Kasel captures contest opener

It was another great start for the annual Area Merchants Football Contest this week, with more than 300 entries being received. By the time the contest culminates in 12 weeks usually between 400 and 500 area folks play the fun contest.

Each entrant must remember to pick a tie breaker score since many weekly winners -- and some overall grand prize champions -- have been determined by this method.

Each week's scoring is tabulated and kept on public view at the Tribune office. Standings are posted each Monday and may

be seen during regular business hours.

Ballots are kept throughout the contest so that any entrant with a question can look back at them.

The overall winner of the 12-week contest will win two tickets to the Dallas Cowboys -- New Orleans Saints game at Texas Stadium in December, plus \$200 in cash.

Safety steps taken at jail

Parmer County Sheriff has taken steps toward improving the safety at the new jail after the attempted escape last month by an inmate.

On Tuesday, a new alarm system was being put in at the jail. This will allow jailers to carry "panic buttons". If a jailer

is having a problem, then the jailer punches that button. It goes to a radio that transmits the call throughout the county. It's the kind of button many convenience stores have their employees carry.

Also, Geris has strongly reiterated the need for jail employees to follow proper procedures. What happened in the escape attempt was that a door that was supposed to be closed was left ajar.

So the inmate was able to knock down the jailer, then get through that key door.

"The correct policies are in place," said the sheriff. "No changes are needed. But we have to keep on top of our employees to follow them."

Steers smash Dimmitt for second victory

The Farwell Steers are now 2-0 on the season after dismantling the Dimmitt Bobcats, 39-12, at home last Friday.

It was a rough start for the Steers as on the first play Dimmitt intercepted at the Farwell 25. After Roper Smith had a good tackle, Dimmitt scored on a 13-yard run at 8:31 for a 6-0 lead.

Hugo Vasquez had a good kick return to near midfield. Robbie Tabb ran around end for 13. Logan McFarland had a good block to enable Rowdy Mitchell gain yardage on a pass play. Tabb then hit Vasquez for 13 yards, and Clint Knight for 9 more. The drive ended with a 5-yard TD run by Tabb at 3:48. The McFarland kick gave Farwell the lead at 7-6.

On defense, Vasquez had 2 good tackles and Colby Norton one. But Dimmitt hit a 3rd down pass for big yardage to the Farwell 45. Roper Fulcher had a QB sack to stop the drive as the first quarter ended.

In the 2nd quarter, Farwell lost a fumble at its 30. Joel Chavez had a good tackle, and Dimmitt was held. Farwell move the ball well, with Tabb running for 8, then 21 more. He hit Vasquez with a 37-yard pass. But the Bobcats intercepted at their 2.

Luis Olmos recovered a fumble at the Dimmitt 4. Tabb then scored from there at 6:34. The McFarland kick made it 14-6.

On defense, Olmos had a strong tackle, then recovered his 2nd fumble at the Dimmitt 25. Farwell was stopped at the Dimmitt 7.

Vasquez had a QB sack at the Dimmitt 3. Then Fulcher

put pressure on the Dimmitt QB in the end zone, who threw an errant pass picked off by Rowdy Mitchell for a TD at 2:36. The score was now 20-6.

A hard hit by Logan Clemmer on the kick returner knocked the ball loose, and Knight recovered it at the Bobcat 25. Tabb hit Vasquez with a 25-yard TD pass at 2:22.

Clemmer tackled the kick returner at the Dimmitt 15. Mitchell had a strong tackle and Farwell got the ball back at midfield. Vasquez caught a Tabb toss at the 10. Then Tabb hit Matthew Edwards with a 10-yard TD strike at :34. The McFarland kick made it 33-6.

Colton Sudderth tackled the kick returner as the half ended.

Starting the 3rd quarter, Olmos had a big kick return. Edwards then ran for 10, and Mitchell raced for a 53-yard TD at 8:48.

On defense, Olmos had a good tackle. During the next couple of series, Farwell lost two fumbles.

Dimmitt started the final period by scoring on a 40-yard TD pass. Mitchell had a good kickoff return. McFarland was now at quarterback.

Edwards became the rushing workhorse, gaining good yardage. The drive was stopped and Farwell punted. Vasquez recovered a fumble, but then Farwell lost another fumble.

Team stats: first downs, Dimmitt 6, Farwell 16; rushing yards, Dimmitt 37 for 80; Farwell 34 for 183; passing yards, Dimmitt, 115; Farwell, 126; penalties, Dimmitt 6 for 50, Farwell 3 for 25. Both teams lost 4 fumbles.

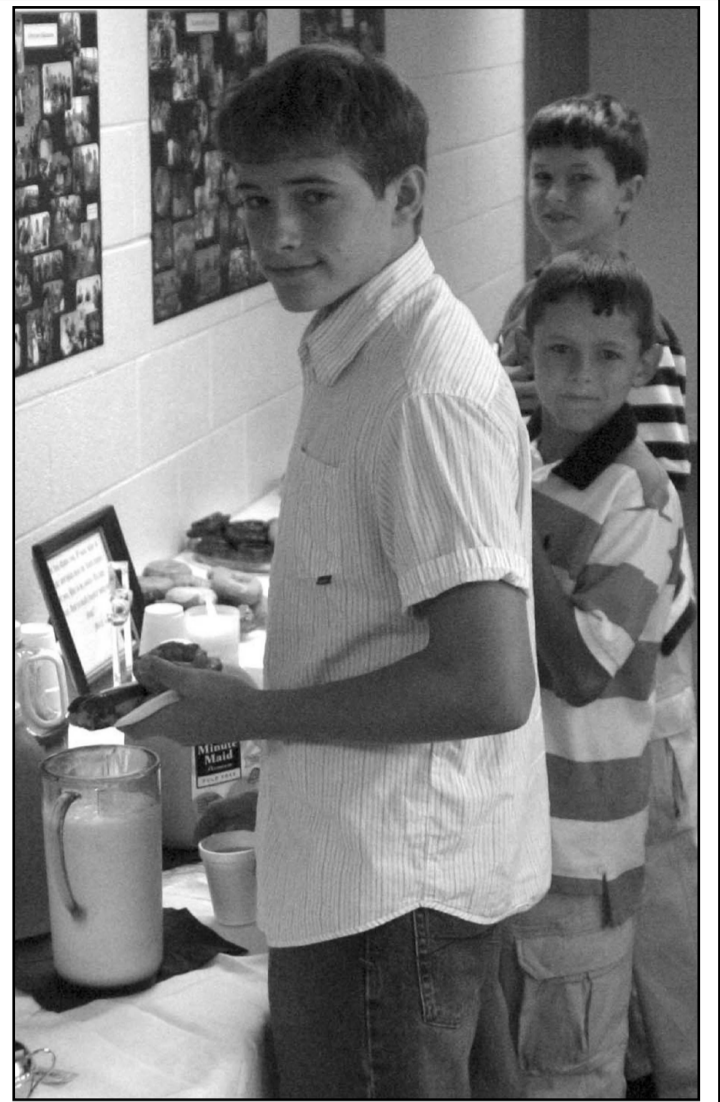

Wolverines top Mustangs

The Texico Wolverines had two things they had to get past last Friday night. One was a much improved Bovina Mustangs team, the other was four turnovers.

Texico managed to overcome both in a 32-0 win that seemed closer than that for much of the game.

The Mustangs, led by running back Eddie Segovia, managed to move the ball well at times, but the stingy Wolverine defense always had an answer when Bovina threatened to score. Bovina was forced to go to the air in the second half and with some success they moved the ball into scoring position. But, again, Texico stopped their best attempt on the 4-yard line.

Texico senior Tony Clements, who didn't play last year because of a knee injury, intercepted Bovina quarterback Jeff Casas twice to stop their other scoring threats.

The Texico defense returned only three starters from last year's

state championship team - senior linebackers Logan Brown and Johnny Serrano, and senior free safety Garrett Mayfield. Seniors Braden Vaughan, Blake Smith and Clements join Mayfield in the secondary, and seniors Leo Muniz and Bryan Vannatta, and juniors Ricky Burns, Michael Johnson, Zac Morgan and Aaron Vaughan shore up the defensive front.

The Wolverines (2-0 and

still unscored upon) extended their winning streak to 14 straight dating back to last season by using a mix of runs and passes to keep the Mustangs off balance. Braden Vaughan threw for two TDs and ran for another and junior fullback Zane Anderson scored twice on runs of 10 and 20 yards.

The offense returned five starters including senior center Bryan Vannatta, right guard Logan Brown,

receiver Garrett Mayfield, quarterback Braden Vaughan, and running back Johnny Serrano. Seniors Tony Clements and newcomer Chris Phillips, and juniors Zac

Morgan, Aaron Vaughan, Michael Johnson, and Zane Anderson are the remaining starters. Senior Blake Smith, junior Ricky Burns, and sophomore Justin Garrison also see

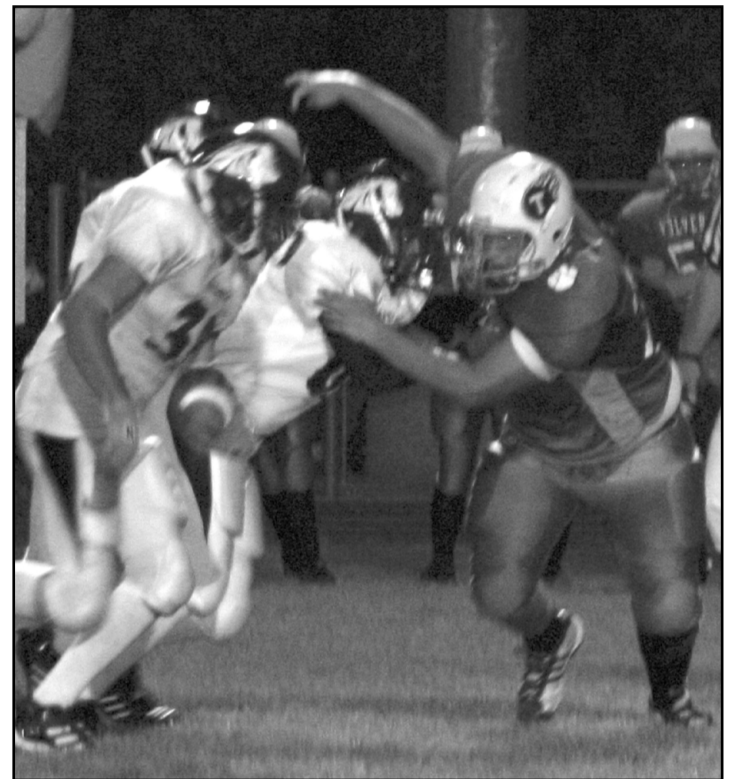
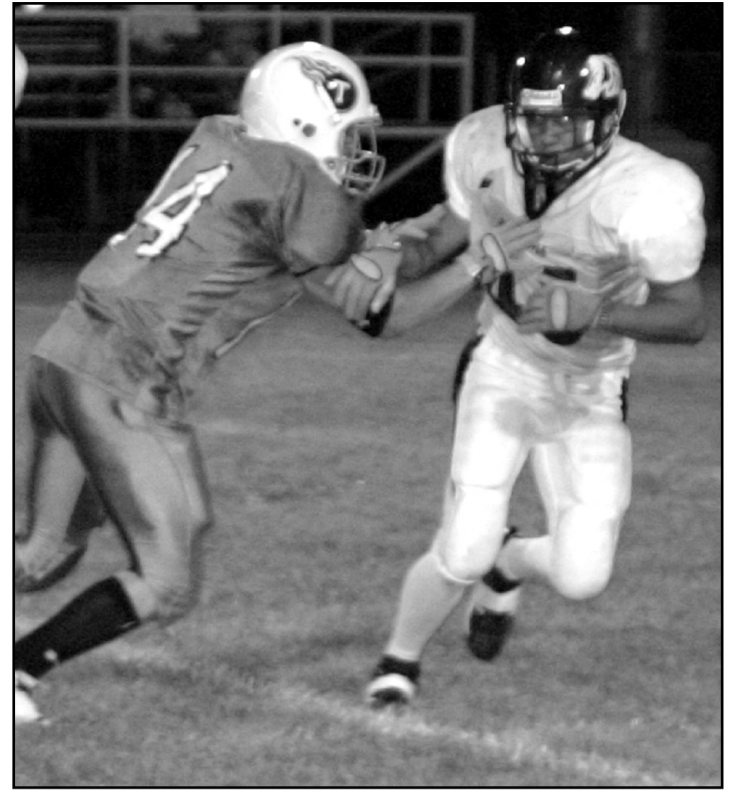

punt when the Wolverine defense clamped down. Texico started on the Bovina 26 yard line and 10 plays later QB Vaughan found Clements in the back of the end zone for a 10-yard score. The drive was highlighted by runs of 17 and 35 yards by Phillips and 11 yards by Serrano. The score was 7-0.

The Mustangs moved the ball into Wolverine territory on good runs by Segovia and Josh Shelby, but they stalled on the Texico 29 yard line when Serrano stopped the running back for no gain on 4th down. The Wolverines committed their first turnover on a fumble, giving Bovina good field position on the Texico 48. The Mustangs couldn't capitalize after gaining only 1 yard on 3 attempts highlighted by a tackle for no gain by Brown.

Both teams traded possessions before the Wolverines scored again on a 10-yard run by Anderson, set up by runs of 31 and 20 yards by Phillips. At the 6:28 mark in the 2nd quarter, the score was 14-0.

Texico scored quickly on their next possession on a 45-yard run by Vaughan making the score 20-0. Bovina was forced to punt again, giving the Wolverines the ball at the 48 yard line, but an interception by the Mustangs allowed them to try to score before halftime.

Bovina moved the ball to the Texico 38 yard line on a 40-yard pass completion from Casas to Kole McNary. But, on the next play, Clements intercepted the Casas pass at the goal line to end the half.

The Wolverines turned the ball over on a fumble to start the 2nd half, giving Bovina good field position

at the Texico 47 yard line. The Mustangs were able to move the ball down field on several good passes and draw plays, but the Wolverine defense came up big stopping Bovina on 4th down at the 4 yard line.

Texico quickly moved the ball across mid-field on big runs by Phillips of 26 yards and Serrano of 20 yards before the Mustang defense tightened, stopping the Wolverines on 4th and short at the 35 yard line.

Bovina went 3 and out thanks to a quarterback sack by Michael Johnson for a 5-yard loss. Clements returned the punt 15 yards to the 45 yard line and 5

plays later Anderson scampered in from 20 yards out for his second TD of the night. Justin Garrison set up the TD with a 20-yard run of his own. With 10:35 left in the game, the score was 26-0.

On the Mustangs' next possession, Muniz hit the running back hard forcing him to fumble and Brown recovered it. Texico took over on the Bovina 16 yard line and took advantage quickly with Vaughan finding Ricky Burns open in the end zone making the score 32-0 with 9:42 to go in the game.

The Mustangs struck back with a 27-yard strike from Casas to Alfie Espinoza, but Clements

intercepted the next pass from Casas, giving the Wolverines another chance to score. Texico moved the ball down to the Bovina 13 yard line on passes from Vaughan to Phillips of 7 yards, and Vaughan to Mayfield of 14 and 17 yards. But, the Wolverines fumbled on the next play to end the drive and the game.

Bovina (0-2) proved to be a worthy opponent for the Wolverines gaining 211 yards and 10 first downs. If the Mustangs can stay healthy, they have a good chance of contending in district.

The Wolverines rolled up 447 yards of total offense, 387 yards rushing and 56 yards passing. Phillips finished with 132 yards rushing while Serrano, who is nursing a groin injury and didn't play last week, finished with 111 yards. Vaughan went 4 of 6 for 56 yards passing and rushed for 73 yards.

Texico has next week off which will give them plenty of time to prepare for their next opponent, the Clayton Yellowjackets, who will show up at the Field of Hopes and Dreams at 7 p.m. on Sept/ 17th. We hope to see you there.

LIVE CATTLE: The market was somewhat surprised when cash trade took place at \$80 this week. Early in the week, the markets were showing significant strength compared to last week and then basically collapsed on Wednesday. Weaker beef demand and higher weights seemed to weigh on the market. Also news that Japan has reverted back to testing every head for BSE was negative.

FEEDER CATTLE: Softer sales across the country also added pressure to board prices. Up until now, feeders have held their own because they have had the Cash Feeder Index to hold the market together. Rumors that many feed yards have cattle already contracted and are beginning to back out of sales was the main reason for the weakness this week. Look for a bottom by mid October?

CORN: After turning up early in the week, prices dropped on news that the likelihood of an early freeze was taken out of the 6-10 day forecast. There are still some concerns that cool, wet weather which crossed the Midwest a couple of weeks ago may have already done significant damage to overall yields? A drop of 300 million bushels would place ending stocks near lowest levels seen in the last 29 years.

SOYBEANS: The market was also caught up in the "early freeze scare" this week. There are still reports that the crop is behind and still vulnerable to any early drop in temperatures. For now, prices have pulled back and will be watching the weather closely over the next couple of weeks.

WHEAT: The market got a boost from the rest of the grain complex this week, but also fell with the rest of the market. Traders are still waiting for something positive to come out of the export picture. Concerns about wet weather in the Spring Wheat areas have helped to hold prices off their contract lows. The seasonal tendency is for higher prices into the end of this year.

COTTON: Prices jumped higher on news based on Hurricane Frances heading toward the Southeastern U.S. this week. Although prices have already factored into the market anticipated damage, the market will change over the next few days based on the direction and actual damage this storm may cause. Long term trends are up and the seasonals are strong into September.

This year, I like the Philadelphia Eagles.

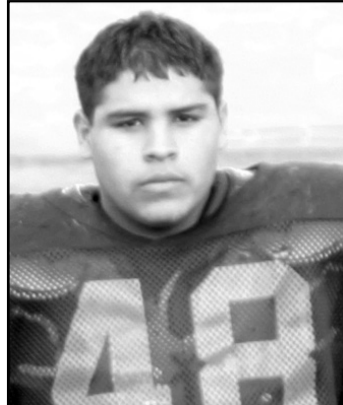
As for the Cowboys, it will be a vastly interesting season. I look for a lot of close games like last year.

quarter when Cuevas hit Adam Pierce with an 8-yard pass that ended in paydirt.

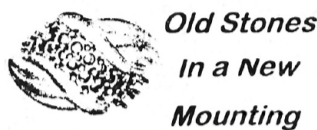
Then came the injuries. But Lazbuddie still led 14-6 at halftime.

over Pudd Wiseman; District 5, Nelson Carlisle over John Tucker and Mark Lowe; and District 7, Raymond Lewis over Leesa Davis.

Nichols has served on the board since 1992; Carlisle since 1985, and Lewis since 1988.

David Marricle, co-op president/CEO, said in his report:

"I am pleased to report that Bailey County Electric's net margin in 2003 was \$527,561, up by almost \$483,000 from 2002. The net value of your electric plant increased from \$17.3 million to \$17.7 million and member equity remained steady at 41 percent of total assets.

"Residential sales were relatively unchanged while commercial sales were down, due primarily to less cotton being ginned in the

service area last year. However, irrigation sales were up considerably helping to improve our operating margins over the past year.

"After 16 years without a change in the base rate, we found it necessary to increase rates by an average of 4 percent, starting March 1, 2004."

Board Chairman Darrell Stephens, of Oklahoma Lane, noted:

"This past year, it became necessary to raise rates and rework the whole rate structure for the good of the co-op as a whole. These changes proved beneficial for some while at the same time not so beneficial for others. The unusual amount of summer rainfall has reduced the amount of irrigation that the income of the co-op has suffered. On the positive side, the crops of

the area are looking great which gives a much brighter look for the local economy.

"The additions of several large dairies in the area bring added membership and income to the co-op."

Former Lazbuddie student Rob Martin gave a report on his participation in the co-op's rural electric youth tour to Washington, D.C. An article by Martin

will appear in next week's State Line Tribune.

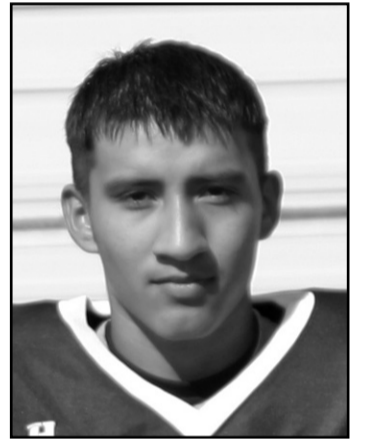
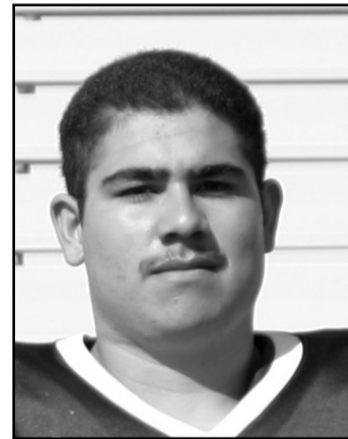
Who are the survivors?

If the task was late and did not follow the rules, that student was "voted off", and did not "survive."

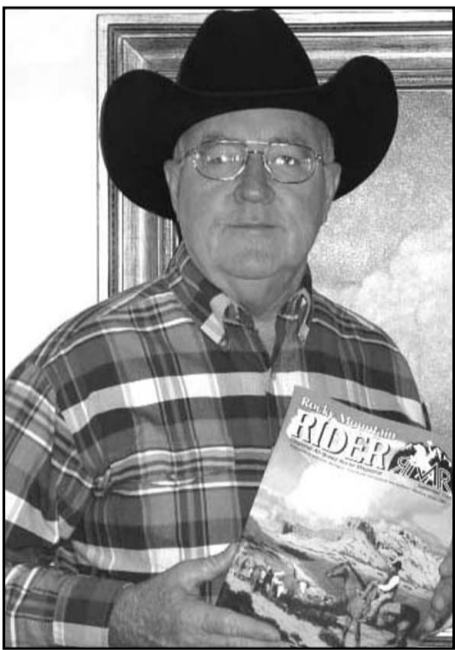

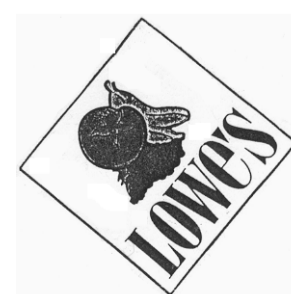
