With so many horrible crimes being committed all over the country these days, I got a real scare the other evening when my wife announced that she was going out to put up the family automobile for the night.

Several minutes passed and she did not return. Finally, I got up to investigate. But when I discovered the car still standing at the curb I felt relieved. "Well," I sighed silently, "they might have gotten off with the old woman, but they left the car."

Reminds me of an early experience I had back in Oklahoma as a cub newspaper reporter, when the city editors of a small daily newspaper sent me out to cover a killing that had taken place near the down-town section of the city.

I made my coverage of what was to be the biggest story I have ever had the privilege of covering. It was very evident that robbery was the motive of the murder, and I wrote my story accordingly.

Concluding my story, I made this enlightening observation: "Fortunately for the murdered man, he had just made a deposit of his money in the bank and was on his way back to his place of business, so he lost nothing but his life."

Speaking about murders, I am reminded of the vicious crime that was committed recently right here in our midst when "Old Josh" Blocher, a harmless old man, was beaten and left to die alone in the broiling sun.

A public subscription reward is being raised for the arrest and conviction of his murderer, and every decent citizen in this section should contribute to this fund.

Our homes and our families are not safe when men of this type are known to be running at large in this community. It is the responsibility of the citizenship to assist in running down the criminals who committed this dastardly deed.

Each driver must have his chauffers license. Buses ran on schedule Tuesday. They are to arrive at school at 8:30 each day and are to leave at 4 o'clock in the afternoon.

Texico Wreck Victims Buried over Weekend

Funeral services for two Texico men, fatally wounded in an automobile accident 80 miles southeast of Farmington, N. M., last Monday, were held at the local Baptist Church the past weekend.

Rites for Preston David Cain, 42 were held Thursday afternoon, and services for Andrew Jackson Crane, 52, were held on Friday afternoon, with Rev. C. M. Fields officiating at both services. Under the direction of the Steed Funeral Home in Clovis, burial was made in the Texico Cemetery.

Complete details of the accident that claimed the lives of the two local men have never been learned here. The two men were traveling in a late model De Soto automobile, owned by Crane, when it left the highway and overturned at least two times. Both men were taken to the San Juan Community hospital at Farmington, where Cain died about 10:30 p. m. Monday night, and Crane passed away at 3 a. m. Tuesday morning.

Cain's body was returned here by a Steed ambulance and the body of Crane was shipped by train.

Relatives of the dead men said today that they had not been advised of the particulars of the accident that claimed their lives, except that a car, driven by an unknown party, crowded the Crane machine off the road.

Farwell Schools Enroll 360 Students Tuesday

Farwell schools enrolled 360 students during registration Tuesday morning, Supt. Jack Williams announces, and the enrollment is not yet complete. In high school, 116 students were listed.

According to Williams, the approximate enrollment will probably be about 370.

Students registered for classes on Tuesday morning, and went into regular classes that afternoon. Books were issued that morning.

Buses made their regular runs on Tuesday taking the children to and from school on registration day, and the lunch room was open. Mrs. Travis Brown is again in charge of the lunch room assisted by Mrs. Willie Hardage, Mrs. Nettie Petree, Mrs. Alpha Doshier, and Mrs. Velma McDorman. Williams states that a large number of students ate in the lunch-room the first day. Three-hundred-forty-six meals were served.

One new course was added to the agenda for the coming term, Junior Business Training which has not been offered heretofore, will be instructed by Mrs. Otis Prescott. Also, Supt. Williams adds, administrators hope to get a Driver's Education course set up in the next few weeks.

A few schedule adjustments are still to be made for some of the students, according to Williams, then the term should be in full swing.

Farm Bureau Directors Favor Water District

The Bureau Directors of Parmer County went on record at their latest directors meeting favoring the proposition concerning the formation of a water conservation district for this area. These men felt that for them to try to furnish any detailed information on the subject might lead to confusion.

They urge the Farm Bureau Membership to carefully read and weigh any press releases that may be forth coming. These directors are convinced that a vote for the proposition in the special election of Sept. 29, would be a vote for free use of water to the land owner and avoid a possible state control at a later date, it has been announced by Hadley Reeve, secretary of the group.

FAIR STARTS SEPT. 13

FARWELL HOG AND CATTLE COMPANY COMPLETES LOTS, WILL OPEN SEPT. 15

Completion of the feeding lots of the new Farwell Hog and Cattle Company 1 1/2 miles south of town was announced today by Jewel Castor, Clovis cattleman. Castor says that the new lots will be ready for business Sept. 15.

"Toad" Thomas, also of Clovis, will be general manager for the new concern when it opens this month, and will supervise a crew of four men employed to run the mill and lots.

Begun last May, the lots, feed mill, scales, and other buildings were erected at an anticipated cost of \$50,000. At that date, Castor expected to see the project completed by Oct. 1. According to his estimation,

the lots are opening two weeks earlier than he had anticipated.

The new company will be buyers of hogs and cattle for Wilson Packing Company. Also, the business will be seen by grain farmers of this area as a ready market for their product, since the company owners have announced their intention to use locally-grown feedstuffs as much as possible.

Capacity of the pens will be 2500 head of cattle. Castor and Thomas said they expected to have the pens full by October.

Thomas, who at present lives in Clovis, plans to make his home in Farwell next month.

Capital Stock Of Local Bank Is Raised

Authorization to increase the capital stock of the Security State Bank of this city to \$100,000 has been issued by the State Banking Commissioner, it was announced here today by G. D. Anderson, president of the local bank.

Anderson said that action on the part of the directors to increase the capital stock from \$50,000 to \$100,000 was taken some time ago, and application for doubling the capital stock was filed with the banking commissioner at that time.

Authority to carry out such plans was received last week, and became effective on Sept. 1, Anderson said.

The certified surplus of the local bank will remain at the same figure of \$75,000, he added.

Local Firms Give Aid For Blocher Reward

With the view of raising at least \$2,000 to be awarded for the apprehension and conviction of the persons responsible for the death of Joshua Blocher, 85-year-old semi-recluse Progress resident, a fund-raising campaign has been launched by citizens of Bailey and Parmer Counties.

Three local firms, the Davis Mercantile Co., the State Line Grocery, and the Security State Bank, have agreed to assist in the collection of the contributions. Other firms agreeing to accept contributions are, Nigh Grocery, Progress; Wimberley Grocery, Progress; and Hughes Service Station, Lariat.

A Muleshoe attorney has drawn up the rules to govern the award, and the Muleshoe State Bank has been named a trustee of the fund. No peace officer will be eligible to receive the reward. The contributors will be refunded their money should no conviction come through the regular law-enforcement agencies.

"Old Josh", a harmless and inoffensive citizen of Progress, was found murdered several days ago, and officers believe robbery was the motive in his brutal slaying. Peace officers admit that little or no progress has been made in solving the case.

Two Run-Away Lads Picked Up Monday

Two teen age run-away lads were picked up over the past weekend by Sheriff Chas. Lovelace at Friona and brought here, where they were held until one of the lad's parents arrived here Monday.

The lads, ages 14 and 15 years, had allegedly run away from their home at Long Beach, Calif., and one of them was working at the Bruce Coleman farm, near Friona, when found.

Last week, Bob Scott, young son of Mr. and Mrs. Robert W. Anderson, turned up with a slight temperature. Mrs. Anderson, known to all as "Carrie", thought maybe she'd better check up on his condition.

Carrie fed him an aspirin, then slipped a glass thermometer into his mouth. She turned her back for a few moments to allow the instrument to warm up. When she came back for a reading, she pulled the thermometer out of Bob Scott's mouth, which was arced in a wide grin.

Not until then did Carrie make the startling discovery that the youthful patient had bitten off the lower end of the thermometer.

"What did you do with it?" she asked in alarm.

"I swallowed it", came the unsuspected reply.

Carrie dashed to the phone to summon a doctor. The medic advised the worried mother to feed Bob Scott plenty of bread and he probably would be okay. This she did, and the incident caused no more trouble.

However, the parents confessed that although Bob Scott's temperature went right down after eating the thermometer, theirs did not. They have a more squeamish appetite than he does.

Loan Contract For Rural Telephones Executed Thursday

Directors of the West Texas Rural Cooperative met in Hereford last Thursday and executed the contract for a federal loan of \$454,000 to finance the project in the three county area of Deaf Smith, Castro and Parmer Counties.

Tabulations at the Hereford meeting showed that a total of 608 potential subscribers had signed up and paid the \$50.00 equity fee, and 239 subscribers had paid in \$5.00 on their quota of the total \$50.00 assessment. Payment of the remaining \$45.00 will be required before the telephone lines are completed, officials said today.

"It is not too late to sign up yet," Leo Forrest, manager of the REA, who is assisting in working out the details of the telephone program, said today in a telephone conversation. And he went ahead to say that there were only a few remaining prospective subscribers in the area who had not already signed up for the service.

"Material is going to be tight," Forrest declared, adding that a priority rating would probably be required before materials could be obtained.

Reburial Services For Pvt. Gonzales

Reburial services for Pfc. Alfonso Gonzales, Texico soldier, killed in action in Korea on March 2, were scheduled for 10 a. m. this (Thursday) morning from Our Lady of Guadalupe Catholic church in Clovis. Mass requiem rites were said by Rev. Father Anthony.

The body of Pvt. Gonzales arrived in Clovis Wednesday afternoon from San Francisco. With the Steed funeral home in charge, burial was made in the Garden of Memories cemetery in Clovis. Military rites were conducted at the graveside.

Gonzales had been overseas only two months when he was killed. He was recalled to service on Oct. 15, 1950, after service more than two years in the Army during World War II.

Gonzales is survived by his wife, Mary, and a son, Alfonso, Jr., both of Texico, his parents, Mr. and Mrs. Pete Gonzales, Tex., a brother, Johnny, Texico, and three sisters, Mrs. Annie Lopez, Clovis, Miss Mollie Gonzales, Clovis, and Miss Margie Gonzales, Anton Chico, N. M.

When the directors began work this year, they were faced with a deficit of around \$600 in addition to the usual task of planning and putting on a county fair. That debt has been overcome through the sale of advertising in the fair catalog.

In connection, Tuesday night the directors decided that additional revenue might be netted for the fair treasury if a pig sale was sponsored and conducted by the fair.

This met with the approval of the directors, since several farmers who do not wish advertising space in the catalog are willing to contribute a pig for the sale. Time of the sale has not been established, but County Agent Joe Jones estimates that is probably will be held after the parade Saturday.

He commented that any farmer who is interested in lending support to the fair through the pig sale is urged to do so.

Friena Men Named To Advisory Board

Bruce and Raymond Parr of Friena have been appointed as an advisory committee to the temporary Board of Directors of the High Plains Underground Water District No. 5585 1 by Jess Osborn of Muleshoe, temporary director of precinct 3.

All of Parmer County is included in the proposed district, which embraces an underground water reservoir as defined by the State Board of Water Engineers. All or part of 21 Plains counties are in the district.

The temporary Board was appointed by the State Board to serve until permanent organization of the district. The temporary directors voted, said Osborn, to have each of the five name an advisory committee of one or more for each county in his precinct.

Osborn said the advisory groups will assist in providing complete information on all matters pertaining to creation of the district and the provisions of the law under which it will operate. After its creation, it is intended that the county committees will advise the directors on all matters pertaining to management of underground water.

Qualified voters who own property in the district and who also live within it will vote on Sept. 29 to

decide whether it shall be made a political subdivision for underground water management. That time the voters will decide whether the directors shall be authorized to levy a tax not to exceed five cents per \$100. They also will elect directors to serve until the second Tuesday of January, 1952. Directors elected at that time will draw straws to determine lengths of their terms—one, two or three years. Thereafter, an election will be held each year to fill vacancy or vacancies. Thus, the terms of all five directors will not expire at the same time.

Bruce Parr, president of Parmer County Farm Bureau, has been invited to appear on the program of the Texas Farm Bureau at a Sub District meeting to be held at Plainview on Sept. 12 at 10:00 A. M. He will speak on the topic, "What Farm Bureau Means to Me."

J. Walter Hammond, State President and Leon Lane from the State Office will appear on the program and there is to be special music in the way of community chorus presentations. All farmers and interested persons in the area are invited to attend, it has been announced.

Water District Voting Slated for September

The fate of a 21-county underground water conservation district will be decided by Panhandle-South Plains voters in an election tentatively set for late September.

Plans for holding the water district election are being made by five directors who head the temporary district created Aug. 9 by the State Board of Water Engineers following a hearing in Plainview.

The election date will be announced by the directors, E. C. Hatton of Lubbock, A. C. Chesher of Littlefield, Jess Osborn of Muleshoe, Tom McFarland of Hereford, Tom Bostic of Plainview. Duties of these temporary directors are confined solely to holding the election, at which West Texas citizens may approve or reject the district proposal.

The election will be conducted under the local option system, with municipalities, counties and segregated irrigated areas voting separately. The vote of one such political subdivision cannot affect the vote of another. Under this system, a town can vote itself out of the water district while the surrounding rural area joins the district, or vice versa. The working district, when created, may thus consist of one or more counties, parts of any of the counties, or the entire area of the 10,649-square-mile reservoir.

The temporary district includes all of Lubbock, Hale, Parmer and Swisher counties and parts of Armstrong, Bailey, Briscoe, Castro, Cochran, Crosby, Deaf Smith, Dickens, Floyd, Garza, Hockley, Lamb, Lynn, Oldham, Potter, Randall and Terry counties.

Farwell Band To Give Performance at Game

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
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AGENT JONES DISCUSSE DIFFICULTIES OF BINDWEED, JOHNSON GRASS FIGHT

Bindweed, which has been called the saboteur of farms and which spreads by both roots and seeds, has become a serious pest over the plains, Joe Jones, county agent states. The county agent urges local

farmers to declare war on the weed, before it becomes more widespread. Occurring on both cropland and non-cropland, infestations vary in size and also occur along fence rows, highways, railroads and other places.

After becoming established, the weed reduces crop yields and land values depreciate, Jones adds.

The weed plant develops deep root systems which live through the winter and produce new growth the next season. Plows, harrows and other implements passing through infested areas break roots and spread them to other parts of the field where they develop new plants, the county agent explains. Infested hay or straw fed to animals pastured in infested areas can pass through the digestive tract and thus spread the infestation, Jones points out.

The deep root system of the bindweed makes it particularly difficult to eradicate, because the root system must be destroyed for eradication of the weed. Also, seed may stay in the soil for years and germinate when the conditions are favorable.

Eradication Methods

Bindweed may be eradicated by continuous intensive cultivation, or cutting the roots of the plants at a uniform depth until the plants are destroyed. Cultivation may be started any time during the growing season, Jones states. Old deep-rooted plants are more difficult to destroy than young shallow-rooted plants

and therefore, take a longer period of time.

Tests indicate that 2 4-D, when properly applied, may kill 80 to 90 per cent of bindweed plants, but a single application does not give complete control. For best results, the chemical should be applied in the spring when the plants are growing rapidly and just before they start blooming, and later in the fall when the plants have resumed growing. Jones warns that treatments are not as effective in the warm summer months.

According to Agent Jones, there are several non-selective weed killers or soil sterilants, that are very effective in the fall months, which can be used to help in control or eradication of bindweed. Included are sodium chlorate, borascue, concentrated borascue, atascide, and polybor chlorate or polybor. All these are used at different rates and at different times to give varying kills, Jones says.

Farmers wanting more information should see County Agent Jones, who can give the method proved best by the bindweed experts.

Facts On Johnson Grass

Discussing Johnson grass, Jones says the same sterilants are used as for bindweed, but different rates of

application are practiced. Rates are found on the container, best time for application is when the grass is actively growing in the boot stage. Jones describes this grass as another pest which is hard to kill. Seeds are scattered by wind, rain, and by livestock. Seeds which haven't been cleaned and certified may contain the Johnson grass seed also. Every farmer should fight this crop killer, Jones concludes, as well as bindweed.

Mr. Adams said in a letter to Frank A. Spring, Defense Bond chairman for Parmer county.

"Instead, Treasury Secretary John W. Snyder has asked us to sell as many Defense Bonds as possible, to back up our armed forces and to help resist the pressure of inflation," Mr. Adams said. He urged the local chairman, however, to set for the county a goal "high enough to be a challenge to you and your committee."



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
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Women's Ball Team Ends Season with Win


