Last week, our family had its first brush with the new system of getting a driver's license renewed. Our spouse received a little card indicating that soon her current driver's license would expire and she must forthwith repair to the place where the State of Texas will take a picture of the culprit, oops, I mean applicant, for license renewal. At that place, then unnamed, she would be issued a temporary permit.

Being a law abiding citizen, or at least one who hasn't been caught lately, she asked where this place of official photography was located, and the writer, being a fount of much information and little wisdom, just did not know where in Parmer County a citizen must repair to for this Department of Public Safety official mugging. A judicious inquiry of the high sheriff's department elicited the information that, lo and behold, Friona was the chosen site for citizens seeking renewal of their right to operate a motor vehicle in the sovereign State of Texas.

Now this is an unseemingly kettle of fish when the good burgers of Farwell must travel some 50 miles round trip and expend much time in pursuit of a license renewal. Time that to a taxpayer is precious, but to a blood sucking politico is just something between elections. We realize that the cost of operating a vehicle is rapidly rising with increased insurance rates, increased depreciation and increased repairs, but we hardly expected a 1000% increase in the cost of renewing a driver's license.

People will continue to be put upon, intimidated, imposed upon, unmercifully taxed; in the whole, discriminated against and generally given second class treatment by our elected representatives as long as we silently and supinely let them get away with it.

A case in point is our elected officials of the Texas Railroad Commission who have now granted Santa Fe the permission to eliminate the Farwell to Houston passenger train. This elimination serves no good purpose to any person or community along this route. It is a distinct slap at the future of all small communities that had been served by this railroad. The people will bemoan this curtailment of service, grumble a little and find some way to make do without it. Members of the Railroad Commission will feel no retaliatory action by the general public at the polls because the general public is too apathetic, selfish, and self-centered to lift its collective beak from the trough of daily living.

For the information of those interested souls, members of the Texas Railroad Commission draw a salary of \$22,500.00, surely not a stipend that would create great wealth, are elected for a six-year term. Currently, these men are Ben Ramsey, chairman; Jim C. Langdon and Byron Tunnell, members.

We will venture a moss-covered 'alfenny that not over four voters in Farwell will remember that these men are the ONLY ONES DIRECTLY RESPONSIBLE for the loss of our passenger train service and vote against them the next time they come up for re-election. I said four voters; my wife and I will be two, but I do not think two others will remember to oppose these sorry representatives of the people.

175 Attend Country Club Open House

Dimmitt and Floydada were on hand for the affair. Ralph Douglas, Muleshoe, engineer for the country club building project was in attendance as was Warren Cantrell of Lubbock, architect for the country club. Several golf-pros including Wilson Swinney from

Tucumcari, Lee Olson, from Dimmitt, Oliver Himes, Amarillo, Tascosa Country Club superintendent, and Paul Jones, Clovis Country Club, were also in attendance. Tours were conducted through the country club building and around the facilities

which include a swimming pool and golf course, by members of the board of directors. Mrs. W. D. Prince, was chairman of the decoration committee. Included in the decorations were bouquets of flowers sent by various business firms and an art display of works of various local artists.

Marshal To Inspect Business Firms

Texico town fathers in action at a recent town meeting authorized Town Marshal Jim Light to inspect all Texico business firms to see if they are operating with the necessary occupational license required by the town to do business in Texico.

The marshal was also authorized to supervise traffic in the vicinity of the school and bring offenders to court, who continue to operate their vehicles in a dangerous manner. The town fathers also approved the use of radar to control speeding inside the town limits.

Bookmobile Has Summer Reading Club

Registration for the Summer Reading Club for all boys and girls of this area has started now. "Be sure to register for the program the next time the Bookmobile is in your area," urges Lorene Sooter, Bookmobile librarian.

To highlight the reading program for youngsters, a poster corral will be made and called "Wild Horse Corral." As each reader completes a book a different horse will be placed on the poster corral to make up the collection in the "old" corral. If more than twelve books are read by a member, ribbons will be awarded. Texas reading certificates will be awarded in the fall. To qualify, the reader must keep his official reading log of all books read. The log will be issued as the children register and must be returned to the Bookmobile after August 20, says the librarian.

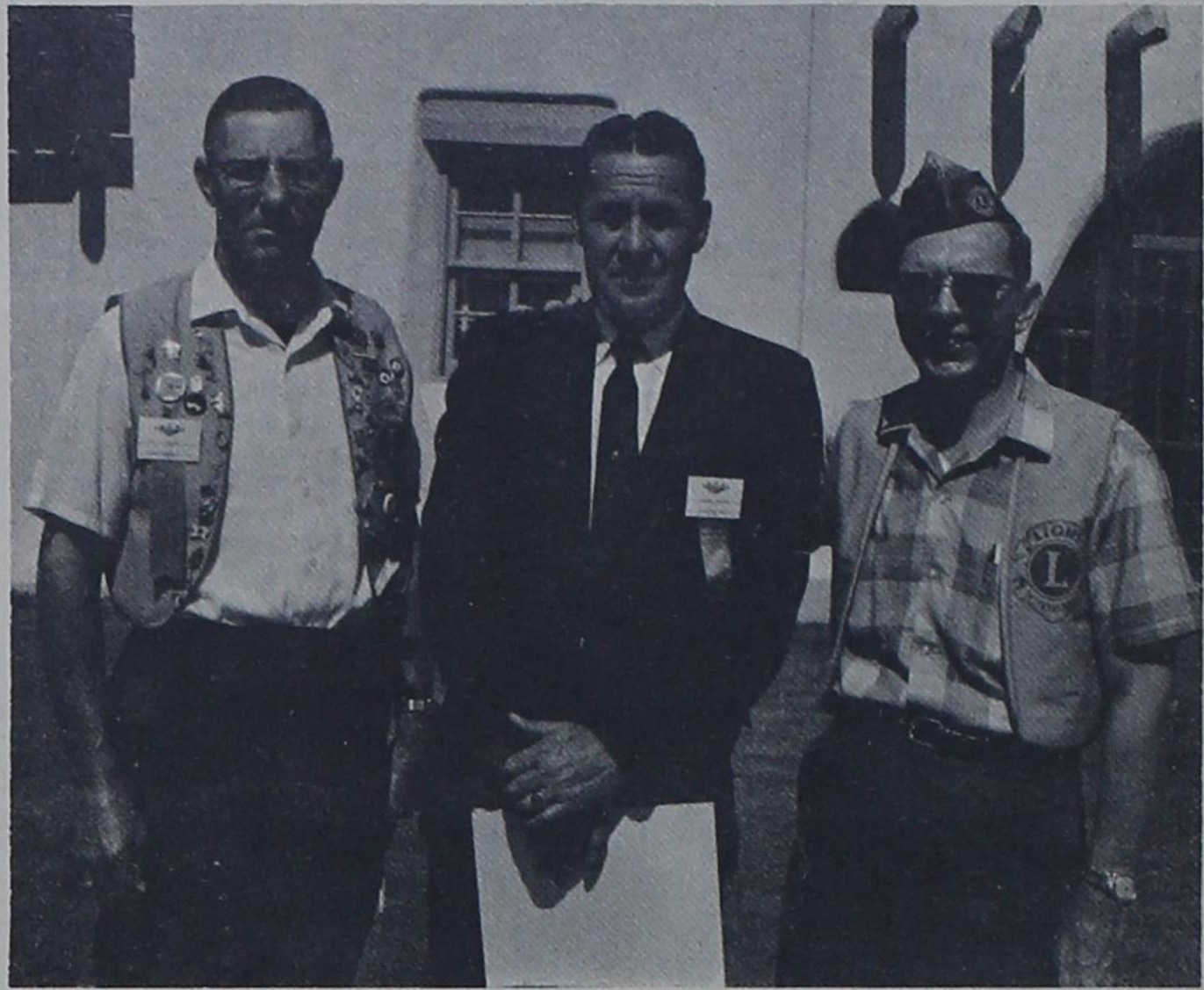

A new ordinance governing water taps in the water line was approved. Prior to this time, all taps on the water main have been a flat rate of \$40 each; however, since the town loses money on many of the taps, due to expense involved, the new ordinance calls for a fee of \$75 on a 3/4 inch tap; \$85 for a one inch tap; and \$250 for a two inch tap.

First Load Of Wheat Arrives

The first load of wheat for the 1968 harvest season arrived at the Sherley-Anderson Grain Co. in Lariat Saturday afternoon, according to Asa Smith, manager.

The wheat was brought in by Lonnie Wilhite from his farm south of Lariat. The dryland Tascosa wheat had a test weight

of 57.3 and a moisture content of 10.53, which is considered good by grain elevator men. Smith says the test weight was a little light due to the dry weather, which had caused the grain to ripen a little too fast. Smith indicated that Wilhite received a premium of \$25 on the 8920 pound load, first to be brought to an elevator in Parmer County this year.

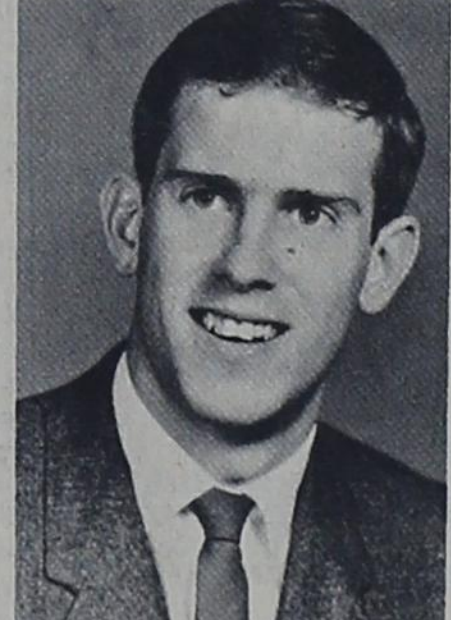
Cortez Billington Services Held

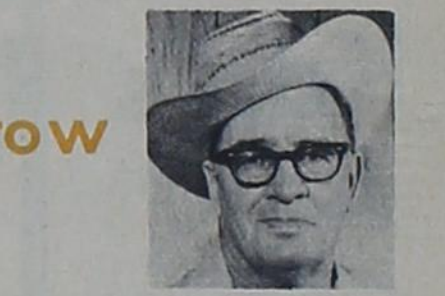
Mother Of Claude Coffey Dies

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NURSERY NEWS

When hail wrecks a garden, flower bed, wheat crop, or almost anything for which we have worked so hard, we often wonder why the elements of nature are so cruel. Then we must stop to figure that to have produced the plants that we enjoy, nature had to be rather relentless, unmerciful and efficient to have produced plants that would survive the treatment that we give them.

Roses are very hardy in this respect. Some that had the tar beat out of them a week to ten days ago are back, blooming as pretty as ever now. Of course, there are some that will revive and do better, quicker than others. That is one reason we are striving for a rose test plot; so that we may see which will do better under our local conditions.

Often we read that a certain plant needs a certain element added. To be more specific, a lady came in the other day and she had read that oyster shell and lime should be added to a certain plant for best results. The part that she had failed to remember was that the article was written for the eastern part of the U.S., where the elements added were primarily to correct an acid condition. Here, we need to approach the acid condition by counteracting the alkali. The article was written in good faith; the directions were being followed in equal good faith, but the only thing wrong was the article and advice didn't apply to our conditions.

There are limits that a plant will tolerate and the closer we adhere to these limits, the more rewarding the plant will be. Most plants do better from 7 1/2 to 7 3/4 on the "ph" scale. The closer we can get to this, the better plants will do. Under acid conditions, lime should be added and under alkali conditions, the adding of acid or an element that will dissolve the lime is most effective. That is where a well-studied, carefully executed play will pay off for the gardener.

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ASC News

By Prentice Mills HAVE YOU LOST YOUR COTTON? If you have lost your cotton (due to adverse weather) and want to have it considered as planted for program payment and allotment history purposes—This is what you do: 1. Come to your ASCS Office and file a request (in writing on Form ASCS-574) for acreage credit. 2. Be sure you come in and file your request before you do anything with your cotton acreage. Do not plant this acreage to another crop until after your request for acreage credit is approved by the County Committee. Again, if you are one of those who have lost your cotton acreage, let us remind you to come in right away and file for acreage credit.

ACREAGE REPORTS: If you have your crops all planted and are in a position to file your acreage report, it will be to your advantage to come in and make your report at the earliest possible date. It works this way: As soon as you make your acreage report, we can prepare (type up) all the documents necessary for completing your program payments. The sooner we can get our work done, the sooner we can get your payment to you. Of course, the final date for making your acreage report is August 15, but, if we could have all reports in by July 1, we could probably have everyone's payment to them several days sooner than we have in previous years.

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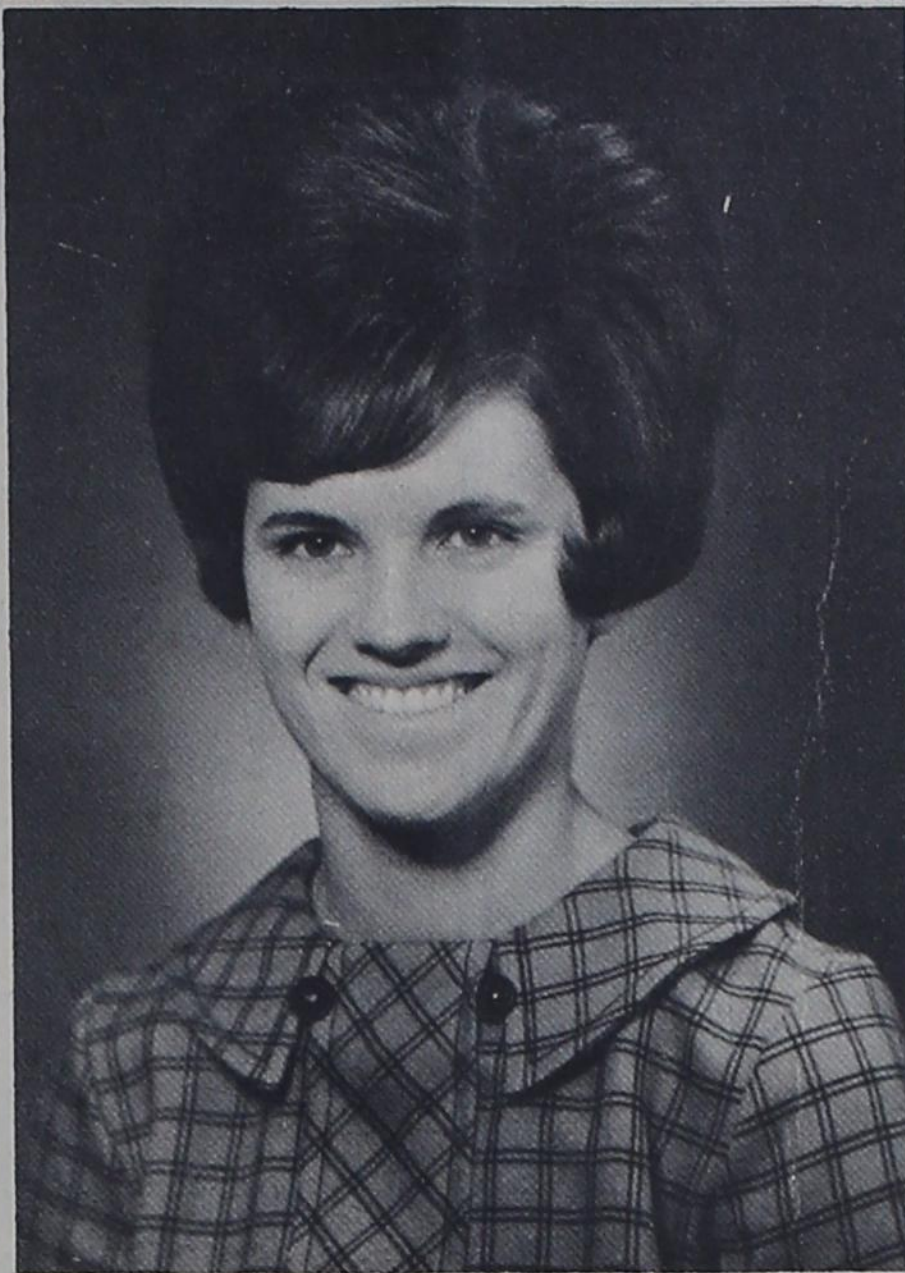
