COLLEGE STATION -There was a time when to be correctly called a Texan one had to be born in the state.

Those guidelines don't work anymore, says an urban sociologist and state demographer at Texas A&M Univer-

More than 50 percent of the 2.5 million people added to the state's population during the last decade were "outsiders" who moved to Texas, says Dr. Robert Skrabanek. The remainder of the new residents were born here.

But many old timers wouldn't even consider the newborns true Texans, Skrabanek says, because there is a good chance their parents weren't born in Texas, and that still makes them "newcomers."

Skrabanek estimates that only about 70 percent of Texas' population today could be considered native in the traditional May 24 - -
