
blowing in the air. Trees are blooming and effort to grace the lands with color, but last Friday night's sudden snow storm seemed to be coming.





New tax laws help homeowners

COLLEGE STATION -Homeowners and potential homeowners may be losing money by not taking advantage of new tax laws, says Dr. Jack Friedman of the Texas Real Estate Research Center at Texas A&M University.

Friedman cites the little known tax advantage of home ownership that allows the individual buying water and sewage services from a township or municipality to deduct a portion of the monthly bill from income tax. The portion of the bill which represents assessment for maintenance, repairs or interest is deductible. Friedman suggests municipal services users contact the billing authority for information.

Another tax savings the homeowner might consider is the reduction of fuel costs through improvements. Energy laws allow tax credits for money spent on insulation, storm windows, caulking and other energy-saving features. This would result in lower utility costs as well as allow partial recovery of costs through tax credits.
