ure but it is not likely to meet earlier expectations Irrigated cotton stands to be most disappointing while dryland cotton yields should be very good. Open weather with warm temperatures and sunshine will give an opportunity to get harvest aids applied. Harvest aids will not accelerate cotton maturity but will open bolls and dry the plant in preparation for harvest.
Maturity can only be enhanced by good growing conditions and time. It as mature as it is going to get. Harvest aid decisions should be based on the
amount of boll opener and defoliant needed. The quicker the crop can be harvested the more weather related risk a producer can avoid.
While irrigated cotton may not yield what it looked like it might 60 days ago, the overall cotto crop has the potential be a good one.
