## Farwell School Board Lets Silvas Re-Enroll

Farwell School Board conducted a special called meeting Monday night to discuss the controversial question of whether to allow students to attend local schools if they live out of the state.

The controversy arose when Dr. and Mrs. Robert Silva and their sons, Bobby and Elcio, moved to Clovis; however, they still wanted the boys to attend Farwell Schools.

Two other families had faced this same predicament, but reluctantly enrolled their children elsewhere once the regulation became apparent to them. However, the Silvas petitioned the School Board to reconsider the issue.

Several members of the Farwell Hospital District Board also met with school board members Monday night to voice their support of Silva's request.

The problem stems from state regulations which do not allow state funds to pay for the educational costs of children not living in the school district. Gilbert Kaltwasser, school board president, said that the present yearly cost of education is \$2070 per student, of which the state pays 45 percent.

Therefore, for every student who attends Farwell Schools, but does not live in the district, the school system loses approximately \$1000, Kaltwasser said.

After a lengthy and "tough" discussion, the school board decided to allow the Silva boys to re-enroll if Silva would provide a letter of intent proving that they intend to move back to Farwell. The

letter of intent must be presented now; however, by the February meeting of the Board, Silva must have shown sufficient progress in establishing legal residence in Farwell to comply with the Board's resolution.

However, Kaltwasser emphasized that the board's decision was not just a one-time exemption for a single family. He said the new rule would also apply to anyone who can show proof of the intent to move to Farwell by the end of the second quarter.

The letter of intent can be provided through legal proceedings stating that the parent or guardian intends to buy, rent or build a home in Farwell with intention of living here, Kaltwasser explained.

He went on to say that "for the sake of harmony in the community" the Board made the decision Monday night. Kaltwasser said some board members were still opposed to the change because it appeared to be giving special privileges to some without granting them to all.

The resolution passed stated, "that Dr. Silva's children be permitted to re-enter school, but Silva must show proof at the February 5 Board meeting that he has progressed sufficiently to establish legal residence in this community or his children will not be permitted to enter school the last quarter beginning February 26. A letter of intent to comply must accompany his children's registration."

In addition, the Board passed a motion stating that "the above mentioned resolution pertains to all persons

who will move into the community."

Prior to ultimately passing the above resolution the Board had earlier in the evening made a motion to charge tuition of \$500 per student for the school year. However, the motion failed to pass because some Board members felt that it would "cater to the rich."

### To Close For Holiday

Otis McMillan, Farwell postmaster, said no rural deliveries will be made that day, but that the mail would probably be boxed.

## Communities Come To Aid Of Texico Family In Need

Three months ago, Gary Cain, a 14-year old freshman at Texico High, was eagerly awaiting the opportunity to begin a full year of football and basketball. Now, the

prospects of ever being able to participate in sports has become a hopeless dream.

Gary, the son of Mrs. Pat Cain of Texico and Weldon Cain of the Rhea Community, is scheduled to undergo extensive surgery sometime around the middle of October in the Khiva Shriners Hospital in Houston.

In late August, Gary's problem was diagnosed as scoliosis, or severe curvature of the spine, by a local doctor and by a specialist in Lubbock. Then, Gary was sent to Houston where specialists confirmed the diagnosis and recommended a spinal fusion, as the only method of correction.

"Without the surgery, the doctors tell us that Gary will be extremely deformed by the time he is 16," Mrs. Cain said. Serious family illness is no

stranger to the Cain family though. A twenty-month old son, Larry Wayne, died 18 years ago from a brain tumor. Ricky, an older brother, underwent surgery twice to remove a rare type of cataract from his eyes, and Randy, Gary's oldest brother, recently had to have knee surgery.

Gary also has an older sister, Cindy McCormick, who lives in Lubbock; a sister, Pam, who is a senior at Texico High; and a younger brother, David, an eighth grader in Texico Junior High.

Although Gary's problem did not become obvious until August, it is actually due to a birth defect, said Mrs. Cain. The family's insurance, which became effective in September, will not cover the extensive costs because the condition was a pre-existing

one. However, as word of Gary's misfortune began to spread last week throughout the communities of Texico and Farwell, the bleak financial prospects facing the family began to brighten.

After learning of the Cains' predicament, a member of the Texico First Baptist Church, Jimmy Walker, contacted one of the Khiva Shrine members in Texas. Within a short time, representatives from Amarillo came to Texico and visited with Mrs. Cain. Soon afterwards, the Shriners notified Mrs. Cain that they will be responsible for the estimated \$6,000 surgery and hospital expenses.

Even though the major medical expenses will be covered by the Shriners, the multitude of other expenses already incurred, travel ex-

penses, (Gary and his mother have had to fly to Houston twice already for tests and x-rays), and expenses related to his post-operative care, still faced the family. That is when the Texico-Farwell communities went into action.

On Sunday evening, the Texico Baptist Church and the Forrest Heights Baptist Church in Clovis, took up love offerings for the Cains.

On Monday, various classes at Texico Junior High and High School quickly went into action and planned several fund-raising projects. As soon as school was out on Monday, members of the freshman class made a door-to-door drive in Texico and Farwell and collected \$326.30 in a short period of time. On Tuesday morning, the freshman boys challenged the freshman girls to a volleyball game. Students

from all grades watched as the boys won two games and the girls won two games; the gate receipts netted another \$211.42 for the Gary Cain fund.

Numerous other activities are also in the planning stages that will be conducted throughout the remainder of the school year.

The eighth graders are sponsoring a baked goods sale in the junior high this week and next week. Seventh graders are planning a garage sale, and a basketball game between freshmen and eighth graders is also being planned. Other groups are making plans for different activities, too.

Within a few days (actually less than one week), the Gary Cain Trust Fund established at the Citizens Bank of Texico has grown to almost \$1800, reports Jimmy Walker. Con-

tributions from the Texico student body, the two churches, the Texico Chamber of Commerce, the Kiwanis, and numerous businessmen and individuals in the Texico-Farwell communities have helped the fund.

The funds will be used to pay Mrs. Cain's expenses while she is staying in Houston with Gary. They will also be used to pay for several airplane trips that will be necessary for Gary and his mother to make to and from Houston for his continued treatment. Mrs. Cain, who is a waitress at K-Bob's Restaurant in Clovis, will be off work for at least six weeks during the earliest stages of Gary's confinement. Part of the funds will be used to defray normal living expenses that Mrs. Cain's income is always used

## Sheriff's Dept. Investigates Thefts

Parmer County Sheriff's Department officers have been investigating the theft of several batteries, reports Sheriff Charles Lovelace.

Six batteries were taken from an irrigation well located on the Kit McClaren farm seven miles south of Bovina. Another battery was taken from a truck on the Oakley Stevenson place one mile west of Bovina.

Lovelace also reported they are holding two Amarillo residents for allegedly attempting to pass forged drug

prescriptions for a controlled substance at Rose Drug in Farwell. David Wright, 22, and Bely Hightower, 31, were bound over for grand jury action and bond was set at \$3000 each.

Lovelace said that Rose reported the incident to the sheriff's office and that the suspects were subsequently arrested two miles east of Farwell on Highway 84. The drugs have been recovered. The prescriptions were allegedly forged on a doctor in Memphis, Lovelace said.

Houston physicians have told Gary that he will be hospitalized for about two weeks following the surgery, then he will be totally immobilized for an additional three months at home. After three months, he will be allowed to sit up and walk for short periods of time, and in approximately five months he may be able to return to school. Gary must remain in a full body cast for nine months following the surgery, and it is possible that he may have to wear a back brace for several months after that. Complete recovery is expected to take over a year, but contact sports will never again be possible.

With the help of a home-bound teacher, Gary plans to continue his studies at home as soon as possible. He is also optimistic about the surgery and the lengthy recuperation period. The quiet, cheerful teenager told his mother, "With all of these friends, I shouldn't miss football and basketball too much, should I?"

Mrs. Cain added, "Without the help of so many kind people, I don't know how we could possibly have managed. We appreciate the help so much."

I went to Houston only to find out he needed an expensive operation. All the way back I had a dejected attitude.

I got back to Texico, told a friend who told Bro. Joel Horne about my problem. Brother Joel told Jim Walker and Jim Pierce. They got on the phone and started trying to find help.

On Thursday evening about 7:30 Jim Walker called his brother in Texas who is a Shriner. At 8:30 Jim had me

## Farwell City Marshal's Report

Farwell City Marshal Ronnie Mitchell recently attended a Texas Narcotics Officers Association Meeting. He reported that one of the main topics of discussion was the new bill which Texas has concerning organized crime.

Mitchell asks all Steer fans not to double park along Sixth Street and Avenue H during home games. He says there is ample parking space south of the bus barn.

He also reports that he has given several warnings for people exceeding the 15 MPH speed limit around the schools, adding that since people have now had enough time to "Get used" to the new ordinance he will start issuing citations.

According to Mitchell, he has received several complaints pertaining to dogs running loose. He said stray animals will be picked up and that the pound fee is \$7.50 plus the cost of feeding.

Mitchell said that Doug Landrum is the city's dog catcher, adding that he also has the power to issue citations for infractions of the city's ordinance.

Bullock said Enforcement Officer Benito Rocha will meet with local taxpayers at the Parmer County Courthouse from 2 to 4 p.m.

"If Farwell-area merchants, or anyone else for that matter, have any questions about state taxes or need help in preparing tax forms, Mr. Rocha will be there to assist them," Bullock said.

"We're trying to cut the red tape in this office and we believe these face-to-face sessions with taxpayers help do just that," he added.

Bullock reminded those taxpayers who are unable to meet with his representative on October 10 that they can still get their questions answered quickly by calling his TOLL-FREE tax information number in Austin. That number is 1-800-252-5555.

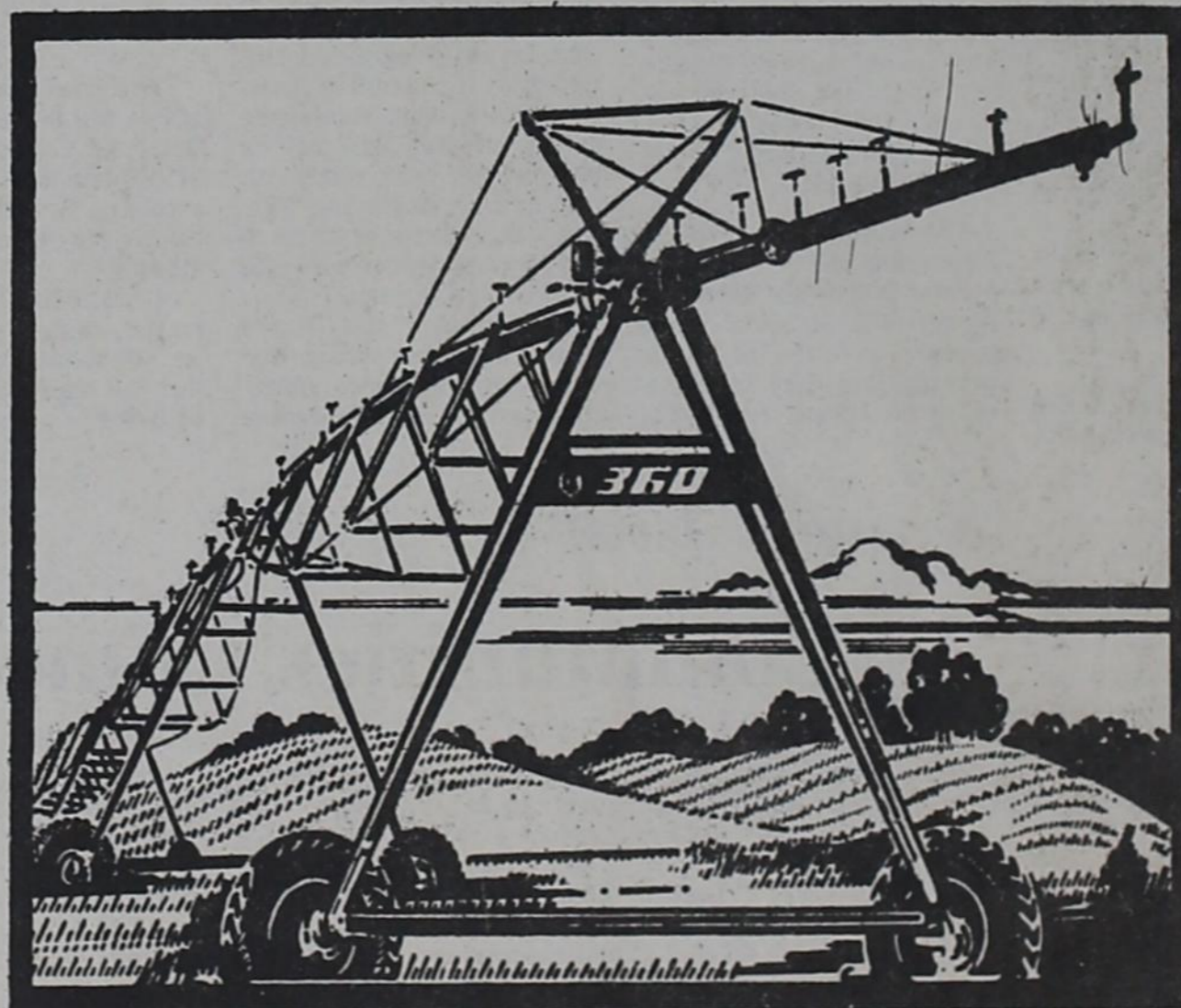
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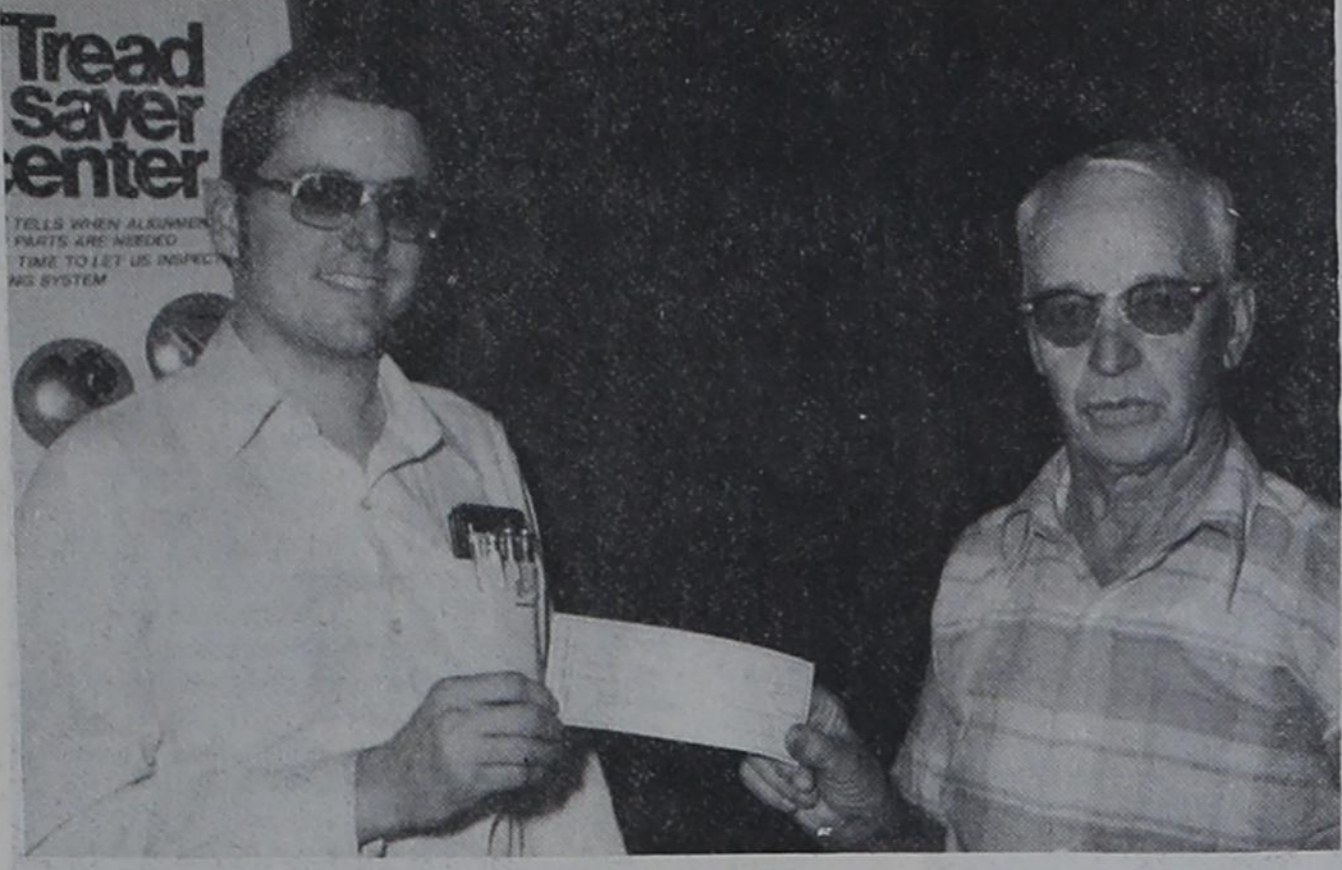

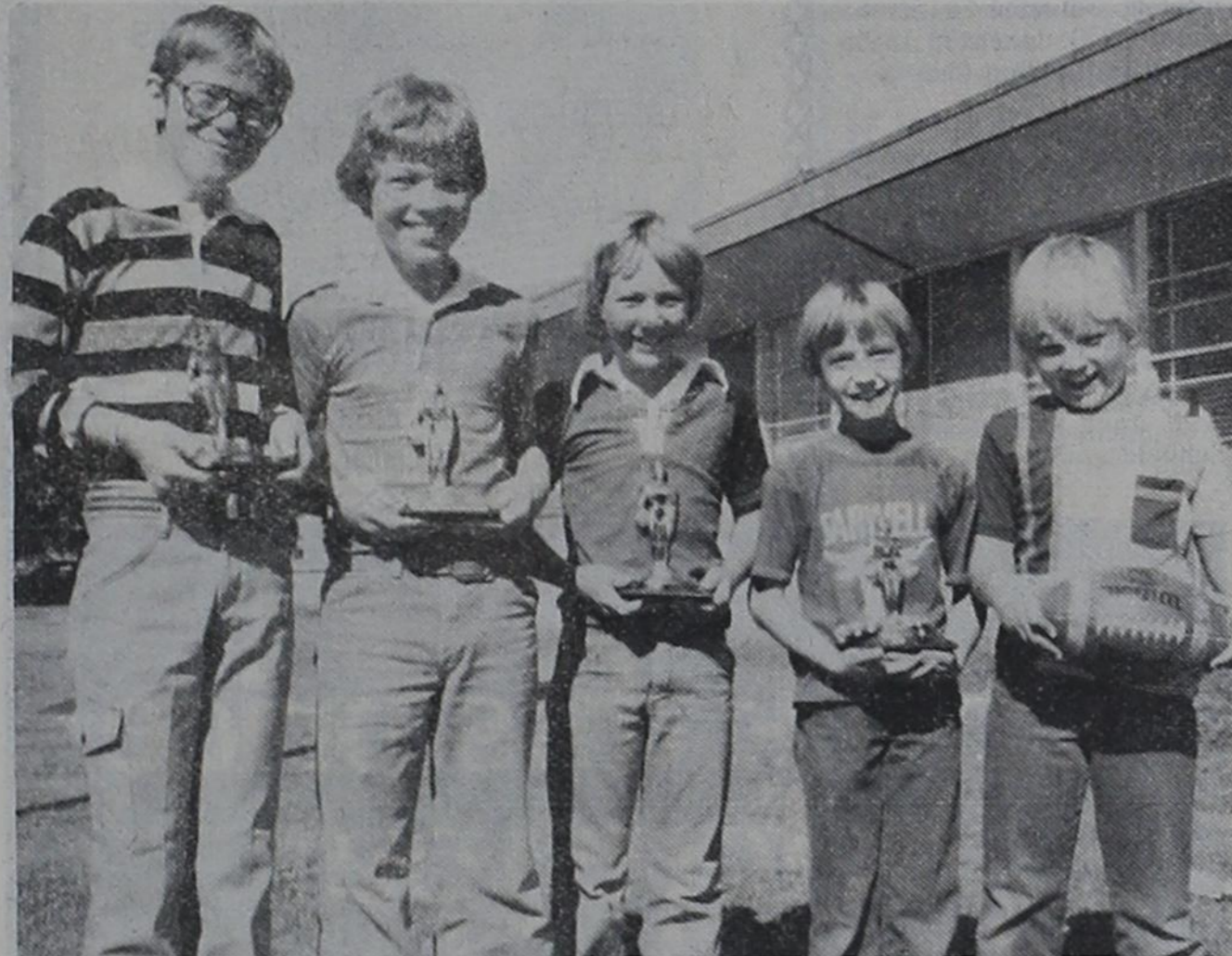

Also, pork counters now offer a wide range of cuts and more attractive prices as the seasonal supply increases, she says.

Mrs. Clyatt is a consumer marketing information specialist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, The Texas A&M University System.

This week's price-quality trends include the following:

POULTRY - Best values are found on whole birds and mixed parts. Medium-size eggs usually are best egg buys.

FRESH VEGETABLES - Cooking greens such as mustard, collards and turnip tops are good quality and attractively priced.

In addition, carrots, cabbage, broccoli, corn, squash, dry yellow onions and potatoes

are worthy of consideration, price-wise.

DAIRY - Look for features on a variety of cheeses, sour cream and yogurt.

PORK - Featured items include several cuts for roasting, such as fresh picnic, Boston butt and loin-end roast. Other considerations include quarter-loin cut into chops, shoulder steaks and pork liver. Smoked features include semi-boneless hams, bacon and frankfurters.

FRESH FRUITS - Red and Golden Delicious apples are now in largest supply and prices are trending downward slightly. Both peach and nectarine supplies are winding down, although they are still available.

Plums, prunes, grapes, bananas, pears and cantaloupes are generally found at moderate price levels.

GROCERY MARKET AISLES - Check prices on peanut butter, cooking oil and bread.

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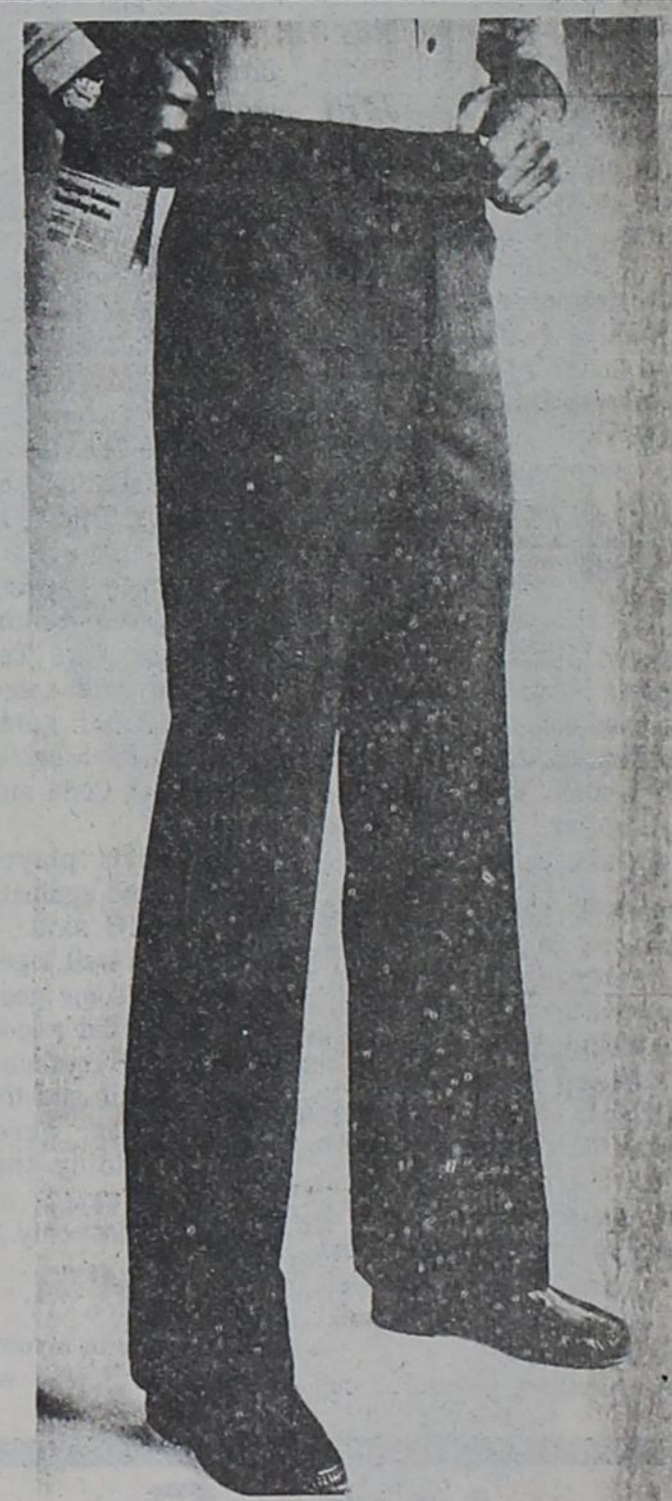
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Offense Strikes Again - -

Texico Wolverines soundly clipped the wings of the Corona Cardinals Friday night, 63-8. The victory ups the Green and White record to 2-0 in District 2-A play and 3-1 for the season.

**ASLEEP IN A STORM**

What a disappointing scene! A terrifying storm, souls in danger of death, but Jonah, the man of God, is sleeping!

Sailors are not soon frightened in a storm, but this time the fury of the gale was so great that "the ship was like to be broken" and even the sailors were driven to their knees "and cried every man to his god" (Jonah 1:4,5).

Can it be that Jonah, the only man aboard who knew the true God, was sleeping? Sleeping in such a storm? Sleeping while souls were perishing? This was the shameful truth, and not one of us would blame the terrified captain for rudely awakening him and crying: "What meanest thou, O sleeper? Arise, and call upon thy God!" (Ver. 6).

But let us not be too ready to condemn Jonah, for we may be more guilty than he. Surely the world today is passing through a fearful storm and souls all about us are in peril of their lives. If they do not accept God's way of salvation; if they do not trust in Christ, they will perish. And what are we doing about it? Are we pleading for them in prayer? Are we doing what we can to reach them for Christ? Or are we fast asleep?

"What meanest thou, O sleeper? Arise and call upon thy God!" And when you have cried to God in behalf of your unsaved relatives, friends, business associates, He will send you to witness to them of Christ and His love. Not until you have talked to God about them will you be ready to talk to them about God.

Politically, morally, spiritually, the night is dark, the storm is raging and souls are perishing, but "God, who commanded the light to shine out of darkness, hath shined in our hearts" (11 Cor. 4:6). "...we are not of the night, nor of darkness. Therefore let us not sleep as do others" (1 Thes. 5:6,6).



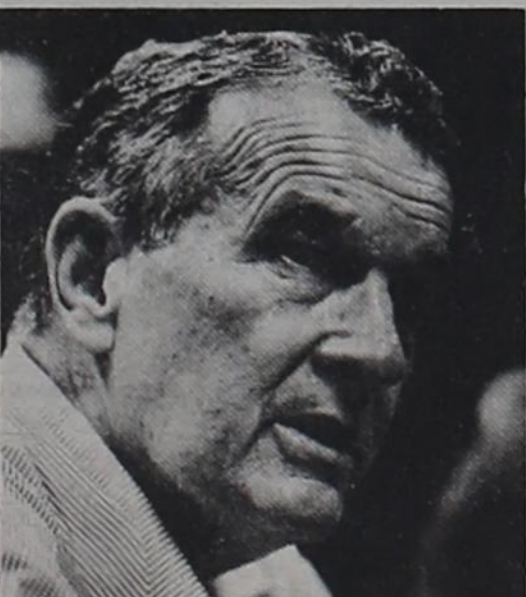
