Texico's Carlee Luscombe: 'She wanted to give something to the people that helped her'

About 4 years ago, Carlee Luscombe had a bad day.

It started out all right, but when her sister Kaitlyn found her that morning she had just had a major seizure.

A quick call to 911 saved 4-year-old Carlee's life. She was taken to Clovis hospital and surgery began immediately. The next 6 days were spent at Lubbock's Covenant Hospital where Carlee was diagnosed with a type of brain tumor that is very rarely found in children.

Luckily, Covenant Hospital is one of the best pediatric hospitals to be found, and Carlee's tumor was removed.

She will still have to face regular MRI scans for the rest of her life, to make sure the tumor does not come back, but as she goes, she will at least have one great memory to take with her.

Last week, she was joined on her normal checkup trip to the hospital by her parents, singer Amy Grant, and the filming crew from NBC's new show "Three Wishes.

FBI arrests Texico city clerk Michael Hannagan, who has been the Texico city

clerk for the past seven months, was arrested by the FBI at Texico City Hall on Aug. 11 with a U.S. Marshal's warrant.

An FBI spokesman said the warrant charges Hannagan, of Clovis, with embezzlement from a federally-insured credit union he worked for in New Jersey.

After the arrest, Hannagan complained of chest pains and was taken to Clovis hospital. He was treated and released.

The FBI said the next step is for Hannagan to appear before a judge in Las Cruces on Aug. 17. Then he likely will be returned to New Jersey to face his charge. Texico City Attorney Marion Ty Rutter said

Hannagan has been placed on administrative leave with pay, pending an investigation.

The city council is expected to seek a new city clerk immediately.

Council raises residents' utility fees arwell

on Tuesday approved utility rate hikes.

Mayor Jimmie Mace said higher fuel costs were the main culprit.

Effective immediately, city residents will pay 10 percent higher garbage and sewer fees; and 5 percent higher water use fees.

Also, the council instituted a \$100 water deposit fee for new residents. This was done because some folks were moving away without paying their use

Mace also alerted that more hikes may be needed next year.

In other business, the council:

-- Approved the request from Duncan Disposal to

The Farwell City Council charge 3 percent higher fee to the city for garbage pickup. Duncan earlier this year received a 4 percent fuel surcharge increase.

-- Acted on four building permits:

1) Approved a fence for Christina Gutierrez at 108 San Andres.

2) Denied a request by Joe Pena to add to his house at 308 9th St. It was denied because he has not finished other work there

3) Denied a request by Ed McPeak to put a storage building at 200 3rd St. because the siding didn't meet city codes.

4) Denied a request by Elva LaFuente to place a storage building at 205 4th

The council was told that the storage building was already put in despite street Supt. Dee Hammit telling the applicant not to until the city council met.

The council said the building did not have the appropriate siding. Police Chief Robert Achterberg will notify the applicant that she has 7-10 days to remove the building or be

If she is cited, she has to appear in city court, where she can be fined.

-- Approved the budget for 2005-2006. It includes 3 percent pay raises for city employees and funds for a second police officer.

But the council still has to vote on whether to hire a second police officer.

revenue has increased greatly, thus helping the budget.

- Agreed to a request from Tire Country to close the first block of 1st Street for its grand opening on Sept. 10.

This is contingent on not conflicting with the Texico road construction which has begun.





2005 Property Tax Rates in FARWELL HOSPITAL

This notice concerns 2005 property tax rates for FARWELL HOSPITAL. It presents information about three tax rates, Last year's tax rate is the actual rate the taxing unit used to determine property taxes last year. This year's effective tax rate would impose the same total taxes as last year if you compare properties taxed in both years. This year's rollback tax rate is the highest tax rate the taxing unit can set before taxpayers can start tax rollback procedures. In each case these rates are found by dividing the total amount of taxes by the tax base (the total value of taxable property) with adjustments as required by state law. Bovina city property taxes to rise 3 cents

The Bovina City Council on Aug. 11 unanimously approved the city budget. Copies are available at City Hall.

They had looked at dropping the vehicle tax, which would have raised property taxes about 10 cents, but heard that the County and School Boards were not dropping theirs. So property taxes will be raised 3 cents to 58 cents per \$100 assessed valuation.

The raise was basically needed due to the higher fuel costs.

This ended the streak of five years in a row that the city tax had been lowered

In other business, the council:

- -- Discussed Martha Jaramillo's offer to buy a property -- a vacant lot at the end of Second Street.. No action was taken pending a review of zoning ordinance to see if a trailer home can be put on the property.
- -- Did not make any changes in the Cemetery Rules about the number of items that can be put on gravesites. The number of items will remain at two.
- -- Approved a rate increase on telecommunications from \$1.34 to \$1.41. This is to bring Bovina in line with the rest of the state, and was requested by the Public Utility Commission.
- -- Discussed Bovina's National Incident Management System (NIMS) compliance. This is important in case an emergency or disaster were to befall the city.
- If there were no NIMS compliance in place, FEMA funds would not be accessible. Mandatory training of the City Council, City Judge, and City Manager will be set up to make sure there is compliance. All cities in the U.S. have to do this.
- -- Heard a report from the Texas Commission on Environmental Quality (TCEQ) on their review of dust from the grain elevators. The TCEQ found no green dust, and they also found no nuisance dust.
- -- Signed a Memorandum of Understanding in a show of support between the school, city and the Bovina Community Network (BCN). The BCN will have their electricity and gas bills covered by the school, and the city will pay for water, sewer and trash.

One change in the Steers schedule: they will play at Olton on Aug. 18 at 5 p.m., not here.

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
