3. Stripper Milk - Any milk produced from a cow that makes less than 10 pints a day or alternately any milk produced by a group of cows that graze at a density of less than 10 per acre. This milk trolled price.

4. "New" New Milk - Any milk produced by a cow born after May 31, 1979, that grazes 21/2 miles from another cow or in a ravine a thousand feet deeper than the nearest cow. This milk can sell at the June 1, 1979, uncontrolled price adjusted for inflation.

Two years after the implementation of the above price control rules, a study of all milk producers shall be conducted (cost to government not to exceed 740 million) to determine if milk producers are showing profits in excess of 3%.

If 10% or more are exceeding the 3% maximum, a windfall profit tax shall be imposed immediately to grab 60% of the gross income or 30% if the herd is comprised of 49 head or less.

The proceeds of this tax shall be disbursed wherever it will buy the most votes for the incumbent politicians.

fructose changed to glucose. That's the form of sugar diabetics can not tolerate. Therefore, honey is no longer considered a sugar substitute for diabetics.

Honey is simply a sweetener. It's good tasting -- but not a miracle worker. If, because of its flavor, you prefer it to table sugar, fine. But don't expect any great nutritional benefits. Mrs. Johnson says.

## Time Extended For FmHA Borrowers To File Housing Compensation Claims

Some borrowers who received loans from the Farmers Home Administration to buy new homes during parts of 1976-77 have been given additional time to apply for compensation for structural defects which may have occurred in their homes.

A provision of the Housing and Community Development Act of 1979 authorizes those who received housing loans between April 12, 1976 and October 12, 1977 to make claims for construction defects until October 12, 1980, said W.H. Pieratt, State Director.

Since October 12, 1977, Farmers Home, the rural development service of the U.S. Department of Agriculture, has offered a program of compensation for construcwho purchase new homes. Borrowers can file claims for chase homes.

We love strawberries and at the current low price we can afford lots of them. How can I be creative in serving them?

Still Serving Strawberries

Dear Still: Since melons are beginning to slow up now too, try serving a 1 or 2 inch crosswise slice of cantaloupe or honeydew melon with sugared strawberries in the middle.

For a special occasion dessert, mix some crushed sweetened strawberries with softened cream cheese. Use the mixture to fill crepes. Roll the crepes and top them with more crushed berries.

Strawberries also combine well with other fresh fruits. Try them with oranges, bananas, apples, pineapples and melons in almost any combination. A very nice combination is strawberries, bananas and oranges. Allow about one-half small orange, one-half banana and four strawberries per person.

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
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
