Members of the El Llano Grande Kiwanis Club gathered Tuesday, Sept. 30, for a regular business meeting and installation of officers for the forthcoming club year.

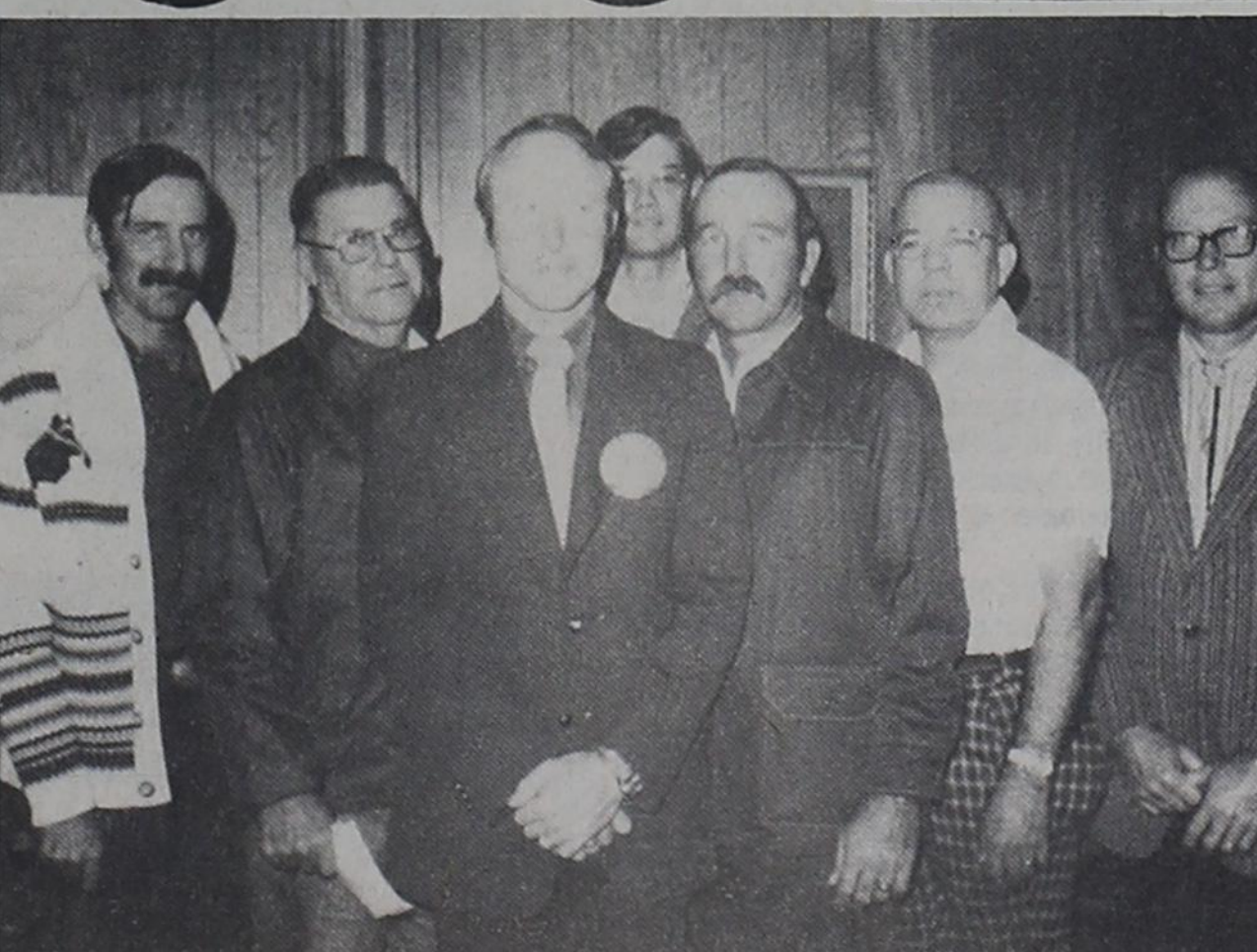
Serving as installing officer for the local organization was Joe Lucas of Roswell, lieutenant governor of Division III, Kiwanis.

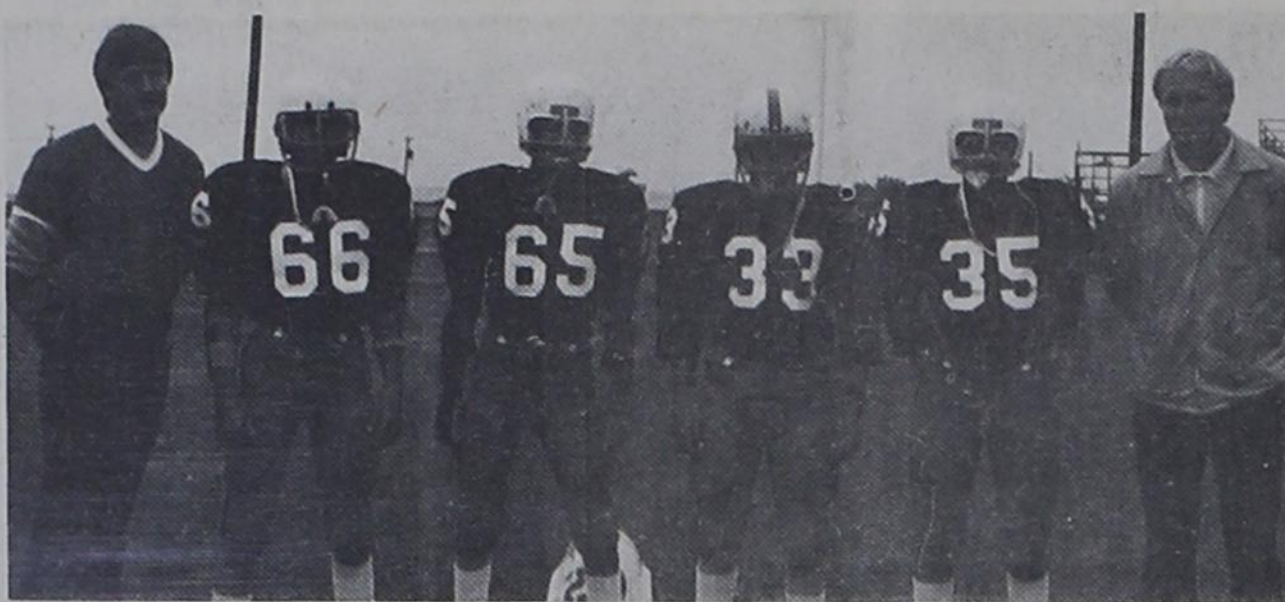

Chamber Reports - -

NHSC Representatives To Visit Area Oct. 9-10

During a regular meeting of the Farwell Chamber of Commerce held Tuesday, Sept. 30, it was reported that information had been received that National Health Service Corps representatives will be in Farwell October 9-10 to visit and inspect the area.

Through NHSC, Farwell may be able to obtain two doctors and a dentist. In further reports, the Chamber learned that the Farwell Hospital District's application for a certificate of need may be out of Austin Thursday, Oct. 2.

"I believe all things possible have been done to speed movement of the application," commented Chamber President Pudge Rose. "If we have to go back and re-apply for a certificate of need, it will be March before construction on the nursing home can begin. If the approval comes through Thursday, it will be possible for construction to begin in 35 days."

Chamber members also discussed a bicentennial celebration. It was reported by Rose that he had contacted Lewis Cooper of the Texico Chamber of Commerce in regard to a celebration being planned by that city. Members of the Chamber agreed to work with the Texico Chamber in coordinating activities for the July 4,

1976 celebration. Chamber member Dutch Quickel was instructed to secure information on bicentennial activities.

John Curtis, Ralph Franse and Quickel were appointed by Rose to compile a list of prospective Chamber members. Prospective members are to be contacted at a later date.

Correspondence received by the Chamber included a letter from the Lubbock Chamber of Commerce asking for the local Chamber's support in getting Amtrax service between Atlanta, Ga., and Los Angeles, Calif. Should the passenger train service be secured, it will, in all probability, encom-

pass the cities of Farwell and Texico.

Chamber members voted to support the effort of the Lubbock Chamber. A letter is to be written voicing the local Chamber's support.

Chamber member Otis McMillan, Farwell postmaster, reported to the Chamber that beginning Wednesday, Oct. 1, a complaint box will be available in the post office lobby. All persons wishing to voice a complaint to the postal service is asked to fill out a complaint card. "This is being done so that we may eliminate problems within the system," commented McMillan.

Farwell Council Discusses Zoning

Farwell City Council met Monday afternoon, Sept. 29, in a regular session.

Mark McConathy and Benny Lawrence of the Panhandle Regional Planning Commission met with members of the Farwell Planning and Zoning Board to discuss the long-range planning and zoning problems in the city. Council members agreed to

have some zoning maps redrawn. When maps are ready for presentation, a public hearing for citizens will be held. All property owners who will be affected by any new zoning will be notified and allowed to voice an opinion.

Next meeting is set for Monday, Oct. 13, at the City Hall at 5:15 p.m. CDT.

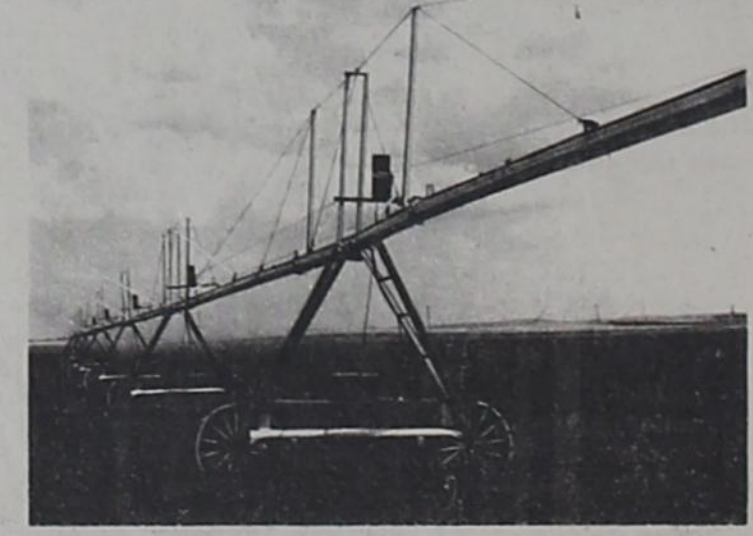
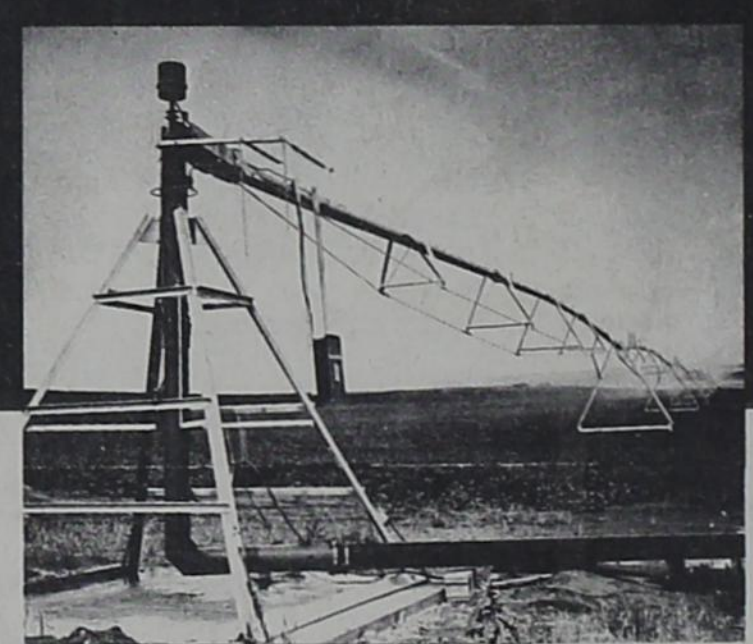

Texico 'Buffaloes' Melrose For Homecoming Victory

Texico won its Homecoming football game 12-0 Friday, Sept. 26, surprising the Melrose Buffaloes. With the victory, the Wolverines upped their season record to three wins against one loss.

Melrose kicked off to start the game. Texico made little, if any, yardage and was forced to punt. Melrose then lost yardage until, failing a first down, they gave Texico possession of the ball. A bad snap from center caused the punter to be tackled.

Wolverine quarterback Steve Turner alternated the ball between his backs, Spencer Turner, Tommy Galvan and Stevie Aske, making short gains with one penalty against both teams. They were then forced to punt.

With a strong defensive stand by the Wolverines, the Buffaloes ran out of downs. Texico took over on their own 10-yard line. The Wolverines gained two first downs, but were again forced to punt. The ball went out of bounds on the Buffalo 48-yard line. Wolverine Homer Ashley then stopped the Melrose carrier for a seven-yard gain followed by a Melrose fumble. Texico recovering. Again Turner alternated backs, adding himself to his list of ball carriers by carrying the ball on a quarter-back sneak. The quarter ended with no score for either team.

Texico had control of the ball when the second quarter started, only to fumble with the Buffaloes recovering. Melrose made no gain and punted. The Wolverines then carried the ball to about six inches short of a first down. Turner again ran a quarterback sneak followed by an incomplete pass to Barry Lindley. Again Turner passed, this time connecting with Stevie Aske who was stopped just short of a TD. A quarterback sneak put the ball across the line for a TD. Steve Turner attempted to run for the PAT which was no good. Hadley then kicked off to Melrose, the ball being downed on the 20-yard line.

The Buffaloes then gained 17 yards only to lose 15 of them from a penalty against themselves. Melrose made only short gains and was forced to punt. The Wolverines made short gains, including a first

down, but lost five yards on a delay-of-the-game penalty. Again they made short yardage, but were penalized five yards. Another Texico penalty forced them to punt. Melrose made no gains and the half ended Texico leading 6-0.

The third quarter started with the Wolverines kicking off to the Buffaloes. Melrose gained six yards, getting another five from a Texico penalty. The Buffaloes then fumbled the ball and Texico recovered it, only to twice be penalized 10 yards for illegal procedure, forcing the Wolverines to punt. Melrose made a five yard gain, then fumbled with Texico recovering.

Texico made a short gain, gaining five more yards from a Buffalo offside penalty. Texico now had the ball on the Buffalo three-yard line and was penalized five yards. The Wolverines fumbled the ball, but recovered it, followed by a 15-yard penalty.

Texico's quarterback attempted three passes, all incomplete. The first was intended for Stevie Aske, the second for Barry Lindley, and the third for Spencer Turner. They lost yardage and handed the ball over to Melrose on their 25-yard line. Chris Eshleman stopped the Buffalo ball carrier for a short gain and Steve Turner intercepted a Melrose pass.

Texico made short gains moving the ball across for a TD, which was called back because of a clipping penalty against Texico. Again they made short gains, until a Buffalo intercepted a Wolverine pass. Melrose made no gain and the third quarter ended with Texico ahead, 6-0.

PAUL TELLS OTHERS ABOUT HIS GOSPEL

It is true that NOW there is but one gospel and God's anathema is pronounced upon any who would presume to proclaim any other (Gal. 1:8,9), but those who suppose that Paul proclaimed the same good news which the twelve before him had proclaimed, should carefully read Galatians 2:1-9.

The twelve had been proclaiming our Lord's kingdom rights in "the gospel of the kingdom." The kingdom having been rejected, however, God raised up Paul to proclaim "the gospel of the grace of God" (Acts 20:24). In Galatians 1:11,12, this apostle declares:

"But I certify you, brethren, that the gospel which was preached of me is not after man, for I neither received it of man, neither was I taught it, but by the revelation of Jesus Christ."

This is only one of many passages in which he declares that he was commissioned to proclaim a special message by the glorified

Lord Himself (Eph. 3:1-4; Rom. 16:25; etc.).

Now in Galatians 2:2, the apostle states: "I went up BY REVELATION [God sent him] and communicated unto them [the apostles and elders at Jerusalem] that gospel which I preach among the Gentiles. . . . But was he not merely checking to make sure that he and they were preaching the same good news? No, for he goes on to say: "But [I went] privately to them which were of reputation, lest by any means I should run, or had run, in vain."

Verses 7 and 9 then go on to tell how "they saw" and "perceived" the grace that had been given to Paul, so that they publicly and officially gave him "the right hands of fellowship," acknowledging him as the apostle of grace, sent to the world with a message of grace.

"For by grace are ye saved, through faith; and that not of yourselves: it is the gift of God" (Eph. 2:8).

Library Aids All; Book Fair Slated

An expanded program has been undertaken at Farwell High School which could well be called "Operation Awareness."

Through the efforts of Farwell Librarian Anne Corn and 10 students known as library helpers, other students at the school are being confronted by displays giving them subtle reminders that the library is located in the school and is there for their pleasure and educational use.

At the present time the bulletin board located in the high school hall is adorned by a display suggesting "Let's Brush Away Our Reading Cobwebs." Included on the board are book jackets suggesting various reading materials such as biography, mystery, poetry and fiction.

The "lay out" or design for the bulletin board was drawn up by Mrs. Corn. Actual construction of the board was done by library helpers. Included in the group are Tim Bradshaw, Bruce Kaltwasser, Sandra McMillan, Tracie Watkins, Lannie Maron, Cindy Watts, Cheryl Gohlke, Truitt Smith, David Harding and Wesley Hukill.

"Our problem at the current

time," stated Mrs. Corn, "is an unawareness of the library. We are seeking to make it a place students can enjoy coming to. We're here for their benefit."

Mrs. Corn, who is serving her fourth year at Farwell, commented that at the present time, use of the library is mainly in conjunction with English classes. "Having only one period a week to browse or four minutes between classes isn't enough for a student to look for a book they really want." She stated that looking for a book is much like shopping, you have to look around to find what you really want.

"We want to develop a program whereby students may use the library before or after school." Mrs. Corn is currently conducting a daily advanced mathematics class from 8 until 9 a.m., the hour immediately preceding regular class hours. This restricts the use of the library to school hours which, as explained, limits the time some students have to use the facility.

There are currently 4125 volumes in the library including filmstrips, tapes, cassettes, overhead transparencies and periodicals.
