Final Clinic Set Sunday

Dr. Jerry Don Gregory of Farwell Medical Clinic announces that the final clinic for Swine Flu inoculations here and throughout the county will be Sunday, Nov. 28. Inoculations will be given at the local clinic from 2 to 4 p.m. CST Sunday and will be the final time they will be offered here. There will be no charge for the inoculations.

Clinics are also being planned at Friona, Bovina and Lazbuddie for this Sunday. Dr. Paul Spring of Friona,

County Health Officer, reports that approximately 2,000 persons have received the vaccine as of Friday, Nov. 19, and it is hoped that many more people will take advantage of the series of clinics in the county this week. The state health department has offered the county all the vaccine they need and this has made it possible to have these clinics this Sunday, says Dr. Spring.

Dr. Gregory encourages everyone to take advantage of

the clinic, stressing that the "safe time" to get the inoculations is almost up. He says that it takes a few weeks for the immunization to build up and that the normal flu season usually begins in December.

The local doctor also says that persons between the ages of 18 and 24 who have already had one inoculation should receive a second shot as soon as possible. He explains that these persons need an additional vaccination to help them

build an immunity to the Swine Flu germ.

An influenza immunization clinic will be held Monday and Tuesday, Nov. 29 and 30 from 2-6 p.m. mst in the gymnasium of the Lincoln-Jackson School located on West Grand, Clovis. 1 cup butter

3 eggs

1 lb. dates (cut up) 1 lb. walnuts (chopped)

21/2 cups flour

1/4 t. salt

½ t. cinnamon 14 t. ground cloves 1/4 t. nutmeg

1 t. vanilla 1 rounded t. soda dissolved in

3 T. hot water. Mix all ingredients together and drop by spoonfuls on a greased cookie sheet. Bake at 350 degrees until light brown. Makes five dozen good-sized cookies.

MINCEMEAT COOKIES 1 cup soft shortening

1½ cups sugar 3 eggs, well beaten

Cream shortening and sugar. Add eggs and beat until mincemeat into small pieces and mix in well. Sift together flour, soda and salt. Add to batter, mix well. Drop by teaspoonfuls about 2 inches apart on a lightly-greased baking sheet. Bake at 400 degrees 10 to 12 minutes or until lightly

2 pkgs. strawberry gelatin 2 cups boiling water

2 cups cold water 11/2 cups sugar

1 46 oz. can pineapple juice 1 large can frozen orange juice, diluted as directed

1 cup lemon juice 1 bottle ginger ale 2 qts. orange sherbet

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
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
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Make Plans For The Leftover Turkey

1/8 t. salt

When you plan your holiday reversed if desired. dinner, it's a good idea to plan for later meals as well, and to do the shopping for them along with the festive dinner shopping.

Since turkey is usually the main feature of at least one leftover meal, here are three suggestions for interesting 1 t. lemon juice ways to serve leftover turkey.

One is a two-layer Turkey Cranberry Mold, which would make a perfect lunch dish. One layer is cranberry sauce mixed with a red colored gelatin, the second layer is the same cranberry sauce mixture blended with real mayonnaise, chopped cooked turkey and diced apple.

The second suggestion is molded Cranberry Fruit Salad to serve with cold sliced turkey and stuffing. For this mold you will need unflavored gelatin, oranges and apples and bottled cranberry juice. Also Iceberg lettuce to serve it on and real mayonnaise as a

The third suggestion is a Turkey Fruit Salad in which holiday fruits are mixed with chopped cooked turkey and dressed with real mayonnaise.

TURKEY CRANBERRY MOLD

- 1 c. boiling water
- 2 (3-oz.) packages red fruit flavored gelatin
- 1 (1 lb.) can jellied cranberry
- sauce 112 c. cold water
- 1 T. lemon juice
- 14 t. salt
- 12 c. real mayonnaise 1 c. chopped cooked turkey 1 apple, pared and diced

Pour boiling water over gelatin in bowl; stir until gelatin is completely dissolved. Mash cranberry sauce with fork and stir into gelatin, then mix in cold water, lemon juice and salt. Chill until thick enough to mound slightly when dropped from spoon. Stir well; reserve 2 cups. Pour remaining thickened gelatin into 2 quart mold; refrigerate.

Add mayonnaise to reserved 2 cups gelatin; beat with rotary beater until light and fluffy. Fold in turkey and apple. Spoon over gelatin in mold. Chill until firm, at least 3 hours. Makes 10 to 12 servings. The position may be

A word to the hunters first. You need to respect the rights of the landowner. The best and only way is to get 'the landowner's permission before hunting. After this, respect his fences and his livestock. A "thank you" after the hunt will be appreciated.

Another thing is to exercise all safety rules while hunting. Remember, it is the "unloaded gun that causes accidents and kills.

A word to the farm operators. We do have good pheasant population. This is because we had good places for the pheasants to hide and feed in the past. We need to keep this good cover and feed available in the future. Generally, more birds are starved to death in a year than are ever killed by hunters.

Another word to hunters and farmers is that the Friona Evening Lions club is having a pheasant hunt on December 11. The club is looking for hunters and fields to hunt in. Please contact the Friona Chamber of Commerce for details.
