Later that night, they had their team. They also had a challenge ahead of

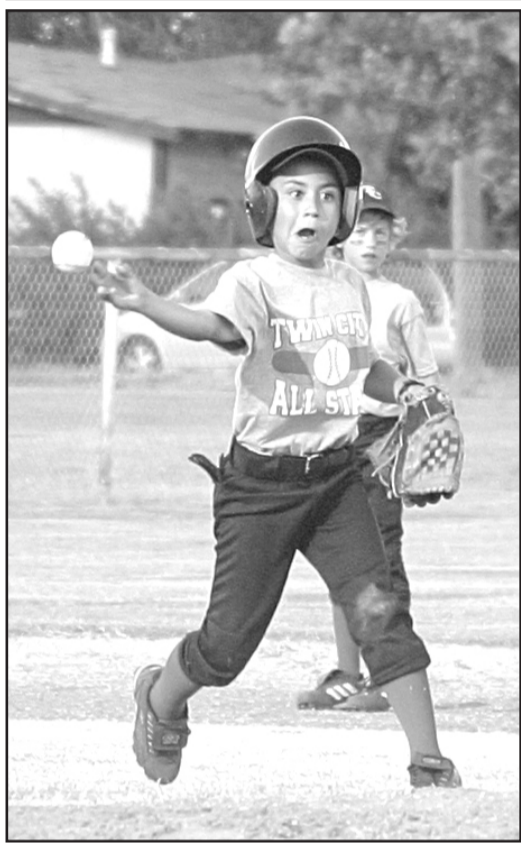
them.

# Border Town Days sign-ups under way

Farwell's 100th birthday will be the theme of the 39th annual Border Town Days to be held on Saturday, July 30.

As always, the parade will begin at 11 a.m. cdt, followed by the Day in the Park activities, highlighted by the Texico-Farwell Rotary Club's BBQ dinner.

The arts and crafts show will again feature homemade and commercial vendors.

Here's a rundown on how the day looks:

Concessions: Cynthia Thigpen is taking reservations for concessions at the Day in the Park. She can be contacted at Farwell City Hall, 481-3620. Signed up so far have been:

- Parmer County Crime Stoppers, silent celebrity auction.
- Farwell Convalescent Center Auxiliary, baked goods.
- Texico-Farwell Rotary Club, barbeque.
- Texico 4-H Club, hot dogs, ice cream, drinks.
- St. Ann's Catholic church, quilt raffle.
- Texico Community Activities Organization, ice.

Parade: Ruth Anne Bennett, Margie Watkins and Cynthia Reynolds are in charge of the parade. Ruth Anne can be called at 825-3822; Margie at 481-9097.

The parade theme is Farwell's 100th anniversary. Cash prizes are given the top four floats -- \$75, \$50, \$35 and \$25. The deadline for signups is Friday, July 22. After that date, you can sign up by calling BTD chairman Mike Pomper at the Tribune, 481-3681, but you will be placed at the end of the parade and not be eligible for cash prizes.

Early signups include Rocky Horton's train, the Farwell Class of 1955, the Farwell Class of 1965, the Clovis Fire Department honor guard, the Farwell Marching Band, the Farwell High School drill team, the Rodeo Queens from Texico, and a float featuring Texico football players who have played for Coach Mike Prokop. The float is sponsored by the Texico Booster Club and will be in the parade behind the car with Prokop, this year's Honorary Parade Marshal.

Other early signups include the Friends of Oasis State Park, KTQM Radio, and a 4-wheeler carrying Amanda Antwiler, Hailey McIntosh and Evan Hutchinson.

There will be a special vehicle carrying Farwell's present and past mayors -- Jimmie Mace, Gil Patschke and Elmer Hargrove -- in honor of the city's 100th anniversary.

Basketball and volleyball tournaments: The BTD committee would love to have some folks run small tourneys. If you are interested in taking on either job, call Pomper at the Tribune.

Entertainment: If you would like to sing at the gazebo during the Day in the Park activities, call Pomper at 481-3681. The lineup is filling up quickly. Scheduled to perform so far are Garhett Von Hoene, Allie Brooks, the Thumbtack Kids (Hayden Hadley and Coby Carter), Lupe Vidaurri, and the Ancira Band. There also will be a special demonstration by the local tae kwon do students.

Decorated Bicycle Contest: Linda Moss and Joy Stanton head this event. Signups will be underway in July at the State Line Tribune, 404 3rd St, Farwell. Again, the theme is Farwell's 100th anniversary. The top champions will receive special prizes -- brand-new bicycles donated by Tedson Trailers, of Texico, (for boys) and Master Tech, of Texico, (for girls).

Arts & Crafts: Lynne Mahaney, the Farwell postmaster, is in charge of this event. As stated, it's open to both homemade and commercial vendors. Folks wishing to sign up for a booth are asked to call her at 481-3601 or write her at P.O. Box 471, Farwell,

TX 79325. Several crafts people already have signed up.

Giveaways: So far, two giveaways have been scheduled.

The Texico Volunteer Fire Department is selling tickets for a Weber LP gas grill and box of ribeye steaks. Tickets cost \$5 each or 5 for \$20. They are available at Farwell Hardware, Citizens Bank's Texico branch, Texico City Hall or any Texico firefighter.

The BTD Committee awards \$50 in cash to the person who bought a BTD button (you must be present to win) and whose name is picked.

Buttons: Rob Pomper is handling the button sales. The buttons are being made by Doug and Susan Scioli, of Texico. Four hundred are numbered on the back. They will be sold for \$2 apiece as the chief fund-raiser to cover BTD expenses. A number will be picked at the conclusion of BTD activities and if the person is present, he will win \$50 cash. Buttons will be placed at local businesses in July.

Merchants Giveaway: Folks will be able to sign up at participating merchants for dozens of free prizes to be given away at BTD. You must be present to win, and must be at least 12 years old to enter. Jerry Adams, J'Dan Sudderth and Debbie Parmer head up this project. Boxes will be put out at local businesses in mid-July.

Antique Cars & Tractors: Ruth Anne Bennett and Margie Watkins are in charge. Persons wishing to have their vehicles in the parade, are asked to contact either lady. In both categories, cash prizes are given for judge's choice, distance furthest traveled, and oldest.

Some funny things did happen too. Like Shelby Christian letting out a high squeak when the ball came flying her way (this happened more than once), and the look on Dellani Jones' face when we were losing (she was out for the other team's blood!)

Although this camp seems so long and hard, there were those few traditions that we all refused to give up this year. Again, we had our pizza night and stayed up until probably 3 o'clock, we all lost track of time. Another fun tradition, I don't know why, is dying hair.

That's right. At team camp, we always have someone get her hair dyed. This year it was Beatriz Garcia, Shelby Christian, Salida Edwards, and myself. It's kind of a weird thing, but we do it every year. Can't break tradition!

I think the one thing that would summarize our camp this year would be our battle with Clayton, not

only on the court, but also in the dorms.

After they beat us on the first night, it was war from then on.

Every night we would choose to have fun and forget the day full of sweat and tears while Clayton would choose to get mad at us, which in turn just egged us on.

We would sing, run around, and just be plain nuisances. I agree that we probably were immature, but we all had so much fun. Clayton kept putting a "Keep Quiet" on one of our doors (it would rotate) but we would just take it off and forget it was ever there.

On the last night of camp, when we got back to the dorms, each of our six rooms had cut-up pieces of the "Keep Quiet" sign pushed under our doors. Beatriz took a picture for proof.

Then, at night they would open and shut our doors, which really started to bug.

On the second night, they opened mine and Hailey Grimes' door, who was also coaching, and left it open. We finally had had enough. Hailey got out of bed, went to the door, looked down the hall at the Clayton girls, and said, "Somebody's gonna die!" Needless to say, they didn't mess with our room anymore. Thanks, Hailey!

Some of the girls had just gotten back from cheerleading camp, so they knew a few annoying cheers. Trish Robertson kept singing this one chant that starts with "I went down to the river."

Let me tell you, I didn't enjoy hearing her yell this at 4 o'clock in the morning, but it was quite funny. So, this was our little joke at camp. When we would see Clayton girls, we would all yell that chant.

Eventually, we were in our dorms chanting and the Clayton girls responded, "We're gonna drown you in the river!"

Despite what they thought, we were going to do to get back at that, we all just laughed and Trish said, "I can't drown in the river!" It was so much fun and I will never forget all the things we did to annoy the other girls.

So, it was great to get to spend one last time on the bench with these players. I'm gonna miss playing, but most of all, I'm gonna miss the close friendships I

had with all of the girls. Most of my best memories were with my teammates and I will take those with me where I go.

**Live Cattle:** After last Friday's announcement from the USDA that a cow from the U.S. tested positive for BSE, prices initially dropped, followed by a strong rally early this week. Although the market has lagged over the last couple of days, there seems to be some optimism that beef over the 4th of July is expected to see good movement. Last week's beef movement was the largest seen in over a year. Prices are normally higher into the mid July/early August time frame.

**Feeder Cattle:** Prices rallied and held most of their gains this week, even with a softer fed cattle market. Cash feeder prices have never backed off throughout this waiting period. The Cash Feeder Index is still holding around \$112 and if the August contract can close back above the \$110.50 area, then look for a rally to last into mid July before making another top.

**Corn:** The changes in weather forecasts have changed the prices accordingly. The volatility is expected to continue over the next few weeks as we move closer into pollination. Overall, there are some areas which have been okay and areas which have remained hot and dry. About 75% of the crop are in good shape while 25% is still questionable. Weather will remain the driving force behind price movement. Best case scenario still places the December contract between \$2.60-2.75.

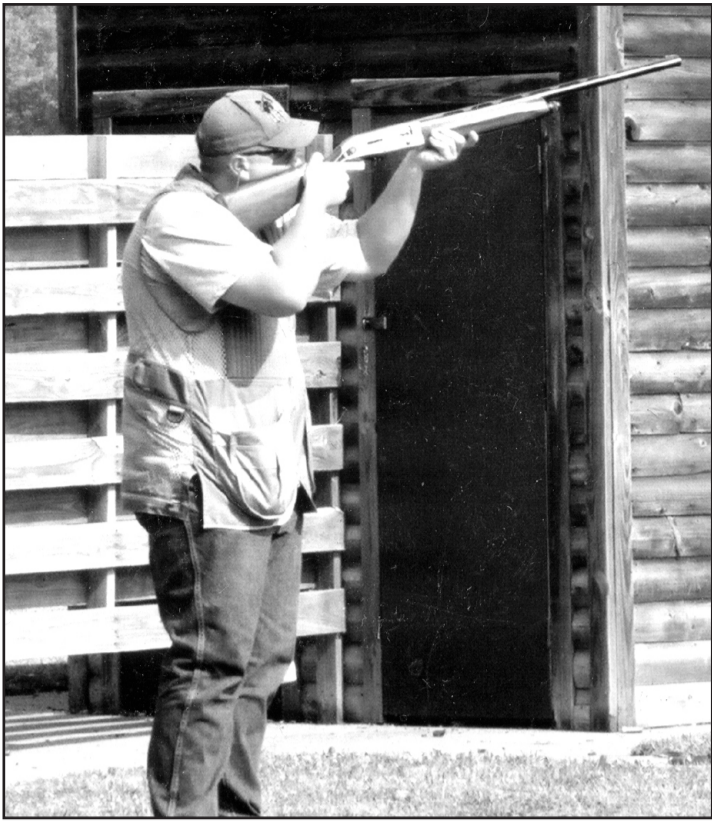
**Soybeans:** Beans led the way up and have led the way down this week as prices dropped almost \$1.00 from Monday into Tuesday. The forecast for more dry weather coming into the 4th of July has helped to stop the drop, but the August contract will need to move back above \$7.00 in order to turn short term trends back to the upside.

**Wheat:** The July KC Wheat stopped in the mid \$3.40 range, which was about where the market topped in April, May and June. Bottoms around the \$3.10-3.15 may support a break into harvest. Once a harvest low can be confirmed, higher prices should be expected into the end of the year?

**Cotton:** The December contract has retraced 75% of the decline from the April/May highs into the June lows. A close above this level could send prices back to the April/May highs and a move above that level would project up toward the 64 cent area. The seasonals remain negative as crop conditions around the globe remain in great shape. Chinese demand is pushing the market up.

**Richardson shoots his way to 1st at nationals**

 Texico has yet another outstanding record to add to their greatest kids' honors.

On July 1, Wade Richardson, son of Ted and Deanne Richardson, achieved the National Title for Sporting Clays at Columbia, Mo.

To start off, Wade has been doing this for a long time; He has been shooting for nearly nine years. He practices about twice a week, but must travel all the way to Hereford to do it. He has been competing with the Curry County 4-H, but will be ineligible next year because of his age.

While at the national competition, he competed in three events: trap shooting – shooting at clay pigeons hurled into the air from spring traps; skeet shooting – shooting clay pigeons that are hurled upward to simulate the random flight of a bird; and sporting clays – shooting clays pigeons at all different angles and on the ground.

Wade captured the title in Sporting Clays, but it was a tough road to receive that honor.

Throughout this past year, Wade and his fellow

teammates have received many shooting awards.

In the Deaf Smith County competition, Wade himself was trap shooting champion. Also, he and Bryan Vannatta, one of his best friends, took first in the two-man team category.

State competition took place on the first weekend of May. Wade, Bryan, Aaron Hemminger, and Cole Andes traveled to Raton, N.M., to compete in a pretty big match-up against many other kids from their state.

They competed in the trapshooting and skeet shooting contests against about 128 kids at the NRA Whittington Center.

"It was snowing that day, so that made it pretty difficult to shoot," Wade said. Thankfully, it was only a one-day competition, so the guys got out of the cold pretty fast ready to celebrate... they were on their way to Nationals!

As a team, these boys placed first in the shotgun competition, earning them

a place at the national level.

So, after going back and forth to Hereford to practice as much as they could, these shooters traveled to Columbia at the end of June to participate in the national finals. Altogether, there were 20 teams at this competition and kids representing 22 states.

It was a three-day competition, so you can imagine everyone's attitudes in the hot and humid weather. "It was so hot, the boys had sweat falling off the bills of their caps," Wade's dad, Ted reported.

"It was pretty nerve-wrecking because there were teams of all-stars from around the country ... even kids who were in Olympic training!" Wade said.

But, despite the hateful weather and the nervousness of other shooters, Wade persevered and achieved first in the Sporting Clays event.

So, what's next for Wade?

He is enrolled at Eastern New Mexico University and will be rooming with his good friend, and past teammate, Bryan Vannatta, in the fall. He is majoring in Wildlife and Fishery Science, hoping to be able to use his knowledge and love of shooting in his job after college. He would like to enter more contests for older shooters and keep doing what he loves (and is obviously good at.)

Whatever happens, Wade's future looks promising. He can show off that shiny new medal to all those Olympic hopefuls and honestly say that he pushed himself and achieved what he knew he could, in his shooting and in life.

**Propane Gas Grill Safety Tips**

- Always use your grill outside in a well-ventilated area. Don't bring cylinders inside or into an enclosed space such as a garage.
- Before lighting your propane gas grill burner, use a leak-detection solution to make sure all connections are secure. Contact your local propane gas supplier to obtain the leak-detection solution and instructions on how to use it. Never use matches or lighters to check for leaks.
- Always use or store cylinders in an upright, vertical position. Store them outside and away from sources of ignition.
- When you have your cylinder refilled, ask your supplier to check for dents, damage, rust or leaks.
- After filling, take your cylinder home immediately. Keep your vehicle ventilated with the cylinder valve closed and plugged or capped (unless your cylinder type does not require plugs or caps). Never leave the cylinder in your car.
- Make sure the grill burner controls are turned off and keep the cylinder valve closed when not in use.
- Make sure the grill is shut off and cooled before covering.
- When your grill is not in use, cover disconnected hose-end fittings and burner air intakes with small plastic bags, or obtain protective fitting caps from your propane supplier to keep out dirt, insects and moisture.
- If there is a significant and uncontrollable release of gas or a fire, call the fire department immediately and move all people and pets away from the unit.
