We went to Silverton the hard way, and in going from Lubbock up into Plainview and over through Lockney, we passed through the oldest and most heavily developed part of the High Plains' vast irrigated acreage.

And from the time we went through Abernathy north of Lubbock, until the moment we rolled in to Silverton about 100 miles further, we didn't see more than

rain and plenty of it. There are big surface lakes wherever you may look, and the weeds in the bar pits are rank.

The rangeland, what little there is, has really put on a lot of grass, and things look greener than we've ever seen them before in that area.

Surprisingly enough, their crops are even farther behind in development than ours here in the west. They usually run a week or ten days ahead of us, but not so this year.

Continued hard, driving rains have forced replanting again and again, and nearly all crops are late. They have thousands of acres of feed just starting to sprout, and the cotton isn't much ahead of that, either.

The writer's father-in-law, who farms a place east of Silverton on | the edge of the cap, says he's gotten 19 inches of rain in all, and to get his crop started.

To begin with, he pre-irrigated until his field was sopping wet, Mrs. Robertson and just about the time he got ready to go in and plant, here came the rains with much more water than the land could pos-

such a limited amount of water. He had been getting only a half a pipe of water, but an acidizing treatment brought it up to about two-thirds. He figured this at about 170 gallons

Over there in that weak water area, those "irrigated" farmers will stand and talk with a stranger from the "big water" country

such as ours for hours. It is very apparent that they would give almost anything to have our water resources. Perhaps that isn't fair: They'd give almost anything to have water

It is reported by Steel Bilt Products Company engineers that this three horsepower electric fan can safely aerate, fumigate, and keep about 72,000 bushels of grain in good condition in flat storage. If drying is desired, special attention should be given to the grain and not more than 3,000 bushels of grain should be dried with this unit in one operation. The job of keeping the grain cool, free of weevil and bug contamination is simple when this aeration process is used on the farm.

The cost of this equipment is fixed, the cost of electric power is insignificant; so barring poor weather or a poor market, your good management can increase
