First Since 1967 - -

Electric Company Seeks General Rate Increase

Southwestern Public Service Company announced this week that it will seek the first general rate increase from its Texas customers since 1967.

The proposal requests an average increase of 10 percent, to be effective with billings in September of this year. The request is addressed to municipal governments in the communities served by the company, those bodies being the regulatory authority in Texas. Southwestern has had only two previous rate increases, 23 and 7 years ago, respectively. The 1967 increase was 7.62 percent. There have been 14 rate reductions since 1942, when the company took its present form.

Increased costs of labor, materials, money and taxes were cited by the company as the major reasons for the rate increase request. Spokesmen said that a standard wooden pole had increased in cost by 175 percent since the last rate change, with a 365 percent increase in the price of cross-arms used on the poles.

Other increases in costs since 1967 include a 162 percent rise in the price of steel for substations; a 124 percent increase in copper wire; labor costs up nearly 54 percent and taxes going up by almost 57 percent. Interest paid on borrowed money has jumped up 68 percent.

The company pointed out such increases in other prices since 1967 as 108 percent for ground beef; 67 percent for coffee; 58 percent for milk; 28 percent for margarine; and 100 percent for lettuce as indications that its request for an average increase of 10 percent was reasonable.

For residential service in homes which are not electri-

cally heated and do not have electric water heaters, the new schedule is as follows: 7.10 cents per kwh for the first 50 kwh used each month, 4.70 per kwh for the next 50 kwh used each month, 2.35 per kwh for the next 900 kwh used each month, and 1.90 cents per kwh for all additional kwh used each month.

Southwestern's average residential customer uses 536 kilowatt-hours a month. Under the new rates, his monthly bill with be increased \$1.38, or 8.9 percent.

The company has a fuel-cost adjustment as a part of its approved rates. This allows it to pass on to customers increases in fuel costs. However, fuel is only about 20 percent of the total cost of providing service and there is no similar protection against the increases that

have taken place in the other 80 percent of the costs necessary to provide service.

In connection with the fuel-cost adjustment, it is charged on the basis of the number of kilowatt-hours used by the customer. As a result, it has the least effect on customers using smaller amounts of energy, both as to amount and percentage of bill, and has the most effect, both ways, on larger consumers.

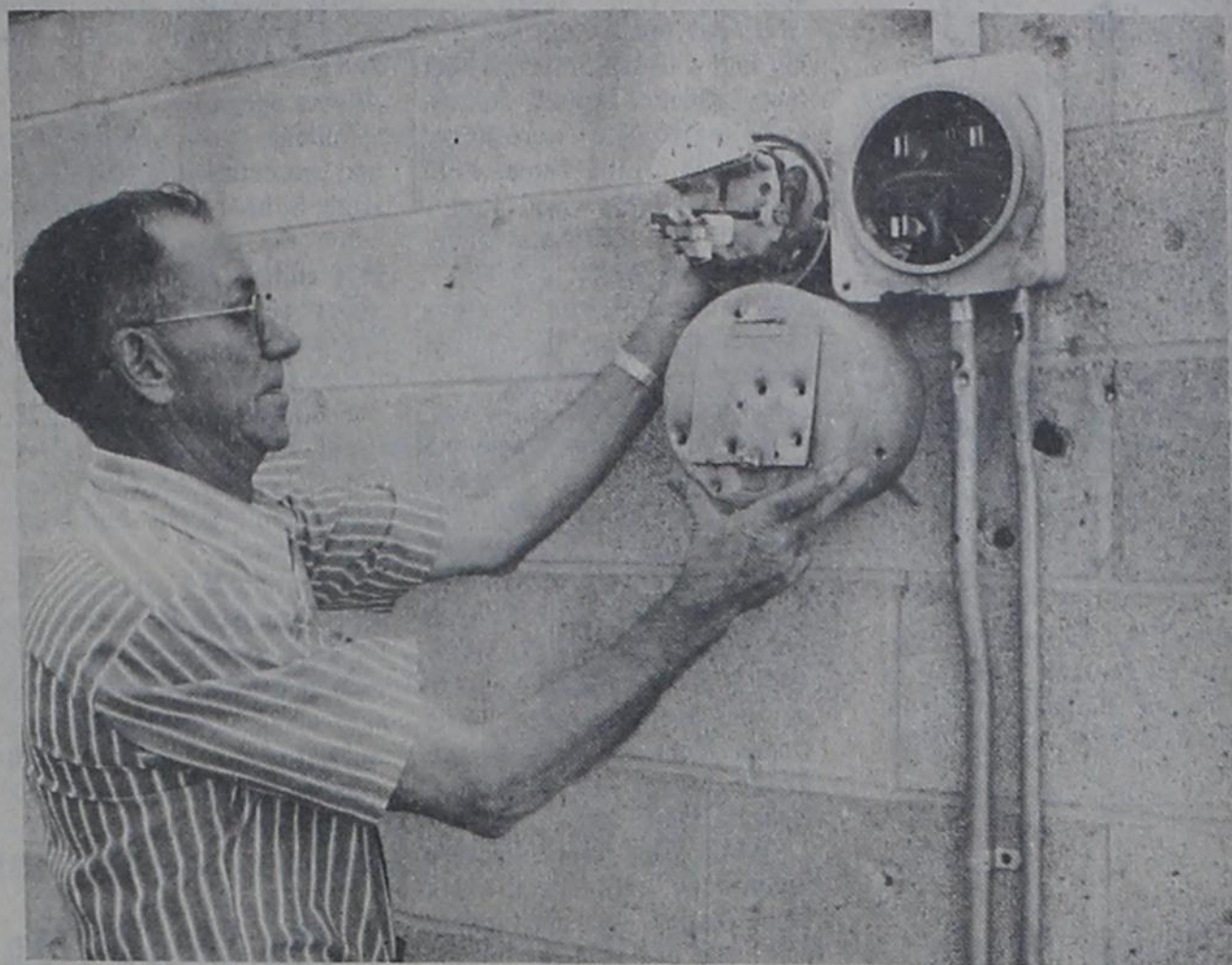
Southwestern's peak demands for electric service fall in a short three to four-month summer season because of irrigation of agricultural crops and air conditioning. In order to more evenly balance the year-round load on the company's system and use the generating equipment and transmission and distribution lines most efficiently and economically, the company offers electric heating rates during the winter season. This type of rate structure benefits all residential customers, whether they heat electrically or not, because it brings in more revenue dollars, which helps keep all rates lower, than would be the case without the incentive for those customers

Development Commission Confers With Architect

Members of the Farwell Development Commission met Monday, May 20, at Security State Bank in conference with

architect Charles Mannot of Oklahoma City, Okla., in a two and one-half hour session for the purpose of discussing plans

for the proposed nursing home for Farwell. Present for the session were Charles Mannot, Beau Mannot, Rev. W. T.

Perry, Mr. and Mrs. R. W. Anderson, Mr. and Mrs. Don Williams, Pudge Rose, Charles Aycock and Bill Nance.

During the session, Mannot presented preliminary sketches of the nursing home facility, both 60-bed and 120-bed units. Several possible modifications of the presented plans were discussed but members of the Commission decided against any changes at the present time.

One area of discussion covered by those present was the cost of constructing the facility. In addition to this expenditure, the actual cost of furnishing, operating and stocking the nursing home was thoroughly discussed by the Commission. One aspect of operation suggested to the Commission was the possibility of the local development commission constructing the home, then leasing the facilities to a management company which specia-

Olympic Games Slated For Elementary, Kindergarten

With their eyes envisioning how a trophy or winner's ribbon would look in their trophy case or mounted on their wall, students of Farwell's kinder-

garten and elementary schools are preparing for the 1974 edition of elementary olympics scheduled to get underway at 11:30 a.m. Tuesday, May 28.

It has been announced by Vernon Scott, elementary principal, that trophies will be awarded to the high point boy and girl in each class with ribbons going to places one, two and three in each class in each event.

Activities will get underway with the broad jump at 11:30 a.m. Third grade girls and boys will be competing at the south pit while fourth grade girls and boys jump at the north pit. At 12 noon, fifth grade girls and boys will compete in the broad jump at the south pit and second grade boys and girls at the north pit. At 12:30 first grade and kindergarten boys and girls will take over the pits with the first grade at the south and

kindergarten at the north.

Following broad jump competition, runners will prepare for the 50-yard dash to begin at 1 p.m. Classes are to run in this order: kindergarten, first grade, second, third, fourth and fifth. At 1:30 the 440-yard walk will begin with third grade students followed by competition by the fourth grade class. The 100-yard dash, open only to fifth grade students will begin at 1:45.

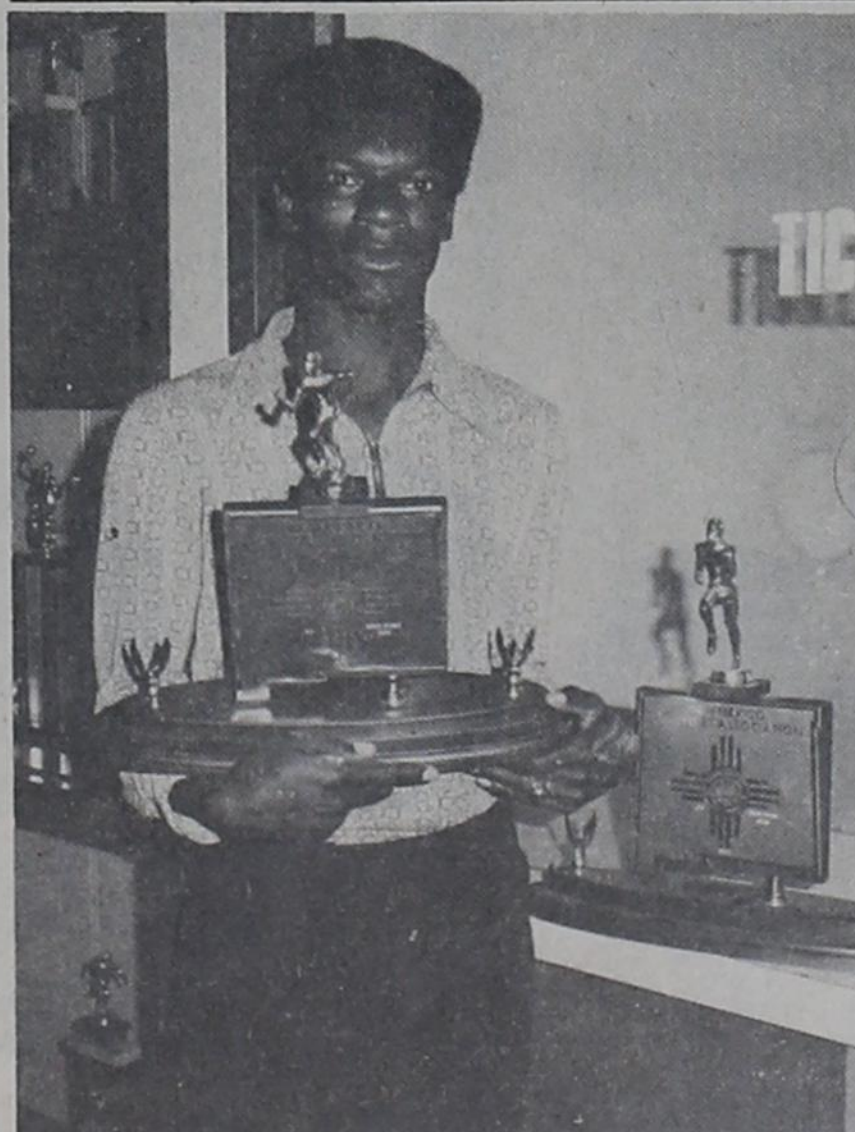
Kindergarten will open competition in the 440-yard relay at 1:55 followed in competition by the first, second, third, fourth, then fifth grade classes.

Finale of the olympics will be the 440-yard dash in which only boys from the fifth grade will be participating.

A couple of week-ends ago we accepted an invitation from the City of Carlsbad, N. M. to a "Press Day" in that city. Members of the news media from New Mexico, Texas and Kansas were invited.

This was a tremendous undertaking for a city of this size but one that was carried off in a first class manner. The red carpet was rolled out to some 150 news people.

The Carlsbad Chamber of Commerce is establishing this as an annual event in the hopes of expanding the volume of tourist traffic. Apparently tourism in that area, as well as in all other parts of the country, has experienced a slump in the number of visitors. Carlsbad and its Chamber of Commerce "Goldcoaters" are out to do something about it and we think they will get a lot done to improve tourism to the "Cave City".

This year the event was built around the general opening of the "New Cave" in the vicinity of the well-known Carlsbad Caverns. The new cave is some 16 or 17 miles from the main cave and is quite a bit different in appearance as well as accessibility. Frankly, it is only for the hale and hearty and those who like a good hike.

The entrance is about a mile and a quarter up a hillside with a very narrow path switchbacking up the hill. The interior is likewise traversed by a very narrow footpath made more difficult by the fact that there is no cave lighting and everyone carries a flashlight to not only light the cave but to show where to walk.

This cave is not as moist or as cool as the big cave, but it does contain many interesting formations that make the cave trip worthwhile.

Another item on the tour was a peek at the new Carlsbad Zoological - Botanical State Park. This is set atop a prominent hill north of the town and affords a striking panoramic view of the river and the entire town. The park is the result of very close cooperation between the city and the State of New Mexico.

The State has pumped some \$4 1/2 million into the project in the past three years which has created a microcosm of plant and animal life in the Southwest. This is another fine new attraction for the area that will surely pull many tourists. Also the newest federal park is the Guadalupe mountain area that offers some fascinating trails for those who like to hike.

All told, Carlsbad is working hard as a town to improve its position in the tourist trade. Officials are making a mighty good pitch to capture visitors from the immediate Southwest area with these new attractions. Nature has provided the scenery, but the Carlsbad Chamber of Commerce is providing the publicity and the many amenities of life to which the American tourist is accustomed.

We recommend a week-end, or longer, in Carlsbad. You will enjoy every minute of it - we did.

lizes in the actual operation of nursing homes.

"Financing is a big problem," said one member of the Commission. It was reported that Charles Aycock, attorney for the Commission, is currently checking into the matter of a bond issue to matter of a bond issue to alleviate the burden of construction.

Other modes of financial aid probed by the Commissioners was financing through FHA (Federal Housing Authority) and through the SBA (Small Business Administration). Following discussion on the matter, it was concluded that financing with FHA was not the feasible route to take. Financing with the SBA is a promising route to investigate but Commissioners are faced with the fact there may be a limitation on the amount of a loan for construction. Mannot, as an architect, talked about the probable limitation on the original structure to a 60-bed unit so there will be no over-building. In further discussion on cost, it was noted that the retirement of the original construction expenditure must

be made over a reasonable length of time and the debt for services such as salaries, supplies, etc., must be recovered. In connection with recovering such debts possible charges to patients were touched upon but there was no real way of determining such charges without knowing the actual basic expenditures.

It was reported that the nursing home must have the approval of the Panhandle Regional Planning Commission as well as some state regulatory bodies which have to approve nursing homes. The local development commission is now in the process of acquiring the needed approvals.

"In the two and one-half hour discussion, we touched on things which seem small but are all important and vital to laying the foundation for a nursing home in Farwell," stated W. T. Perry. "We are now one step farther along, a step that has to be made."

preferring electric heat.

The new general service rate that applies to most commercial customers, is as follows: 7.1 cents per kwh for the first 100 kwh used each month, 4.6 per kwh for the next 900 kwh used each month, 2.4 per kwh for the next 6,000 kwh used each month, 1.4 per kwh used each month, and .9 cents per kwh for all additional kwh used each month.

(When the commercial customers' demand - the number of kilowatts the company must have to serve his load - exceeds 10 kw, the 4.6 cents block of the rate is extended 38 kwh for each kw of demand above 10 kw. This demand feature affects only the larger customers.)

The company projects that the rate increase will produce annual revenues in Texas, where it serves the great majority of its customers, of \$6,161,000.00. Of this amount, \$3,021,000.00 will go for additional taxes.

In the face of high interest costs that now range from 9 to 11 percent, the company's rate of return on its investment is 5.87 percent. If the proposed new rate had been in effect during 1973, it would have yielded a rate of return of 6.61 percent. Texas law allows as much as 8 percent rate of return for utility companies.

Curtis Lindley - -

Texico Trackster Captures Three Firsts At State Meet

In competition against 33 AA teams from New Mexico, Curtis Lindley of Texico High School, the defending Class AA long jump and 220 champion, leaped 23'9" in long jump competition to break the 23'7/8" record which has been in standing since 1955 at the New Mexico State Track Meet at Hobbs Friday and Saturday, May 17 and 18.

Lindley, who qualified in five events for the State Meet also broke the standing 100-yard dash record by dropping the time a tenth of a second to 9.8 in the preliminary heat Friday. The Texico trackster won the 220 in 22.7 after running a time of 22.4 in the preliminaries. He was credited with pulling Texico from third to second in

the 880-yard relay and from sixth to fourth in the 440-yard relay with his "anchor legs."

Teaming with Lindley in 880 yard competition were Wolverines James Steward, Spencer Turner and Jimmy Ortiz. 440-yard relay team members besides Lindley were Tommy Galvan, Turner and Steward.

Lindley, who said he had his heart set on winning five gold medals at the state meet, finished his high school track career with six state championships, three in the long jump, two in the 220 and one in the 100. He was awarded the state high point trophy for his 23 3/4 accumulated points.

James Steward, another mighty Wolverine trackster, ran to a fifth place win in 220-

yard dash competition to aid his team in capturing second place in the overall meet with 32 points behind first place Jal with 39 1/2 points.

Dwayne Kelley and Eugene Wallace ran in the 180-yard low hurdles but were unable to qualify for the state finals. James Steward ran the 100-yard dash preliminaries but was also unable to clock a qualifying time.

Seven Texico Wolverine track team members were entered in competition at the state meet. They were Tommy Galvan, Spencer Turner, James Steward, Jimmy Ortiz, Curtis Lindley, Dwayne Kelley and Eugene Wallace. Coach of the Wolverines is Bucky Walters assisted by Daryl Haley.

BUY THE TRUTH AND SELL IT NOT

Every true Christian should understand that *the truth costs*. If you don't think so, make it your own, value it, defend it, stand for it, and see if it doesn't cost. Before you are through it may cost you far more than you had thought - hours of ease and pleasure, friends and money. Yes, the truth costs. Salvation is gloriously free but the truth costs - that is if you want it for yourself. Many who know the truth won't buy it. They won't pay what it costs to say: "This is what I believe. This is my conviction." The truth isn't worth that much to them.

But God's Word urges us: "Buy the truth!" Not, "Buy it if you can get it at a bargain; if the price is not too great." No, "Buy the truth!" Buy it at any price. It's far more valuable than anything you can give in exchange for it.

And when you have bought it - "sell it not." How many, alas, have bought the truth only to sell out again. For awhile they valued and

defended some God-given light from His Word, but presently they sold it again for something that seemed more valuable. Perhaps it was peace with others, or position, or popularity, or some other temporal gain. They still gave mental assent that it was the truth, but it formed no part of them. It was no longer a conviction. Such should read again the Spirit's counsel: "Buy the truth, and sell it not." He does not say: "Don't sell it unless you can get a very good price for it." He says: "Sell it not." Sell it not at any price. Buy it, no matter what it costs and when it is yours do not sell it for any price or under any consideration.

It is because the truth is so little valued in this indifferent age, that many of God's people have become so spiritually powerless. They hold opinions instead of convictions, because the inflexible, unchangeable Word of God is given little place in their lives. But God uses those who "buy the truth and sell it not."

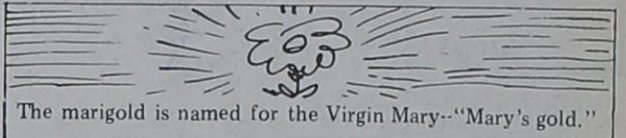

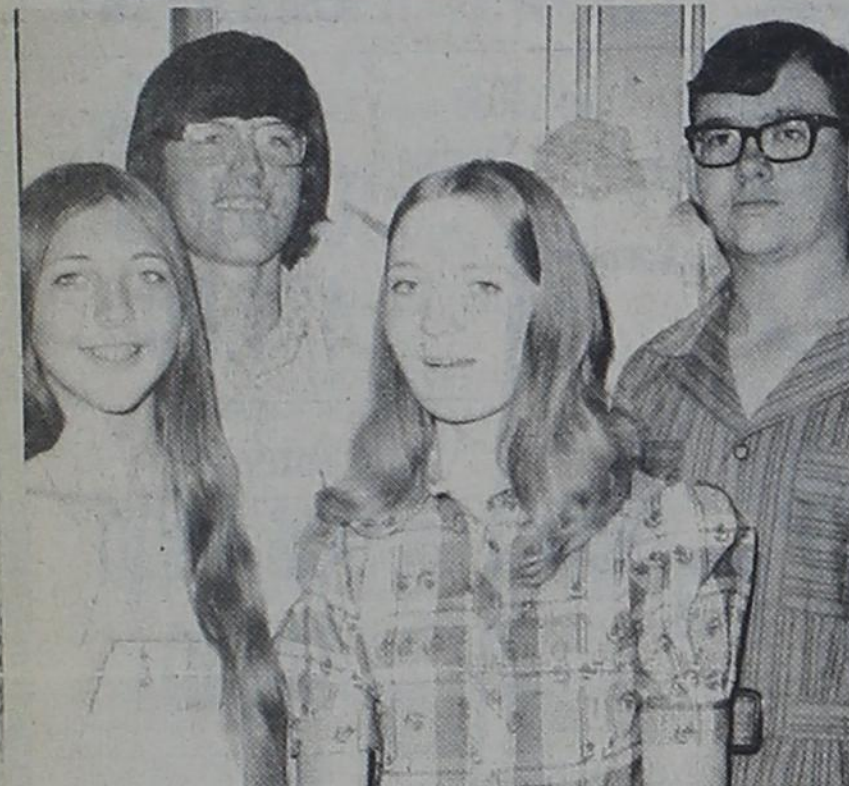

BARBECUED BEEF TURNOVERS

Make a two-crust recipe for pastry and store in refrigerator while making this sauce.

- 2 cloves of garlic
- 1/2 green pepper
- 1 small onion
- 2 Tbsp. butter
- 2 Tbsp. brown sugar
- 2 cups chopped leftover roast beef
- 1/2 tsp. dry mustard
- 1/2 c. catsup

- 1/2 c. cold water
- 2 Tbsp. vinegar
- 2 Tbsp. Worcestershire sauce
- 1/2 tsp. black pepper
- 1/2 tsp. hot pepper sauce

Chop garlic, pepper and onion finely and cook in skillet with melted butter until wilted. Add remaining ingredients and cook slowly for 15 minutes. Put 2 cups chopped leftover roast beef in bowl and add enough sauce to moisten well. Preheat oven to 400 degrees. Roll pastry on floured board to thickness 1/8 inch. Cut into 9-inch squares and put mound of filling in center of each. Brush edges with water, then fold into triangles and seal edges together with a fork. Bake on cookie sheet for 15-20 minutes or until brown. Serve with remaining sauce.



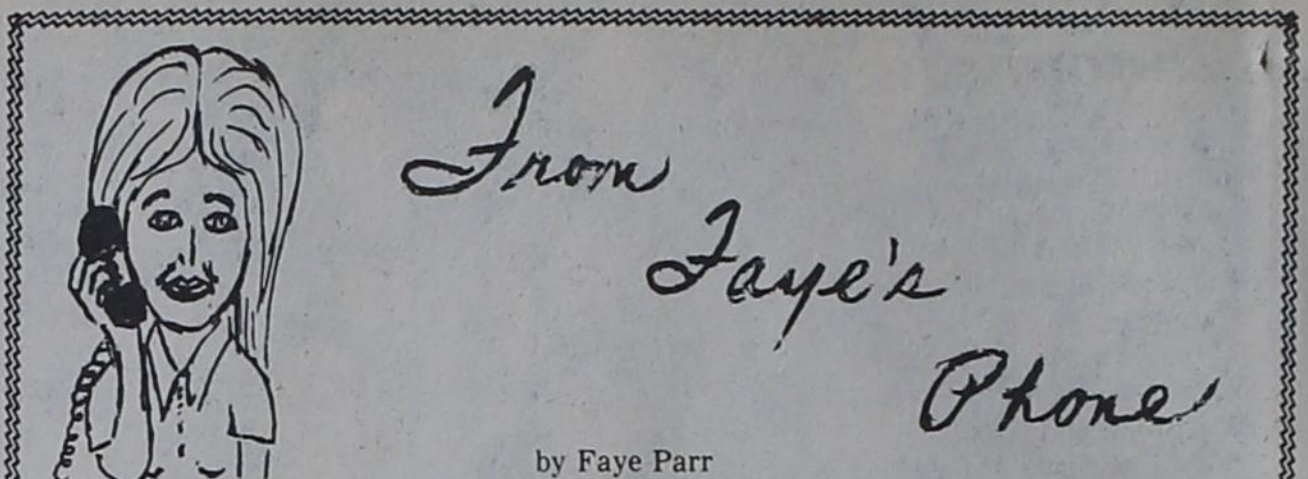

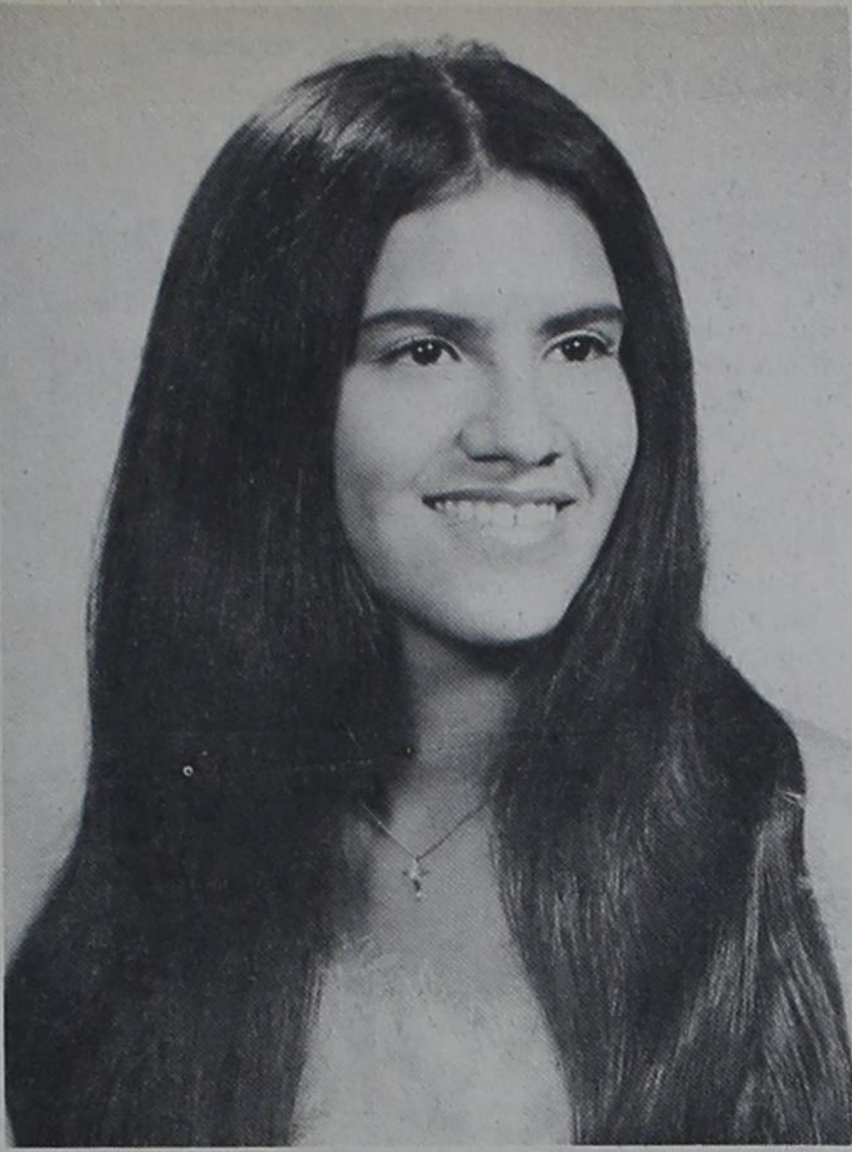

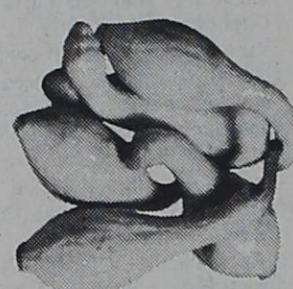
