understand."

"So they read in the book of the law of God distinctly, and gave the sense," with the result that "all the people went their way to eat, and to drink, and to send gifts and to make great mirth, BECAUSE THEY HAD UNDERSTOOD the words that were declared unto them" (Vers. 8, 12).

Similarly, after our Lord had explained the Scriptures to the two disciples on the way to Emmaus,

they said to each other:

"Did not our heart burn within us, while he talked with us by the way, and while he opened to us the Scriptures?" (Luke 24:32).

Well-meaning groups and individuals have for decades been praying in vain for a true spiritual revival in the Church, but the only sure road to revival is a renewed interest in the Bible—and especially in what God there says to us in the Epistles of Paul.

When we become convicted of our neglect of God's Word; when men of God "study" to "rightly divide" its contents and begin TEACHING THE BIBLE from the pulpit, a great spiritual revival will inevitably follow.

As we study the Word of God in general, and His Word to us in particular, we, like the Israelites of Ezra's day, will experience the joy of understanding God's love letter to us.

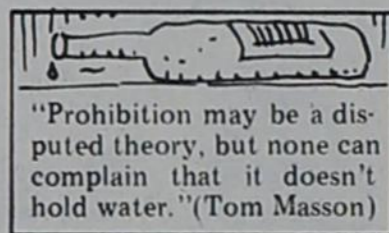
