## Texico School Board Okays Independent Football Play

According to reports received this week, Texico School Board has agreed to play independently of district classification in the 1977-78 school term. The present plan calls for the other Texico athletic teams to continue to compete in District 4-AA. The Board's okay of the move came at the Tuesday night meeting of the school board.

The action of the school board was precipitated by action at the New Mexico Activities Association meeting in Albuquerque this week.

Results of the referendum held were that the re-classification of the athletic districts passed at a similar meeting last spring were set aside and the old classification system was reinstated.

Under the new plan adopted last spring, Texico, with an enrollment of only 160 students in high school, would have dropped to Class A classification. The criterion for membership in that class is an enrollment of 0-200. The Class AA enrollment figure was 200-600 students.

However, the recent meeting conducted in Albuquerque

changed all that. The original classification figures were adopted, locking Texico into the Class AA category. Under the present classification system, an enrollment of 150-400 earns a school a berth in Class AA; therefore, Texico only narrowly fits into this class.

Superintendent James Pierce said the decision to go independent in football was not taken lightly. He pointed out that Texico is the smallest Class AA team in the state, adding that their nearest district competitor is 135 miles away. He explained that travel arrangements and "other things" were considered in making this decision.

Pierce said Texico would remain independent in football for at least the coming football season. Two factors would decide future action, Pierce explained, either a change in Texico's enrollment dropping them into Class A, or a change in the classification system.

In other business the board discussed a sale of "old equipment," including such items as roll top desks and wind-up clocks. The sale is scheduled for December 11.

Marion Brumfield was hired as a new bus driver with

Laquita Stephens being named assistant bus driver.

### School Board Discusses Use Of Country Club

One subject discussed at the Monday night meeting of Farwell School Board was the possibility of the physical education classes using the Farwell Country Club facilities. A tentative plan will be drawn up and presented to Country Club officials. The matter will then be returned to the school board for further action.

It was reported that several board members plan to attend the Texas Association of School Board finance meeting December 13 in Austin.

It was also reported that a reorganization proposal for the school system is currently under study.

It was announced that a school bus no longer used by the system has been sold to Southern Bus Sales of Alexandria, La., who placed the highest bid in the amount of \$1,725.

## Traffic Stop Nets Drug Haul

A routine traffic stop by Texas Department of Public Safety officers in Friona Thursday of last week resulted in the arrest of one man on drug charges and one of the largest drug seizures in Parmer County history.

The DPS troopers reportedly stopped a car about midnight on U.S. 84 because they saw the vehicle weave as it traveled northeast toward Amarillo.

According to the officers, the driver appeared to be under the influence of a drug. When they searched the man and the inside of the car, they

found a small amount of what was believed to be heroin.

Since the driver did not have the keys to the trunk of the car the officers forced it open, finding more than 300 pounds of what appeared to be marijuana in kilo (2.2 pound) bricks.

This discovery led to the arraignment of Kenneth J. Poe, 26, of Taos, N.M., on a felony possession of marijuana charge before Justice of the Peace R.E. Mears Thursday afternoon in Farwell at the Parmer County Courthouse. Bond was set at \$15,000.

According to Parmer County Sheriff Charlie Lovelace, bond on the second charge was later reduced to \$5,000, making Poe's total bond \$20,000 on the two counts. Poe posted the \$20,000 Tuesday and was released.

After the white powder substance found in Poe's car was determined to be heroin he was arraigned Monday on a possession of heroin charge. Mears set bond on this charge at \$15,000.

According to reports, Poe apparently bought the car from a used car dealer in El Paso last Tuesday. There was

also some speculation that another car containing the trunk key might have been following Poe's car. This vehicle passed by while Poe was stopped by the highway patrolmen.

The marijuana was described as "high quality" and the bricks were wrapped in paper with each brick being a different color.

The bricks were covered with baking soda, apparently to disguise the odor.

Also confiscated were drug paraphernalia, including syringes and needles.

### Texico Chamber Drops Overpass/Underpass Idea

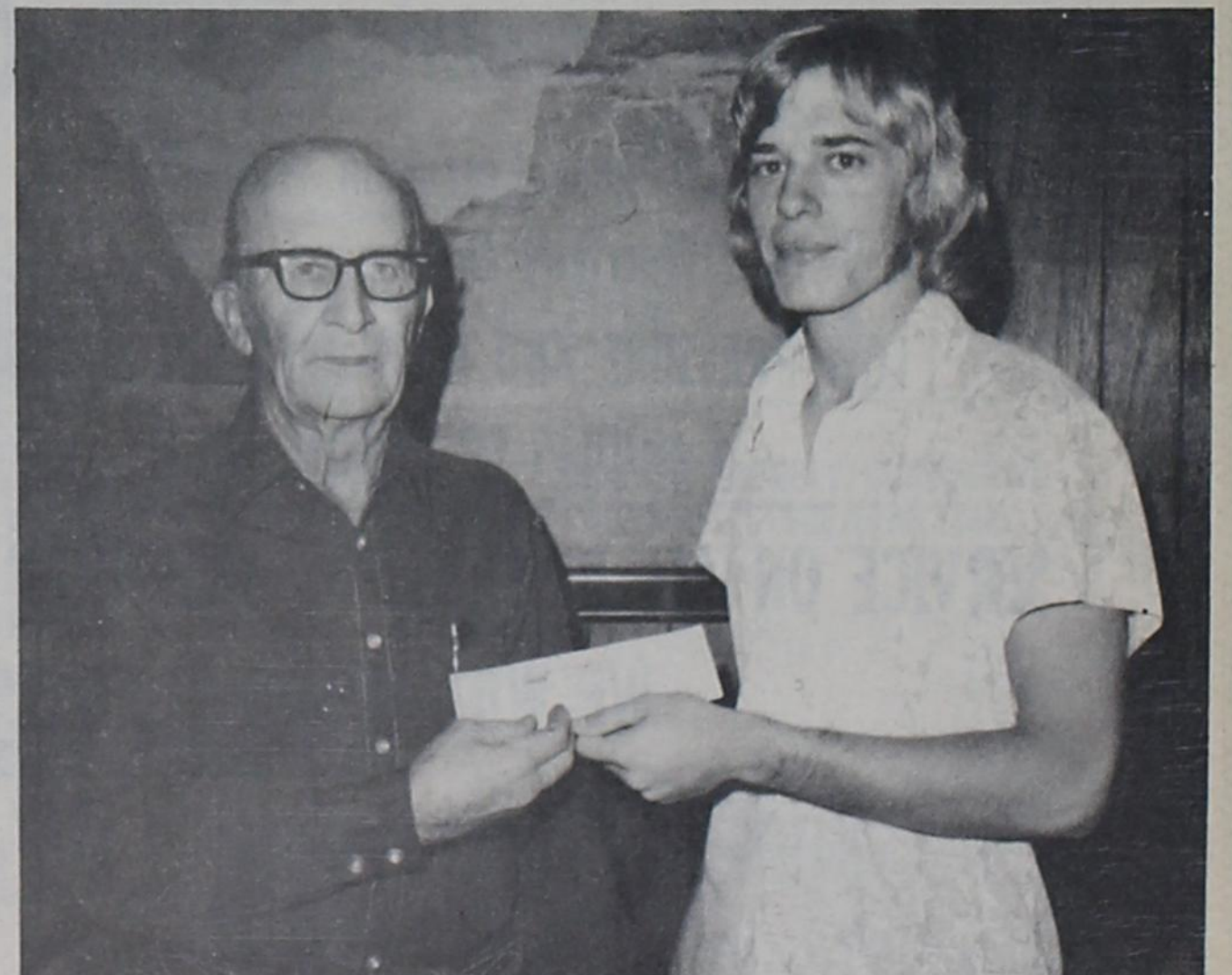

## Mrs. Reba Bell Rites Thursday In Muleshoe

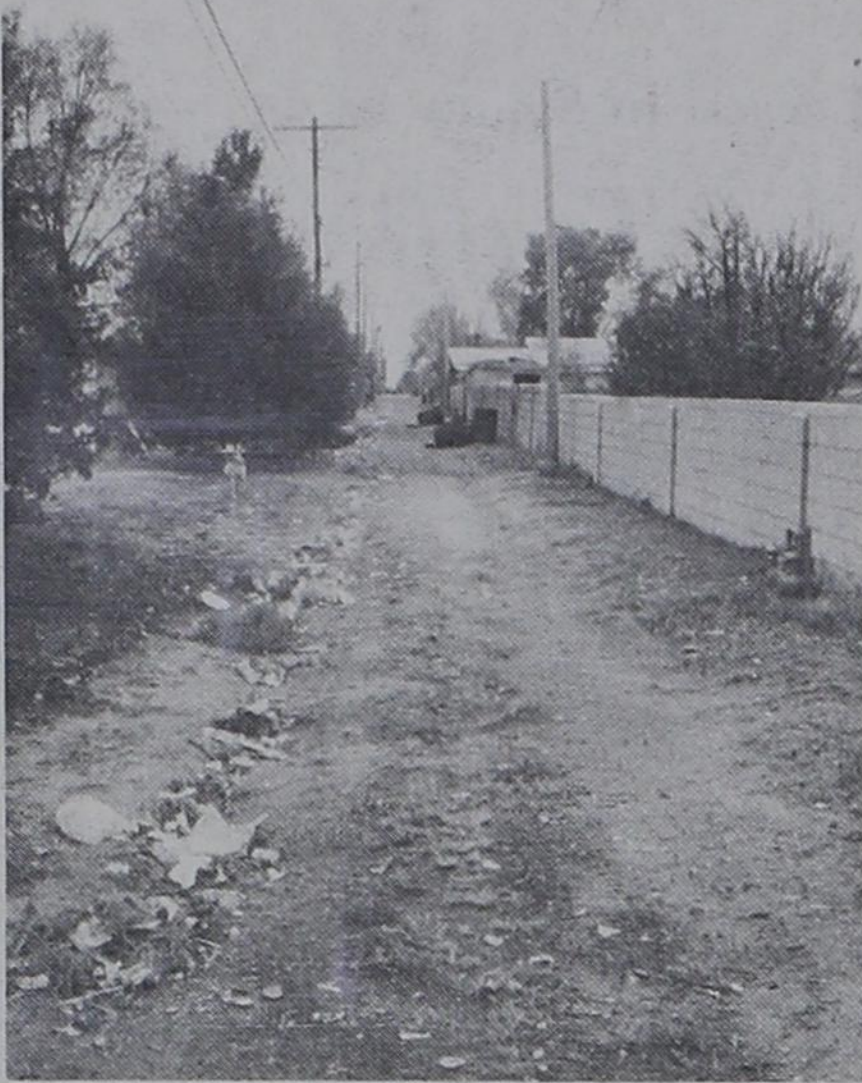

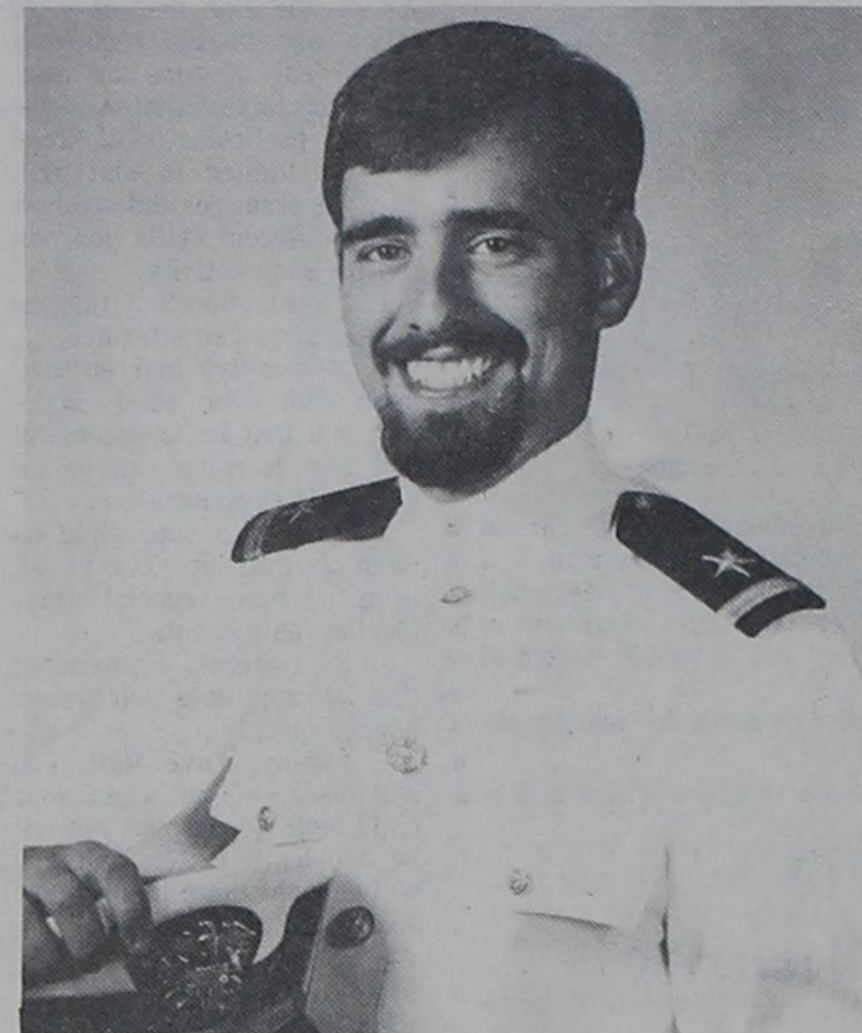
Anderson applied for OCS while he was in college, and in October of last year he received notification of ac-

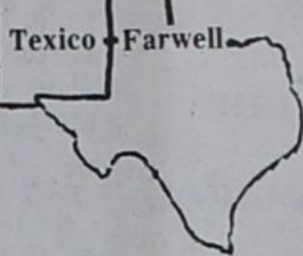


Narrow row cotton gets its most comprehensive test this year with some 50,000 acres to be harvested. First started as a novelty idea three or four years ago, the concept has steadily increased in popularity. Pioneers of the system, Elmer Hudspeth and Levon Ray, say their initial test block produced exceptional yields of nearly three bales per acre. More recent narrow row results show yield increases of ten to fifteen percent . . . good enough to make the system more popular every year. General recommendation for planting on a 40 inch bed is to space the rows from 8 to 10 inches apart. With the sizeable acreage in the field this year lots of us will be taking a close look at gin tickets in the fall to see how the narrow row breed does in its most comprehensive test.

Bids for the playground equipment for the new K.K. Runnels Park was discussed. The matter was tabled until the next regular meeting.

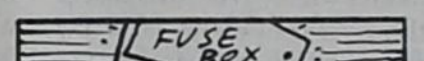
The police report for the month of October was approved.

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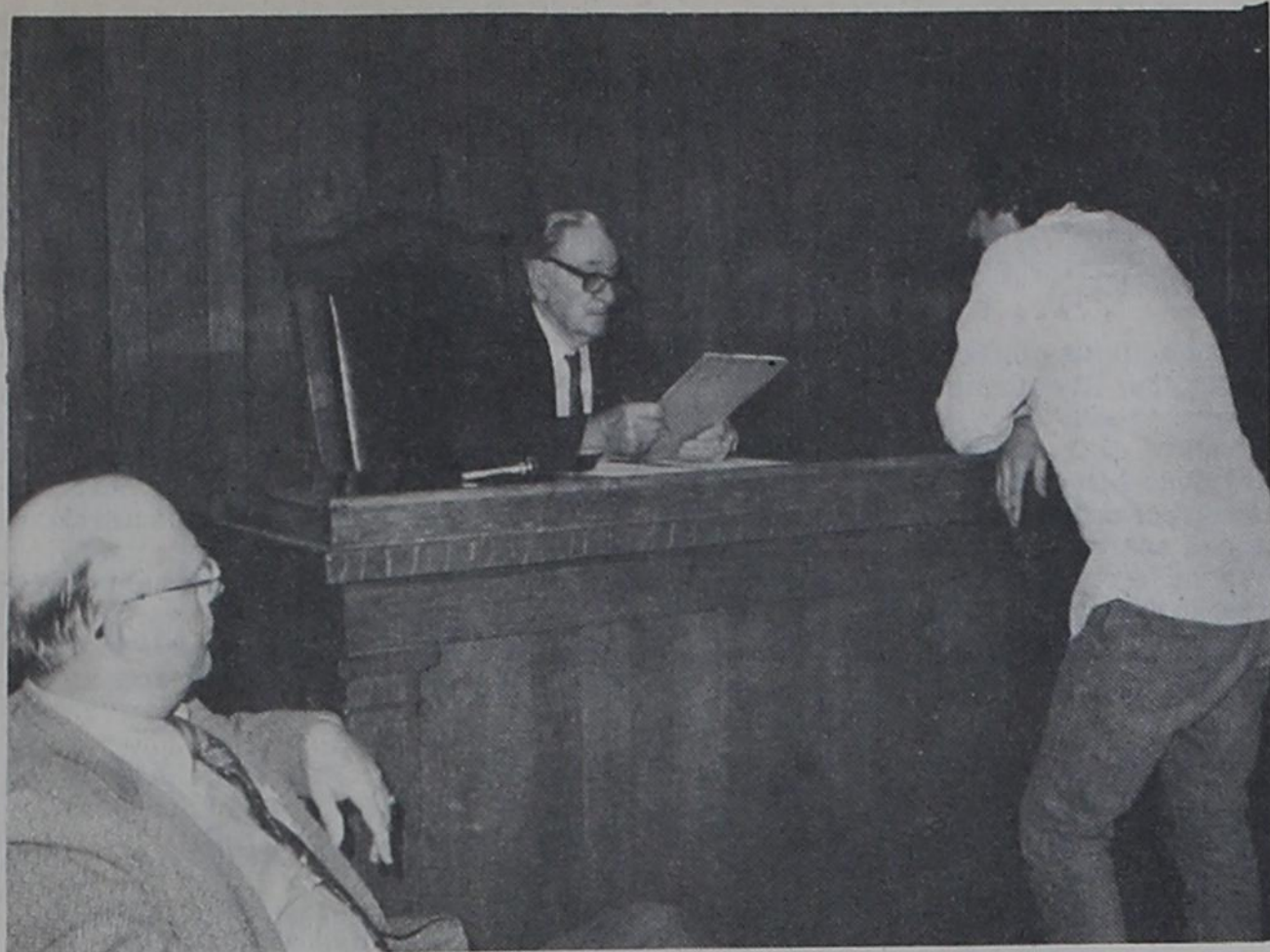
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### Arraignment

## Cartridge Companies Issue Recall

Frontier Cartridge Company and Federal Cartridge have issued recall orders for certain lots of 30-30 rifle ammunition which have a structural weakness. This weakness may cause the case head to separate upon firing which may result in injury from escaping gas.

Frontier purchased the empty primed cases from Federal Cartridge Corporation and Federal advised Frontier to recall this ammunition.

The ammunition involved is Frontier 30-30 loaded with either 150 gr. round nose or 170 gr. flat point bullets bearing lot numbers 6-38-76-9, 6-42-76-9, 9-68-76-9, and 9-71-76-9.

The lot number is located on the inside end flap of each box of 20 and on the outside end of the shipping carton.

Persons having Frontier 30-30 ammunition with one of these lot numbers should take it back to their dealer or write Frontier Cartridge Company, P.O. Box 1848 Grand Island, Neb 68801.

Federal Cartridge Corporation's recall order is for 30-30 ammunition or empty cases with lot codes ending in -5289 through -6285. Lot codes are

stamped on the back of each box. Boxes may have the brand names of Federal, Revelation, Wards, or Hiawatha.

Shooters who have this ammunition should call 800-328-7525 or write Customer Service, Federal Cartridge, Anoka, Minn. 55303 for proper disposition and refund information.

The case heads of a small number of these cartridges may separate on firing, resulting in a jammed rifle and possible injury from escaping gas. Although no serious injury has been reported, they should not be used.

Only a fraction of one percent of the several million cartridges and unprimed cases produced are suspect.

## Sheriff's Report

A pickup full of unshelled corn was recently stolen from the Gene Ezell farm east of Bovina, reports Parmer County Sheriff Charlie Lovelace.

Sheriff Lovelace reports that Kenneth J. Poe of Taos, N.M. posted \$20,000 bond Tuesday after having been arraigned on two counts of possession of drugs.

Rujellio Reyes of Dumas is in custody awaiting transfer to a penitentiary. Reyes was charged with assault with the intent to maim. He was tried 18 months ago and the Texas Supreme Court recently affirmed his conviction. Sheriff Lovelace said they expect to receive the mandate to transfer Reyes in a few days.

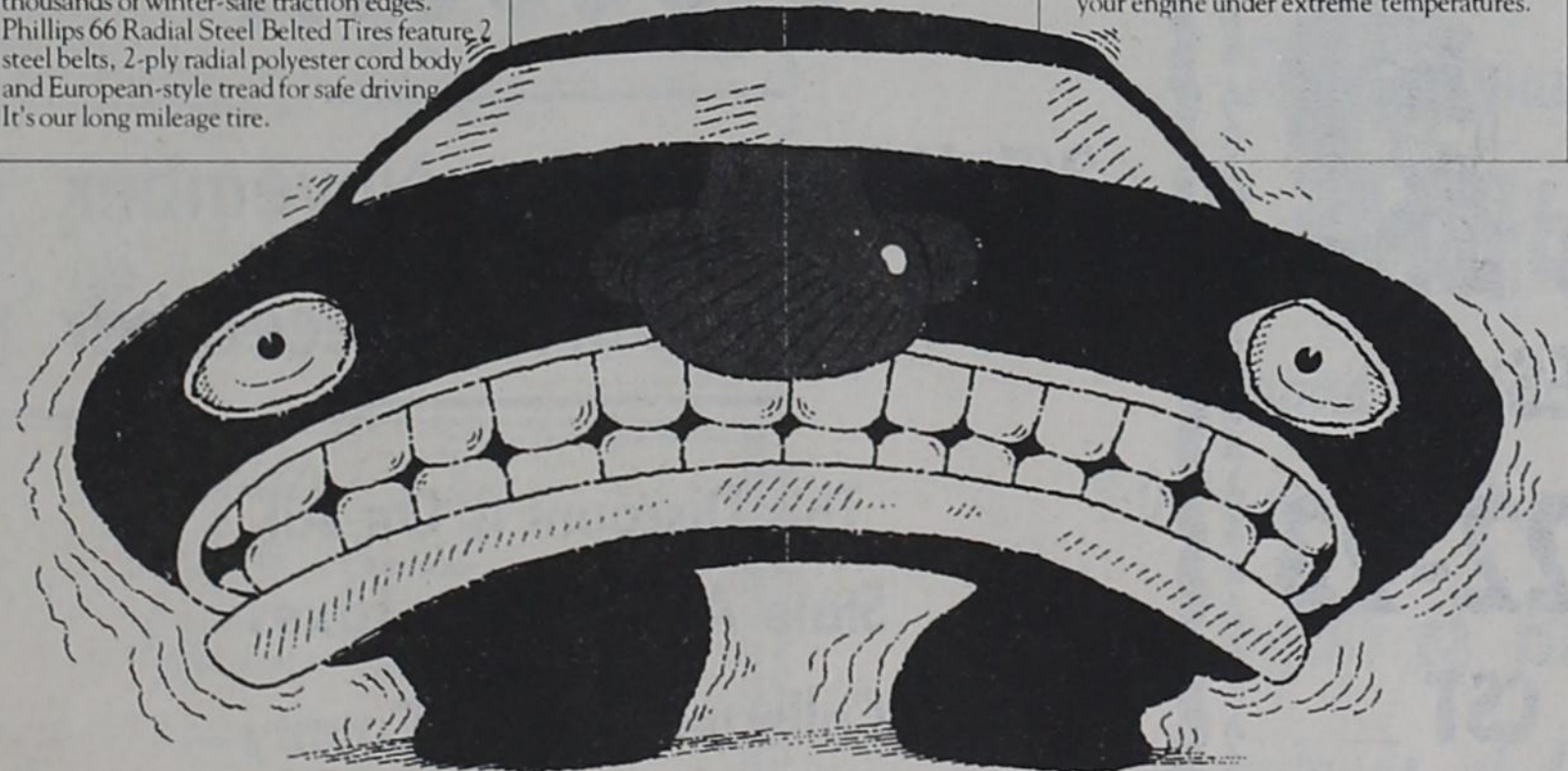

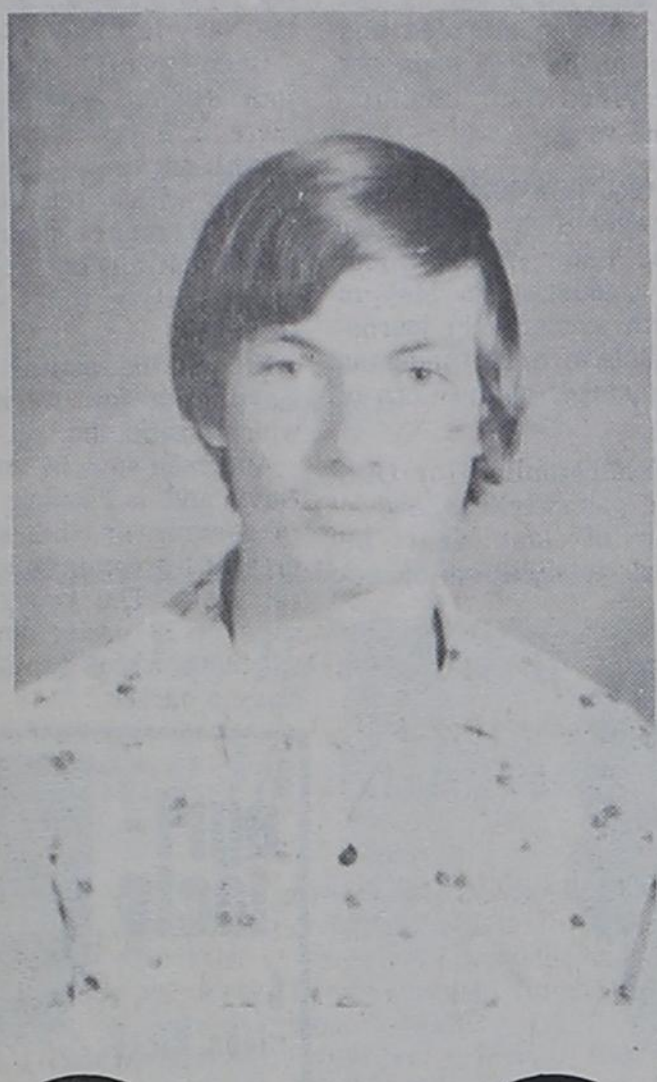

## "Right To Read" Tips To Parents

### Suggestions For Helping Your Child To Become A Better Reader

(Editor's Note: This is one of a series of articles prepared for publication by Pat Owen, Director of the Right to Read program at Farwell Schools.)

The following suggested activities can be used at any age level and anywhere: while traveling, shopping, riding in the car, or staying at home. All of the tips are easy to follow and do not require a great deal of time or cost. While certain activities refer to one particular skill, they are not limited to that skill only. Be creative, and see how many different skills you can use for each activity.

The most important tips we as educators can offer are:

1. Be positive and enthusiastic with your child. Make him feel that he is successful and that learning can be an enjoyable experience.
2. Work with your child as often as possible. Try to set aside as many special times together as you can.
3. Be patient. Remember that learning does not always happen quickly.
4. Finally, have fun! You will discover that when your child feels good about himself he will learn better, and you will be right there to share his success.

#### WORD ATTACK ACTIVITIES

1. **MAKE A WORD GAME**-Make a set of cards, each having only one letter on it. Spread the cards out on a table. Give the child a time limit to make as many words as he can using the letter cards.

2. **BLEND GUESSING GAME**-On separate cards print consonant blends. (pl, sl, bl, fl, gl, cl, gr, br, fr, cr, dr, sp, etc.) Spread the cards out in front of the child and say, "I'm thinking of the word 'broom.' Can you find the card that shows the beginning sound of 'broom'? If you can,

show me."

3. **WORD MEMORY**-Someone says a word. The next person says a word that begins with the letter the first word ends with. Continue until someone misses or cannot think of a word.

4. **SOUND DESCRIPTIONS**-Pick an object and ask the child to describe it using words that start or end with a given sound. See how many words he can use.

5. **FOOD ALPHABET**-Have your child think of things to eat using the letters of the alphabet from A to Z. See how many foods he can think of for each letter. Next, make a list for writing practice.

6. **TELEPHONE**-Use the telephone book in teaching your child the skill of alphabetizing.

7. **SHOPPING**-Let your child help make out your weekly grocery list. Ask him to hunt for certain items when at the store.

8. **CATALOGUES**-Play long and short vowel games using various catalogues. Point to a picture and ask your child to give you the vowel sound.

9. **CLAP HANDS**-Decide on a particular sound and tell the child to listen for it. Start saying words and ask your child to clap whenever he hears the sound. Be sure to tell him when he is right.

10. **GOING ON A PICNIC**-Parent selects a certain sound (short a, long i, beginning bl, etc.) and says, "I'm going on a picnic so I will pack \_\_\_\_\_." Each child repeats the items already stated but always saying another item with the same sound.

11. **RHYME TIME**-Give your child a word and ask him to see how many rhyming words he can say or write in a given time.

12. **RHYMING RIDDLES**-Say, "I'm thinking of a color that rhymes with bed." (red) or "I'm thinking of something to ride in that sounds like jar." (car)

13. **TREASURE HUNT**-Have a treasure hunt where your child has to read clues to find the prize.

Next week we will include activities to help your child learn a sight vocabulary.

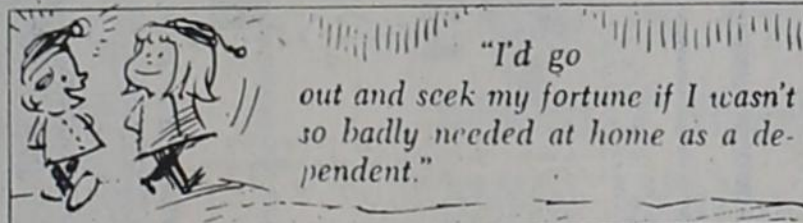

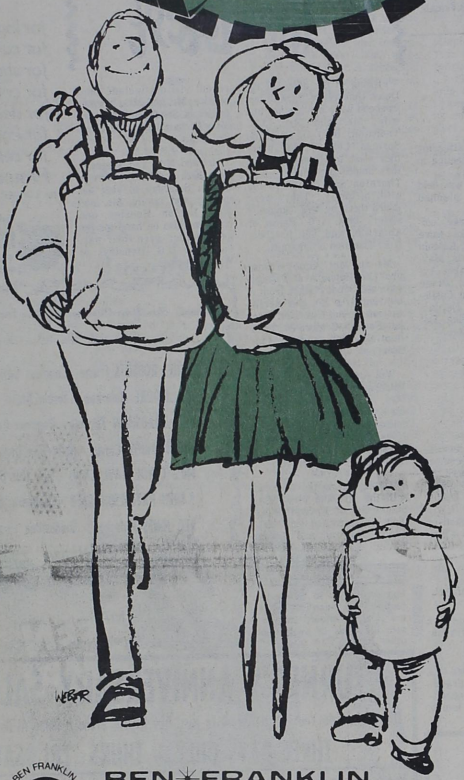

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# Hart Longhorns Shut Out Farwell Steers 27-0

A scrappy Hart Longhorn football machine, hungry for its second district crown in a row, invaded Steer home territory Friday night and blanked their hosts 27-0. The game was the final home outing for the Blue and White this season and was also dubbed "Father's Night." The loss was the Steers' second in District 3-A action and dropped them to a 2-2 record in loop play and 7-2 on the year.

Playing in their last game at home were seniors Chip Craft, Travis Bibbs, Greg Goether, Steve Meeks, Mike Goetsch, Billy White, Terry McCully, and Kent Goldsmith. The other senior Steer, Joe Haseloff, was sidelined due to a knee injury.

The Longhorns won the toss and Eliazar Castillo returned Billy White's kickoff to the 27-yard line. On the second play the pigskin popped loose and a nimble Chip Craft caught it in the air. However, the Steers were unable to capitalize on the break and the ball went over on downs.

On the first play of Hart's second possession of the night Mike Goetsch stopped Lester Aven for a two-yard loss. Kerry George scampered 30 yards with the ball before Russ Jones downed him at the 35. Seven plays later the ball went over on downs.

On the next two plays Travis Bibbs was thrown for a loss. A Hart penalty and a run by White earned the Steers a first down; however, the Blue and White could not sustain a scoring drive and Jones punt-

ed. The ball was returned by Aven who dropped it, but the Longhorns recovered.

The first quarter ended with neither team scoring.

In the opening minutes of the second stanza Hart's Glen Black scored on an eight-yard run. The kick for the extra point failed, and Hart took the lead, 6-0.

Hart kicked off from the 35-yard line. Jones fielded the ball and handed it to Craft who carried to the 18. Goetsch carried for one yard and Jones completed a pass to Craft to keep the drive alive. Bibbs earned the first down on the next carry. Jones fired a pass across the middle to Rowdy Chandler for an eight-yard gain.

White picked up the first down on the next play and Bibbs and Goetsch carried for three and four yards, respectively. However, the promising drive was cut short when Farwell fumbled and the Longhorns recovered on their own 47-yard line.

Time ran out in the first half with the score remaining 6-0 in the visiting team's favor.

The Steers took the ball to open play in the second act of the District 3-A game, but were unable to earn a first down and Jones punted the pigskin away.

Craft and Chandler smeared Aven for a four-yard and three-yard loss, respectively, on the next two plays of Hart's initial possession in the second half.

Bibbs returned the Hart punt to the Steer 43-yard line. The potential drive was cut short on a third and seven situation when Aven picked off a Jones aerial. Two plays later Chandler recovered a Hart fumble and the Steers momentarily came alive again. With three minutes remaining in the third quarter, Farwell moved the ball inside the ten-yard line, but on a fourth and two situation Jones overshot Chandler and Hart took possession of the ball.

At that point the visiting team erupted for 21 points, assuring themselves of a play-off berth.

With one minute left in the third stanza George ran the ball in two yards for the score. Chandler blocked the kick for the PAT and Hart increased its lead to 12-0.

Early in the final quarter George scampered 83 yards for paydirt. Donald Robinson ran for the extra points and Hart went ahead 20-0.

With five minutes remaining in the game Aven ran in from the three and Bobby Allensworth kicked the extra point. The visiting team now commanded a 27-0 lead over their hosts and play ended with the Steers suffering their only shutout.

Although Hart has a District 3-A game remaining against Bovina, Friday's win assured them of a bi-district berth opposite Petersburg, a 32-0 victor Friday night over District 4-A opponent Lorenzo.

The victory shoves Hart back into the playoffs for the third straight year and the fourth time in history.



Fumble Return

Yruegas added another six points to his credit in the second stanza when he jaunted 40 yards for his second TD. Robin Roberts ran for the extra points. Also in second quarter action, Steve Owens scampered 15 yards to score, but the conversion attempt failed.

The final score for the Blue and White came in the third stanza when Mike Hernandez sprinted 15 yards to round out the scoring at 34. The try for the PAT failed.

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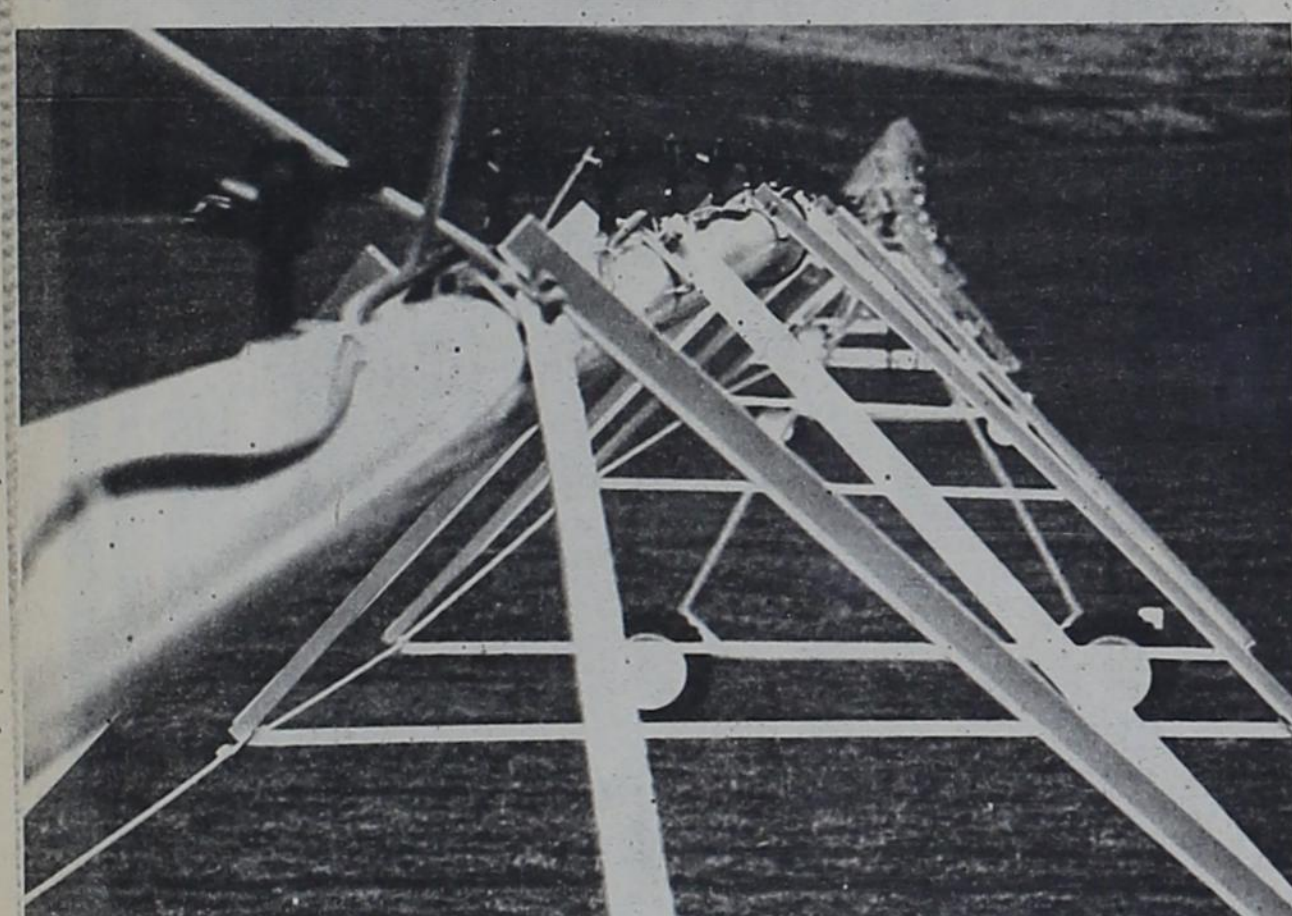

## Coach Says "It Was A Tough One To Lose"

"It was a tough one to lose, but we really didn't deserve to win," Farwell Steer Coach Tom Whatley said following the local team's 27-0 thrashing by Hart Friday night.

He added that until the final quarter the game was a better contest than the score indicates.

"We just kind of gave up after we missed a crucial fourth down conversion late in the third quarter," the coach added. "We aren't used to being district contenders. Hart is, and that makes the difference," he stated. "Hart has been there before," Whatley commented.

Whatley said the Steers made "bad mental errors at crucial points" and that cost them the game. "When the chips were down, we didn't play well. Instead of hanging in there we let our spirit out," he continued. "That comes with experience and we don't have it yet," Whatley said.

Hart's defense, which has allowed only one touchdown in the last four games, was ignited by linebackers Bryan Irons and Cary McLain, line-men Johnny Newsom, Glen Black at end, and cornerback Bobby Allensworth who intercepted two passes.

Hart's offense rolled up 408 yards, 394 on the ground, while Farwell's output was 222 total yards. The Steers had been averaging 349 total yards per game.

Farwell's defense was sparked by linebacker Mike Goetsch, halfback Billy White and tackle Rowdy Chandler

who recovered one fumble and blocked an extra point attempt.

For the first time since the football season began in September the coaching staff did not select a "Steer of the Week." Other positions not selected were "outstanding offensive lineman," "outstanding offensive back" and "outstanding secondary man."

Players selected for compliments by the coaching staff were Mike Goetsch, who was named "outstanding forcing unit man," Travis Bibbs, the "outstanding offensive back." The coaches said Goetsch played well and cited Friday's clash with Hart as his "best defensive effort." They said Bibbs gave his usual "excellent performance."

Tonight (Friday) the Farwell Blue and White travel to Springlake-Earth to bring down the curtain on their 1976 football season. The Steers and the Wolverines are tied in district play, each sporting a 2-2 record going into the game.

Whatley said the game will be very important for his team. "We have to prove we have the mettle to come back after the thrashing we took," he added.

The Green and Gold have one thing in common with the Steers besides their district records. They also have a new gridmaster, Roland Murray, whom "Top-o-Texas" magazine calls "one of the top young coaches in the state of Texas." He is a former grid standout from Abernathy and helped build New Deal to a grid power the past two years.

An asset which the Springlake-Earth Wolverines will be using tonight is their speed. Three members of their 43.6 sprint relay team are returning backfield starters this fall. A "bogeyman" they have had to cope with all season is lack of experience.

Big names in the Wolverine backfield are Mark Barton (5-9, 145, senior) quarterback

and fullback Rodney Geissler (6-2, 185, senior). Both are returning starters and all-state candidates.

Top halfbacks in the veer-T attack are Terry Hood (5-11, 160, senior) and Timmy Thomas (5-11, 160, senior).

Heading up the offensive attack is All-District Brent Been (6-0, 185, senior). Other returning starters are guard Tim May (5-11, 170, junior) and tackles Brian Taylor (6-3, 185, senior) and Greg Holland (6-0, 175, senior).

Graduation stripped Springlake-Earth clean of ends, but an ample replacement has been Monte Price (5-11, 160, senior).

There is cost share assistance for underground irrigation pipeline from a tailwater pit up to an existing irrigation distribution system. This assistance is available under the ACP and GPCP programs. There is assistance for digging tailwater pits under the GP program.

Under both programs all the land draining into a tailwater system and the land to which the return water is pumped, must meet a conservation irrigation system.

Under the GPCP program an application for assistance for just irrigation practices is considered law priority.

No funding has been provided for law priority contracts.

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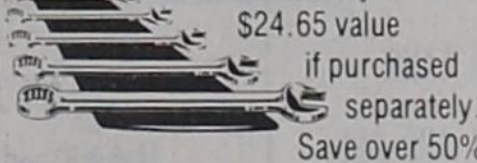
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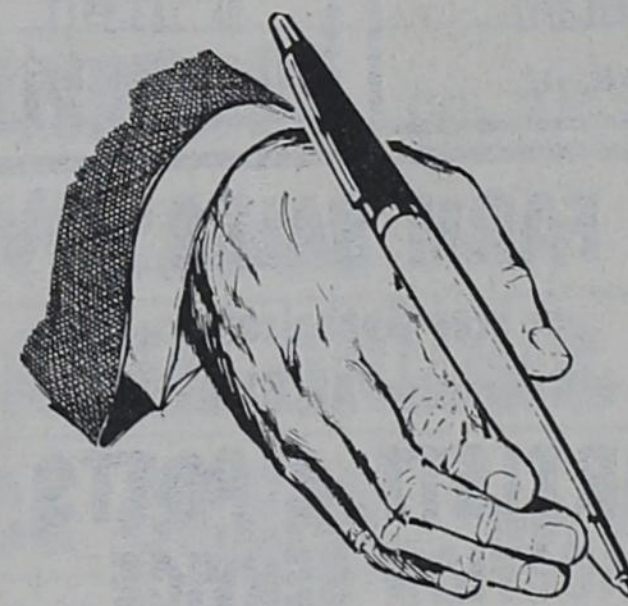
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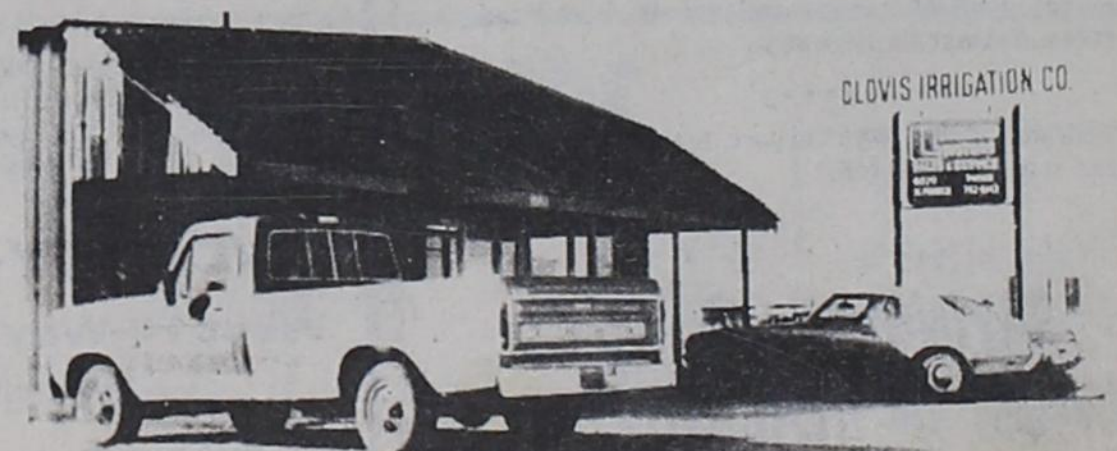
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**Bailey REA Loan**

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**TWO MINUTES WITH THE BIBLE**

**WHAT SHALL WE DO?**

When John the Baptist appeared as Christ's forerunner, God's chosen people had lived under the Law of Moses for 1500 years but had not kept it. Hence John's call to repentance and baptism for the remission of sins (Mark 1:4).

John was in earnest too, for when the thoughtless multitude came to him to be baptized, he sent them back, saying: "Bring forth fruits worthy of repentance" (Luke 3:7-8). Their lives were to be changed and they were to show it.

When the people asked: "What shall we do then?" he told them to live for others rather than for self (Lk 3:10-11). When the tax collectors asked: "What shall we do?" he demanded that they stop cheating the tax payers and live honestly (vers. 12-13). When the soldiers asked: "What shall we do?" he told them to forbear violence, false accusation and bribery (ver. 14). Clearly, righteousness was demanded under John's message. His hearers were to repent, be baptized and bring forth the fruits of true repentance.

When our Lord appeared, He proclaimed the same message as John (Matt. 3:12; 4:17). A lawyer asked: "What shall I do to inherit eternal life?" and He replied: "What is written in the Law?" When the lawyer recited the basic commands of the law, our Lord answered: "This do and thou shalt live" (Luke 10:25-28). God was still demanding righteousness. They were all under the law. (See Gal. 4:4; Matt. 23:12, etc.)

Some suppose this was all changed after Calvary by the "Great Commission." This is not so. When at Pentecost, Peter's hearers were convicted of their sins and asked: "What shall we do?" Peter commanded them to "repent and be baptized... for the remission of sins" just as John had done (Acts 2:38). He did not tell them that Christ had died for their sins.

It was not until later that St. Paul was sent to proclaim the death of Christ as the payment for sin. He was the first to say: "But now the righteousness of God without the law is manifested. We declare His righteousness for the remission of sins" (Rom. 3:21-26). When the Gentile jailor fell on his knees and asked: "What must I do to be saved?" Paul replied: "Believe on the Lord Jesus Christ and thou shalt be saved" (Acts 16:30-31). This is God's message for sinners today. "For we have redemption through Christ's blood, the forgiveness of sins according to the riches of His grace" (Eph. 1:7). "Believe on the Lord Jesus Christ and THOU shalt be saved."

The department did not report any emergency vehicle calls the past week.

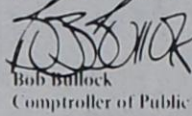

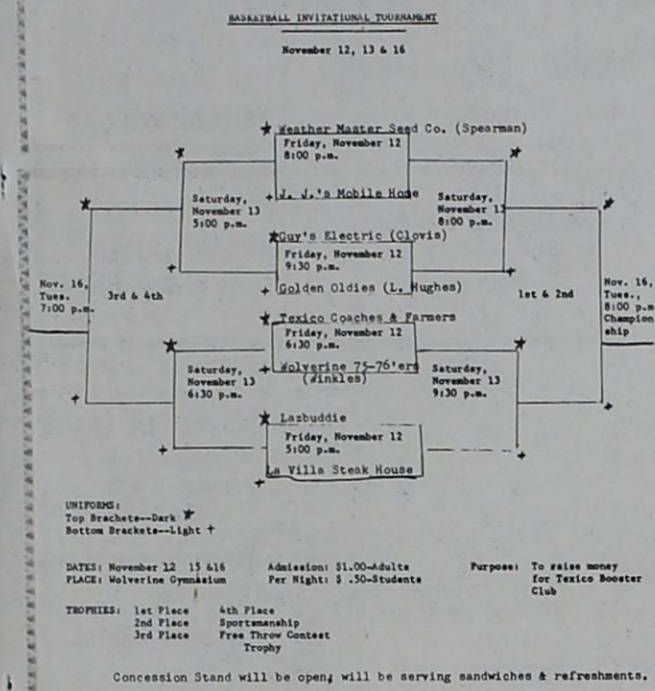

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
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
