Adriana and Mikaela will participate in the All-State Band in San Antonio Feb. 13-16. They

will have to compete for chair positions on Feb. 13, followed by three days of intense rehearsals and a performance on Feb. 16 at 3:15 p.m. at the Henry Gonzales Convention Center ballroom.

"It has been decades since Farwell has had a musician place on the All-State Band," said Shelly.

About 9,000 students in Texas tried out for 200 spots "and that says a lot about the determination and work ethic of our students. Fortunately, I have the pleasure of working every day with a room filled with young people determined to work harder and be better on a daily basis. For this, our district and community are truly blessed," said Shelly.

Drought causes county fire warning

As you know, it has been a very dry winter so far. This brings the topic of fire into a reality. A burn ban in Parmer County is in effect. And the Texas Forest Service says we are also under high fire danger due to the current drought like conditions.

With the acreage of CRP grass in our county, wildfire is a threat. Due to the rains last summer, many ditches and CRP acres had a large amount of growth. This contributes to the danger of wildfire. All that growth can help fuel a fire and allow it to spread rapidly.

Many roadsides are also grown up as well as the playa lakes which saw a large growth of weeds which are very dry and burn readily.

Protection is your best bet on avoiding damage from a wildfire. The best

advice for many of our families that live out of the city limits is mowing. Mowing those tall weeds and grass can greatly reduce the chance of a fire because it takes away much of the fuel needed to keep burning.

Another important factor is not throwing out lit cigarette butts, and extinguishing flames on items when you are finishing.

Many farmers use cutting torches to work on equipment and should take precautions when working on or around equipment that has been allowed to grow up with weeds through the summer.

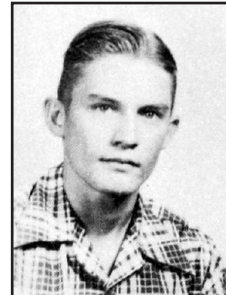
By preventing fires from getting started, we reduce many factors that contribute to a fire getting out of hand.

Luscombe heads for milestone

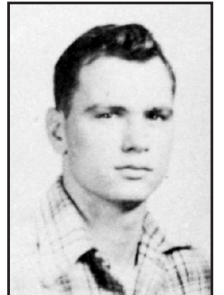

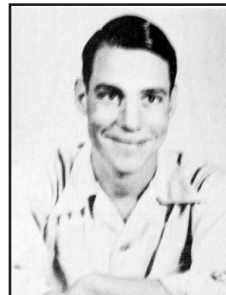

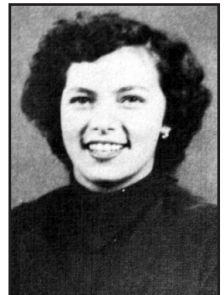

LIVE CATTLE: Live Cattle prices broke hard on Thursday this week which came as somewhat of a surprise with sharply higher cash trade. Technically, when short term support levels gave way, sellers pushed the nearby February contract all the way back to last weeks low around \$94.52. Prices held into Friday, but will need to see a quick rebound early next week or risk else risk breaking the market down for another \$1-2.

FEEDER CATTLE: Higher back months is Live Cattle prices have been able to offset some of the pressure from higher corn prices until late this week when the entire cattle complex melted down all in one day. There were some major support levels taken out, but the \$102.50 weekly support was able to hold the nearby March contract. Need a quick rebound because this market has very little support below.

CORN: Corn prices opened strong on Tuesday night and traded from one end of their ten cent range to the other into Friday's close. Both short and long term trends are still pointing higher for the moment. There is very little news to support prices at current levels, but the fundamental situation seems to have very little to do with the overall picture at this time. It seems to be the perception of things to come or events which may or may not take place in the future which has driven prices.

SOYBEANS: Beans have slowed from their earlier advance, but continue to hold at or near their contract highs. This market seems to have reached a level which have some traders questions whether \$12.70 is high enough or not? All trends are still pointing higher at this time.

WHEAT: Wheat prices began to show some signs of weakness last week, but quickly recovered when the new year began with a couple of days of 30 cent limit moves back up. The July KC contract was able to make it back to contract highs around the \$8.55 level, but has yet to break out above this level. Quite a mixed bag between the old crop/new crop price swings. Trends are still higher.

COTTON: New crop December was able to trade back to test contract highs, but has failed to penetrate those levels while the old crop March has fallen far short of testing their highs. The new crop December should find support in the fact that 2008 production could fall below a 25 year low and world production is estimated to fall below world consumption this season.

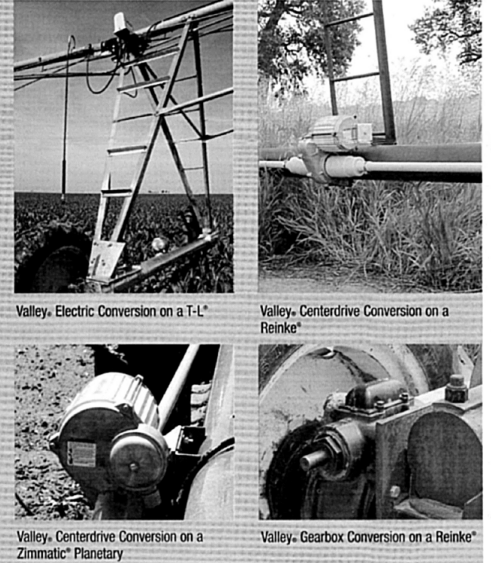

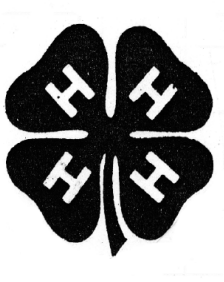

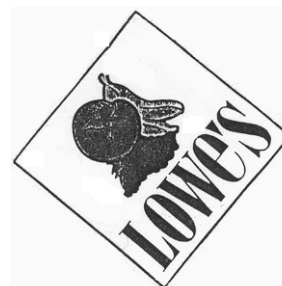
