body talks about it but nobody does anything about it.

The daily press is full of stories about committees, subcommittees, seminars, interviews, articles and books on how to attack inflation. Most of the guff you hear and read is just that - guff. To date our eyes and ears have not heard one sensible thing put forward about the causes of, or a cure for, our spiraling economy and diminishing dollar.

Labor takes the corporations to task. The corporations speak soothingly to the labor barons. Congress points its finger at everybody and everything but Congress itself. The President calls a meeting of all the economic poobahs for late September, and this conclave has all the earmarks of a Texas Constitutional Convention.


We feel reasonably sure that out of all this hubbub will come a few ill-conceived laws that will only add to the red tape misery of the public, and in reality do nothing to halt the erosion of the economy of the country.

In our opinion, to halt inflation we must first have a spiritual rebirth of the nation. The people must return to the view that a day's work must be given for a day's pay. That a pound of cabbage is a pound of cabbage, not 15 and 9/10 ounces. That getting to your neighbor before he gets to you is not a way of life. That welfare aid does not mean a lifetime pension to loaf and produce more children.

Simply put, we think that whipping inflation means a return to moral honesty along with a respect for the money virtues of work and thrift. This rebirth cannot be legislated by a government, but a government can encourage a return to these virtues by legislation.

Make the tax system so that people do not have to cheat to live. Make fiscal prudence an example in Washington for all people to observe and emulate. Make punishment follow crime, swiftly and surely. Make the laws reward work, not slothfulness. Make the person, not society, responsible for his sins of omission or commission.

As the American Republic was founded upon the rock of the integrity of the individual, so it will continue as long as the individual has integrity.

county, with 3.4 measured in Farwell as of Sunday, and the northern part of the county getting slow soaking rains. 'The cotton crop will be hurt if it keeps on raining into the fall," Heald stated.

"As far as row crops, the best benefit is to late corn and late milo," Heald continued. 'The rain soaking into wheatland for fall planting will provide good underground moisture." Grazing grasslands will also benefit greatly from the rains, the county agent said. "In most parts of the county, the moisture has been soaking in until Monday,'

Howard Whitener, who lives six and one-half miles north of Texico, measured 5.45 since Aug. 22 at his home and reported .45 inches of rain fell Sunday evening. For the month of August, he has totaled 6.05. 'This month's rain has been ideal; it has fallen slowly and there hasn't been too much

run-off," Whitener commented. Whitener said the dirt roads in the area are "pretty soft," and pointed out that the recent rains have saved tremendously on the use of irrigation wells. "The rain will make the grass come out in the pastures and will provide good underground moisture for the 1975 wheat crop," Whitener said.

'There is no need for irrigation at the present time,' stated Bud Pearce, who lives near Clovis Municipal Airport. "This good soaking rain is of more benefit than a hard rain. Pearce said as he reported 4.4 inches at his place since the night of Wednesday, Aug. 21.

A spokesman for Detachment 11, Fifth Weather Wing at Cannon Air Force Base, said the August rainfall is "pretty close to a record," with 4.44 measured through Aug. 26 at the Cannon rain gauge. The maximum ever recorded in Cannon's gauge for the month of August was 5.67 in 1966: with the mean average for August being 1.91. "We are well above the mean average this August," the spokesman

In other reports from around the area, John Hadley, south of Texico, measured six inches during the month of August as of Monday; Mrs. Vernon Symcox, Oklahoma Lane, reported between six and seven inches of rain for the month; and Mrs. W.D. Hukill, north of West Camp said they had received five inches since Aug. 22 and approximately 10 inches for the month.

Mrs. Elmer Langford, who lives eight miles north of Texico, said they had received 4.25 inches of rain during the past week and she estimates approximately six inches for the month. "Some of our neighbors have had more rain than we have," she commented. "This rain will greatly benefit the farmers and ranchers and it will make the grass grow," she said. She also said that they are not running their irrigation wells.

The Sunday, Aug. 25, edition of the "Lubbock Avalanche-Journal" reported that a total of 4.40 had been measured by 7 p.m. Saturday, Aug. 24, making this month the fifth wettest August since record-keeping began in Lubbock in 1911
