It's downright scandalous to have to admit it, but we at The Tribune are currently engaged in a war against an invasion of mice.

Not since we cleaned up our front offices and installed some halfway decent looking floors and petitions, have we been troubled with the pestiferous little rodents, who somehow seem always to be able to survive our most calculated combat tech-

In days gone by, we relied on a big yellow tom cat with sad eyes which sat around all day looking like anything except an industrious mouse-catcher. In fact, this poor old cat was often the object of printers' pranks such as determining his top speed by applying a little type wash to the end of his

Also, whenever he happened to find himself in the way, he could usually be found soaring through the air after a well placed kick amid appropriate remarks from the irritated printers who never lacked for colorful adjectives.

During the year he attended school they gave head marks in spelling and during their study halls he said they would go out in the shade of the house and study their lessons.


