Public Service Starts Power Improvements

This week, Southwestern Public Service Company began a power improvement program for the Twin Cities. The increased power capacity of the new lines being installed will affect the west side of Farwell and all of the city of Texico.

The improvements in transmission capacity will also result in many of the smaller lines and transformers disappearing from view. The project will begin at the substation located in the 400 block of Avenue A in Farwell and

continue along the highway west into Texico.

According to Otis Huggins, local manager of Southwestern Public Service Co., the improvements will take about 30 days to complete at a cost of about \$30,000 to the company.

Area football fans are urged to come out and support the Farwell Steers and the Texico Wolverines today by attending the pep rallies at their respective schools.

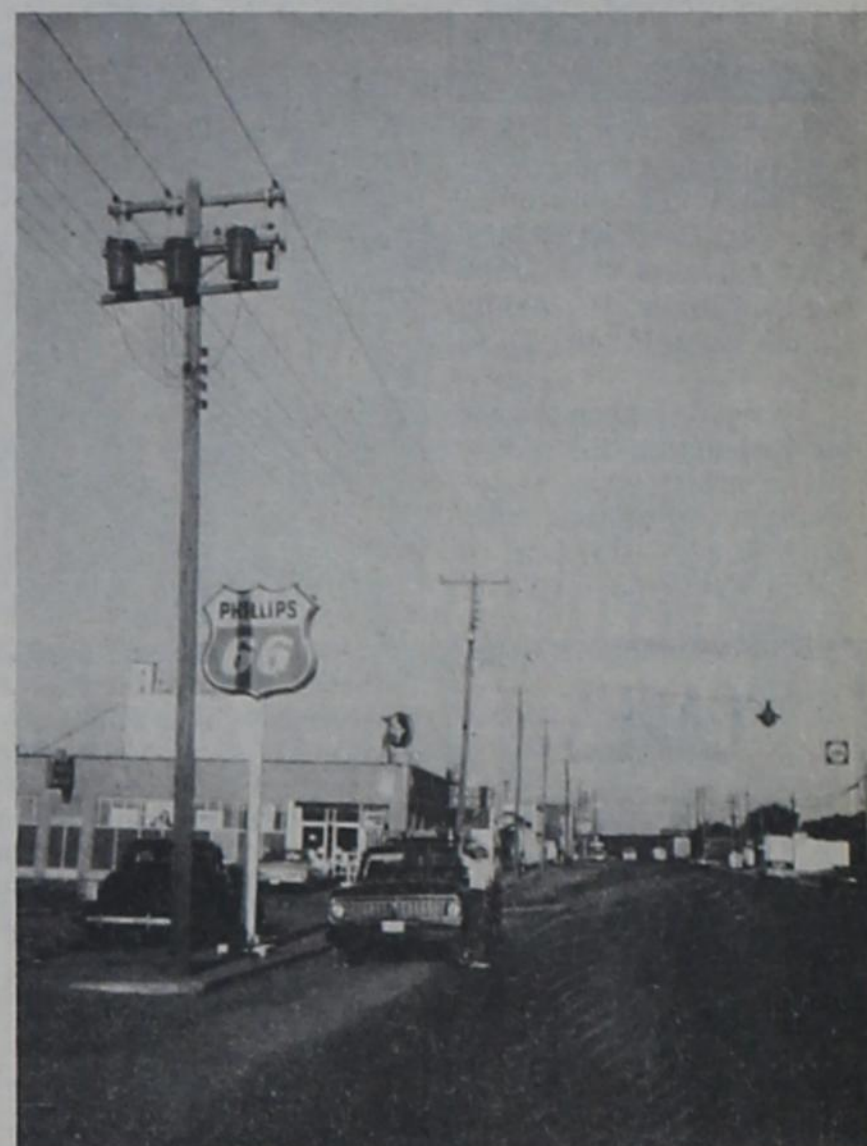

Mr. Taylor, 81, a resident of Curry County since 1907, died Wednesday afternoon in Clovis Memorial Hospital. He moved to the Texico community in 1913 and farmed in that area until his retirement. He resided in Clovis at 912 S. Walnut at the time of his death. The feel of fall is in the air. Monday morning of this week we jumped out of bed, betimes, and dashed out of the house in our usual short sleeve shirt. This was a mistake as we promptly raised a crop of goose bumps. We had listened to several weather forecasters Sunday evening but apparently failed to hear what they were saying about the prospect of a cool spell. Ah well, our helpmeet often accuses us of not hearing what has been said to us. Maybe so she is right.

Whatever the case, school has started, football begins tonight, Friday, and our front yard tree is rapidly changing its habiliments in anticipation of a long winter nap. Oh yes, the TV networks are promising us the greatest new season ever on the boob tube. We can believe all the other signs, portents and omens but the latter is strictly wishful thinking.

The Twin Cities are rapidly getting into an expansion problem. Due to our rather unique geographical circumstances, our two communities are beginning to find themselves in a box as far as suitable areas for city expansion is concerned.

Texico and Farwell are abutting the New Mexico-Texas state line. This effectively cuts off either city from expanding to the east or the west, respectively. John Santa Fe and the various highways hinder the southern or northern natural growth patterns to a great extent. This leaves each community, for all practical purposes, only two directions for future home sites. This is a different situation than what confronts the vast majorities of cities and towns, where at least three and often all four directions are open for future development.

This geographic uniqueness demands that the two city governments must plan now for orderly future growth. Texico has to a greater extent than Farwell been planning for this future problem. Farwell particularly is the victim of geography and civic inertia in planning growth areas.

Consider Farwell's specific plight. The state line cuts off its westward areas. The railroad and US Highways 70-84 effectively plugs the northern portion for future home sites. This leaves only the east and the south for directions in which the town can grow. At this time we are encircled by a Farm to Market road which must be hurdled by any future development. This can be done without too much trouble except that the areas just over the edge of the FM road are not now within the city limits and are subject to development without any sort of guidance.

The results are now beginning to be quite visible. To the east we are being shut off from home building sites by divers business establishments and horse pastures. These in themselves are not bad, except that they preclude any substantial home development coming to that area. The farm land to the south is at the present time not available for future plating.

If in the future, the area south is available it will probably be so only at a high initial cost to the developer. This in turn means that only homes in the very high income bracket will be built in this location. This situation would effectively cut off a great majority of future houses, as homes of \$35,000 and up actually constitute a small percentage of any growing community's total living units.

Therefore, to provide reasonable future home sites the City of Farwell must now consider the annexation of the area lying east of our Farm to Market loop and placing it under a planning and zoning commission. To wait until the area is completely undesirable will stifle future growth. We must protect the citizens of today and of tomorrow who will want to own homes in Farwell from excessive costs in acquiring their homes. Tomorrow is already well under way to being today.

Wolves To Meet Hagerman In Opening Game Of Season

The Texico Wolverine football squad will travel to Hagerman, N.M., to clash with the Hagerman Bobcats in its first game of the 1973-74 season Friday (today) at 8:30 p.m. CDT after defeating the Tatum Coyotes and the Lazbuddie Longhorns in pre-season scrimmages.

The Wolverines have been working hard to win this (the

Hagerman) game, according to Coach Bucky Walters, as they will meet a team with experience and speed. Coach Walters also said the Bobcats have a team with more size and a number of returning lettermen. "Their passing team is also very effective. We can't afford to make any mistakes," Walters commented.

The Wolverines had two scrimmages during pre-season activity and did a very fine job, and Walters said he is expecting to see his team play a fine game against the Bobcats.

In listing Wolverine squad members, Walters said probable offensive starters are Craig Chumley, Roger Pace and Jeff Brown, tackles; Eugene Wallace and Dwayne Kelley, guards. Ends are Steve Harrington and Jimmy Ortiz with halfbacks James Steward and Tommy Galvan. Sammy West will be the starting fullback and quarterbacking the offense will be Curtis Lindley.

Probably defensive starters will be the down four linemen Dwayne Kelley, end; Jeff Brown and Roger Pace, guards; and Kevin Stanley, end. Linebackers will be Eugene Wallace, Jimmy Ortiz, Craig Chumley and Sammy West. Defensive safeties are James Steward, Curtis Lindley and Tommy Galvan.

Lettermen returning from last year's squad are Curtis Lindley, Randy Harrison,

James Steward, Jimmy Ortiz, Jeff Brown, Duane Kelley, Craig Chumley, Sammy West, Eugene Wallace and Raymond Cantu.

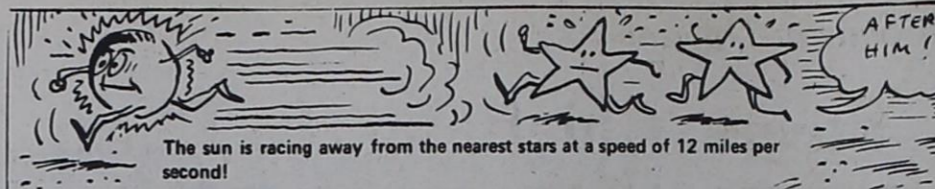
Coach Walters also stated that the Wolverines have a lot of good sophomore boys who will substitute the starting players.

In their second pre-season scrimmage of the year Friday, Aug. 31, the Wolverines dropped Lazbuddie Longhorns 21-0 in Wolverine Stadium.

The first touchdown was set up by Jimmy Ortiz when he received a long pass by quarterback Curtis Lindley. James Steward then broke through the defensive line to make it 6-0 Texico.

The second TD was scored by fullback Sammy West and James Steward was credited with the third TD for his second scoring effort of the evening.

The passing game looked very good for the Wolverines as quarterback Lindley completed passes to tight end Steve Harrington and split end Jimmy Ortiz. Starting quarterback Randy Harrison was not able to compete in the scrimmage Friday because of foot injuries received in a motor scooter accident. Coach Walters said he doesn't think Harrison will see action in the regular season opener Friday night against the Hagerman Bobcats.



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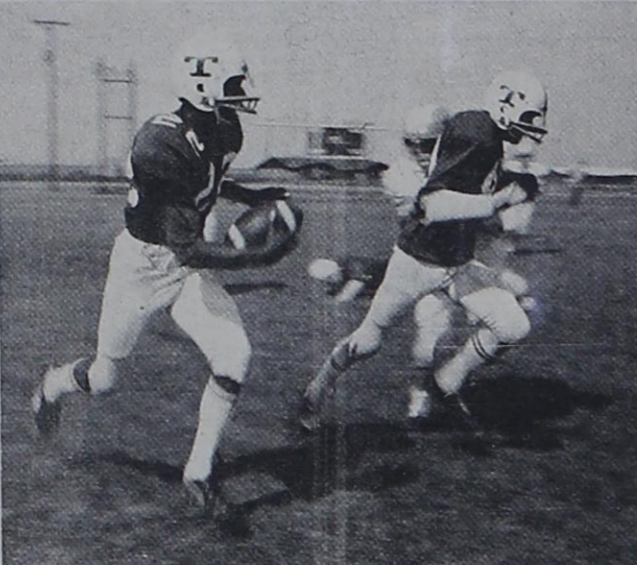

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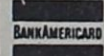
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In Season Opener - -

Steers, Chieftains To Clash In Chiefs' Territory Tonight

"The Friona team is a little larger than us but not too much. They have a good team that defeated Canyon and Boys Ranch in pre-season play," stated Head Coach Toby Booth in commenting on the Farwell Steers first opponent of the 1973 football season. The Steers will meet their cross-county rivals of many years on Chieftain soil at 8 p.m. tonight (Friday). Steers will clash with the chiefs for the 37th time tonight in hopes of putting another winning mark on their 18-17-1 all-time win-loss record against Friona.

In regard to individual Friona players, Coach Booth said

quarterback Clay Bandy has a "good arm" and in all probability will play more of a passing than running game. Friona linebacker James Perea is Friona's best player, according to Coach Booth.

The prospective starting lineup for the Steer-Chief encounter, stated Coach Booth, will be directed by quarterback Kevin Hargrove.

Hargrove will be joined in the backfield by halfbacks Mike Woods and Kent Armstrong and fullback Winfred Long. Greg Taylor and Carl Kirkland will be filling the end positions with Mark Haseloff and Bill Johnson serving as tackles.

Other starters are expected to be Jesse Cantu and Thad Phillips or Barry Goldsmith, guards; and Gene Christian, center. Booth also stated that the varsity substitutes are "doing a fine job" in relieving starting players. Steer halfback Kevin Hargrove will not see any action with the squad for several weeks because of a back injury received during a

pre-season scrimmage with White Deer.

"The best hitting ball club in several years" is the way Coach Booth described the 1973 Steers following their second pre-season scrimmage of the year with Morton last Friday in Steer Stadium.

Linemen Gene Christian, Jesse Cantu and Kie Watkins "did an outstanding job defensively and in blocking" against Morton. Coach Booth continued by saying he expects great things from quarterback Hargrove who made "great connections on his pass plays." Booth commended Armstrong for a "good job of running" in the varsity clash.

Booth was well pleased with the B team members who "did credit to themselves" during Friday's competition, and he said that Rudy Rodriguez will be a good help during season play.

According to Booth, quarterback Mike Goettsch connected with Brad Jones on a pass play for the B team score.

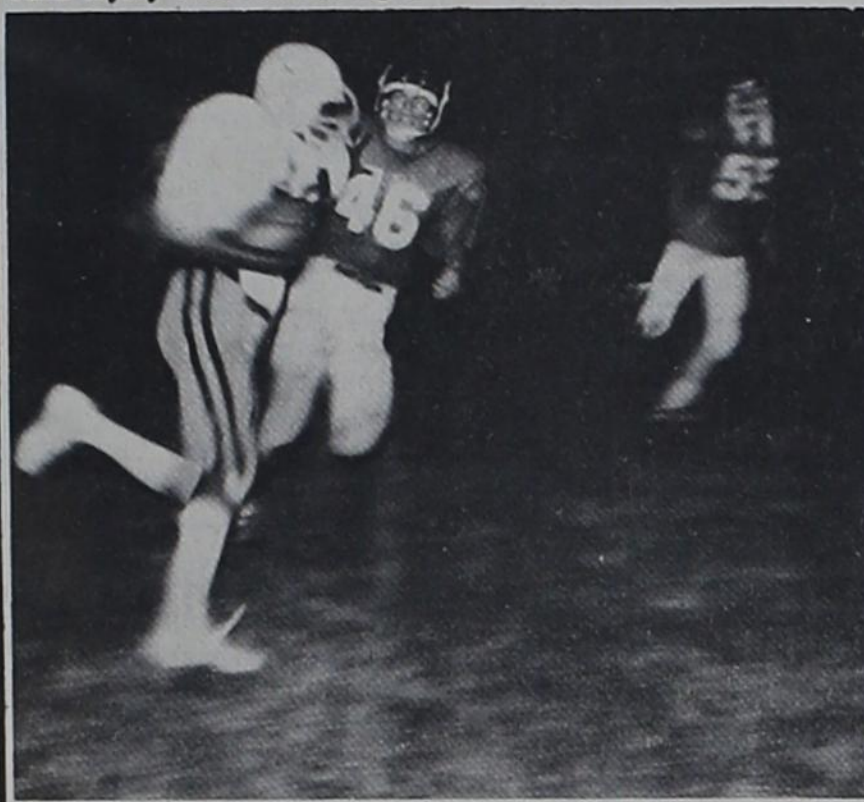

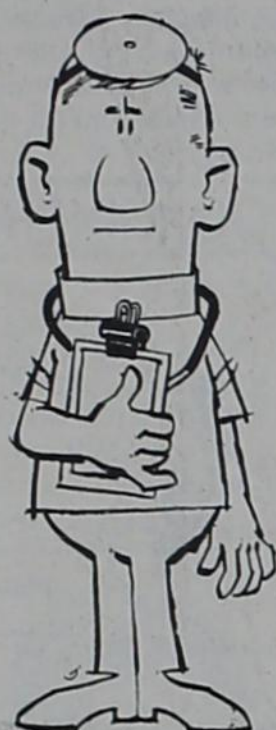



Cricket Taylor Visits Holy Land With Group

On July 14, in a group conducted by Dr. Jack Lewis, head of the Bible Dept. of Harding College, Mrs. Cricket Taylor of Farwell explained to Cyprus, Israel, Syria, Lebanon, Turkey and Greece.

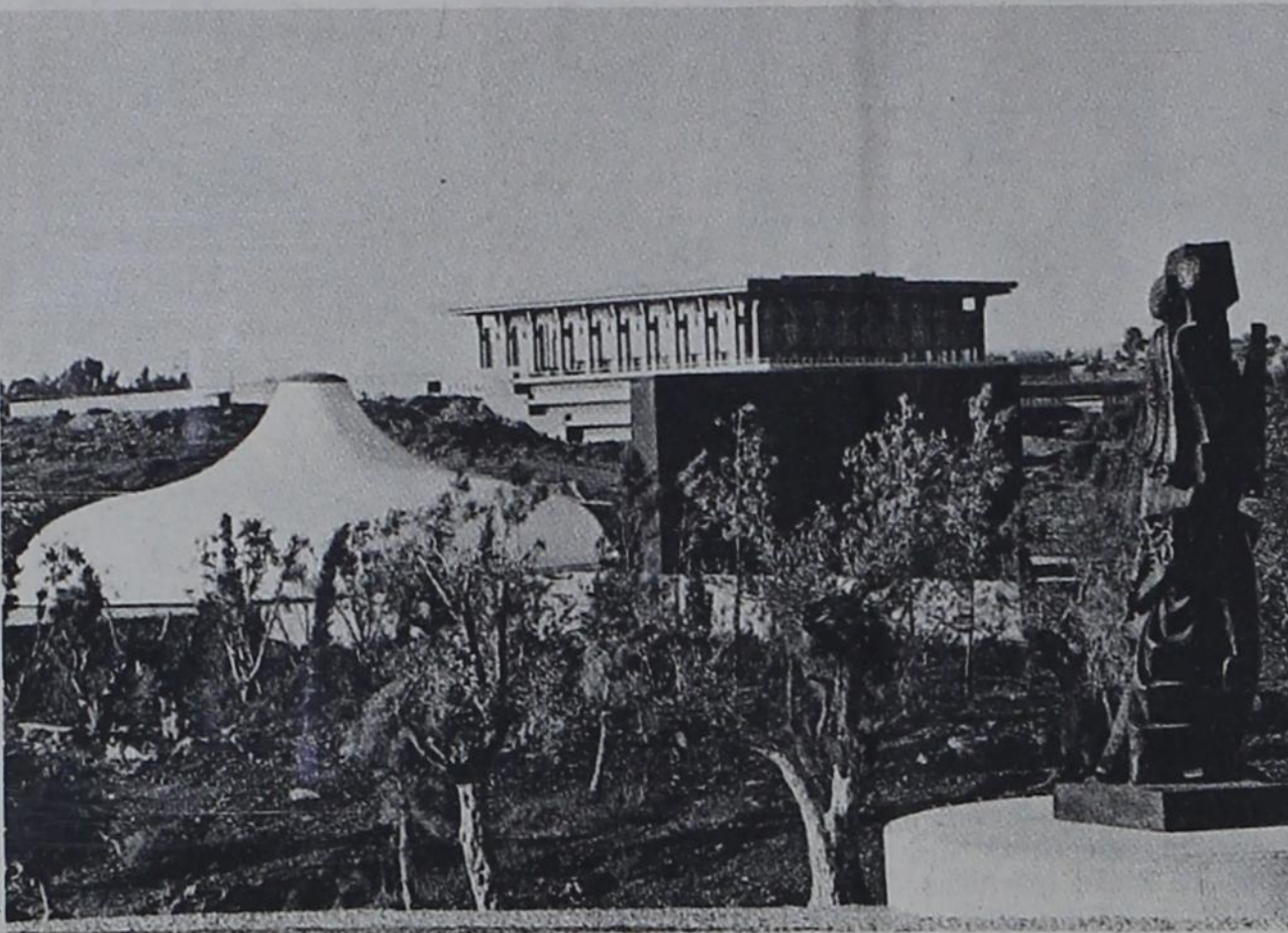
First stop on her trip was at Newfoundland. Mrs. Taylor had never before seen icebergs and was enthralled. "I really don't know what I expected," she said, "but they looked just like big ships." She saw the icebergs while flying over Ireland.

The group made a short stop in Madrid, Spain, where they refueled. From there they went to the Island of Cyprus at Salamis. Here they visited St. Nicholas Cathedral, the Venetian Palace and St. Barnabas Monastery, by bus.

They saw many Grecian ruins, and according to Mrs. Taylor, "It was the roughest ride I can ever remember being on. There were no air conditioners on the bus and they literally drove like 'wild turks.'" Later they toured the ruins at Famagusta, by the sea, and lunched at a very modern hotel. "Cyprus is desolate, with little of anything," Mrs. Taylor said. "This made the hotel a more pleasant surprise."

While on Cyprus they witnessed four monks performing a betrothal, and were amazed at the number of people who spoke English.

The tour group boarded a ship, The Fiesta, at Haifa. The ship was a floating hotel. By day they would tour the island via bus, returning to the ship

and fourth largest cities in Lebanon, Mrs. Taylor reported that one could really see the American dollar at work. She saw cotton, sorghum and other grains growing profusely. At times she stated it was almost as if you were back in the States.

The Jordan valley is really very pretty, according to Mrs. Taylor. Agriculture wise, she believes it is the most modern of all countries she visited. There are large hills all around and archeologists can tell by their shape that they are buried cities covered with dust and vegetation. She says this is true in almost every country she visited. Many ancient ruins have been reclaimed since World War II and many, many more are waiting.

Turkey, surprisingly enough, is the main meat eaten in Israel, according to Mrs. Taylor. Next comes fish, chicken and lamb. The tour sponsor usually arranged for a sack lunch to be provided by the ship and therefore they actually partook of native fare sparingly.

July 17 and 18 saw the tour group taking a walking tour of old Jerusalem and Bethlehem. In Jerusalem they saw the "Pool of Bethesda" and Pilot's Judgement Hall. In Bethlehem they visited the Church of the Nativity where Jesus was supposedly born. There are 12 huge pillars representing the 12 apostles. All nations are said to have had a part in this building.

One of the most outstanding sights viewed by Mrs. Taylor was the model city of the

original Jerusalem. By looking at this model one could get an idea of what the original city was really like. In the Garden tomb where Christ was supposedly buried, the group held a short prayer service and sang songs. Several churches were represented in the group.

Mrs. Taylor found out that the "Wailing Wall" is not a part of the temple but was built by Herod. It is already 2000 feet long, and excavation is still going on. It is now called the "Wall of Hope."

People go there and write their wishes on small pieces of paper which they stuff into crevices in the wall. She said one could see literally thousands of pieces of paper all over the wall.

The only decent drinking water in Samaria, at least the only water recommended for tourists to drink, is that from "Jacob's Well." Mrs. Taylor tasted this water and declared it to be delicious. The group ordinarily carried bottled water from the ship.

She got to visit the Qumron Cave where the "Dead Sea Scrolls" were found. Later they visited the "Shrine of Book" in Jerusalem. This is an oval building that was built especially to house the Dead Sea Scrolls. They are preserved in their original form. A light comes on intermittently to enable a person to read them.

Kavala, Greece, a place of about 60,000 population, was in Mrs. Taylor's opinion one of the most modern and prettiest places seen. In Athens they all disembarked early and had a

Mrs. Lora Deaton Garrison, 70, died Monday in Bernalillo County Medical Center in Albuquerque.

Mrs. Garrison was born April 1, 1903, in Oklahoma. She came to the Oklahoma Lane and Lariat communities in 1930 and moved to Portales seven years ago. She was a member of the Oklahoma Lane Baptist Church.

"IT'S YOUR ATTITUDE"

Many people fear that they will never reach heaven. Some try not to think about it, while others struggle to "be good," hoping that they will finally "make it." Very few, comparatively, are sure of heaven.

The real pity is that so few understand what it is that keeps people out of heaven. If you are confused about this, just remember that according to Scripture, it is not one's sins that keep him out of heaven, but his attitude.

God has made full provision for our sins. "Christ died for our sins" (I Cor. 15:3) and "we have redemption through His blood, the forgiveness of sins according to the riches of His grace" (Eph. 1:7).

But God has made no provision for a self-righteous attitude. He gave the law "that every mouth might be stopped and that all the world might become guilty before God" (Rom. 3:19). Thus He does not want you to keep saying things in your own defense. In fact, before you can know God as your Savior, you must recognize Him as your Judge, righteously condemning you as a sinner.

Often, when capital crimes are involved, the defendant's attorney will tell him: "It will be to your advantage to plead guilty and to throw yourself on the mercy of the court."

This is especially true of us as sinners in the sight of a holy God. If we will only plead guilty and cast ourselves upon His mercy we will find Him more than gracious, for He has already paid the penalty for our sins Himself.

Thus Eph. 2:3-7 declares of every believer in Christ that though we were "the children of wrath... God, who is rich in mercy, for His great love wherewith He loved us" has saved us by grace, giving us a position in Christ, "that in the ages to come He might show the exceeding riches of His grace in His kindness toward us through Christ Jesus."

Yes, unsaved friend, it will be to your eternal advantage to plead guilty before God and cast yourself upon His mercy. "For the wages of sin is death, but THE GIFT OF GOD IS ETERNAL LIFE THROUGH JESUS CHRIST OUR LORD" (Rom. 6:23).

Charming toys sometimes present danger - in the form of "swallowable" parts. Often a young child's first impulse is to taste a toy. Should a small part on that toy break away, the child will likely swallow it.

With so many toys to choose from, it's important that parents and other consumers examine a toy thoroughly before purchasing it. Unfortunately, packaging partially prevents this - as with items enclosed in plastic or boxed up.

Responding to this need, the Food and Drug Administration has proposed to ban those toys meant for children under three which have parts small enough to swallow.

Concerning toys intended for older children, FDA suggested they carry or display warnings of potential danger if used by babies or toddlers.

Consumers finding toys which seem dangerous should contact their nearest FDA office. Interested persons can write the Food and Drug Administration, 3032 Bryan, Dallas, Texas 75204.

The seventh and eighth grade teams and the Jr. Varsity were to play Friona at Steer Stadium, with the games beginning at 5:30 p.m.



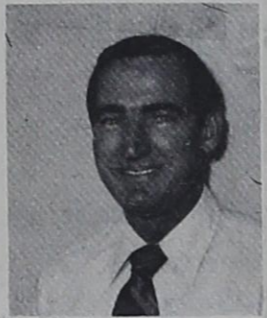

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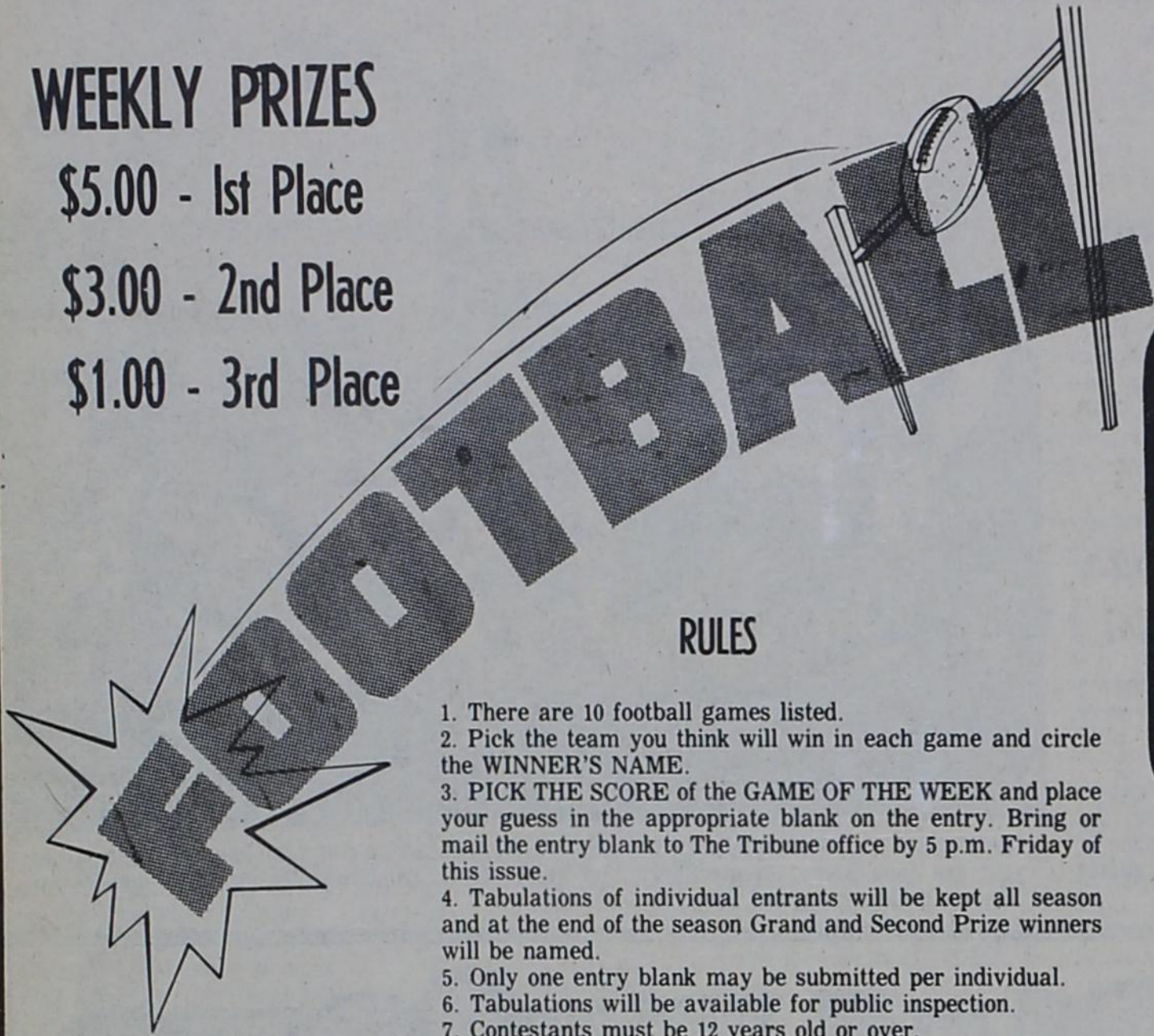
