About the worst mess we've gotten into recently was when Gran'ma had her house painted.

This time when we stop, there are four screens left over.

# Farmers Must Help Sell What They Produce

A change must come about in the thinking of most of the farmers of this nation if the optimum in sales of agricultural products is ever to be achiev-

The discouraging response to a special program presented by a member of the National Cotton Council last week, is indicative, we fear, of the general attitude of producers of this region-and probably the nation over.

John Gregg, who came to tell farmers what the outlook for sales of their highest-income-per-acrecrop is, must feel as we do, and that is that farmers usually don't give a hang what happens to their cotton once it has been taken to the gin.

Our conclusions in this matter have not been drawn from that meeting of last week alone-it simply served as a reminder of what we have seen in other ways.

What the reason for this lack of interest in sales can be is hard to clearly define. The effect of the government serving as a market instead of a storehouse in many instances has no doubt been partly to blame.

However, the problem is more extensive than that, and is largely, we believe, a result of improper education, or better said, the lack of proper education.

With competing fiber (man-made synthetics) pouring money for advertising and sales promotion into their merchandising program at a rate that is 80 times greater than the meager amount allowed the Cotton Council, it is small wonder that cotton, for instance, is hard pressed to keep its grip on present markets, let alone develop new ones.

The day of the "come and get it" slogan is gone forever.

Raw material buyers are not interested so much in how much you have to sell, or surprisingly enough, how much you want for it! They want to know the good points of your product-how your product can be used to open new markets for them.

Manufacturers of rayon, dacron, nylon, and other synthetics are doing this, don't think they're not. They are SELLING THEIR GOOD POINTS and not mentioning their weaknesses!

The USDA and several strong national farm organizations believe that lower prices for farm products will automatically increase consumption of them. So do we-but only to a limited extent,

Instead of making our cotton, our grain sorghungs) or wheat sound cheap, we think we ought to be telling the world about how superior they are in so many ways, and how even at \$200 a bale, or \$3 a hundred, or \$3 a bushel, they are tre-

This week, the writer's wife was amazed to read an advertisement in the Dallas News wherein a nationally-famous store was offering variety cards for \$2.50 per box. It happened that she was engaged in a money-raising project in connection with an organization to which she belongs, and she had been selling the same brand and style of cards for \$1 per box (25 cents per box more than they cost her). And we feel sure that the Dallas store's sales were enormous on that single item they so effectively promoted.

The same principle of merchandising can be applied, we feel sure, to raw materials as well munities need to develop faster.

### Safety Department to **Receive Applications**

Austin-Applications are being received by the Texas Department of Public safety for appointment as Driver's License Examiner, according to a statement released today by Col. Homer Garrison, Jr., Director of the State Safety De-

partment. Young men between the ages of 21 and 35, inclusive, may apply between now and September 20th, closing date for receiving applications, according to Garrison.

In addition, applicants must meet the following qualifications: be not less than 5 feet 8 inches in height; weigh not less than two nor more than three pounds per inch of height; have a high school education; be of good moral character and subject to rigid character and physical examinations. Also, they must have resided in Texas

for at least a year. Garrison said that examinations will be given late in September to fill 23 existing vacancies in the Driver's License Division caused by resignations, promotions and transfers.

Student examiners are paid \$275 monthly during the first month of training. They are then raised to \$306 per month for the initial three months of their first field assignments. After that they receive the maximum pay scale of \$315. Additional benefits are: two

weeks paid vacation annually; and both retirement and social security provisions. Application blanks may be secur-

ed at the State Driver's License District Office or by writing directly to A. F. Temple, Chief, Driver's License Division, Texas Department of Public Safety, Aus-

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



Waste of underground water as defined in Texas Law was amended in the 1955 session of the Legislature by adding the following section:

"(e) WILLFULLY CAUSING, SUFFERING, OR PERMITTING UNDER-GROUND WATER PRODUCED FOR IRRIGATION OR AGRICULTURAL PURPOSES TO ESCAPE INTO ANY RIVER, CREEK, OR OTHER NAT-URAL WATER COURSE, DEPRESSION, OR LAKE, RESERVOIR, DRAIN, OR INTO ANY SEWER STREET HIGHWAY REPORTED. UPON THE LAND OF ANY OTHER PERSON THAN THE OWNER OF SUCH WELL, OR UPON PUBLIC LAND."
