Just about the time the struggling little plants begin to show some signs of growth, the highway boys decide that the weeds and grass need burning and they come along with blazing torches, with the result that the little trees are killed back to the ground. The trees make a come back by the following spring only to be treated to the scorched earth policy of the highway maintainers again.

The New Mexico boys need to observe how the Texas crewmen take care of their trees. Every tree along the Texas highways is carefully cultivated and rank weeds and grass kept down. Each spring the trees are properly pruned and cared for. The result is trees along Texas highways are now affording shade for tired motorists while in New Mexico only a few struggling unpruned, shaggy bushes are to be found.

The big city papers are carrying on a campaign to induce the Texas legislature to change the law so that county commissioners will be elected by a county-wide vote, instead of the precinct vote now being used.

To our way of thinking, it would be a serious mistake to change this law, under the present system, each precinct elects its own county commissioner. But under a countywide basis the entire county would result in the large cities of the state donameting the selection of all four commissioners.

For example, the population centers like Amarillo would elect all four county commissioners, with the rural precincts having no say in who would represent them in the commissioners courts. That would be most unfair.

> CRUDE OIL OUTPUT UP IN '50; GOING HIGHER IN '51

Domestic crude oil production rose seven per cent during 1950 to a total of 1,973,000,000 barrels, according to the Bureau of Mines. This was about two per-cent below the record production of 2,020,185,-000 barrels achieved in 1948, the



Quick-Frozen Orange Juice Concentrate Adds to Happy Birthday Refreshments

And if you serve the quick-frozen kind, it means only the flip of a can opener, the addition of water, brisk stirring or shaking, and the lovely golden drink is ready. It's a thrifty treat, too, so you can be generous in granting seconds and then thirds without worrying about an upset food budget. And it's certainly one of the healthiest drinks, safe as safe for children.

Cake, of course, is part of the birthday entertainment tradition. That's easy, too, if you make it with a mix. Frost it lavishly and decorate it with pretty candles-bright red or pale pink, blue or green. There are all sorts of amusing candleholders: flowers and small animals, plastic numerals and birds.

Remember, whether you're preparing orange juice for breakfast or a party, that it must be thoroughly stirred or, better still, shaken, to restore the air removed when it was concentrated just before quick-freezing.
