

Profile of the Farmer

More than three million people farm or ranch in the United States. Individuals, family partnerships or family corporations operate almost 99 percent of U.S. farms.

Over 22 million people are employed in farm or farmrelated jobs, including production agriculture, farm inputs, processing and marketing and wholesale and retail sales.

According to the 2002 Census of Agriculture, 50 percent of the farmers are 55 years of age or older, up only three percent from 1997. Average age of the principal operator is 55.3.

Forty-one percent of U.S. total land area is farmland (938.28 million acres). In 1900, the average farm size was 147 acres, compared to 441 acres today.

The top five agricultural commodities are corn, cattle and calves, dairy products, broilers and soybeans. U.S. farmers produce 46% of the world's soybeans, 41% of the world's corn, 20.5% of the world's cotton and 13% of the world's wheat.

Farmers and ranchers are independent business people who provide for their families by growing and producing food and fiber. They use modern production techniques to increase the quality and quantity of the food they produce.

In the 1960s one farmer supplied food for 25.8 persons in the U.S. and abroad. Today, one farmer supplies food for 144 people in the U.S. and abroad.

The Texico Lady Wolverines utterly destroyed game. Estancia in the first round of the state playoffs at home on Friday, 59-12.

Estancia finished its season at 18-11. Texico was 25-2 after the game.

Actually, it was never a game. Texico's stifling defense wiped out Estancia so badly that the clock ran at the end of the game just to get it over with although an Estancia player was on the free throw

How bad was the destruction? Texico took a 15-0 lead at the end of the first quarter. Not only did Estancia fail to score a single point, but they took only six shots at the basket – and not one of those shots even touched the rim.

Estancia turnovers in 32 minutes.

Scoring for Texico were: Bryn Mayfield, 13; Katlin Luscombe, 6; Victoria Richards, 6; Faith Martin, 19 (including four 3-pointers); Brooke Bailey, 8; Braeden Hadley, 5; and Jaryse Harris, 2.

Texico discusses complaints about dogs running loose

The Texico City Council on Tuesday discussed complaints about dogs in the community running free without leashes.

The city does not have a dog catcher due to financial constraints, but they directed the city police to start handing out citations to dog owners who violate city ordinances.

Owners will have to appear before a judge and can face fines up to \$500.

City Clerk Caroline Johnson also pointed out that citizens can file complaints and both parties will be summoned to court to discuss the problems.

In other business, the council:

- Ok'd the transfer of funds to help pay for EMS

 Discussed buying a wood chipper for the city. A chipper big enough to take care of 12" logs will cost around \$30,000. Johnson will look at getting it into next year's budget.

 Agreed to let Johnson replace the copier in city hall. The current copier has been repaired several times recently and continues to have problems.

- Discussed the wastewater treatment proposal with representatives from the engineering company Souder Miller. Texico is upgrading itssewage plant to get it up to date with current state regulations.

The engineering firm gave several recommendations for upgrades, but the most reasonable options were to clean out the current lagoons, put in a synthetic liner, possibly dig a new lagoon, and then discharge the waste water onto city maintained farm

The engineers priced this at around \$1.5 million. They also pointed out that runover water is held in a lagoon, and it is believed that the state could make this illegal in the near future.

They recommended a plan that would cost around Beautiful cherry solid \$1.8 million to put in a mechanical system that cleans the water to a higher standard. If the water were to be used for anything besides agricultural use, this would be necessary.

Other improvements that will have to be implemented included measuring incoming materials to the treatment facility, chlorinating the water, and dechlorinating it before it leaves. Texico will also have to put in several monitoring wells to make sure there is no waste getting into the ground water.

The engineers pointed out that several cities, including Cloudcroft and El Paso, have started cleaning their water and pumping it back into the water supplies. They also pointed out that it is very expensive and Texico doesn't need it at this point.





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
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
