**Gay Goettsch Going  
To Cotton Bowl**

Gay Goettsch and Eddie B. Smith both called 96 games correctly during the year to take top honors in the Merchants Football Contest; however, Mrs. Goettsch was closer on the tiebreaker scores throughout the year and edged Smith out of first place by a scant 18-count margin.

The winner has chosen to accept two tickets to the Cotton Bowl game plus \$50 while Smith will receive two tickets to the Sun Bowl in El Paso plus \$25.

In the final week of guessing, the two top winners did not fare too well; however, their consistent guessing of correct outcomes of games throughout the season kept them on top. Mrs. Goettsch called only five correctly this week while Smith managed only four correct guesses. The top four contenders saw things pretty well eye-to-eye in the past week's selection with their entries being identical except for the Sundown-Groom game which Mrs. Goettsch

called correctly. Smith was off 20 points on the tiebreaker while Mrs. Goettsch was only five points away.

Jane Kent managed to name nine winners this week and won \$7.50 prize money. Second in line and winning a \$5 check was Fern Christian with eight correct guesses. She was 23 points off on the tiebreaker. Janice Newcomb won third place and \$2 by calling eight right and being off on the tiebreaker by 38.

Winding up in third place in the overall contest with 95 points was Louise Hancock who has managed to stay in one of the top five places all season.

Ending the season's guessing with 94 points were Donald Jones, Beulah Williams, and Ellen Wurster.

Ron Hancock, Wallace Inge, and W.M. Roberts called 93 correctly to come in fifth place while Susan Franse, Thad Phillips and Missy Taylor were in sixth place with 92 games called right

during the year.

This year's contest had a somewhat different format in that 12 games instead of 10 were to be chosen, but this year's winner had only three more correctly-called games than did last year's winner, Sam Gonzales of Muleshoe won the contest last year for the second year in a row by calling 93 games right throughout the year, only three less than this year's top winners called. There were more tie games on the entries this year, causing fewer points to be possible since a tie (unless predicted, of course) was counted as incorrect.

A total of 427 persons entered this year's guessing match, the 18th year since its inception by the State Line Tribune and area merchants.

Tuesday In Oklahoma**

Suggested Christmas mailing deadlines for domestic parcels and letter mail have been advanced because of an exceptionally high volume, according to Postmaster Otis McMillan.

The suggested Christmas mailing deadline is now December 3 for domestic parcels and December 10 for letter mail and greeting cards intended for delivery by Christmas.

"The impact of greatly increased mail volumes generated by the 15-state United Parcel Service strike in the East and South, and its

residual effect on other parts of the country, compels us to ask the public to mail even earlier than normal," McMillan said.

In the past, some persons have left large numbers of Christmas cards in their box for the carrier to put postage on, and this will just not be possible this year, say the postal officials.

**For Flu Shots - -**

**Final Clinic Set Sunday**

Dr. Jerry Don Gregory of Farwell Medical Clinic announces that the final clinic for Swine Flu inoculations here and throughout the county will be Sunday, Nov. 28. Inoculations will be given at the local clinic from 2 to 4 p.m. CST Sunday and will be the final time they will be offered here. There will be no charge for the inoculations.

Clinics are also being planned at Friona, Bovina and Lazbuddie for this Sunday. Dr. Paul Spring of Friona,

County Health Officer, reports that approximately 2,000 persons have received the vaccine as of Friday, Nov. 19, and it is hoped that many more people will take advantage of the series of clinics in the county this week. The state health department has offered the county all the vaccine they need and this has made it possible to have these clinics this Sunday, says Dr. Spring.

Dr. Gregory encourages everyone to take advantage of

the clinic, stressing that the "safe time" to get the inoculations is almost up. He says that it takes a few weeks for the immunization to build up and that the normal flu season usually begins in December.

The local doctor also says that persons between the ages of 18 and 24 who have already had one inoculation should receive a second shot as soon as possible. He explains that these persons need an additional vaccination to help them

build an immunity to the Swine Flu germ.

An influenza immunization clinic will be held Monday and Tuesday, Nov. 29 and 30 from 2-6 p.m. in the gymnasium of the Lincoln-Jackson School located on West Grand, Clovis. Vaccine is available for those 18 years and older. Both bivalent for high risk and monovalent will be given. This is the last clinic planned at this time.

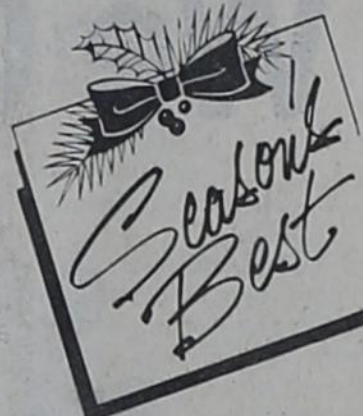

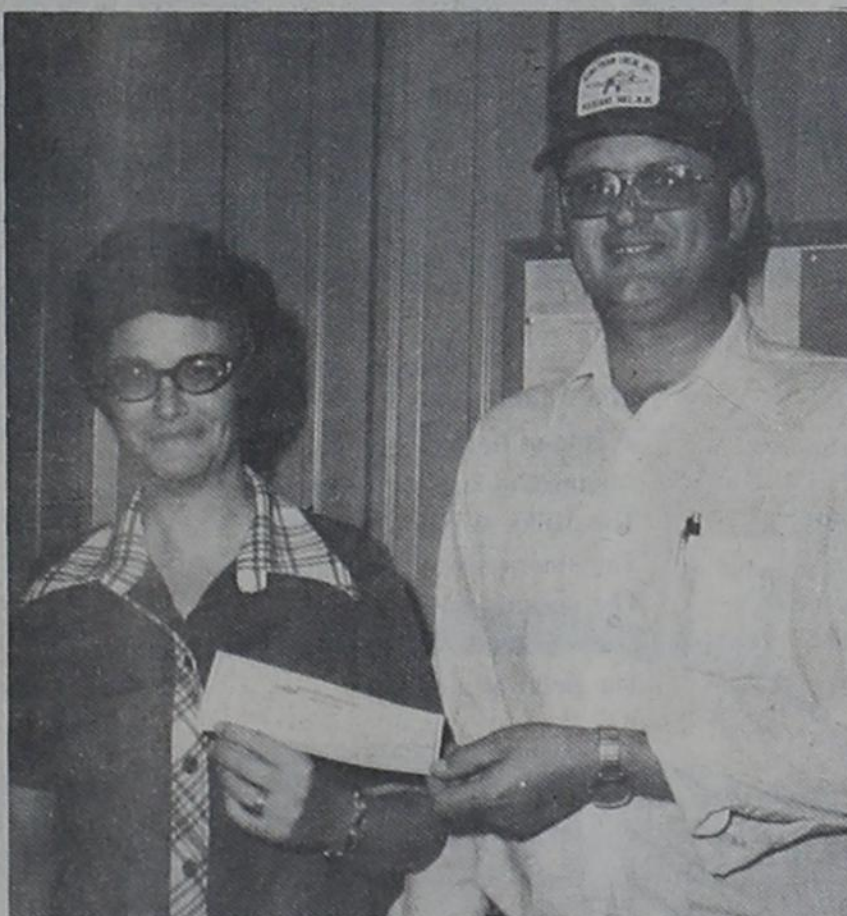

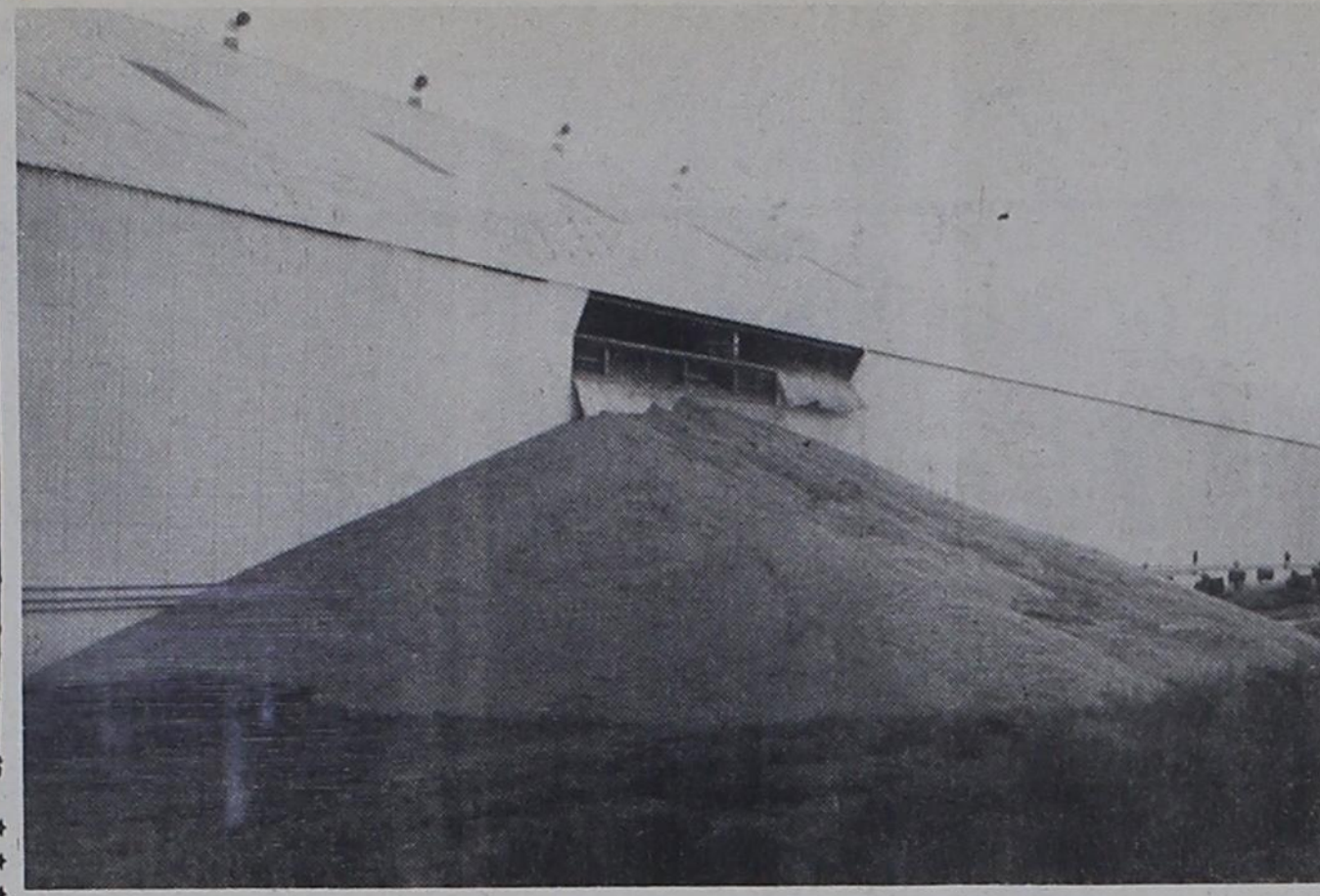

About 5:30 p.m. Monday a flat storage barn located at Worley Mills, Inc. in Farwell developed a "leak" and almost two million pounds of corn spilled out onto the ground. He said the corn was in no way damaged and that it was in the process of being moved to an elevator. Thigpen said the process was time-consuming but added that it did not present any other kind of problem.

**Commissioners Court Conducts Session**

Parmer County Commissioners Court met Monday and decided that interest money received to the Available School Fund be put on certified deposit until it is needed in 1977. It was also resolved that a certified deposit in the amount of \$50,000 be purchased by the General Fund for a period of one year.

In other business it was decided that a note to the Friona State Bank in the amount of \$3200, plus interest in the amount of \$19.63, be paid from the Right-of-Way Fund, as this fund originally borrowed the money.

Further business consisted of approving a statement about weather modification to be sent to Judge Glen Williams, Senator Max Sherman and Speaker Bill Clayton.

It was also reported that utility adjustments on the area around the Hub community had been executed by the utility company and were in the hands of the highway department at the present time.

Among other business taken care of was the resolution to pay \$300 for the Texas Association of Counties dues for 1977.

Other business included deciding to advertise for sale a 1960 pickup which belongs to Precinct 4.

Jerry London, Harry Hamilton, and Jerry Hinkle met with the Court concerning a hearing to be held by the Natural Resources Committee in Austin on November 30.

They did not report any emergency vehicle calls this past week.

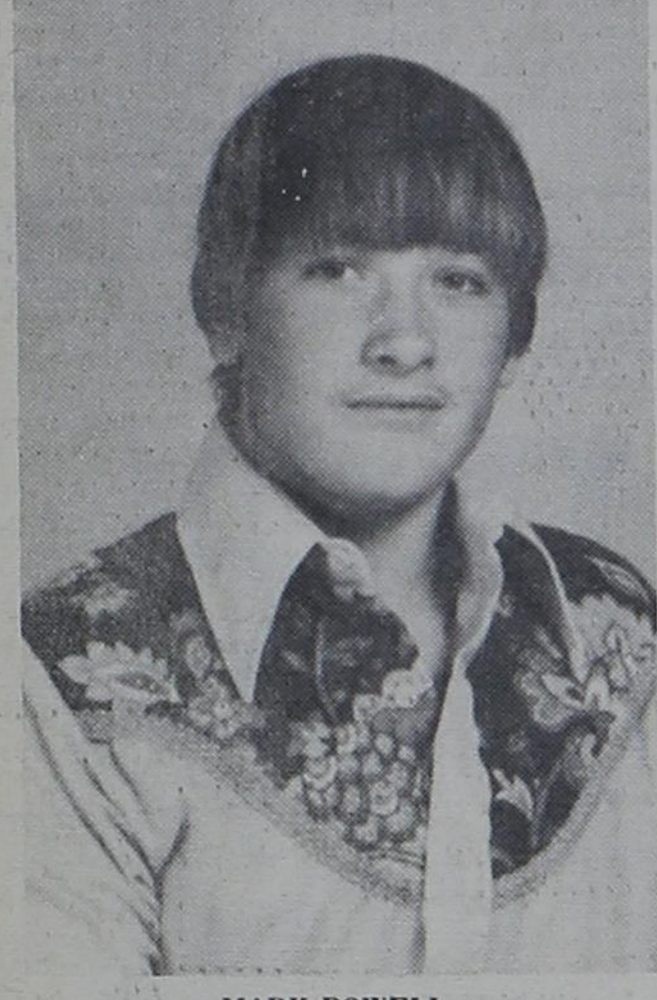
**Lions Club

Lion spokesman Jim Walker said the only exception to that feature is for people who suffer from hemophilia.

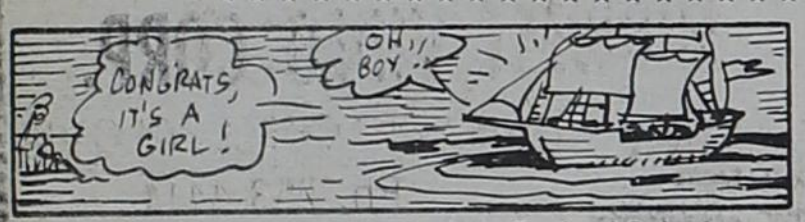

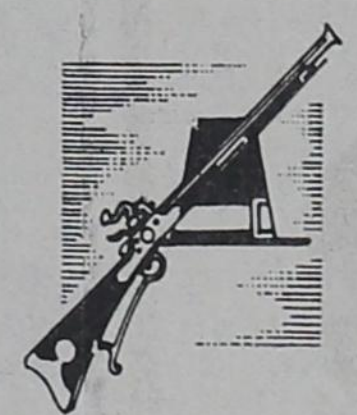

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# Finger Foods For Festive Occasions



Entertaining during the upcoming holiday season will be easier for the hostess who has several recipes for quick and easy snack type or finger foods. Dishes that can be made ahead and frozen are also a boon to the busy homemaker. The Tribune has asked readers to share some of their holiday recipes with us.

Mrs. Sterling Donaldson of the Oklahoma Lane Community was generous in offering three different recipes, two for special cookies and one for a sherbet punch that would be good for party time.

1 pkg. mincemeat  
3/4 cups all-purpose flour  
1 t. soda  
1/2 t. salt

Cream shortening and sugar. Add eggs and beat until mixture is smooth. Break mincemeat into small pieces and mix in well. Sift together flour, soda and salt. Add to batter, mix well. Drop by teaspoonfuls about 2 inches apart on a lightly-greased baking sheet. Bake at 400 degrees 10 to 12 minutes or until lightly browned.

**THANKSGIVING COOKIES**  
1 1/2 cups sugar  
1 cup butter  
3 eggs  
1 lb. dates (cut up)  
1 lb. walnuts (chopped)  
2 1/2 cups flour  
1/4 t. salt  
1/2 t. cinnamon  
1/4 t. ground cloves  
1/4 t. nutmeg  
1 t. vanilla  
1 rounded t. soda dissolved in 3 T. hot water.

Mix all ingredients together and drop by spoonfuls on a greased cookie sheet. Bake at 350 degrees until light brown. Makes five dozen good-sized cookies.

**ORANGE SHERBET PARTY PUNCH**  
2 pkgs. strawberry gelatin  
2 cups boiling water  
2 cups cold water  
1 1/2 cups sugar  
1 46 oz. can pineapple juice  
1 large can frozen orange juice, diluted as directed  
1 cup lemon juice  
1 bottle ginger ale  
2 qts. orange sherbet

Dissolve gelatin in boiling water. Add sugar and stir until dissolved. Add cold water. Combine juices and add to gelatin mixture. Chill. Spoon sherbet into punch. Add ginger ale just before serving. Serves 40.

Dardanella Helton of Texico offers two recipes to satisfy a sweet tooth and another for those times when something a bit more zesty seems to be in

order.

**CHOCOLATE PUFFS**  
1 - 6 oz. pkg. chocolate chips, melted  
2 egg whites, beaten stiff  
Add 1/2 cup powdered sugar, 1/4 t. salt and 1 t. vanilla. Fold in melted chips. Add 1 cup coconut and 1/2 cup pecans. Drop by teaspoonfuls on greased and floured cookie sheet. Bake 10 to 12 minutes at 300 degrees.

**DATE COCONUT BALLS**  
1/2 cup butter  
1 cup brown sugar  
1 cup dates  
1 egg, beaten  
1/2 t. vanilla  
2 1/2 cups Rice Krispies

Combine butter, dates and brown sugar. Cook until thick. Remove from heat. Add egg and cook for five minutes longer (to firm ball stage). Remove from heat and add cereal. When cool, roll in coconut.

**CHEESE BISCUITS**  
Over low heat melt two sticks oleo with two squares Kraft cheddar cheese (10 or 16 ozs.) and 4 ozs. blue cheese. Stir until well blended (will have grainy appearance). Cool. About 30 minutes before serving, use three cans (10 count) biscuits; cut biscuits into quarters, crowd into Pyrex dish 2 1/2 to 3 inches deep. Spoon cheese mixture over biscuit squares and spread. Bake at 475 degrees 15-20 minutes or until lightly browned.

1 1/2 cups sugar  
3/4 cup pecans (chopped)  
Grind apricots, orange and peeling. Moisten sugar in a little water. Add fruit and boil for 10 minutes, stirring constantly. Remove from heat, add nuts. Drop by teaspoonfuls on powdered sugar and roll into sticks (1 1/2 to 2 inches). Let stand on waxed paper for several hours. Store in tins with waxed paper between layers. These can be frozen.

**CHICKEN SANDWICHES**  
1 fryer, stewed, boned and ground  
1 small onion, chopped or ground  
6 sweet pickles, ground  
dash of salt  
salad dressing enough to moisten well

Butter bread and spread with chicken mixture. Wrap and freeze. These may be cut into finger sandwiches.

**SQUASH PICKLES**  
8 cups sliced squash  
2 cups sliced onions  
1/2 T. salt  
1/2 cup diced green pepper (optional)  
1 cup cider vinegar  
1 3/4 cups sugar  
1/2 t. celery seed  
1/2 t. mustard seed

Combine squash and onions, sprinkle with salt and let stand one hour. Combine green pepper, vinegar, sugar, celery seed and mustard seed; bring to boil. Add squash and onion and return to boil. Pack in jars, cover with vinegar mixture and seal. Process 10

minutes in hot water bath.

**PICKLED OKRA**  
1 qt. white vinegar  
1 pt. water

Heat to boiling point. Wash and pack okra tightly in jars. Then put into each jar:  
1/4 t. dill seed  
1/4 t. mustard seed  
1 clove garlic  
1 hot dried pepper  
1/2 t. salt  
pinch of alum (teensy bit)

Pour hot vinegar mixture into jars. Work out bubbles. Seal. Process 7-10 minutes in hot water bath.

**PARTY CHEESE BALL**  
2 pkgs. (8 oz. each) cream cheese  
3/4 cup crumbled blue cheese (about 4 oz.)  
1 cup shredded sharp cheddar cheese  
1/4 cup dried minced onion  
1 T. Worcestershire Sauce  
1 t. crumbled dried parsley flakes

Place cheese in bowl and let stand until softened. Blend in other ingredients and mix well. Shape into large ball. Chill in wax paper overnight. Crush one cup roasted peanuts or pecans. Roll cheese ball in nuts and parsley flakes. Chill again for about one hour before serving.

Mrs. G.D. Anderson Jr., of Bovina submits the following recipe for Cheese Crunchies, another tasty treat when you want to serve something not on the sweet list.

**CHEESE CRUNCHIES**  
2 sticks oleo  
2 cups flour  
1/2 T. cayenne  
1 T. salt  
1 lb. extra sharp cheese, grated (about four cups)  
dash Tobasco sauce  
4 cups cornflakes

Cream flour and oleo. Add other ingredients and stir in cornflakes. Roll into balls 1-1 1/2 inches (make good firm balls). Mash with fork and top each ball with half of a salted peanut. Bake at 325 degrees until brown and crisp (about 25-35 minutes.)

1 egg  
2 cups grated cheddar cheese (sharp)  
2 cans (4 oz. each) chopped green chilies

Preheat oven to 350 degrees. Sauté sausage and onion and drain on paper towels three times. Be sure to drain the three times. Set aside. Mix Bisquick, milk and 2 T. mayonnaise. Spread in well-greased 9x13 casserole and pat down. Spread sausage on top of Bisquick mixture. Beat egg with remaining mayonnaise, cheese and green chilies.

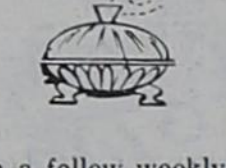
Spread on top of meat mixture. Bake 30 minutes. Cut into 1 inch squares for hors d'oeuvres or larger squares and serve as brunch. May be frozen after cutting and reheated later.

**CURRY HERB DIP**  
1 cup mayonnaise  
1/2 cup sour cream  
1 t. mixed herbs  
1 t. salt  
1/8 t. curry powder  
1 T. parsley  
1 T. grated onion  
1 1/2 t. lemon juice  
1/2 t. Worcestershire sauce  
2 t. drained capers.

Blend the above and chill. Serve with raw vegetables such as cauliflower, cucumbers, celery and carrot sticks.

**CHILI SAUSAGE SQUARES**  
1 lb. hot sausage  
1/2 cup chopped onion  
1 cup Bisquick  
1/2 cup milk  
4 T. mayonnaise

**BRAUNSCHWEIGER PATE'**

1 lb. braunschweiger  
2 pkgs. green onion dip mix  
1 t. sugar  
1 T. garlic spread  
2 - 3-oz. pkg. cream cheese, softened  
1 T. milk  
1/8 t. bottled hot pepper sauce

Mash braunschweiger. Combine dip mix, sugar and 2 t. water. Add to braunschweiger and blend thoroughly. Form into an igloo shape; place on serving plate. Chill.

Melt garlic spread. Whip cream cheese with milk and hot pepper sauce. Blend in melted garlic spread. Spread cream cheese mixture over braunschweiger; chill.

Before serving, garnish with snipped parsley and radish slices; serve with crackers and melba toast rounds.

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# Make Plans For The Leftover Turkey

When you plan your holiday dinner, it's a good idea to plan for later meals as well, and to do the shopping for them along with the festive dinner shopping.

Since turkey is usually the main feature of at least one leftover meal, here are three suggestions for interesting ways to serve leftover turkey.

One is a two-layer Turkey Cranberry Mold, which would make a perfect lunch dish. One layer is cranberry sauce mixed with a red colored gelatin, the second layer is the same cranberry sauce mixture blended with real mayonnaise, chopped cooked turkey and diced apple.

The second suggestion is molded Cranberry Fruit Salad to serve with cold sliced turkey and stuffing. For this mold you will need unflavored gelatin, oranges and apples and bottled cranberry juice. Also Iceberg lettuce to serve it on and real mayonnaise as a dressing.

The third suggestion is a Turkey Fruit Salad in which holiday fruits are mixed with chopped cooked turkey and dressed with real mayonnaise.

## MOLDED CRANBERRY SALAD

- 2 envelopes unflavored gelatin
- 1/2 c. water
- 1/2 c. light corn syrup
- 1/4 c. orange juice
- 1 t. lemon juice
- 2 c. cranberry juice

- 1/8 t. salt
  - 1/2 c. sliced apple
  - 1/2 c. drained orange sections
  - Iceberg lettuce
  - Real mayonnaise
- Soften gelatin in cold water. Place over boiling water and stir until dissolved. Remove from heat. Add corn syrup, orange juice, lemon juice, cranberry juice and salt. Mix

well. Chill until slightly thickened. Add sliced apple and orange sections. Turn into a 1-quart mold or 8 individual molds which have been lightly oiled with corn oil. Chill until firm. Unmold. Arrange on crisp Iceberg lettuce. Make 8 to 12 servings. Serve with mayonnaise. Then, if desired with orange juice.

## TURKEY FRUIT SALAD

- 4 c. chopped cooked turkey or chicken
  - 1 c. seedless grapes
  - 1 c. pineapple tidbits
  - 1 c. chopped apple
  - 1 c. chopped nuts
  - 1 grapefruit, peeled and sectioned
  - 1/2 c. real mayonnaise
  - Iceberg lettuce
- Mix turkey with grapes, pineapple, apple, nuts and grapefruit. Toss with mayonnaise until evenly coated. Serve in lettuce cups, garnish with walnut halves or cranberry sauce slices, if desired. Makes 8 servings.

- 1 c. boiling water
  - 2 (3-oz.) packages red fruit flavored gelatin
  - 1 (1 lb.) can jellied cranberry sauce
  - 1 1/2 c. cold water
  - 1 T. lemon juice
  - 1/4 t. salt
  - 1/2 c. real mayonnaise
  - 1 c. chopped cooked turkey
  - 1 apple, pared and diced
- Pour boiling water over gelatin in bowl; stir until gelatin is completely dissolved. Mash cranberry sauce with fork and stir into gelatin, then mix in cold water, lemon juice and salt. All Center residents and staffers wish a "happy Thanksgiving" to everyone in the Twin Cities area.

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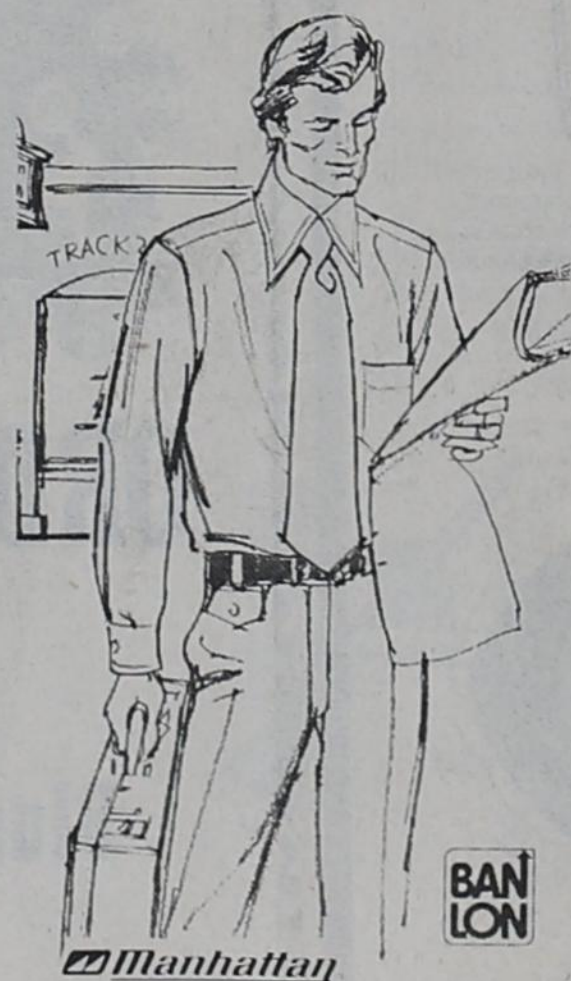

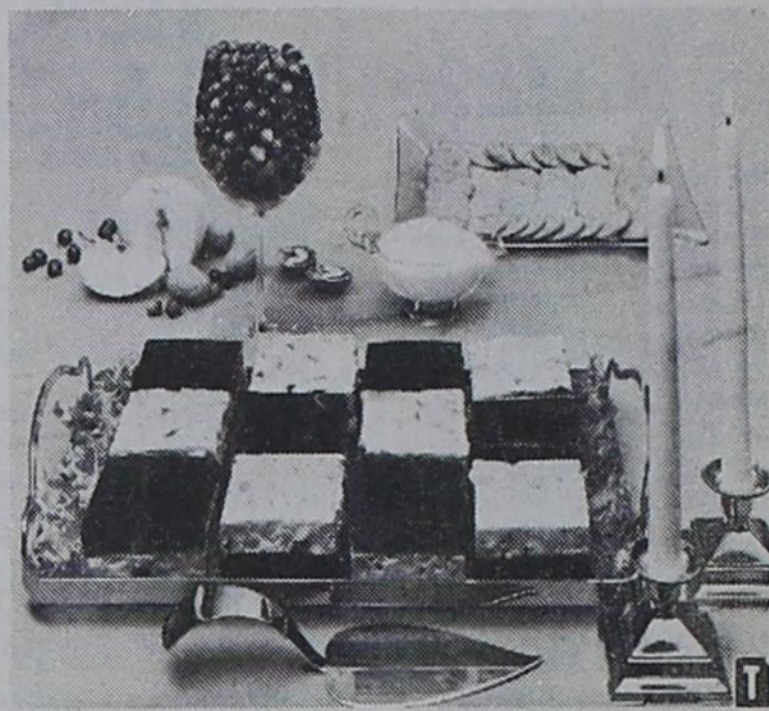

## Cranberry and Turkey-Favorite Holiday Salads

Whether you are using the last morsel of turkey in a salad or beginning plans for a festive party two traditional foods are cranberries and turkey. Real mayonnaise too, has a traditional role in making American holidays special. Try these recipes to make your family observance a memorable one.



### Checkerboard Soufflé Salad

- 1 can (1 pound) whole cranberry sauce
- 1 cup boiling water
- 1 package (3 ounces) yellow, red or orange fruit flavored gelatin
- 1 tablespoon lemon juice
- 1/4 teaspoon salt
- 1/2 cup Hellmann's or Best Foods real mayonnaise

- 1 apple or orange, peeled and diced
- 1/4 cup chopped walnuts
- Salad greens

Heat cranberry sauce; strain. Reserve berries; mix liquid with boiling water, then add gelatin, stirring until completely dissolved. Mix in lemon juice and salt. Chill mixture until thick enough to mound slightly when dropped from spoon. Reserve 1-1/2 cups thickened gelatin mixture; pour remaining mixture into chilled 13 x 9 1/2 x 2-inch pan. Refrigerate. Add mayonnaise to reserved 1-1/2 cups gelatin; beat with rotary beater until light and fluffy. Fold in cranberries, chopped fruit and nuts. Spoon evenly over clear gelatin in pan. Chill until firm. Cut into 12 squares; unmold. Arrange

range squares, inverting half, checkerboard fashion on salad greens. Chill until ready to serve. Makes 12 servings.

### Turkey Orange Salad

- 2 cups diced cooked turkey
- 1 cup diced celery
- 2 apples, diced
- 1/2 teaspoon salt
- 1/2 cup real mayonnaise
- 1/2 cup dairy sour cream
- 1 small onion
- 4 large oranges, peeled and sliced
- 1 tablespoon orange juice
- Salad greens

Mix together turkey, celery, apple and salt. Stir together real mayonnaise, sour cream, 1 tablespoon minced onion and orange juice. Toss turkey mixture and dressing; mound on salad greens in center of bowl. Slice remaining onion and separate into rings. Alternate

orange slices and onion rings around edge of bowl. Makes 6 (3/4-cup) servings.

Note: If using a large round shallow bowl or platter, the dressing may be served in a small dish in the center.

### Green Grape Turkey Salad

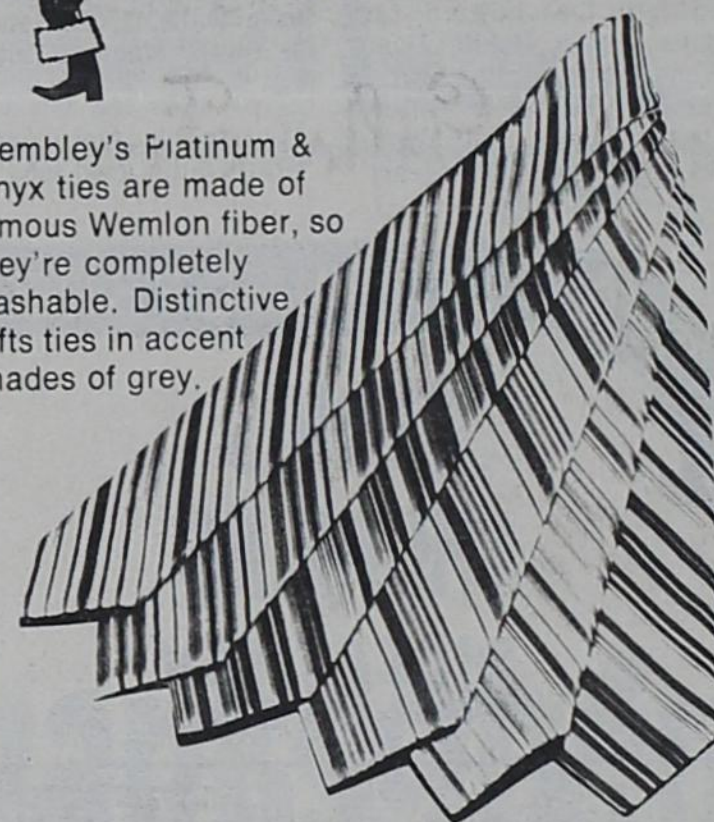
- 3 cups diced cooked turkey
- 1 cup sliced celery
- 1 cup cooked rice
- 1 cup green grapes, cut in half
- 1 cup real mayonnaise
- 3 tablespoons lemon juice
- 2 tablespoons chopped pimiento

- Dash cayenne pepper

American farmers will soon be replacing professors and economists... at least in the ranks of one international agency. Officials of the U. S. Agency for International Development (AID) have decided the farmers of this country can be far more effective for training farmers in underdeveloped countries than anyone else. Part of the criticism of the current and immediate past programs has been that the Ph.D.s and agricultural economists have so overwhelmed the natives of underdeveloped countries with technology relatively little has been accomplished. Under the new guidelines, an American farmer would work directly with a group of about 100 native farmers... at a realistic pace the natives could understand. Although just now getting off the ground, AID executives hope to soon have several American farmers in each of the 40 underdeveloped countries participating in the program.

Top scorers for Texico were Herbert Bibbs with 18 and Ricky Foreman with 16.



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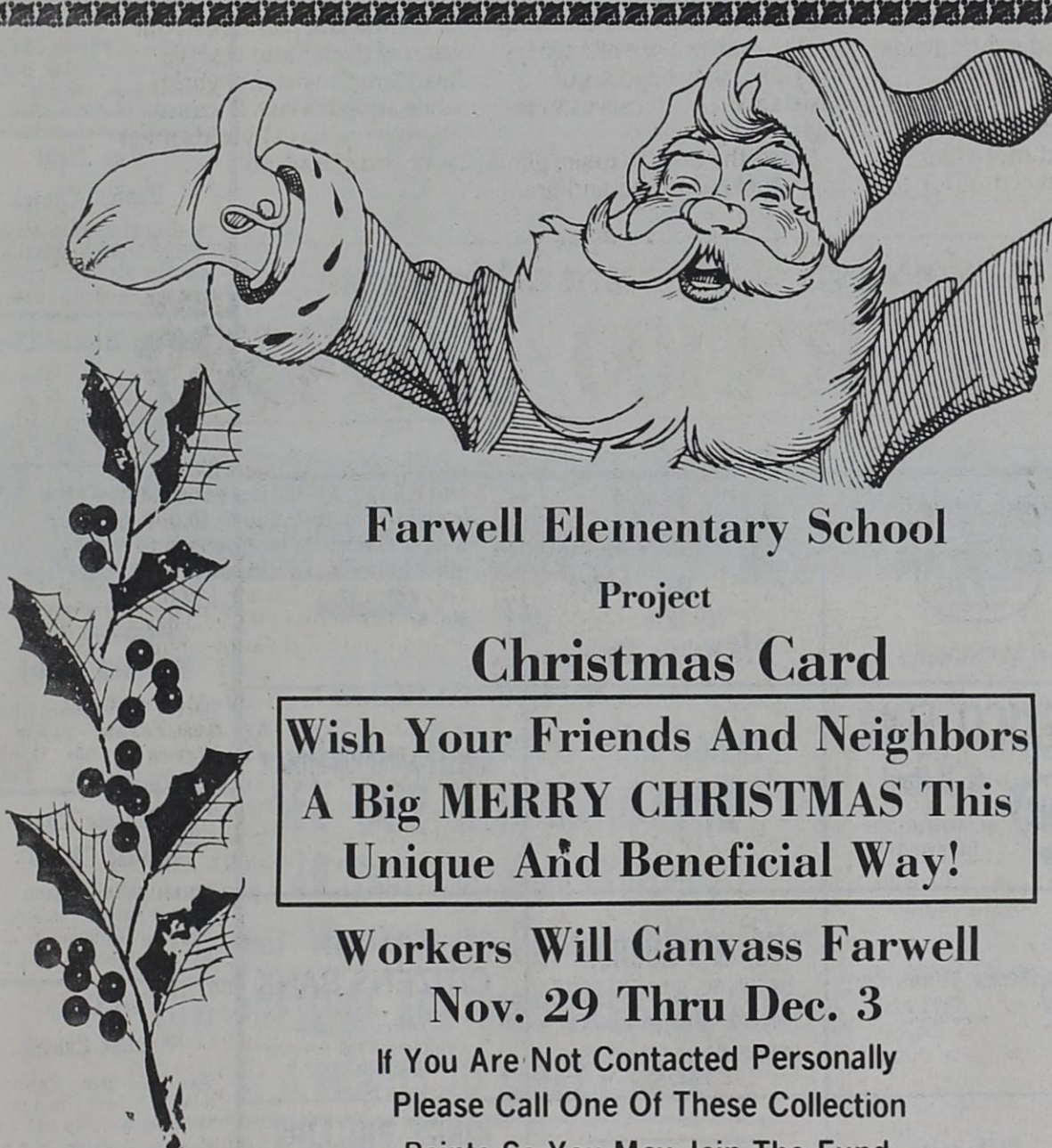
