"What's going on at The Tribune?"

That question has been asked us many times in recent weeks. The story in circulation has it that The Tribune, as a publishing and printing enterprise, is about to be transplanted to Friona. This rumor has no foundation in fact.

It is true that the writer of this column is investing in a newspaper plant in Friona, and it is also true that some of the work now necessary to get The Tribune out each week will be done in the new plant in Friona when it is completed. But the allegation that we are "killing" our business here is pure scuttlebutt.

Here's the deal: Two years ago the writer and a second party purchased the newspaper there. We disposed of the equipment at junk prices because that's just what it was. Since then we have had only an office in Friona. No building, no equipment. Just an office.

Now we are having a building built for us. We are buying equipment. This will give us an integrated operation in Friona. It also will enable us to have, we hope, some economics not possible the way we run things now.

Here at Farwell, the "home plant" of the Parmer County newspapers, we have utilized the space of our present building. We are still growing. We need more room. If you've visited our place within the last six months you'll agree—it's a mess.

Maybe, too, we'll be able to hire and keep competent personnel. It's not too surprising to see such hard work and a 60-hour week scare off likely prospects. We challenge ANYBODY in business to show they work their employees as hard as we do here. Something has got to give.

With this mess, we haven't been able to do justice to our employees and to our commercial or job printing, which is our "lame duck" sideline. If we succeed in streamlining our newspaper production, we will be able to develop our printing, much of which is now being grabbed off by Clovis, Lubbock, Plainview, Amarillo, and even Dallas and Austin.

We have not made an announcement of our plans for a variety of reasons. First, nothing has been firm. We have been feeling our way along and our plans have been changed drastically from what they were originally, already. There may be some more changing.

Secondly, we're still trying to shape up our new working force. Dolph Moten is the first component. He's one of the main cogs and we're real proud to be able to get him because we know he'll put out a good paper and build the community.

And we're shopping for a really qualified man to help us develop our printing business—which should be three times what it is now. We want to bring back Ronny Ferguson, who's doing a stretch with Uncle Sam right now. He is due out soon, but hasn't decided whether he'll be back with us yet. We hope he'll come.

As for where this leaves the writer and his family, the future is pretty much of a question mark at the moment. It just depends... depends on how all of these loose ends tie together. You may count on us to pass the word along when we find out, though.

Meanwhile, Mrs. W. H. Graham will continue to own The Tribune, we will continue to be publisher. After the new plant in Friona begins to function, we will diversify our work, but the difference will be scarcely recognizable. All of the county's commercial printing will be kept here.

The bookkeeping and accounting departments will be kept here. If comparisons prove interesting, there will be a bigger payroll in Farwell than in Friona.

The only full-time employee who will be displaced will be Mary Ann Walls, who is now a Linotype operator for us. And we stand to lose her anyway. She plans to go to school this fall.

So, we hope that our readers will be comforted to know that The Tribune will continue to be locally owned, locally edited and published newspaper, and its interests in continuing to promote and develop the things that make for a better community will continue undiminished.

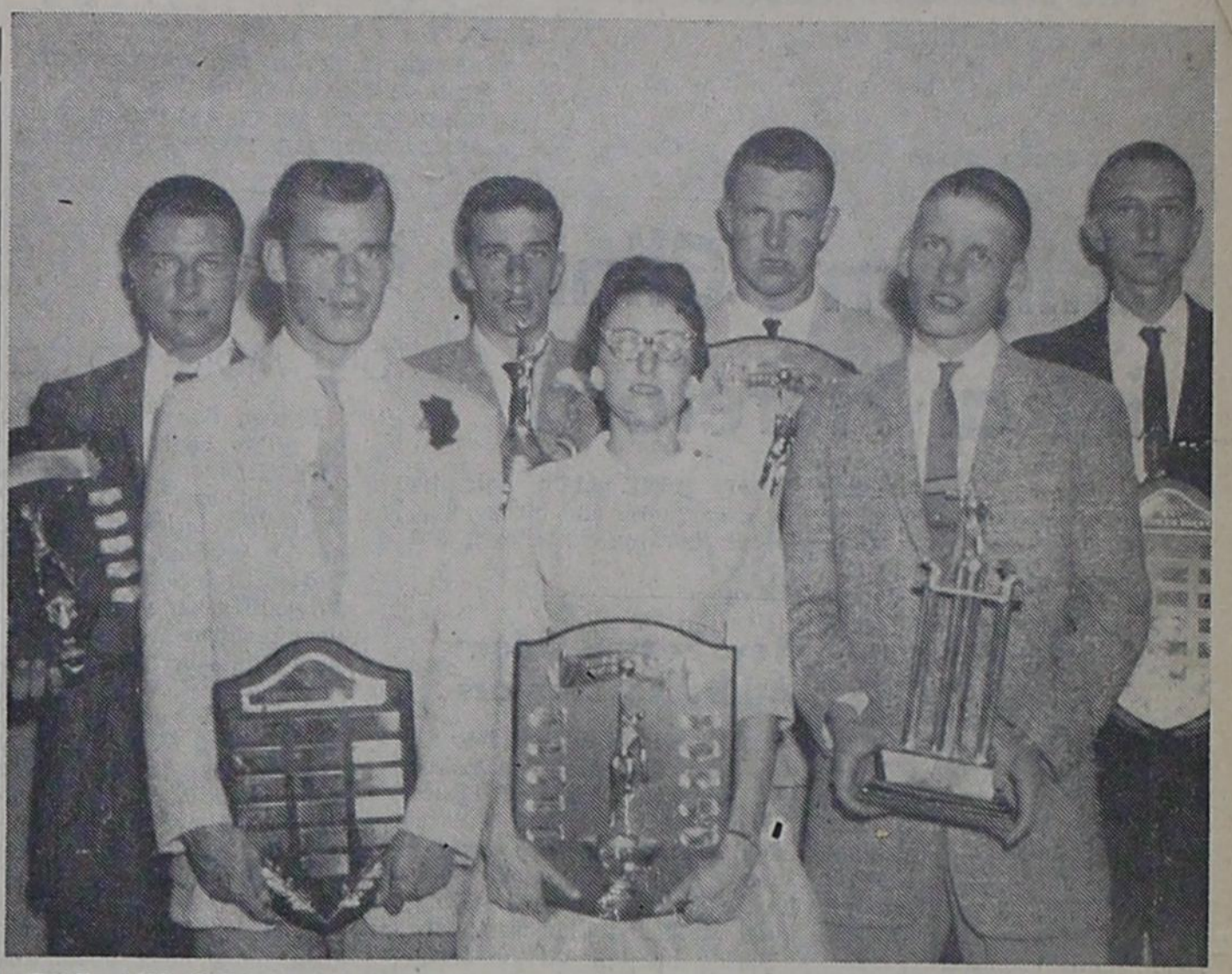
Miss Mathews' salutatory was entitled "The First Part of Honor," and she emphasized that being deserving of honor

Dolph Moten Tribune Editor

Dolph Moten, who built The Bovina Blade from nothing to the second best weekly newspaper in Texas in two years, is taking the reigns of The Tribune in the capacity of editor. His duties begin today.

Publisher W. H. Graham Jr. in making the announcement, says "It is a genuine pleasure to welcome Dolph back to Parmer County and to Texico-Farwell." Graham and Moten began the Bovina newspaper as a partnership in 1956, and continued it until Moten sold his interest early this year.

At present the new editor is filling the same slot on The Olton Enterprise. Here, he will also be in charge of advertising. Moten will be remembered by many local business people inasmuch as he helped out in The Tribune advertising department previously when conditions here got "in a tight."

Moten replaces Jeanne Graham, who has been pinch-hitting in the editorial slot since Bob Clendennan, former Tribune editor, took over the Cannon Air Base newspaper two months ago.

This makes several times Mrs. Graham has "retired."

Les Means Wins Texico JP Post

The defeat of Sam Lewis as justice of the peace headlined local action in the New Mexico Democratic Primary Tuesday. State-wide races took a back seat to the Texico contest, which finished with Les Means, the challenger, ahead by a scant 10 votes. The tally was 79 to 89.

T. L. McLeod was unopposed for constable.

On the state and county scene, Texico voters went along with the other boxes. Incomplete returns put John Burroughs in the governor's seat and Dennis Chavez back in the senate as Democratic nominees. Briscoe West was re-elected sheriff.

Election officials say the turnout of 204 was very good. Judges were Mr. and Mrs. John Hadley and Charles McDaniel. Clerks were Walter Freeman, McLeod, and Mrs. W. J. Matthews.

People are reminded that Friday's warning will only be a practice one.

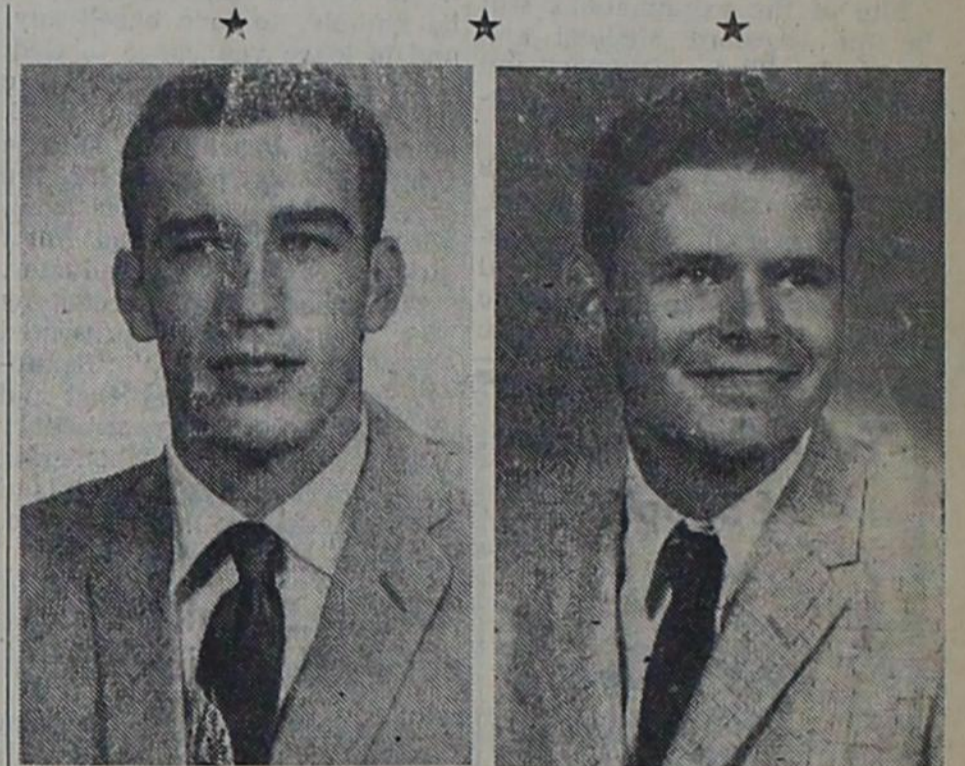
Percy Tipton Has Heart Attack

Farwell school officials released this week a list of 23 candidates for graduation from Farwell High School, at the end of the coming term. Two versatile young men were named as the honor students.

Larry Pike, son of Mr. and Mrs. C. S. Pike, tallied a grade average of 94.3793 for the valedictorian honor; and the salutatorian had an average less than one-half point below the top score. Truman McKillip, son of Mr. and Mrs. L. E. McKillip, is salutatorian with an average of 94.

Baccalaureate services are planned Sunday evening, May 18, at 8:15; and commencement will be May 23, at 8:30 in the evening. Both services are scheduled in the high school auditorium.

Pike has made an outstanding record as an athlete, having just returned from the state track meet where his record placed him high among the winners of state achievements. He lettered in football; served on the student council for four years and was vice-president the past year; attended Boys' State in Austin last summer; was editor of the school yearbook this year; was an all-district athlete; class president during his sophomore year and was a member of the junior play cast.

He was in the junior class play and was a librarian his freshman year.

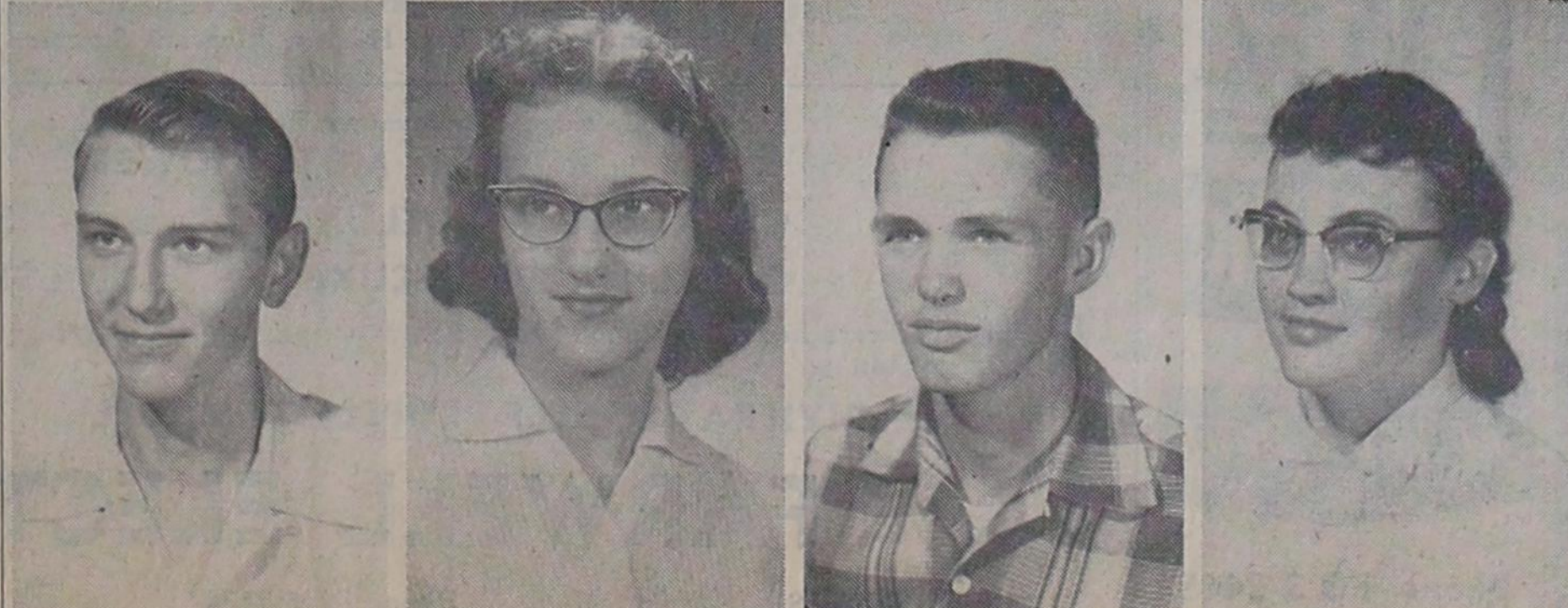
Miss Range has been active in music, and has been a member of the girls sextette. She

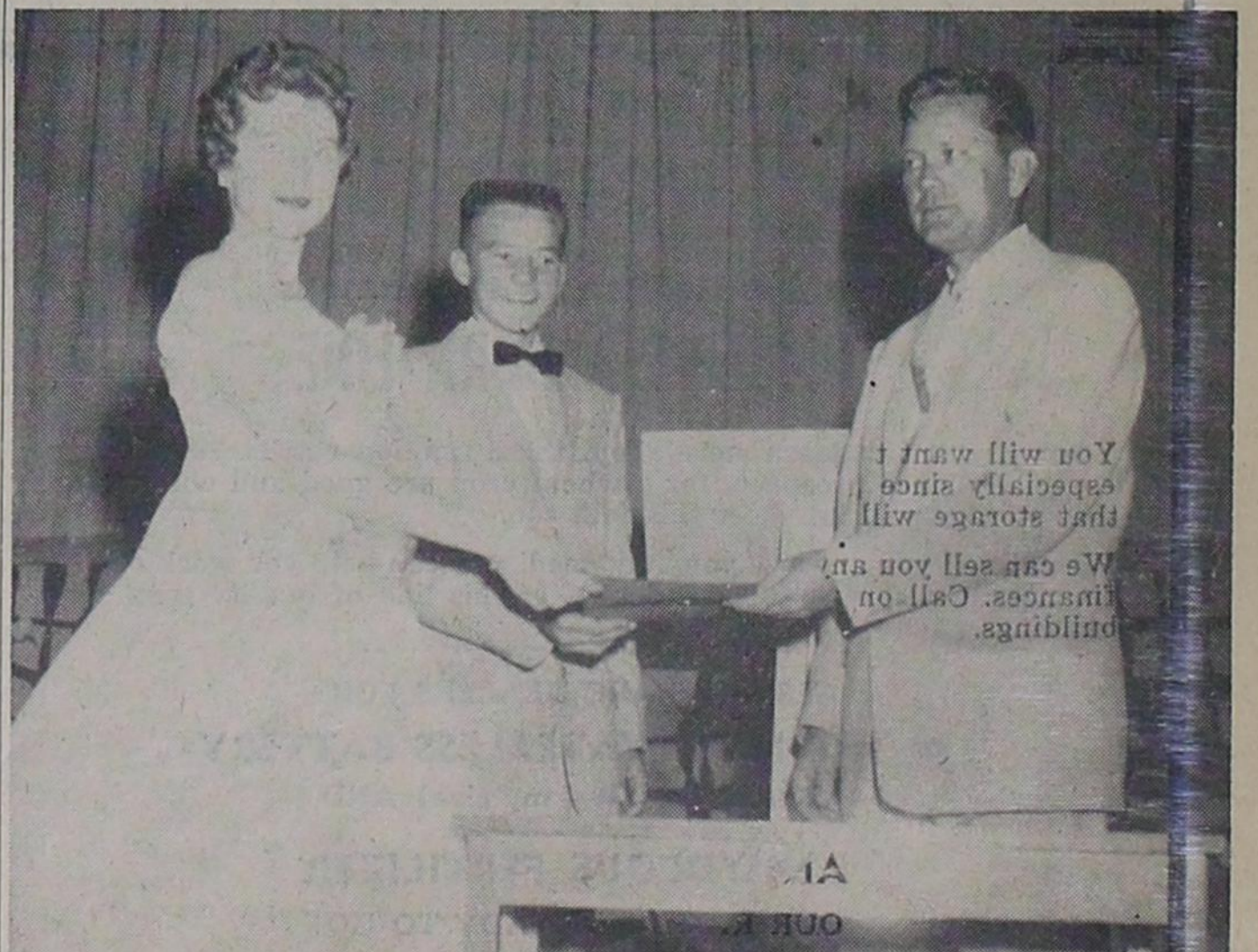
Williams is a member of the school band, worked on the annual staff the past year and will

Children's Clinic Set at Hereford

Featuring an outstanding number of medical specialists, the third annual free clinic for handicapped children in a seven-county area will be sponsored by the Hereford Oasis Shrine Club there May 17.

Children through 18 years of age will be examined by 20 doctors in 10 different fields, ranging from general physical examinations to neurosurgery.

According to Dr. L. B. Barnett, Oasis Shrine president, the clinic will examine children from Farmer, Bailey, Randall, Castro, Oldham, Swisher and Deaf Smith counties.

Purpose of the clinic will be examination and diagnosis of illnesses of children of all races, colors, creeds and economic status. The Oasis Shrine will help children of needy parents to enter regional or national hospitals for special treatment.

Site of the examinations will be the Hereford Medical and Surgical Clinic, Fourth and Miles. Twenty doctors are participating.

Registration will begin at 9 a.m.

The phases which will be covered in the clinic are general physicals, dental, orthopedic surgery, neuro-surgery, plastic

surgery (cleft palate, hair lip, etc.), ear, nose and throat, eye, speech therapy, cardiology, oral surgery.

HOW TO GET WHAT WE NEED
(A distinguished Texas judge offers pointers on combating our rapidly increasing juvenile delinquency problem.)

Texans like to brag — and we have much reason to be proud. But we can't brag about our facilities for handling juvenile delinquents. They're inadequate.

The state institutions are heavily overcrowded. There are no state parole officers for children released from them. Many counties have neither institutions nor parole officers.

While the Legislature provided for some additional facilities, the buildings will merely permit less crowding and replace unsafe structures. No more children will be accommodated. No probation officers were authorized.

You Can Get Them

There is, however, something that can be done, and it is up to us, the people, to do it.

Public officials respond to what the voters want. On the state level it is the Commissioners Court, and for the state the Legislature has the responsibility.

If there is strong enough public opinion favoring adequate facilities and probation officials, our representatives in county and state office will provide them.

Develop Public Opinion

Public opinion is something you can be a force in developing. Talk to your friends, your clubs, your church. Write your legislators, county commissioners, newspapers.

And if your county is too small to afford paid probation people, get volunteer ones, ministers, other people with character, yourself!

Sesam Acreage To Be Doubled In Parmer County

Sesame, the Old World crop transplanted to the Western Hemisphere's most productive agricultural region only four years ago, will probably double in acreage in the Parmer County area this year, and production is expected to increase by 100 percent also. This outlook is the prospect from checks with Parmer County's two handlers of sesame seed, Cummings Farm Store in Friona and Henderson Grain & Seed in Farwell. Last year, Parmer farmers harvested about 2,200 acres of sesame under the worst conditions that have prevailed since production was begun on a small scale in 1954. Sesame, like cotton, does well when the weather is warm and dry, it wasn't last season. The area produced 15 million pounds of sesame. F. Lokey, more than 10 years ago, had sold it for one-fourth of the total. Sesame, which is finding itself a good market as production rises each year. The southern and southwestern parts of the county will lead in sesame acreage this year. Sesame seems to do better in slightly sandier soils, and also it is difficult to get high grain sorghum yields in lighter lands, which has also encouraged sesame planting in this area. C. M. "Heinie" Henderson, Farwell sesame seed dealer, says there will be "between 2,500 and 3,000 acres" of sesame in his trade territory this year. Ennis Cummings of Friona says the central and north-eastern part of the county will plant about 1,500 acres to the crop, which will give the Parmer County area a total acreage of 4,000 or more. Billy Marshall of Bovina will again be the biggest grower. He will plant 600 acres near the Hub. The rebirth and development of sesame in America in at years is an amazing story which has already been told (Farm and Home). The sesame development is Parmer County's sesame story.

Two Spaniards Study Irrigation

Two representatives of the Spanish government visited in the Parmer County area during Monday of this week observing local irrigation practices. The two visitors, Dr. Antonio Hidalgo-Granados and Dr. Juan Antonio Valentin-Gamazo, are both agricultural engineers in their country and are visiting many irrigation areas in the Southwest. They left the Hereford area Monday and arrived in Friona where Bob Crozier and Levon Summerfield, soil conservation men, took them for a tour of the local areas. Both men were intensely interested in how our program of irrigation was carried on from drilling to harvesting. Hidalgo told of some 125,000 acres annually which are being transferred over to irrigation in his country. "The government buys the land and installs the irrigation. The land is then sold to poor people who are given 25 years to pay for it, including 60 percent of the cost of providing the irrigation." In regard to our well-drilling technique on the Plains, Hidalgo said that in Spain all their water is taken from streams and as far as he knew there was no water taken from underground sources. The land in which Hidalgo and Gamazo ply their trade in Spain raises similar crops to those grown here on the Plains. After a short visit in the SCS office in Friona the group left to visit with Bruce Parr and observe his irrigation system and his recharge system. Following this they went by the Lloyd Mings place to watch a well being drilled and down to Archie McCutchan's farm to observe land levelling. The group also toured the Gifford-Hill Western plant in Farwell and later into New Mexico to see a sprinkler system.

HOME ECONOMICS BRIEFS

Broilers and fryers are popular spring and summer main dish items. Here are some signs of quality to look for when buying chickens—flexible breastbone, indicates a young bird; soft, pliable skin with few pinfeathers; a "meaty" look.

Preserve surplus "greens" easily and quickly by freezing, suggest extension foods and nutrition specialists. For best flavor and highest food value, freeze as soon as possible after gathering.

Fewer Beans Make Instant Coffee Latin American countries which rely upon revenue from coffee as their chief export are feeling the impact of the growing popularity of instant coffee among American consumers.

Trade talks have been initiated in Washington, about a possible commodity arrangement, to ease the situation for Brazil and Colombia particularly.

In 1901, Thomas A. Edison developed and patented the nickel-iron-alkaline storage battery. Because of its excellent characteristics, this type battery is still used today in such equipment as trains, ships, railroad signals and radio installations.

Sprinkle rosemary over beef before roasting, the Texas Beef Council suggests. Grown in France, Spain and Portugal, rosemary has been used as a spice for many centuries, and the name has come to mean fidelity or constancy.

Early Sea Bug Programed For Better Cotton

A good cotton insect control program is one that gives protection to the plant and its fruit before damage occurs.

It is also important that injurious insects not be allowed to build up into damaging numbers. Most growers feel that the early crop is their money crop, and go all-out in protecting the early squares from damage by insects.

Plains Cotton Growers is urging farmers to keep a close watch on their cotton crop this year. Statistics show that early season control is profitable six out of 10 years.

An early season insect control program insures early fruiting and maturity and results in higher quality cotton. The first fruits or squares of the cotton plant are very attractive to two insect pests—the fleahopper and the boll weevil.

About the time cotton plants first start squaring, fleahoppers leave their host plants and move to the more attractive cotton fields. This tiny insect sucks the juices from the newly set squares, causing them to turn brown, then black and fall off.

Nickel was used for plating as early as 1843. However, owing to the high price of nickel at that time and the difficulty of obtaining it in a sufficiently pure state, it was not until about 1870 that nickel plating was established as an industry.
