Harvest Is Halted as General Rains Drench Territory, During Past Week

Harvesting of grain sorghums and cotton came to an abrupt halt in this territory the past Tuesday night, when the first of continuing heavy weekend showers was received. Total precipitation ranges from just over the three inches recorded in town to an estimated—and registered—5½ and 6 inches out of the city.

Some scattering hail was also received during the four-day wet spell, but all contacts made here on Monday morning indicated that little or no damage was done by the hail stones.

As to just what damage may have been recorded against grain and cotton, the majority of producers and businessmen alike were of the opinion that this would be of little consideration when posed opposite the incalculable benefit to future crops from the generous ground seasonings.

At the local elevators, a checkup revealed nothing doing the first of the week and across the tracks at the gin the story was the same. In addition, several trailer loads of cotton were on hand in the yard when the rains came, and these will have to wait for several days until they are sufficiently dry to put through the gin.

To consider the damage: most observers were of the opinion that light losses would be sustained by grain producers unless a heavy freeze is received before combines can get in the fields. Such a freeze could cause top-heavy stalks to topple over. As to cotton, the majority of the crop in this area is stormproof, and a minor loss only is anticipated.

Wright Williams, gin manager, replied to questions that he did not believe the moisture would lower cotton gradings much, although he admitted it "might not run quite as high as before". Cotton, incidentally, is grading better quality this year than ever before in the area, producers point out.

Immeasurable benefit will come to wheat fields and pasture land, both of which suffered during the closing weeks of summer from high temperatures and an absolute dearth of moisture.

Some wheat has been planted and should afford winter pasture in a very short time. Observers hazarded opinions the first of the week that wheat plantings would be the highest of recent years, in view of the fact that this is the first time in years that generous rains have come at a time to encourage seedings.

Resumption of harvest action is expected around the last of this week, as soon as the ground dries sufficiently to allow heavy machines to move into the fields. Cotton picking will likely begin again about the same time.

Further Construction Not In Plans Now

Construction of additional labor camp facilities on the site owned by Bert Chitwood is not being considered at present, in the opinion of H. H. Weis, contractor.

Chitwood was not available for information on Monday. Weis, however, reported that he had not been notified of any further work on the project.

The housing units now being occupied by migratory laborers, are not yet entirely complete, Weis said. Gas lines are yet to be run to each unit, and the outside stucco is to be applied. No report as to when this work would be done was available.

This was the 144th gathering of the foreign missionary conference, and was attended by approximately 1900 ministers and laymen from churches in 16 states.

Theme of the program, devoted to missionary work, was reviewing new trends in the work. The problem of nationalism was taken up, with workers home from foreign fields reporting that particularly in India and South Africa, "Americans just aren't welcome". Decision of the conference was to try to carry on missionary work in those areas through native Christians, Knight added.

The pastor reported further that conference attendants agreed to put more emphasis on the fact that "Christianity has a unique message to offer the world".

Ronald Bridges, president of the mission board, and Dr. Frederick Meek, of Old South Church, Boston, were among the prominent speakers at the sessions.

Bazaar, Dinner is Planned By Ladies

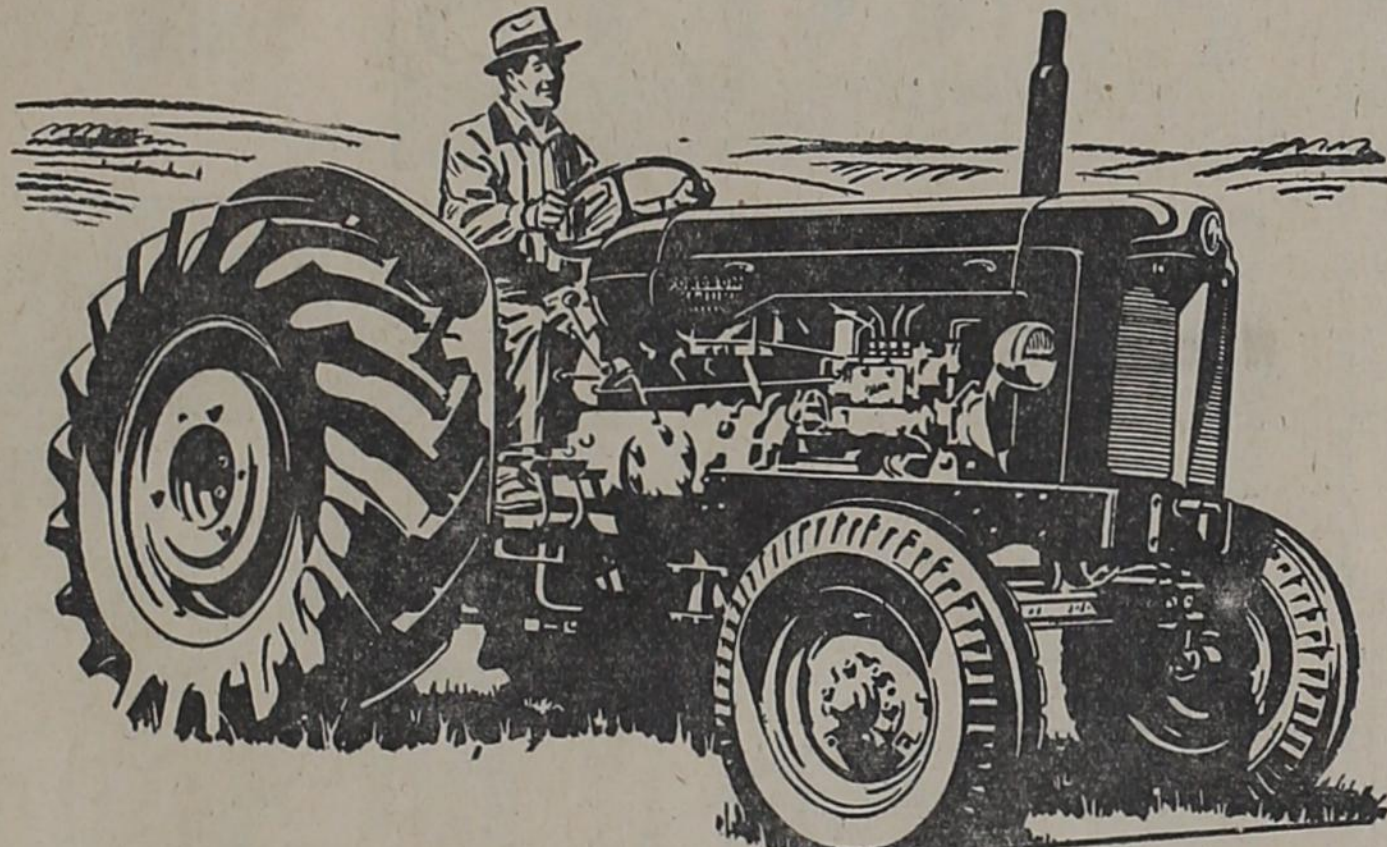
The annual bazaar and dinner sponsored by the Ladies Aid of the Congregational Church has been announced for Tuesday, November 3rd.

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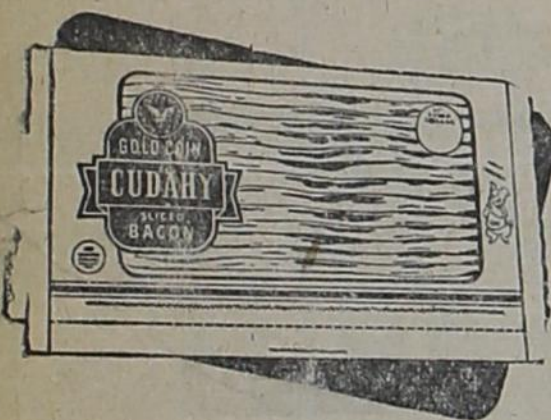

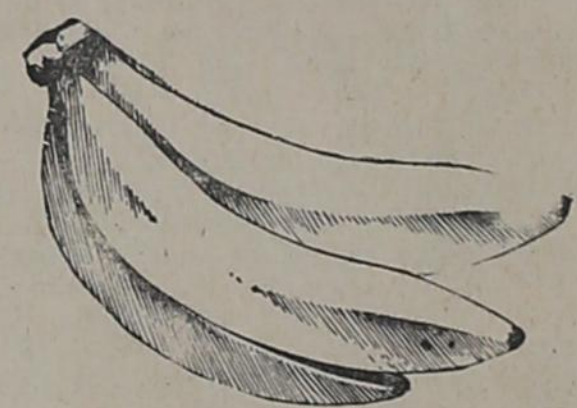

1/4 cup melted butter or margarine
Filling:
1 No. 2 1/2 can cling peach slices
1/4 cup melted butter or margarine
2 tablespoons lemon juice
1/2 cup confectioners' sugar
1/4 teaspoon salt

Crust: Blend crumbs and butter thoroughly. Press firmly in bottom and sides of 9-inch pie pan. Chill.

Filling: Chill milk in ice cube tray of refrigerator until ice crystals begin to form around edges. Drain peaches. Reserve 12 slices for garnish, dice remainder. Mix remaining ingredients until smooth. Whip icy milk in cold bowl with cold beater until stiff. Whip in butter-sugar mixture, 1/2 at a time. Fold in diced peaches. Turn into chilled crust. Decorate with peaches and with maraschino cherry halves if desired. Chill 2 hours or longer. Serves 6.

NEWS FROM THE FARM BUREAU

By RAYMOND EULER

This is, perhaps, the first time agriculture has rated two, three or sometimes more prominent headlines in the daily newspapers of America almost every day. It is the first time any labor organization ever suggested that agriculture should have some support, as long as every other industry is so supported. It is certainly the first time such groups have ever suggested supports in excess of what the farmers themselves have asked through their organizations. Why this sudden revelation to such groups?

Organization of agricultural people has, we believe, provided the light that allows everyone who studies national economy to see the facts that Farm Bureau and other farm groups have tried to present for many, many years. Agricultural income has, since records have been kept, always equalled just about exactly one seventh of the national income. Consequently, other income can equal only six times the agricultural income. What good reason could there be, therefore, for laborers and industry

NOTICE TO THE CITIZENS OF TEXICO

The Town Council of Texico has engaged the services of Ray Mears to haul garbage in Texico, for a very nominal sum, and invite the citizens to cooperate with him as best they can.

Established grain sorghums as a basic commodity.

Earlier in the evening reports were heard from Farm Bureau officers concerning work of the organization during the past year.

Retiring president Bruce Parr spoke out for the Bureau: "The Farm Bureau has never asked for anything that was not for the good of the nation as a whole."

Aubrey Ellison, head of the legislation committee, spoke on the matter of Farm Bureau resolutions. He said one Parmer County resolution last year was made into law: the Texas Warehouse Bill.

"Texas Farm Bureau supported thirty-six national resolutions," said Ellison. "We were defeated in only five. We opposed five, and defeated them all."

He then observed that the Bureau has proved to be a very powerful influence upon affairs of the nation as well as those local.
