# A study in patriotism

By Teresa Mesman "Patriotism" is defined as "love for and devotion to one's country" by the dictionary. Some add words and phrases like "fervent love for and extreme devotion to one's country."

Patriotism is more than just waving the flag, wearing the colors and reciting the Pledge of Allegiance. It's a simple definition, but it becomes multi-faceted when discussed. It is also a term that is sadly being warped and pushed away in a sea of societal issues, doubt, fear, and in the black hole of what is considered "politically correct."

Throughout history, there have been times when patriotism and love of country were non-issues. Most Americans

did what it took to stand by America in a time of crisis. Carrie Anderson, of Farwell, was one such American that stepped up to the plate to help after the bombing of Pearl



Harbor on Dec. 7, 1941.

Carrie was born in Purcell, Okla., in 1921. Her father worked in the oil and gas manufacturing industry. Hard work and simple pleasures enjoyed with her parents and younger brother saw them all through uncertain times, like the Great Depression. She graduated from high school one year early in 1938.

She set off to Gulfport, Miss., to attend Gulf Park College, an all-girls school. "It was here I was supposed to learn what fork to use!" Carrie laughed.

She returned to Oklahoma and enrolled in Oklahoma University. She declared a major in Business and set forth to fully enjoy the life of a col-

lege student.

Then Pearl Harbor took place and her college days were over.

Carrie immediately enlisted in the Army. Because women were not being enlisted for front line service, she was placed as a private in the Women's Army Auxiliary Corp. (WAAC). She was sent to Monticello, Ark., for three months of basic training. This camp eventually became a Prisoner of War camp for the Army.

Following basic, Carrie was accepted into Officer Candidate School (OCS) at Des Moines, Iowa. Here, Carrie learned military customs, rifle instruction and range shooting and long hours of military drilling.

"We learned to shoot those rifles from the prone position - on our stomachs lying on the ground," Carrie commented. She was at OCS for about 5 months and graduated on July 19, 1942, with the rank of 2nd Lieutenant.

The WAAC was originally meant to only be an auxiliary of the Army without military status. The organization was begun by the Edith Rogers, a Congresswoman from Massachusetts. She introduced a bill in 1941 that was passed the next year.

Oveta Culp Hobby was the first WAAC director, and five training centers opened within a year.

Because the WAAC had no military status, Cong. Rogers introduced another bill in 1943 to enlist and appoint women in the U.S. Army. This bill was signed by President Roosevelt on July 1, 1944, and the WAAC was replaced by the Women's Army Corps (WAC). Oveta Culp Hobby had been given the rank of Colonel and she continued as the Director of the WAC.

Even without military status, the WAAC had been stationed throughout the world and theaters of conflict. The first WAAC contingents were sent to Algeria and England. WAC's arrived in India in 1943, and in Australia and New Caledonia in 1944.

Carrie was not sent overseas, but was assigned to Harbor Defenses at Boston's Ft. Banks, HQ for Harbor Defenses. She worked in the payroll department.

"The soldiers received their pay twice a month from my office," Carrie explained. "The interesting thing was that back then, not one person was paid by check. They received their money in cash."

On pay days, Military Police would come to the office and get empty foot lockers and take them to the bank. At the bank, the lockers were loaded up with cash and coins and brought back under guard to her office. Carrie and the other payroll personnel would count out each soldier's pay and hand it to them in an envelope.

"I was also in charge of making the payment reports. I had to do so much paper work to make sure that each payment matched up to the right

troops, persons, and divisions," she explained.

Eventually, checks were used to pay the soldiers. A short time after this change, Carrie was transferred to oversee a WAC unit at Waltham Regional Hospital in Boston.

Ft. Banks also was the site of an Italian POW Camp. And Waltham was also a treatment site for Italian POW's and soldiers brought back to the States from front line combat.

Carrie served in the Army until the official end of World War II -- three years at Ft. Banks and at Waltham.

"Other than this little bit, there really isn't much to tell. I didn't do anything spectacular or special," Carrie stated.

This reporter begs to differ.

When asked if she enlisted for the Army with a group of friends, Carrie shook her head and said, "No, I did it all by myself."

This proves her to be a patriot and one of valiant character.

In a day and time when women were expected to marry early out of school and establish homes, Carrie chose to serve her country.

"I just couldn't see not doing what could be done after Pearl Harbor," Carrie recalled. "I wanted to get in there and fight the bad guys!"

The home front war effort that took place in the U.S. tends to be overlooked among many historians. The men and women of the Armed Forces stationed in U.S. military installations served a huge role in the American and Allied Force

cohesiveness and eventual dominance in World War II. Whether the service was behind a desk or behind a gun became inconsequential to the support and function of the military forces. Every person had their part and was proud to serve in them.

After the war, Carrie came to Texico to live with her parents. Her father had retired from the oil and gas business and had moved to our area to fulfill a lifelong dream. He had always wanted to own a movie theater. He purchased "The Border" theater in Farwell and "The Mustang" theater in Bovina.

Carrie went to work in the law offices of John and Sam Aldridge. In time, she met Bob Anderson, of Farwell. He had served in the Army in the 82nd Airborne. After the war, he returned to Texas A&M University, graduating in 1947. He moved home to work in the family banking business at Security State Bank.

The couple married in 1949. They reared four children, Bob Scott, Meredith, Will and Caroline.

Meredith was sadly killed in 1978. Will and his family live in Miami. Caroline and her family live in Richardson, Texas. Bob Scott and his family

live in Missouri.

Carrie is active in the First Baptist Church of Farwell and with a Bible Study group. She also has been involved in various civic groups over the years.

She is a devoted wife, mother, and grandmother and an avid Texas A&M fan.

"I do like OU, but when it comes to A&M, I've got a husband, son and three granddaughters that are all about A&M so I better love A&M!" she laughs

When asked how she feels about her years in the service, she quickly comments that she is proud to have served.

"If I had been a man, there would have been no question about my serving our country back then. I just never thought there should be any question about my serving as a woman then either," she stated. "I did what I was called to do at a time when our nation needed all the help they could get."

Carrie feels that she had a rewarding military career and she is in full support of our American military men and women that are in the Armed Forces today.

"Again, there should be no question as to what these brave men and women have been asked to do and we should support them in every way

possible," she emphatically stated.

"Everyone needs to be more patriotic, especially in this day and time," she added. "Our children need to be taught how to be more patriotic and what it truly means to support and cherish this great nation of ours."

## Let us always remember...

In 1918, on the eleventh hour of the eleventh day in the eleventh month, the world rejoiced and celebrated. After four years of bitter war, the Allied powers a signed a cease-fire agreement with Germany at Rethondes, France on November 11, 1918, bringing World War I to a close. The "war to end all wars" was over.

November 11, 1919 was set aside as Armistice Day in the United States, to remember the sacrifices that men and women made during World War I in order to ensure a lasting peace. On Armistice Day, soldiers who survived the war marched in a parade through their hometowns. Politicians and veteran officers gave speeches and held ceremonies of thanks for the peace they had won.

Armistice Day officially received its name in the United States in 1926 through a Congressional resolution. It became a national holiday 12 years later. Congress voted Armistice Day a federal holiday in 1938, 20 years after the war ended. But Americans realized that the previous war would not be the last one. World War II began the following year and nations great and small again participated in a bloody struggle. After the Second World War, Armistice Day continued to be observed on November 11.

In 1953 townspeople in Emporia, Kansas called the holiday Veterans' Day in gratitude to the veterans in their town. Soon after, Congress passed a bill introduced by a Kansas congressman renaming the federal holiday to Veterans' Day. Beginning in 1954, the United States designated November 11 as Veterans Day to honor veterans of all U.S. wars. 1971 President Nixon declared it a federal holiday on the second Monday in November.

Americans still give thanks for peace on Veterans' Day. There will be a ceremony at Farwell High School at 11:00 in the morning.

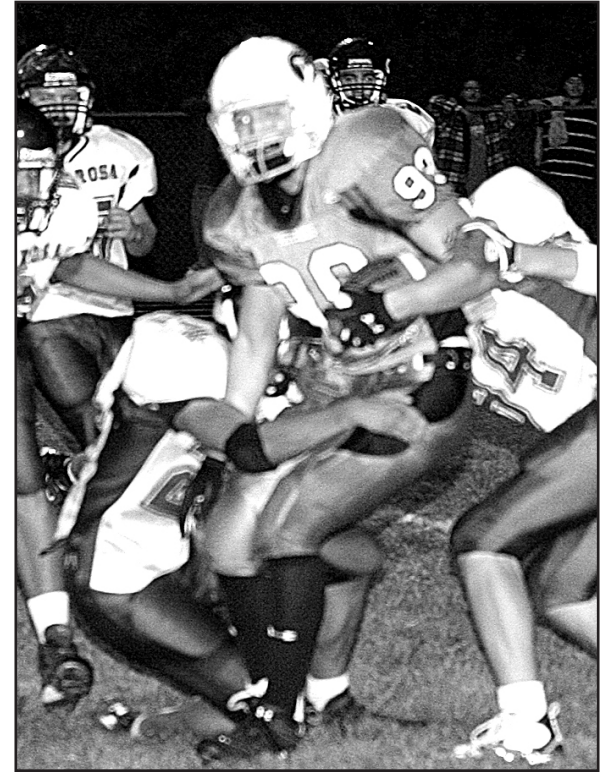
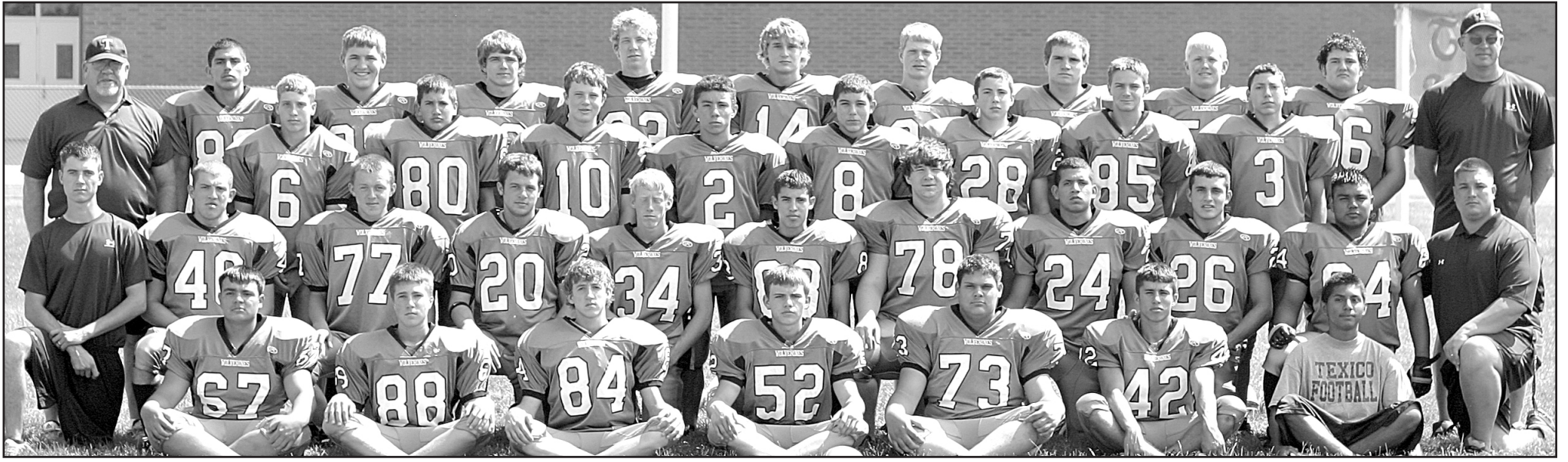

No. 5 - Allots city governments (under 10,000 population) to make pacts with property owners to limit taxes for five years (involving Texas Department of Agriculture programs): 246 yes, 125 no.

## Honoring veterans

I hope you and your children take the time to review the ads and themes in today's paper about Veterans Day.

To me, it is a vitally important holiday and the understanding of why it is held must be passed on to our youths.

I served three years in the U.S. Army during the Vietnam War, but was not sent to Nam. I was sent to the 3rd Infantry Division in Germany for two years, and with an Army - air defense unit stationed near New York City for eight months.

Thus, for two years I never set foot in the U.S.

At the time I served (1965-1968), there were anti-war demonstrations going on in the U.S. and while I respect everyone's

rights to their views, I feel that when a nation goes to war, it's the duty of its citizens to support that decision, whether it be right or wrong.

The decision to send troops to Nam in the fight against the Commies was correct, in my opinion. Unfortunately, the way we fought the war, from Washington, D.C., was the opposite.

As I pointed out in a column years ago, the mistakes we made in Nam were corrected in the 1st Gulf War. So when I note the horrifying errors our government has made during the current Iraqi situation, hopefully they will help us correct them when our next war arrives.

Since we are in a 100-year war with terrorists, I guarantee there will be more military actions coming down the road.

Like any veteran, I can tell my share of stories about my soldiering. But mine are not very pleasant, so I will skip them.

What is important is that we never forget the sacrifices our men and women have made for our nation during its history. The sol-

diers who died, or who were injured, or who gave up part of their lives, all must be remembered ... and honored.

I recognize that very few of our readers served in the military. Thus, it's hard for some folks to understand the impact of being in military service. Your armed service tenure may be short, but its memory stays part of you your entire life.

There were six of us assigned to the 3rd Infantry Division: Minthorn, Muenz, Peterson, Pomper, Praven

and Roemer.

You never forget.

I was never in combat, but knew many who were. It was most difficult.

Those men and women served our nation in the best of all ways, and Veterans Day is a day when each and every one of you should pick up the telephone and call someone you know who has served, or is still serving, and thank them for their sacrifice to keep our nation strong and protected.

That's right, every one of you.

2. Replacing leaky

pipelines

3. New center pivots replacing row irrigation covering 90 acres or more

4. New Drip irrigation systems replacing row irrigation covering 30 - 160 acres

5. New center pivot systems replacing row irrigation covering 60 - 90 acres

6. All other center pivots or drip irrigation systems

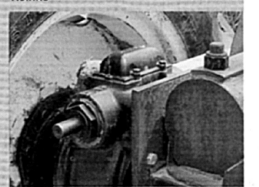

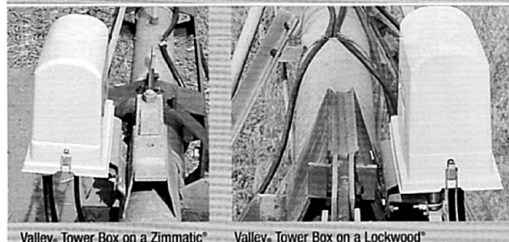

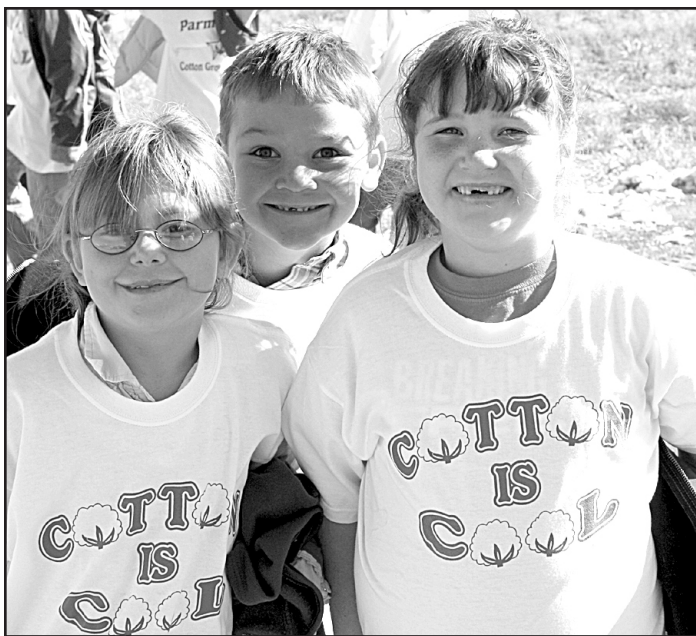

The Lazbuddie Longhorns lost to Samnorwood last Friday, 66-20, in a game halted due to the 45-point rule in the 2nd half.

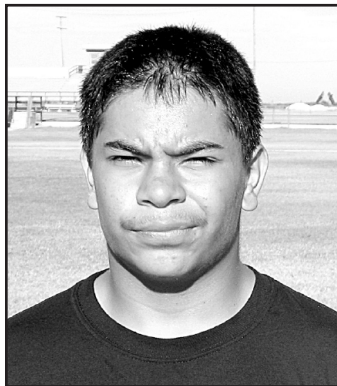
Coach Beau Thompson said his kids played hard.

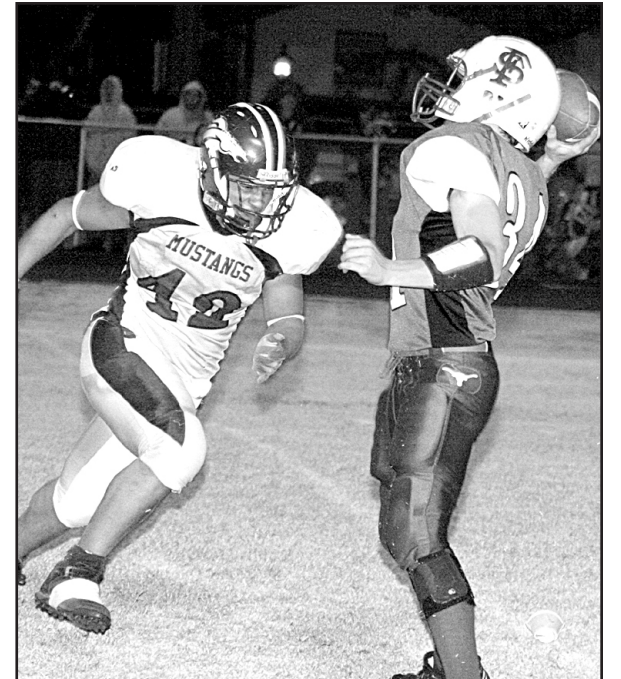
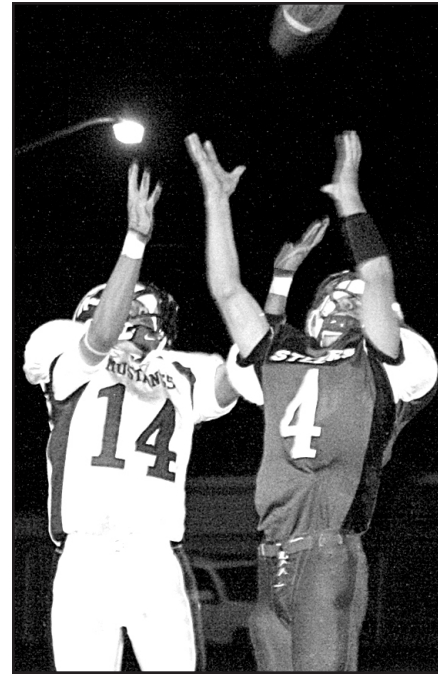
Farwell took over at its 35. A Ledbetter pass to Saenz gained 15, and Farwell 5, then scored from the 3 at 6:09. The
