Too bad the highway maintainers on New Mexico can't learn a lesson from the crews in similar jobs on the Texas side of the line. For the past several years an attempt has been made to get some young trees growing along the right-of-way along Mabry Drive between Texico and Clovis.

Just about the time the struggling little plants begin to show some signs of growth, the highway boys decide that the weeds and grass need burning and they come along with blazing torches, with the result that the little trees are killed back to the ground. The trees make a come back by the following spring only to be treated to the scorched earth policy of the highway maintainers again.

The New Mexico boys need to observe how the Texas crewmen take care of their trees. Every tree along the Texas highways is carefully cultivated and rank weeds and grass kept down. Each spring the trees are properly pruned and cared for. The result is trees along Texas highways are now affording shade for tired motorists while in New Mexico only a few struggling unpruned, shaggy bushes are to be found.

There is a lot of good in the world, but you never would suspect it by reading the front pages of the large newspapers.

The big city papers are carrying on a campaign to induce the Texas legislature to change the law so that county commissioners will be elected by a county-wide vote, instead of the precinct vote now being used.

To our way of thinking, it would be a serious mistake to change this law, under the present system, each precinct elects its own county commissioner. But under a county-wide basis the entire county would result in the large cities of the state denouncing the selection of all four commissioners.

For example, the population centers like Amarillo would elect all four county commissioners, with the rural precincts having no say in who would represent them in the commissioners courts. That would be most unfair.

Again some responsible citizens of the town have called to our attention the deplorable state of the Farwell cemetery. Action is taking hold in the Legion group here, and it appears that they are willing to join hands with other organizations to do something about the general appearance of the grounds.

We hope a movement grows out of this recent awakening, and know that there probably isn't a person in town who will say that a cleanup and permanent service arrangement for cemetery is not a worthwhile project. ## N. L. Tharp Farm Offers 'on-Location' Opportunity to See Irrigation Methods

Bill Kennedy, local work unit conservationist, and Joe Jones, county agent, term the irrigation day, held on the N. L. Tharp farm Thursday, as a success. Despite high winds and dust, over 100 farmers turned out for the special demonstration program.

Beginning the program, Bob Thurmond irrigation specialist with the extension service talked on the use of gated pipe, also canvas hose. A demonstration was set up to illustrate his talk. Thurmond also talked about the uses of the pipe in connection with concrete pipe.

N. L. Tharp welcomed the group members to his farm; then made a short speech. He stated that farmers should consider three things in irrigation; land preparation, control water, and proper application of water to avoid waste and land erosion. He cautioned that there is no tail water if the land is prepared and the water is applied correctly. He emphasized the use of proper size tubes for down-the-row irrigation.

Miles Kelley, irrigation specialist with the soil conservation of Dimmitt, explained the engineering involved in the installation of concrete pipe. He explained its importance in water conservation, also the cost to the farmer and the payment the PMA makes.

Jim Terrell, engineer with the local soil conservation unit of Friona, explained the use of flume that he had previously set up in the irrigation ditch to measure water flow. He added that farmers should use flume so they would know how much water a well pumps. "To know how many acre inches of water he is applying, a farmer must know how much water is going on the land," Terrell said.

John Aldridge, soil scientist with the soil conservation service from Dimmitt, discussed soils, their structure and the rate they would take water; he also listed the factors that could effect the water intake of the soil.

Jess Osborn, farmer, banker of Muleshoe, who is on the Board of Directors for the High Plains Water Users association, suggested that farmers learn as much as possible about the water law which they will be asked to vote on in the near future, stating that when the time comes the farmer should be prepared to vote intelligently. He emphasized

that Parmer county will be affected by this law.

Thurmond then explained a demonstration for securing infiltration rates on the plot of land. He stressed the importance of farmers knowing how much water is running down the row and how deep a given amount of water penetrates. He recommended the soil probe which is nothing more than a steel rod to determine the depth of the soil which receives moisture. He also recommended winter irrigation and storing sub-soil moisture; stating that evaporation is low in the wintertime.

As did Tharp, Thurmond stressed the use of correct size siphon tubes to properly apply water.

A demonstration on applying anhydrous ammonia with an equipped tractor was then given by John McFarland of Western Fertilizer Co.

in Muleshoe. In the past, according to County Agent Joe Jones, most Parmer farmers have applied this fertilizer by bubbling in irrigation water. Jones feels that the proper way to put anhydrous ammonia in the soil would be with an equipped tractor.

Mr. Sanders, engineer with the soil conservation work unit, explained land leveler and border machine which Tharp built with the aid of plans acquired from the Soil Conservation district. During the talk, the machine was in operation showing how it would border and level land in the same operation.

Bill Kennedy, local work unit conservationist, discussed grass seed drills which the soil conservation district has for farmer's use; and gave a brief talk on seeding grasses and the part grasses play in our agriculture.

### Legion Asks Support For Cemetery Project

A drive appears to be in the making for cleaning up and placing under permanent care the Farwell cemetery, with the idea having its beginning at a meeting of the local American Legion Post, Tuesday night.

The Legion is anxious to begin action that will culminate in the permanent care of the grounds, and is now seeking support from the public in the movement, according to Wilfred Quickel, commander.

"The Farwell cemetery is a disgrace to the town," said Commander Quickel bluntly, as he announced that efforts were being made to gain support from other community organizations.

Help will be sought from groups such as the local Lions Club, the Farwell Chamber of Commerce, women's clubs, and other civic-minded organizations, Legion members decided. Representatives from the Legion are contacting such organizations to discuss the project.

The Legion is particularly interested in securing the support of individuals who have relatives buried in the cemetery, says Quickel.

Initial plans call for landscaping and general cleanup, with the possibility of a well and permanent caretaker being added in the future.

### Sewer Tie-ons Lag, May Need Ordinance

Connections to the new sewer lines in Farwell have been coming in at a discouraging pace the past several weeks, according to city officials, and they are now making a plea to citizens to have this taken care of soon.

The city needs some revenue coming in for its extensive new sewerage program, officials emphasize, and unless there is a normal increase of applications in the near future, it may become necessary for the municipal government to take stringent action.

Although it would be a last resort, it may become necessary for an ordinance to be passed to bring sewer connections up to par, they warned.

Ray Mears, local collector, asked that all users who were 30 days behind in payment for sewer services contact him. He warned that several citizens were lagging in payments, and as a consequence the city was falling behind in its revenue.

## Texico Graduates 20 Seniors In Ceremonies

Baccalaureate services for twenty Texico seniors were held Sunday night at the Hamlin Memorial Methodist Church, and the students received their diplomas at commencement exercises held last night (Wednesday) at the Texico school house.

Rev. C. M. Fields, pastor of the local Baptist Church, addressed the class on "The House That Wisdom Built". In his talk, Rev. Fields emphasized that care of body, care of soul and care of mind make up the "house called character on the river of life . . . or the house that wisdom built".

Listed by the pastor as workers who build the house were: self control, patience, and other factors, including purity, or the "cleaning of the windows of our lives to enable us to see out and others to see in".

"The house that wisdom built is a complete structure," Rev. Fields said, "and is supported by seven pillars." The speaker listed the pillars as purpose, courage, genuineness, unselfishness, work, right thinking and faith. He discussed each pillar and its qualities.

For contrast, Rev. Fields showed the house on the other side of the river, built on laziness, lust, greed and lack of courage.

### Mystery Surrounds Death of Young Texas Tech Student

Mystery early this week still surrounded the circumstances of the death of 21-year-old Clayton J. McMillan, of Shallowater, brother of Mrs. Florine Bengier of Friona. McMillan was struck and killed by a car driven by Roy Gipson Calcote, 49, of Lubbock, around 2 a. m. Sunday morning, while the young man was reported walking down the center of the Idalou highway, about four miles east of Lubbock.

Officers investigating the accident, having been dispatched to the scene a few minutes earlier by a telephone call reporting a man walking down the center of the highway, said the victim was lying face down in the east-bound traffic lane. A truck driver had stopped near the body, putting his spotlight on McMillan, and had placed flares to caution traffic.

It appeared that Calcote's car had swerved sharply into the east-bound lane following the impact of McMillan's body, and then left the road. The driver was charged with murder without malice, alleging that he was driving "unlawfully while under the influence of intoxicating beverages" at Lubbock, Sunday afternoon, by District Attorney Travis Shelton. He was later released on bond.

Just why the young Tech student, who had earlier attended a fraternity dance at Hotel Lubbock, was out on the highway remains unexplained.

Funeral services were held Monday afternoon at the Shallowater Methodist Church with Rev. W. C. Hinds of Abilene officiating, assisted by Dr. J. O. Haynes and Rev. L. N. Lipscomb of Lubbock. Burial was made in Tech Memorial park.

McMillan, son of the late Rev. Clint McMillan and stepson of an other Methodist pastor, Rev. H. W. Barnett, pastor of the Shallowater church, served three years in the Air Force during the last war. He entered Tech in 1949 and was a junior engineering student, being reported "above average" in the engineering division of the school.

Survivors are his mother, Mrs. H. W. Barnett, and his stepfather, Rev. Barnett, of Shallowater; three sisters, Mrs. S. W. Parks of Paducah, Mrs. Truett Smith of Dumont, and Mrs. Johnny Bengier of Friona; a brother, Clifton McMillan of Carlsbad, N. M.; and an uncle, J. D. McMillan, of Farwell.

Attending the funeral services at Shallowater were Mr. and Mrs. J. D. McMillan and Loyde Brewer of this city; Mr. and Mrs. Ralph Roden, Mr. and Mrs. Gilbert Boatman, Mr. and Mrs. H. T. Magnus, Mr. and Mrs. Johnny Bengier, Mr. and Mrs. Guy Latta and Hugh Moseley, all of Friona.

**CRUDE OIL OUTPUT UP IN '50; GOING HIGHER IN '51**

Domestic crude oil production rose seven per cent during 1950 to a total of 1,973,000,000 barrels, according to the Bureau of Mines. This was about two per cent below the record production of 2,020,185,000 barrels achieved in 1948, the government agency said.

It is estimated that the 1951 output would be up approximately six per cent over 1950.

The estimated price of the crude oil at the well in 1950 averaged \$2.54 a barrel, unchanged from 1949.

The senior boys' and girls' teams both won the traveling trophies for county and the boys won first place in the county tournament, while the junior girls also won first.

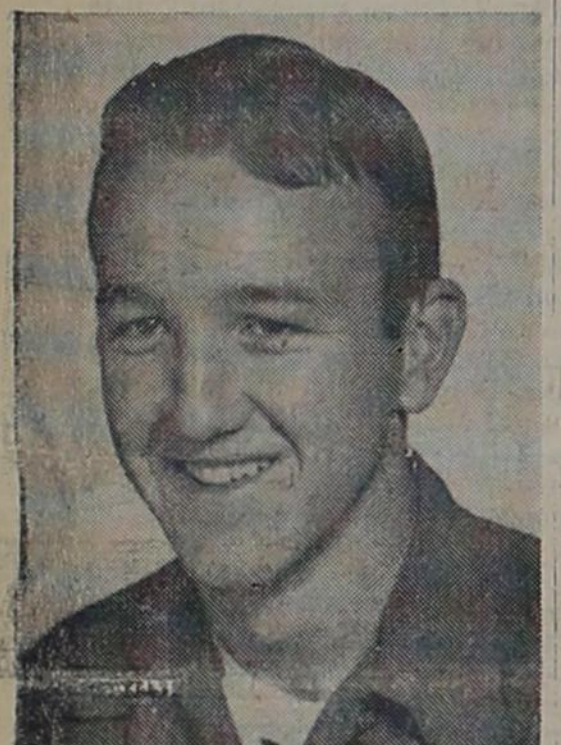

Class officers elected the first week of school were: Seniors—president, Jimmy Horton; vice-president, Carmen Roth; secretary, Jeanette



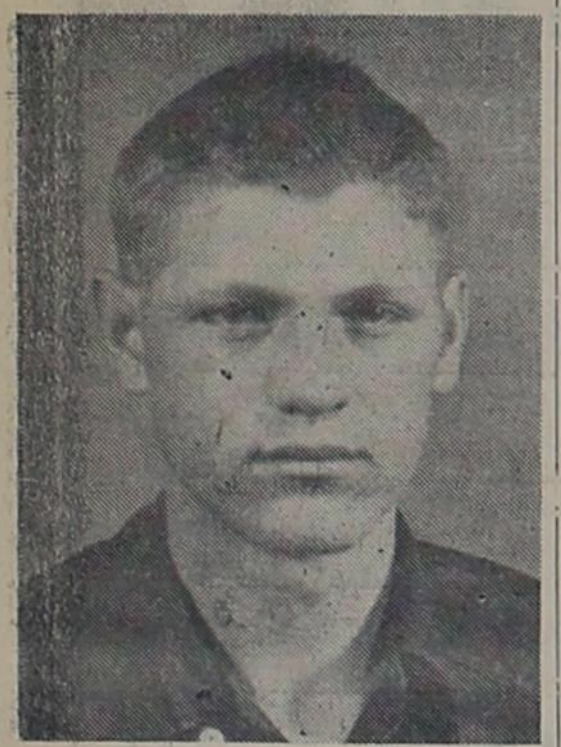

### UNCLE SAM GETS ROYALTIES

A total of 23,555,075 acres of oil and gas properties on public lands in 22 states and Alaska were under federal supervision at the close of the fiscal year, June 30, 1950. During the year, 829 wells were drilled on public lands. Of these, 581 produced oil and gas while 248 were dry. The year's production on public lands amounted to approximately 76 million barrels of petroleum, 123 billion cubic feet of natural gas and 152 million gallons of natural gasoline and butane. Royalties of approximately \$21,637,000 were paid to the U. S. government.

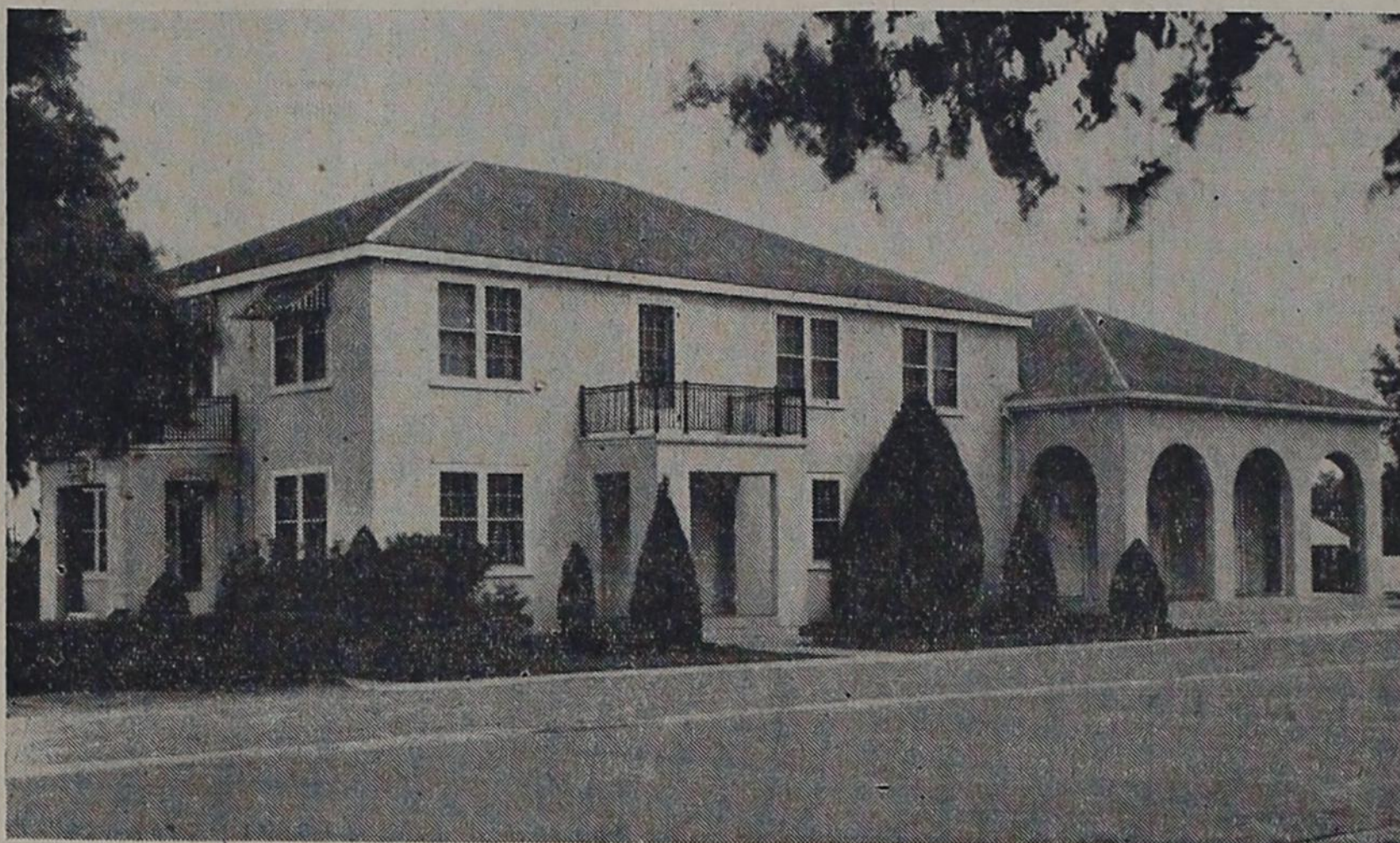
In addition to constructing a backstop for the tennis court, the boys have reconditioned several of the teachers desks and the cabinets in the home economics room.

The boys have attended several livestock judging contest. Among them was the district contest held at E. N. M. U. in Portales in which

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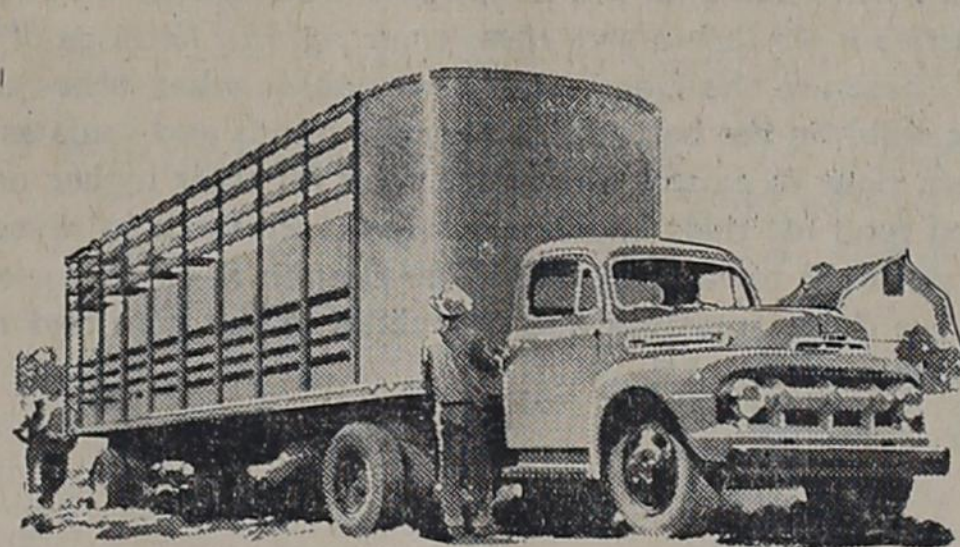
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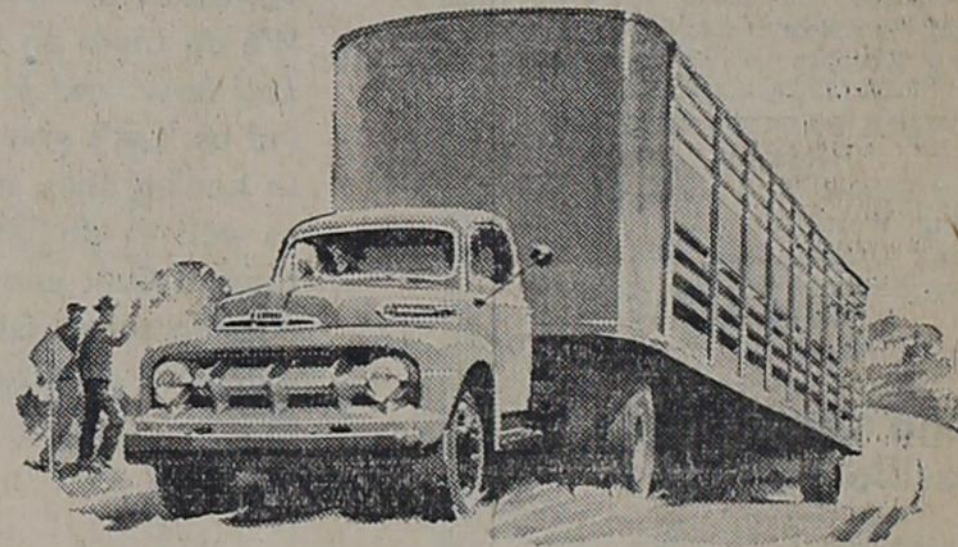

The eighth grade class of Bovina schools will hold regular graduation exercises Tuesday night, May 15 at 8 o'clock.

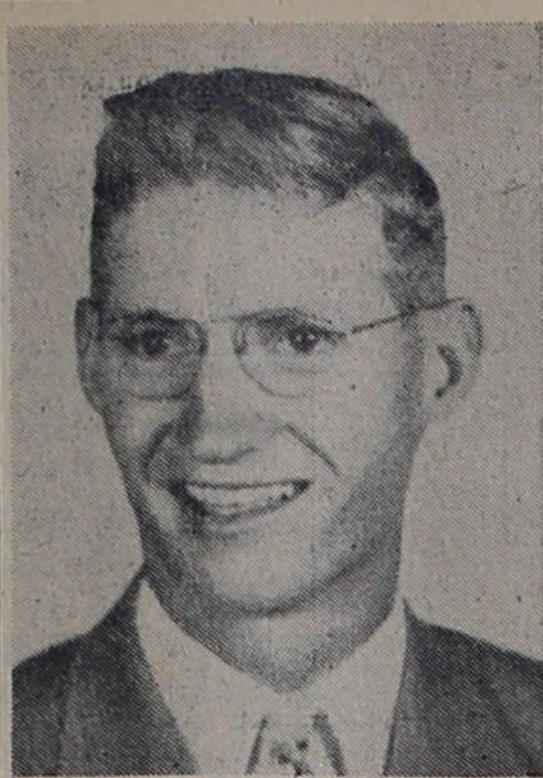
The class members do not plan to have a speaker, but will present a special program for the exercises. The students will handle all the program themselves, Supt. W. H. Willoughby says.

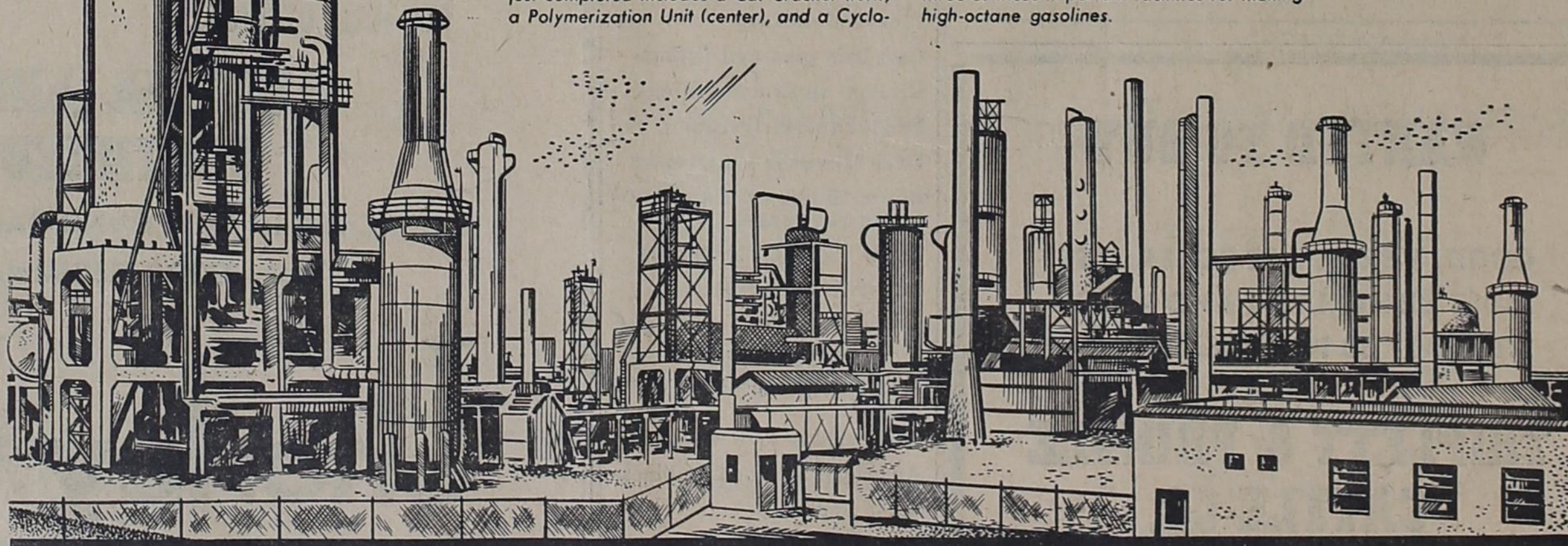

Taylor heads the price division of the Lubbock district which includes merchants of Parmer county.

Contrary to the belief by many merchants that they are exempt, Taylor emphasized that practically every one of them falls under the General Ceiling Price Regulation or the "tailored" ceiling price regulations which have removed them from the general freeze.

"There are certain records which every business must keep" Taylor

said, "so that they are available to OPS representatives; and there are filings which many should make with their district office." The district office for merchants of this county is in the Broadway Building, 1202 Texas Avenue, Lubbock, Texas.

"By May 14," the price executive continued, "retail grocery stores should be in full compliance with the regulations. They are covered, in the main, by Regulations 15 and 16. They should have already filed with the district office OPS form 5 placing them in a certain category based on 1950 gross sales volume. Full compliance should begin Monday, May 14. Grocery stores operate under a tailored margin-type price program."

Restaurants, cafes, soda fountains, and other eating and drinking establishments should have already filed with the district office their base period food costs per dollar of sales, Taylor explained. Their deadline, too, was April 30. Briefly, the

eating establishments are, by regulation 11, obligated to keep their food costs in proportion to their total sales.

Another large segment of business, large and small, comes under the tailored, margin-type Ceiling Price Regulation 7 and its amendments. The regulation governs firms handling so-called consumer goods, including soft goods and durables.

"Department stores, variety stores, all kinds of wearing apparel firms, and furniture stores are among the operations falling under CPR 7," Taylor pointed out.

There are record requirements for this type firm to maintain, and they,

too, have a filing to do with the district office. The regulation requires that retailers of these type goods file pricing charts by categories with the district office. However, the deadline for filing these charts has been extended to May 30. The former deadline, which no longer holds, was April 30.

Ceiling Price Regulation 13 sets out the pricing procedures for gasoline service stations and retailers of petroleum products. New and used car dealers have definite pricing patterns, too.

Questions concerning all pricing regulations, records keeping, and filing procedures should be directed to

the pricing division of the district OPS office if they cannot be answered by local chambers of commerce. Adequate supplies of applicable regulations also are available from the district office and will be mailed on request to those desiring them.

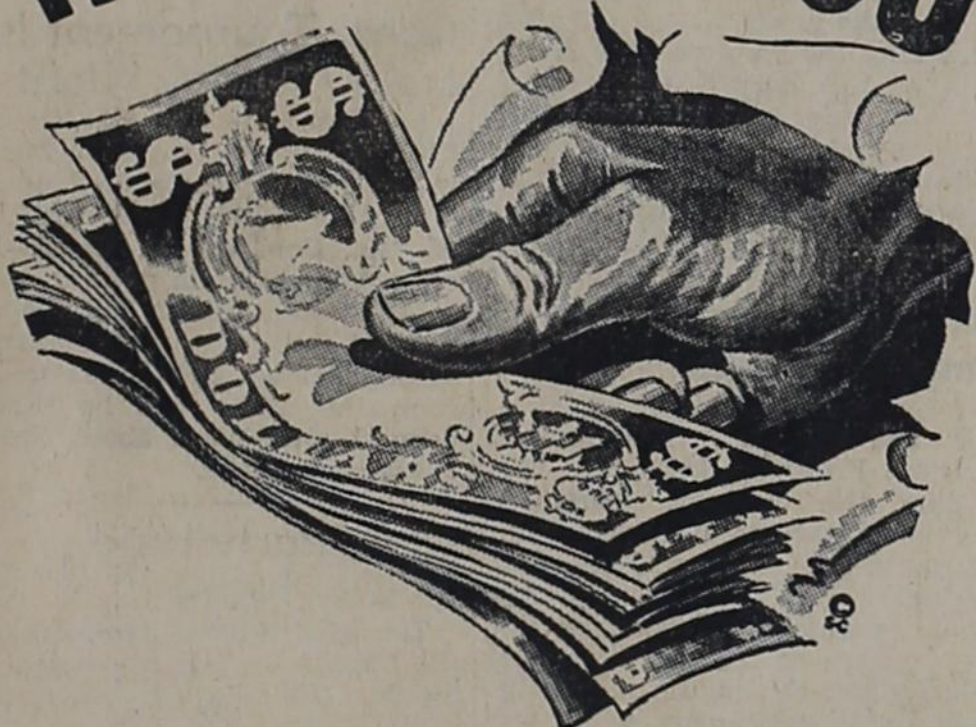

## High Winds Damage Buildings Sunday

High winds that built to a climax around nine o'clock Sunday night and reached an approximate speed of around 60 miles per hour damaged a local buildings to a considerable extent.

The Texas bulk company's main building sustained an estimated \$250 to \$300 damage, according to Bert Shackelford, local consignee who said that the front porch of the building and the south side of the sheet iron roof was ripped from its moorings and scattered indiscriminately for some several hundred yards.

Shackelford did not concur in the idea that a slight twister may have hit the building, giving it as his opinion that the extremely high wind hoisted the porch up and away, with the timbers ripping loose a portion of the roof, which then became vulnerable to the raging wind.

A crew of workmen was put to work immediately on Monday morning, when the damage was discovered. Shackelford added that no damage was sustained inside the building, other than the heavy coating of dirt which covered everything exposed to the elements.

The second building damaged was a sheet-tin storage structure, some 30x40 feet, located at the rear of the Galloway Implement Co., and owned by W. L. Hannold.

Hannold reported that the building was ruined to the extent that it was wrecked by workmen the first of the week, and added that his damage could not be estimated until he determined what amount of the material could be salvaged for

further use. The building was empty, being planned for storage use at the Galloway Company.

**RURAL ROADS PROGRAM**

Dear Editor:

Time is rapidly approaching for the expected early adjournment of the Texas Legislature. Just what will be done about a rural roads program is uncertain. The House rejected attempts to curtail the present program, then passed the Sewell Bill, HB 669. This bill levies a tax of 1 cent per thousand cubic feet on natural gas and is estimated to bring in about \$28,000,000.00 the first year and more each year thereafter. One half is allocated for rural roads, one fourth for schools, and one fourth for cities.

The Texas Rural Letter Carriers' Association endorses this measure and is calling upon Senators to support the Sewell-None's natural gas tax bill because we feel this is more equitable than one of the proposed bills which would levy additional taxes on gasoline. The natural gas tax would cost the average domestic household only about 85c a year, and about 62 percent of the entire tax would be paid by users outside of Texas.

Some 53,000 farm families in Texas have already signified that they favor the above-mentioned method of taxation for farm to market roads and we hope that the farmers of Parmer County and West Texas will line up with this program and IMMEDIATELY write their Senator asking that he, too, support this mea-

sure. Yours for better rural roads, Nelson C. Smith.

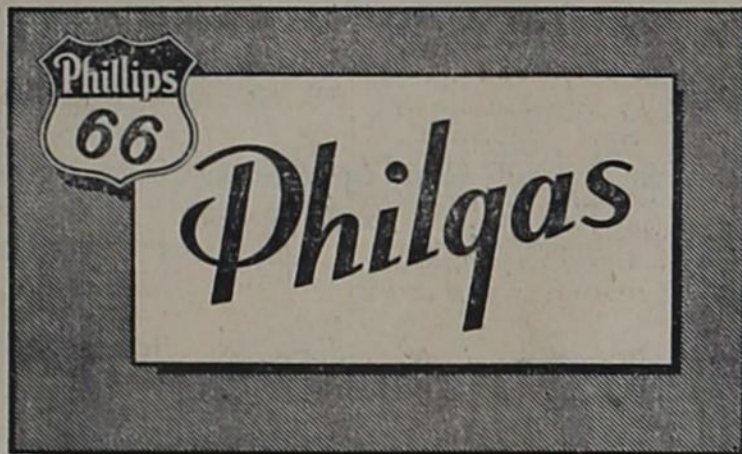

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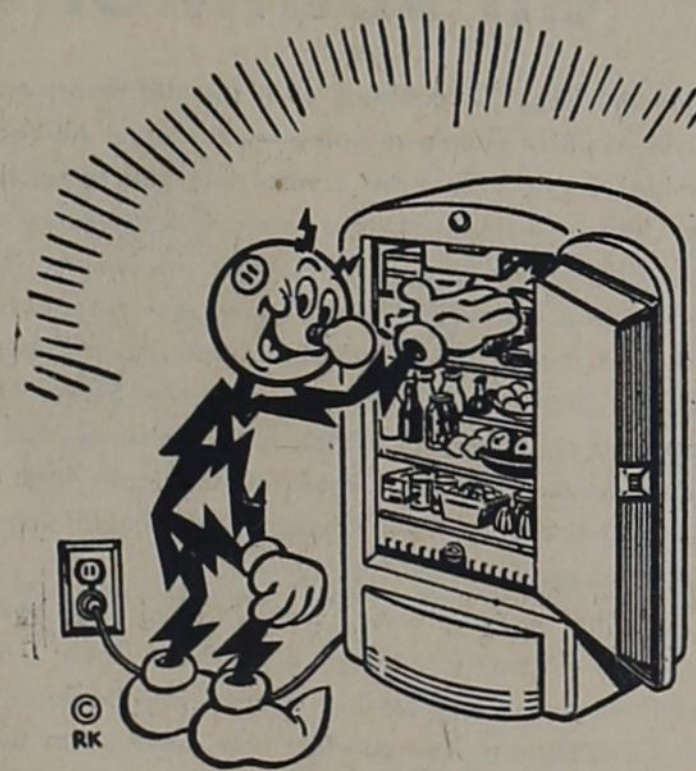

## REA RECOMMENDS FULL \$454,000 LOAN FOR RURAL PHONES, OUTLOOK GOOD

(From The Hereford Brand)  
A recommendation urging approval of the full \$454,000 loan to the West Texas Rural Telephone Cooperative will be made to the administrator of the REA in Washington, Deaf Smith County REA Manager Leo Forrest was advised in a telephone conversation with Washington, Friday.

Forrest said that Stuart McCabe, assistant in Region 10 of the Application and Loan division of the REA in Washington, told him Friday he would make this recommendation regarding the local cooperative's application.

McCabe said he would advocate approving the entire amount and recommend executing loan papers and notes to cover the amount of the rural phone network that can be constructed at the present time. Engineer's studies on the work will be sent from Washington in about 30 days, Forrest estimated.

In his telephone conversation with the Washington office, Forrest was advised to accept applications from anyone wanting service up to the time actual construction work begins.

McCabe said he felt that all who had signed up and paid their equities would be served, including the people in the Wyche community. He

also discussed the southern part of Castro county and Forrest assured him an effort would be made to get patrons in that section of the county to sign with the local cooperative.

The system is designed, Forrest said, to accommodate 30% more connections than are signed up.

The Washington office, in discussing the local application in length, assured Forrest they were "of the opinion" that the local cooperative would be able to serve all who have made application and made their equity payment. A final decision on this matter, however, hinges on the government's final engineering study which will determine the feasibility of serving these patrons. McCabe was sure, however, that none would be cut out in the Wyche area.

After talking with the application and loan division spokesman, Forrest told The Brand the picture "looks favorable".

Loan papers will be ready in about 30 days, Forrest estimated. Cutover date on the system may be in about a year. He based his reasoning on the way this type of equipment is being delivered at the present time by manufacturers.

system—will depend on the Korean situation. If it gets worse, it may be longer than a year. If it gets better, chances for obtaining materials may get better.


