FROM THE

Nothing could have pleased the staff of The Tribune more than to be awarded first place in the nation in service to agriculture, as this newspaper was by the National Editorial Association in Louisville last week.

In our mind, this is one of the highest achievements a small newspaper can win in an area such as ours, where agriculture is the predominant industry. Our thanks to Joe Jones, our county agent, who has been so helpful with this type news

For Joe's thoughtfulness in reminding us of timely farm stories, and for his cooperative spirit whenever we go to him for assistance, we are indebted.

Several of the editors from all over the nation whom we talked with in Louisville last week told us that we are fortunate to have an agent so interested in seeing the local newspaper do a thorough job of farm coverage.

Our trip to Kentucky and back rolled up about 2700 miles. We aren't sure of the actual distance for the reason that our speedometer wore out on the way back. It was, however, about 1350 miles to Louisville, and we presume about the same distance back.

In the area through which we traveled, there are no signs of the much-publicized drouth. All parts of the country seem to be having general rains this spring.

Even the Panhandle of Texas and the ranges of southeastern Oklahoma have put on a good cover of grass, and things look greener than we believe we have ever seen them.

We are sold on the idea of turnpikes, even though they cost the motorist who wants to drive on them. After a sample of the Turner pike between Oklahoma City and Tulsa, we are fans of the tollroad system.

It wasn't so much the quality of the pavement itself-because we have seen smoother four-lane projects lots of times—as it was the safety which is a built-in feature of a turnpike.

No cars are permitted to enter the pike except through the toll gates at either end, which means that the hazard of swooping down from a hill and up behind a farm pickup entering from a side road has been eliminated. The maximum speed on this pike was 70 miles per hour, although it seemed to us that most people paid no attention to the ceiling. More important, the minimum is 40, and the slow pokes which are hazards on modern highways are non-existent.

The 40 to 50 inches of rain takes its toll on the land, however. The rolling hills fall easy prey to severe erosion when cleared and put into cultivation.

The alfalfa and pasture that country can produce with just normal rainfall is amazing. The prettiest farms are those which have beef or dairy cattle on these lush pastures.

Most of the land we saw looks extremely unproductive. The soil ranged in color from a sickly yellow to a pale pink. It surely didn't look very healthy. We suppose that this condition is a result of both heavy and long-time cropping, plus the leaching action which so much rain would produce.

Surprisingly enough, the corn and other field crops aren't much farther along than ours here on the Plains. A lot of the land still is in the bedding stage and hasn't been planted. Their cotton is mostly in the three-four leaf stages.

For our Plains farmers, who so often wish they could trade a few of our duststorms for some of that eastern weather, a trip through the humid areas of southern Missouri, Kentucky, and Tennessee would cure some of this longing.

The Plains, with their flat, fertile fields so suited to mechanical operations, are a far cry from the tiny farms of the Southeast, whe e we saw about as many horse-and-plow scenes as we did those which depict modern agriculture.

Joe Magness, who farms south of Farwell, brought in the load. Of the Wichita variety, the wheat weighed 60.6 pounds per bushel and the moisture content was 13.25 percent, Brooks says. The irrigated wheat was making around 30 bushels per acre. Magness sold his first load for \$1.85 per bushel and he received a \$25 premium for its being the first received at Lone Star.

Magness also brought in the second load. It was delivered to Worley Grain Company in Farwell Saturday morning. This load had a moisture content of 14 percent and weighed 60 pounds per bushel, says Herbert Potts, elevator man-

Sherley-Anderson-Pitman elevator in Farwell, Billy Fields of the West Camp community delivered the first load, says Johnie Williams, manager. It weighed 62 pounds per bushel and moisture content was 13 percent. Fields received a \$25 premium for its being the first load at Sherley-Anderson-Pitman.

At Roberts Seed Company in Texico, the first load arrived late Monday afternoon. The Comanche wheat was grown by D. J. Brown, who farms south of Texico, says Pat Patrick of Roberts Seed. It was good wheat according to Patrick, and weighed 60 pounds per bushel. Moisture content was 13 percent.

Wheat harvest is a little earlier this year than last, and the local elevator managers expected it to get started good this weekend or the first of next week.
