Poage's Cotton Bill Would Hit County Hard

(That farmers are vaguely aware that there is a movement underfoot to reduce the trend consideration in making cotton allotments seems to be evident in Parmer County, but it is doubtful that very many have any idea how far-reaching pending

legislation would be if enacted, and to what extent it would adversely affect their own allotments.

For that reason, this story is printed as a timely reminder that forces are afoot which virtually do away with a system

A bill introduced recently in the U. S. House of Representatives by Rep. Bob Poage of Waco would, if made law, reduce the amount of cotton held in the state reserve for trend, hardship cases, and new farmers from the present 10 percent of the state allotment, to 2 1/2 percent.

Furthermore, it would do away completely with the trend factor in Texas, which has been using 66 1/2 percent of the reserve for rapidly developing areas such as Parmer County.

ment that is taking place on the Western High Plains, of which Parmer County is a part, this county received (percentage-wise) the greatest trend consideration of any county in the state—12,000 acres, this year.

Child Polio Shots To Begin Again

Vaccination of first and second grade children for the prevention of poliomyelitis will be resumed in Parmer County "probably late this month," according to Dr. Paul Spring, county health officer.

Dr. Spring received a communication from the State Department of Health Wednesday that indicated the vaccine has been brought into the state, and will be moved to local points some time in July.

The amount of vaccine available will reflect a reduction from the amount allocated the county for

the first series of shots prior to school vacation, when 479 children in the county were "shot," Dr. Spring pointed out.

The reason, he says, that the supply will be cut is because the Department anticipates the demand from parents for the free vaccination service to decline somewhat. From 70 to 80 percent of the

original shipment will be supplied.

When asked if there have been any reports during the past three months to indicate any connection between instances of polio and the first vaccinations, Dr. Spring emphatically answered, "Absolutely not."

In addition, he pointed out that the new serum has undergone severe tests to determine its safety, and can be considered reliable.

A small amount of serum was left over from the first series of shots, but will be turned back and not used in connection with the new series.

New City Ordinance Requires Sewer Connections for All

A new city ordinance passed by the Farwell city commissioners two weeks ago will soon require the hooking on of all businesses and residences to the sewer system, which has been in operation for several years now.

The new city law applies to all buildings that are within 100 feet of an existing sewer line. The sewer fee will be assessed whether the connection to the line is made or not.

As soon as legal work can be completed and the ordinance published it will become effective, according to Wilfred Quickel, city manager.

Hoppers, Bollworms Subject of Meetings

Infestation of fleahoppers and bollworms are showing up in cotton to some extent at this stage, reports County Agent Joe Jones, and a series of educational meetings designed to acquaint farmers with control measures has been announced for the county.

The sessions are scheduled for Monday, Tuesday, and Wednesday of next week, and will feature "in the field" demonstrations at various points.

Cotton producers will be instructed on how to find and identify insects, and how to determine when a stage of infestation has been reached that requires control measures.

In recent years, this meeting has proved to be advantageous in fostering intelligent control work.

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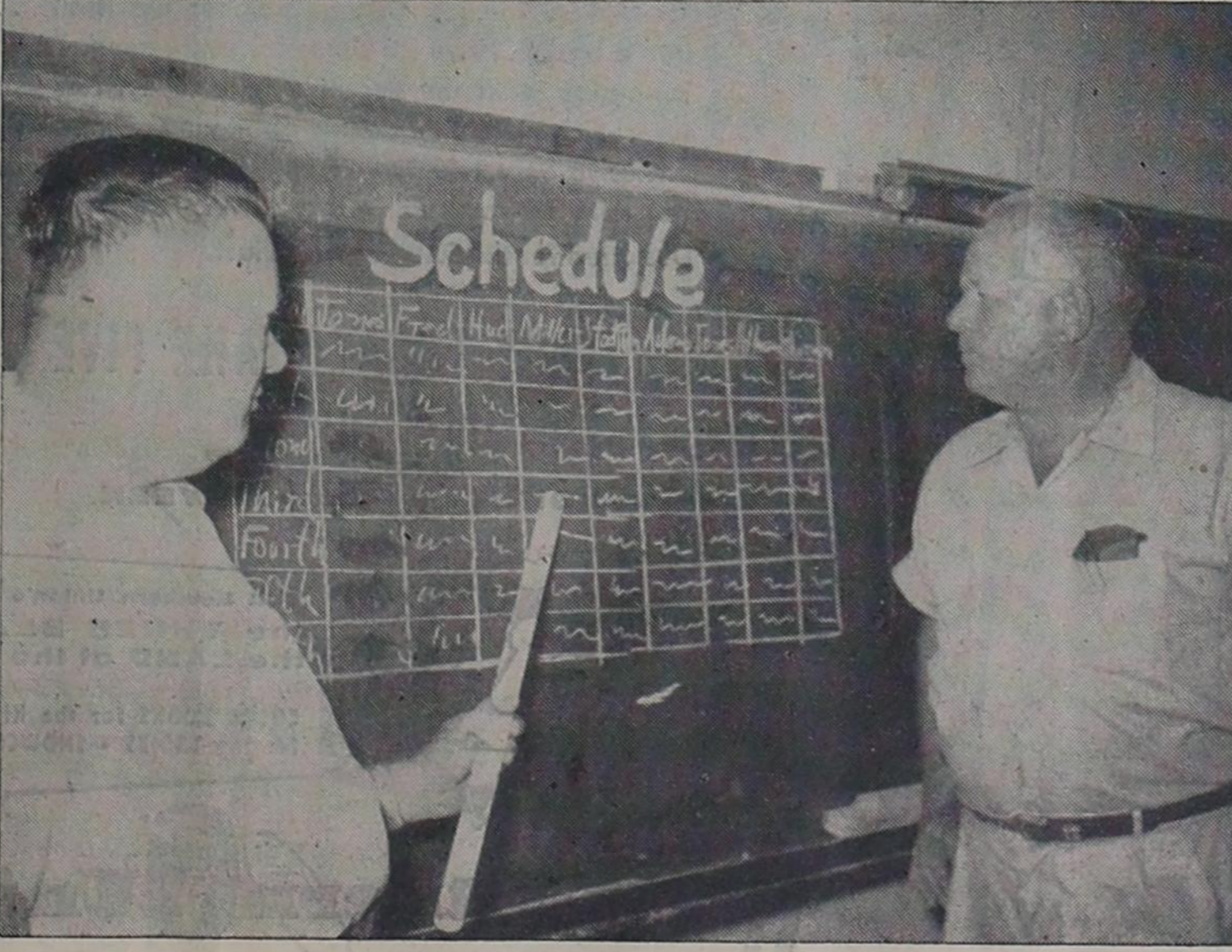

Thomason Contractors of Lovington were apparent low bidders with an offer of \$59,980.90 for a double-seal application; and \$63,705.86 for a triple-seal job.

The contract, however, will not be let by the city until Monday night after the city dads have had time to consider the bids.

Odell Potet of Ralls entered a bid for two coats, \$62,081.45.

The Dodson Company of Clovis bid \$69,315.65 for a two seal; \$75,154.05 for a triple-seal.

Mayor Scotty Levins emphasized that the paving will be installed this year, and the work is expected to begin in the near future.

Texico School To Have Major, Minor Courses Coming Year

"We want to help our students to form a purpose in life a little earlier—young people seem to work better if they have a purpose," Agrie Jones, superintendent of Texico Schools, related this week, as he explained the newest change in curriculum that will be inaugurated in the school system this year.

The program, which is long range, and will not be in full operation until the coming year, is a reasonably new trend in the educational field and will be rather unique in a school with a small

enrollment such as Texico.

The new system will be patterned after those used in colleges, with students selecting a major and minor in subjects in which they are most interested and best adapted.

To determine what these courses will be, each student who enters the freshman class will undergo orientation during the first high school year. He will spend part of his study hours in exploratory courses, designed to give occupational guidance to help him determine what profession he wishes to

pursume.

Then in his sophomore year, the student will decide what subject he wishes to major in, and the remainder of his high school will include a course of study designed to give him the most training in his chosen field, as well as comply with state requirements.

He will be able to choose a major in vocational, academic, business or general field, and specific training will be designed to help him in his chosen work.

Just about the time that Sen. Lyndon Johnson's name was beginning to be mentioned whenever the big brass got to talking over the next presidential campaign, the congressman turned up with a severe heart attack. Overwork, very probably.

Now, since the doctors indicate that Johnson will have good recovery (but are urging him to be cautious in his work), his admirers are back plugging him for the nomination again.

We say, don't ride a good horse to death. Lyndon Johnson will no doubt continue to be a very serviceable congressman in years to come, but it is doubtful if his constitution would be ready for a presidential campaign such as would soon come his way if his supporters get what they want.

We definitely have not always agreed with Lyndon Johnson, but we think that he is as good a presidential timber as there is lying around. Still his name ought to be forgotten since his recent illness.

"Ain't Fun Any More"

The arrest of and charges against the two fellows on the Atlantic seaboard who touched off a \$50,000 search of their fake "SOS" signals this past week indicates a definite change in the thought pattern of the nation.

Time was, say about 50 or 60 years ago, when these boys would have been practically heroes for their ingenious hoax. But what now? They wind up in the tank!

Remember the days of "yellow journalism" in the U. S. when big papers, clamoring for readership, stopped at nothing to get something exciting into print?

Remember the stories about "horrendous sea monsters" in the Atlantic, and the stories that were blown up about Dr. Livingston's expedition into Darkest Africa?

Well, is "ain't fun any more," as the two who recently got into trouble will no doubt verify. We don't mean to condone their actions. They ought to be disciplined. We merely are pointing out that times have changed.

Our problems out here on the High Plains will be nothing to compare with those of the southern and eastern part of the state. We earnestly hope that there is no violence in connection with these major changes that will directly affect the living habits of thousands of persons.

Also to teach in the elementary grades is Mrs. Hattie Coffey. Mrs. Coffey makes her home in this community. Her last teaching position was in Amherst.

James Allen has been hired as language arts instructor in the upper elementary grades. He is a graduate of Eastern New Mexico University in Portales, and is now doing graduate work at Texas Technological College in Lubbock. He is married, and his former home is in Clovis.

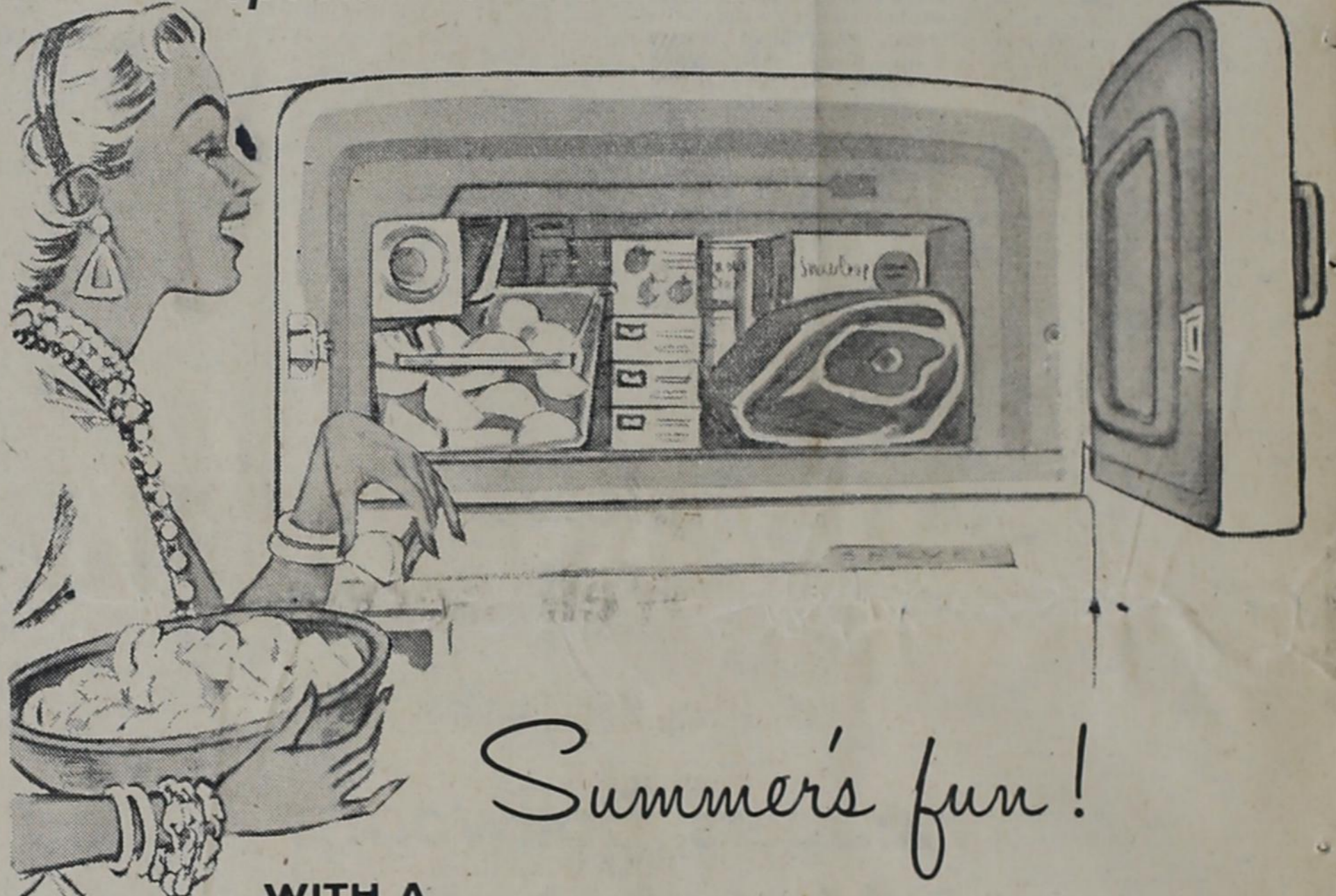

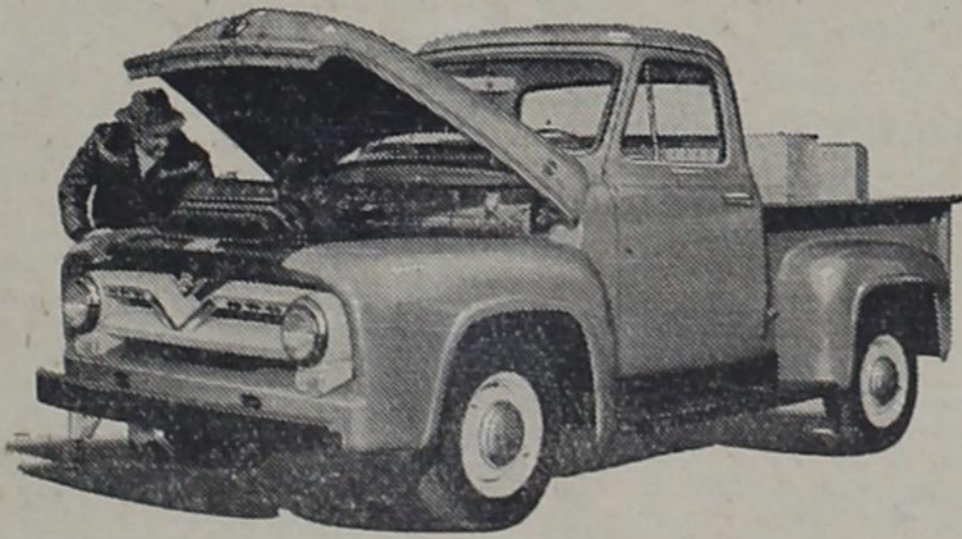
The men's breakfasts have been discontinued during the summer months while farmers are so busy in the fields. The socials are to be resumed in the fall.

25% Underplanting Next Year Won't Reduce Wheat Allotment

Wheat growers whose 1956 wheat acreage is as much as 25 per cent below their farm wheat acreage allotment will get credit for full allotment acreage in calculating future farm allotments.

In other words, office manager, Joe Camp, of the Farmer Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Committee explains, "if the

farm's wheat acreage, for next year's harvest is only three-fourths of the farm allotment, the future wheat acreage allotments established for the farm will be figured as though the full allotment had been planted."

Heretofore, reductions of more than 10 per cent were considered in calculating future allotments.

"Each year's farm allotment," the manager explains, "is based primarily on the farm's acreage for the previous three years."

Under the new ruling, even if the wheat acreage is as much as one-fourth less than the farm allotment, future allotments will be calculated as though the full allotment had been harvested.

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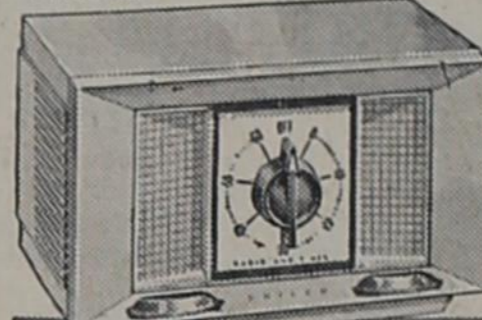

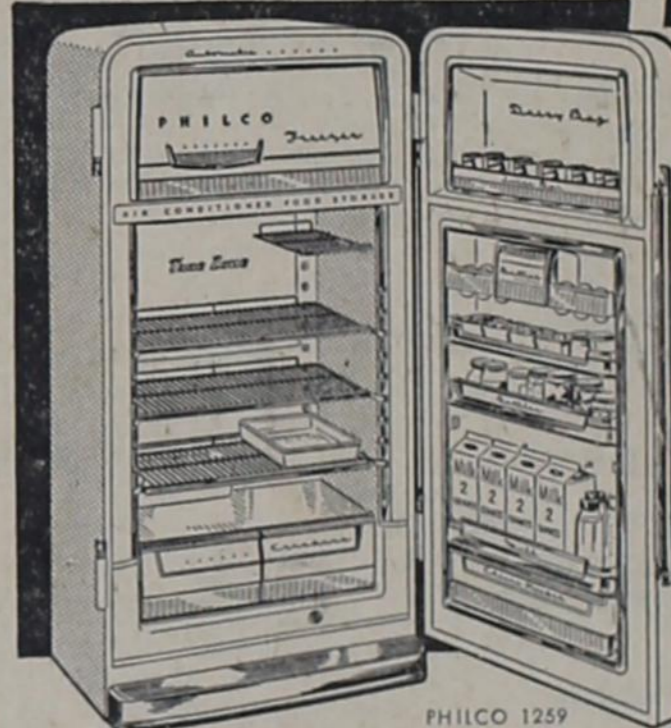

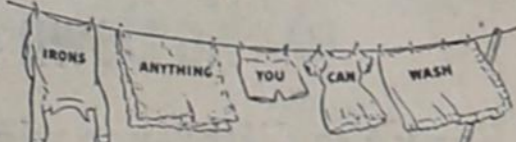

Cotton Conference Set for September

College Station, Texas—Importance of quality preservation in cotton's competitive fight with synthetic fibers will be stressed at the ninth annual Beltwide Cotton Mechanization Conference here, September 7-9.

"Quality is a big factor in determining the textile manufacturer's choice of fibers and it is imperative that the cotton industry provide him with the best product possible," R. Flake Shaw, Greensboro, N. C., chairman of the conference steering committee explained.

Mechanization, he added, is directly related to cotton quality. It offers the farmer an opportunity to lower his production costs but at the same time calls for more care to assure quality preservation.

Efficient mechanical harvesting, for example, demands that the land be prepared properly; that insects, weeds and grass be controlled; and that cotton be defoliated in many cases in order to reduce leaf trash and staining of the lint. Gins must do a good job of processing to further maintain high quality.

Conference speakers, in studying cotton's competitive situation, will point up possibilities for expanding consumption. They will study the relationship of the farm equipment industry, and the USDA-land grant college programs, to cotton's competitive strength.

The meeting is being sponsored by the National Cotton Council in cooperation with the Texas A&M College System, Farm Equipment Institute, United States Department of Agriculture, and Cotton Belt land grant colleges.

Texico Court Cases Draw Fines in June

NEWS FROM THE FARM BUREAU

Rhea Farm Bureau, in conjunction with their Home Demonstration Club, enjoyed another annual "4th of July" get-together on July 1st, their regular monthly meeting date. Rhea is one of the few remaining communities of this area with a thoroughly active local program.

Farm Bureau's annual Queen Contest will soon be in the news again.

Your commodity committee, of which E. T. Ford is chairman, met last Thursday night. The principal subjects of discussion were: (1) Planning definite lines of action to retain the "trend factor" in cotton allotments. (2) Action necessary to regain last year's reallocation of unwanted acreages of wheat, and (3) Plans for a county wide meeting in cooperation with the National Cotton Council in August. This meeting is to be held in the Bovina Auditorium on the night of the 19th. John Gregg, an associate of the Council met with President Kaltwasser to talk over plans for this meeting, designed to acquaint producers with the work being done in research with other marketing promotion work.

You will be glad to know that the amendment proposed for attachment to the Mexican Farm Labor Program extension bill was defeated. The House vote was 98 to 50 against the amendment which would have given Immigration Service Personnel authority to stick their noses into your farm labor business. Your local Farm Bureau officials joined state and national Farm Bureau efforts to defeat this move.

To protect you against a probable \$1 per hour minimum wage law, your organization is working for clarification of the phrase, "area of production" in the Fair Labor Standards Act.

Most of you no doubt know that you pay a 1 1/2 cent federal tax on gasoline used in farming operations. Farm Bureau is actively working for exemption of this tax on agricultural production fuel, particularly in view of the present aim of some legislators to increase this tax for federal highway use. No other industry has a substantial tax burden on power used in production.

Cynthia Bell, whom most of you remember as our first office secretary, has returned from Michigan to help us for a few weeks. She will supervise rearrangement of some of our files and records, and help us serve you better now and later. Glenda Richerd is the young lady who is working with Mrs. Bell, training to serve you as regular office secretary. We think you will find her efficient, courteous and pleasant to work with. Aeration and conditioning of small grain in flat storage on the farm is successful and profitable according to information compiled by the Agricultural Engineering Department at Texas Tech College in Lubbock, and other reliable sources. The work at the Lubbock College was in cooperation with the Texas Agricultural Experiment Station. Grain was placed in storage in October 1953, and complete records were kept on operating costs, temperatures, and moisture of the grain at all times for the past two seasons. Ira Williams, Head of the Agricultural Engineering Department, and Eldred Jordan, instructor, supervised these tests with the technical cooperation

of the Steel Bilt Products Company in Lubbock.

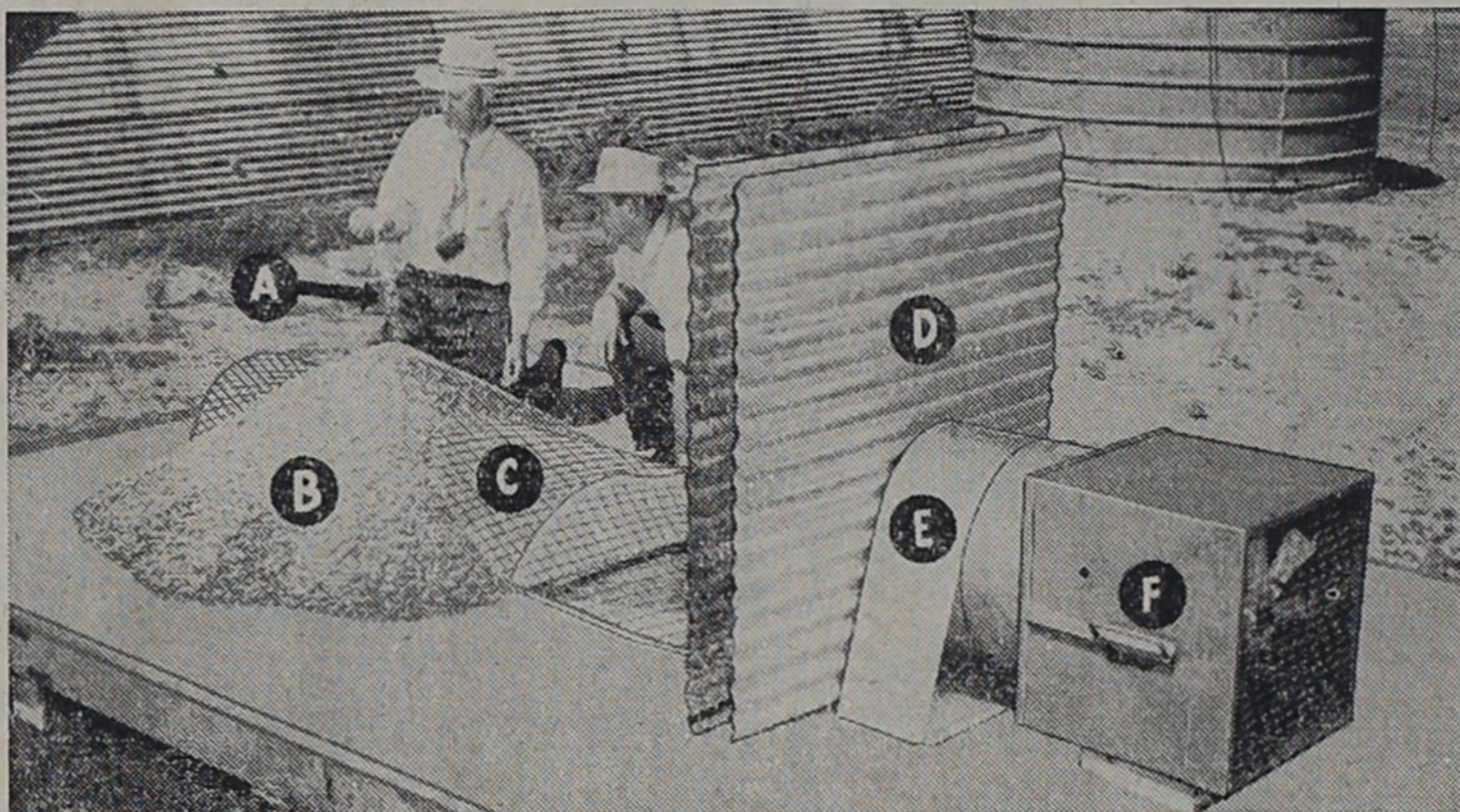
The equipment at the College includes a 16' x 32' quonset steel building with an expanded metal mesh air duct tunnel extending the entire length of the building. A high speed three horsepower electric motor drives the semi-pressure 18" fan that is attached to the outer end of the air duct tunnel. Outside air is pulled through the grain, carrying out moisture and heat; both enemies to grain in storage. Cost is small, particularly in view of the fact that moving and the turning of grain is eliminated. Also, any fumigation of grain that might be necessary is simplified. You

may get the details for this operation from Mr. Williams at the college, your nearest supplier of grain aeration equipment, and your county agricultural agent.

It is reported by Steel Bilt Products Company engineers that this three horsepower electric fan can safely aerate, fumigate, and keep about 72,000 bushels of grain in good condition in flat storage. If drying is desired, special attention should be given to the grain and not more than 3,000 bushels of grain should be dried with this unit in one operation. The job of keeping the grain cool, free of weevil and bug contamination is simple when this aeration process is used on the farm.

The cost of this equipment is fixed, the cost of electric power is insignificant; so barring poor weather or a poor market, your good management can increase your grain profits with aeration equipment.

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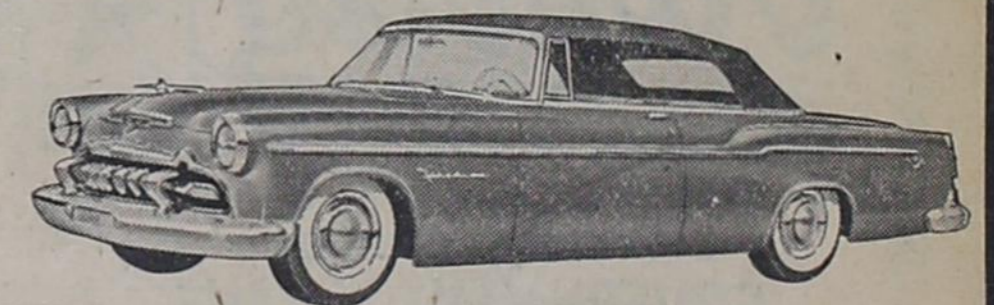
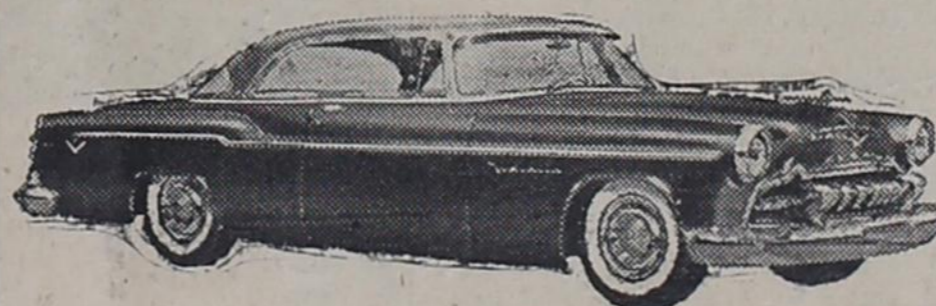

Poage Cotton Bill Threatens County Trend Allotment

mer FB president. The Poage bill obviously is special legislation, because it would apply only to states that have a 5,000,000-acre allotment or more. And Texas is the only state in the nation under such a classification.

Up until now, the state ASC committee has exercised its own judgment on what percent of the state reserve should be dedicated to trend factors, and to what parts of the state it should go.

Rep. Poage is gunning to stop this practice with his bill that would place strict limitations on the ability of the committee to do this. "I see no other way of stopping the unfair movement of cotton acreage by our state committee," Poage has been quoted as saying.

And while the congressman's bill is pending, Kaltwasser and E. T. Ford are scheduled to meet with the state ASC committeeman from Dumas next week to discuss the problem.

Hub King of Brownfield, who is this Farm Bureau District's director, also made a public statement opposing the Poage bill the past week. He had met with the state committee and issued a glum forecast for the trend factor's future. He said he definitely thinks trend in 1956 will be largely done away with.

King was quoted by Jim Comp-

ton, farm editor of The Brownfield News as saying:

"In the last two years of cotton allotments, the state Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation Service committee has withheld 10 percent of the state's allotment for reserve," King said. "By doing this, it has had plenty of acreage for hardship cases, new farms, and counties which were trending toward more cotton production. If this reserve in 1956 is chopped down to 2½ per cent, then the committee will not have enough acreage to devote to the hardship cases, new farms and so forth. It will mean that farmers will get an original allotment, and after that trying to get any more, either for individuals, or for counties, will be like trying to get 'blood out of a turnip.'"

they are (market-wise) at any time.

But we can't help but think that there ought to be some way or another to move these potatoes into channels of consumption in an orderly manner.

The government price support program on spuds proved to be disastrous and now probably is dead for all time to come. It appears that potatoes are entirely too perishable to be handled in such a manner.

What, then, can be done? We have no idea. We only know that there must be some remedy to the situation where California potatoes are bringing 5½ cents a pound in local stores, and potatoes in the field little farther than the city limits can't be sold at any price.

The same situation existed a couple of years ago down near Jacksonville, Texas, where quite a bit of truck farming goes on. Farmers down there banded together in a big cooperative marketing movement. It worked. They can do together what they couldn't do as individuals.

This, we think, ought to be a problem for the Farm Bureau or the Farmer's Union, or some such other organization.

Farmers hereabouts are sure to sour on spud growing, or any other commercial vegetable production as long as it keeps being a losing proposition.

They don't mind a couple of

bad years, but to have things blow up three years straight— well, something ought to be done if it's possible.

principal of the school, credit for working out many of the details of the program. The two men explain that the program will be used partially this year, then will be set up from year to year on the same basis, as the "kinks are worked out."

The reason behind this addition to the school system is that the administrators feel their students should be better prepared in specific fields.

The orientation helps them make a choice of majors, and the guidance program will extend to parents, so they may assist students in making a choice on a major.

Some courses will probably be added after the system is out of the infant stages, such as third year home economics and agriculture. Office practice will also be an addition.

"Under the new setup, conflicts in schedules will practically be eliminated," says Jones, "as a

sophomore could practically enroll for the remainder of his schooling, if he has decided definitely on a major."

Asked where they happened to get the idea of the major and minor system, Jones and Frederick say larger schools have used it successfully for years. They didn't know of any school of Texico's comparable enrollment using it, however.
