Our area is blessed

Last week, I got a call from a friend in the early evening hours.

He was riding with friends who attempted to make a u-turn in their pickup next to Oppliger South Yards on State Line Road, but got stuck in the grass due to recent rains.

So my friend asked me to come get them so they could find someone with a 4x4 and tow rope to pull out the stuck vehicle.

I got there in about five minutes, but a 4x4 had already stopped with a towrope and was setting it up to pull out the pickup.

The rope broke (the pickup was really stuck!).

While this was going on, another 4x4 stopped to watch. When that fella saw the problem occur, he got his own towrope out and they attached it to the pickup.

This time it worked, and the pickup was pulled out of the mud.

The reason I am writing about this incident is that it goes along with what I wrote about the Cal-Maine fire.

Our area is one where folks help when it's needed.

Two guys just driving down State Line Road stopped to help a motorist with a problem. If this was the big city, they would have kept on going and never looked back.

Speaking of Matt, at the end of the day he and Rob Pomper helped Fred Chandler "break down" the sound system so it could be put away for next year's BTD.

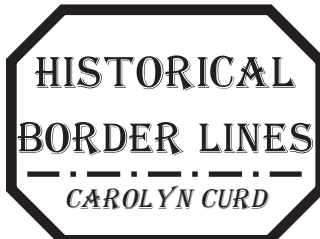
Like I say, living in a small town definitely has its plusses: folks help folks.

Xcel Energy to give out refunds

Xcel Energy retail customers in Texas will soon be receiving a refund on their bills because of lower fuel costs.

The refund will be a one-time credit based on August usage. A residential customer using 1,000 kilowatt-hours in August will receive a credit of \$23.60.

Because the refund will be calculated on August usage, customers can expect to see the credit on bills received in August, September and/or October depending on their billing cycles.



Nathan L. Tharp (1887-1971) and Nettie Tharp (1888-1984) of Texico presented Retirement Ranch of Clovis to the New Mexico Synod of the United Presbyterian Church. The gift came from the N.L. Tharp Foundation in 1961.

Valued at more than \$250,000, the retirement and nursing home at 2210 Mabry Drive was set back from the highway on a spacious acreage.

"The Retirement Ranch of Clovis ... is a monument to this pioneering couple's service to mankind," reported the "State Line Tribune" on the celebration of the 60th wedding anniversary of the Tharps.

In recent years, a new Retirement Ranch was built at 2221 Dillon St. near Plains Regional Medical Center in Clovis. The Senior Citizens Resident Center now occupies the Mabry Drive building and touts its landscaping.

N.L. Tharp also donated money for construction of the Texico swimming pool.

The Tharps' daughter, Beth Howard, resides in Texico. She and her husband, W.D. Howard Jr., are the parents of Greg, of Farwell, and Mark, of

Pleasant Hill. All three men have been honored as Agriculturalists of the Year by the Farwell Chamber of Commerce.

Namesake grandson Nathan Tharp has served as a Texico city councilman and mayor and is currently a member of the board of Yucca Telecom. His sister, Anita J. Zachrel, also of Texico, has served as Curry County treasurer.

William Edward Tipton is named on the New Mexico Law Enforcement Memorial in Santa Fe and the National Law Enforcement Memorial in Washington, D.C.

Roosevelt County deputy sheriff Will Tipton was shot on April 25, 1907, in a Texico saloon by Portales town marshal Byron Parrish. A jury acquitted Parrish.

Texico was in Roosevelt County in 1907.

Oscar L. Owen won election as one of three members of the first State Corporation Commission in Santa Fe. A Texico resident from 1905 to 1908, he was employed as an office engineer in the construction department of the Santa Fe Railway.

Owen served as treasurer of Clovis from 1908 to 1910. He also owned a wholesale grocery and produce business, and helped form the Clovis Journal Co., according to historian Ralph Emerson Twitchell.

For the term starting in 1912, Owen, a Democrat, defeated George H. Van Stone, of the Progressive-Republican party. The latter contested the election, but Owen prevailed as a State Corporation Commissioner.

"In his (Owen's) official capacity, he has acceptably discharged the duties incumbent upon him, his record inspiring confidence in his trustworthiness and ability," reports Twitchell's "Leading Facts of New Mexico History."

Also, the board hired Steve Parker as high school principal, and his wife, Rachel, as a teacher.

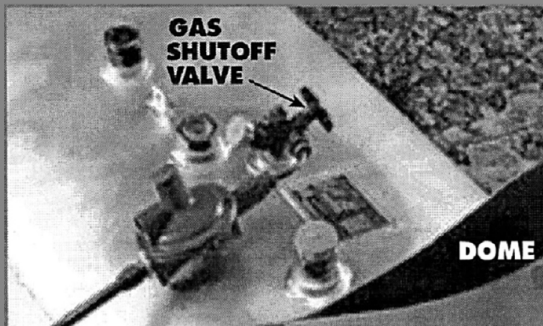

Texico City Council moves ahead on clean-up

Texico's City Council discussed city clean-up Tuesday.

The council had directed city officials to do all they could to clean up a property where Raul Esparza was living on Lamar Street.

Police Chief Doug Bowman said he contacted a family member who got the rest of the family involved.

Mayor Jerry Cunningham said the Esparza family contacted him and said they had read about the problems in the Tribune and would clean up the property in 30 days rather than face foreclosure.

Bowman said cleanup has started.

In other business, the council:
-- Discussed a 9-ft. fence that a neighbor believes was build over the property line. The council asked him to get the property surveyed before action. The maximum height for a fence in town is 6 feet.

-- Building Inspector Terry Martin said that four properties have been cited into court and could be foreclosed in the future.

In the future, City Attorney Ty Rutter recommend-ed using a state statute to take possession of property covered with debris.

This includes passing a resolution against a property owner and then serving them with a notice of impending foreclosure. If the owner does not ask for a court date within 10 days, the city can take over.

- Passed resolutions to accept the final budget and to chip seal parts of State, Turner, and Garwood streets.

- Discussed businesses that have not paid for business licenses. Martin said the Wolverine Service Station had been shut down due to violation, and has been cleaned up. The business is licensed to repair cars, but not to sell, paint, or store vehicles, he said.

- Heard that Court Clerk Melissa Montano has resigned to move to Arizona. The council cut the position and split the pay between City employees Carolyn Johnson, Elpidia Solis, and Bowman as they will be doing the extra work.

- The mayor and council congratulated the fire department for their work at the Cal-Maine fire on July 9. Councilman Doug Scioi also complimented the city staff for their outstanding job during the year.

- Signed an updated Joint Powers Agreement to assist the Farwell Fire Department in fires. The agreement says that both fire departments will do their best to help the other, but each department is responsible for their own vehicles and materials.

- Discussed ways to fix roof leaks at the Texico Community Center.

- Autrey received permission to cut drainage holes in flower planters that fill with water on city property. He said water was draining from the roof of the Senior Citizens Center, but had no place to escape.

Local volunteers will again prepare the meal, including rib-eye steaks, green beans, new potatoes, salad and green chile corn.

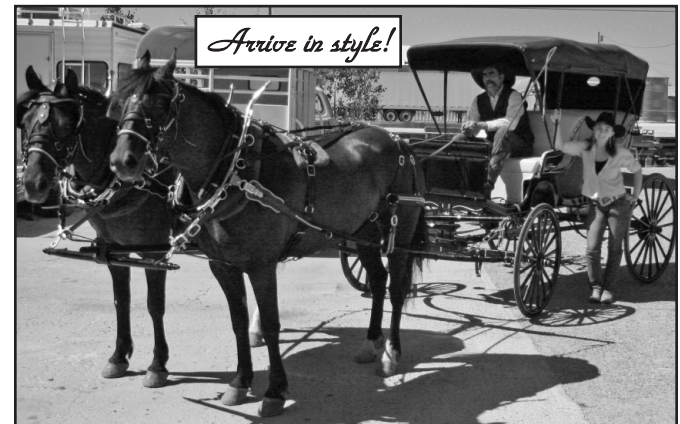

LIVE CATTLE: Prices were able to make a short term top last week before turning down. This is about two weeks shy of the normal seasonal top, but there could be a rebound back to test those highs at some point over the next couple of weeks. The market should find a bottom around late August and trade back higher into the September/October time frame.

FEEDER CATTLE: Feeder prices also halted their advance last week after making a couple of attempts to break out to new high ground. The seasonal tendency is also strong to top during the mid July time frame and trade down into late August before turning back higher into the September time frame. Odds are good that the most recent highs could be all we see even if the market is able to turn around in late August.

CORN: Corn has also acted like the beans with prices trading inside a tight range, but no buyers to hold the market up. There was about a 20 cent bounce which took place last week on rumors that the USDA would adjust planted acres back down, but these have just been rumors which no confirmation as of this writing. Could bounce back higher, but trends are still down.

SOYBEANS: Prices have basically been trading inside a tight range with no real direction at this time. There is a fairly strong seasonal tendency to see prices decline into the harvest time frame. Prices look poised to attempt a rally, but there has been little or no follow through on the last couple of times prices have been able to turn short term trends up.

WHEAT: Wheat prices have also remained neutral over the last few weeks which no real direction. Keep in mind that price trends are still down, but should bottom at some point over the next few weeks. The seasonal tendency is to see a bottom in wheat take place at some time in August before turning back higher. The nearby September contract should trade into the \$4.00 range before turning back higher.

COTTON: Prices turned their short term charts down last week and the market took a pretty good break. The market was able to catch at support around the \$56.50 level basis the December contract before trading back up. This was about a 2/3rds retracement level from the June low measured to the most recent high. Expect to see the market stabilize around current levels over the next few days.

'Plastic' is now the theft target

Modern day theft does not involve stereos or cars; instead, plastic is now the target.

Estella Espinoza, of Bovina, is an independent consultant, who works to help show people the risks of identity theft.

"Every person on this earth is at risk for identity theft," she said. "When people apply for jobs, use credit cards, and even register for school, they are releasing their information to others. The way to help prevent identity theft is to have a plan in place."

Estella's employer, Kroll Background America, is a major national risk manage-

ment company.

There are five types of identity: driver's licenses, Social Security numbers, medical information, character/criminal actions, and financial transactions.

"Only 26 percent of identity theft is financial, and most people take for granted the other information that they have circulating throughout the country," she said.

"It can take a thief only minutes to hack into systems and steal people's personal information."

Ms. Espinoza says all five identities are monitored 24 hours a day under Kroll's plan. The private investigators will also have an up-to-date credit report, which is

analyzed for any suspicious activity.

"When bad things happen to good people, what do you do?" Estella asked.

Once a person has their identity stolen, it becomes a legal problem. Kroll will contact the Social Security administration and other governmental agencies to inform them of the fraud in order to prevent further transactions until the problem is solved.

Ms. Espinoza said almost one quarter of victims without a plan do not discover the misuse of their information for at least six months after it started.

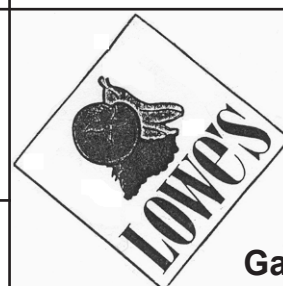
