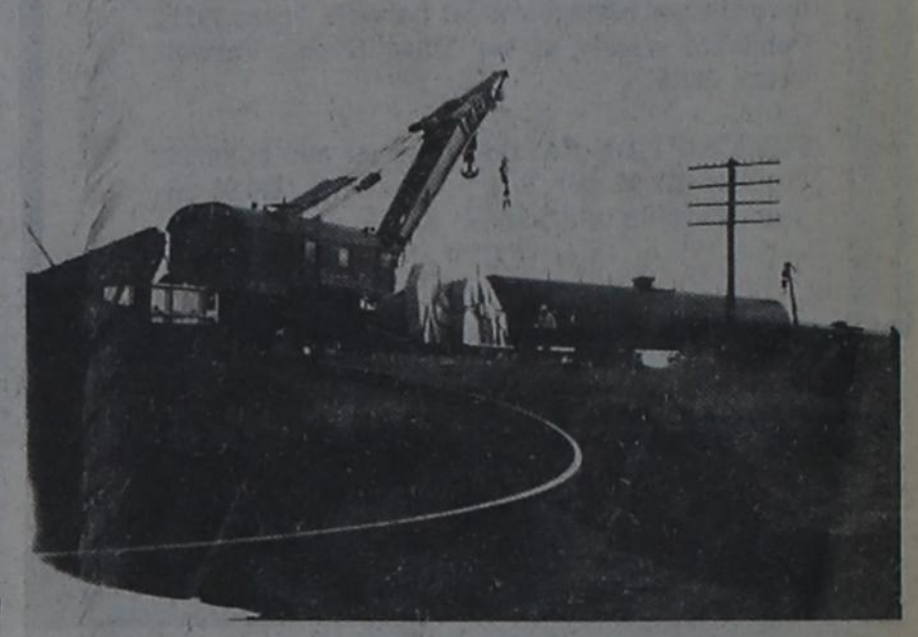
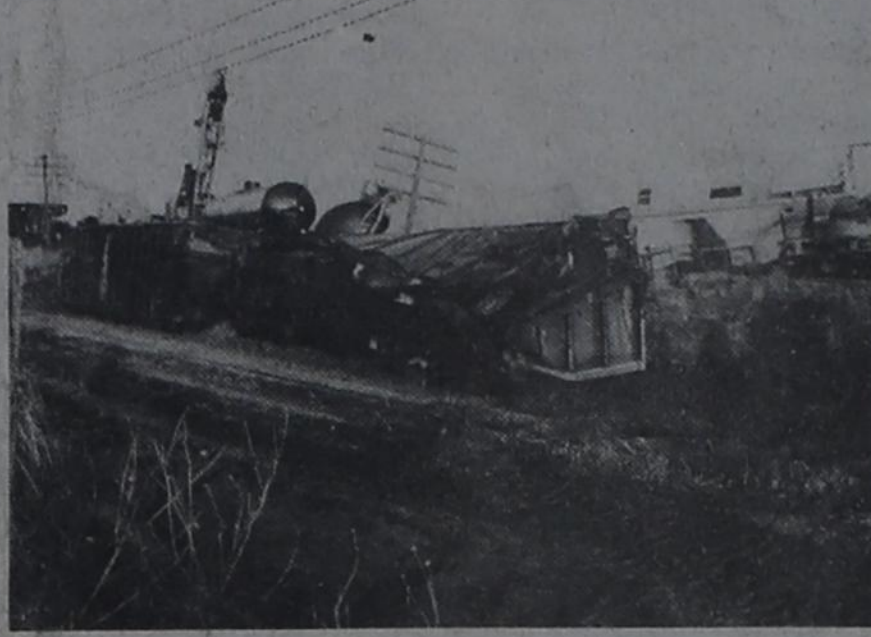
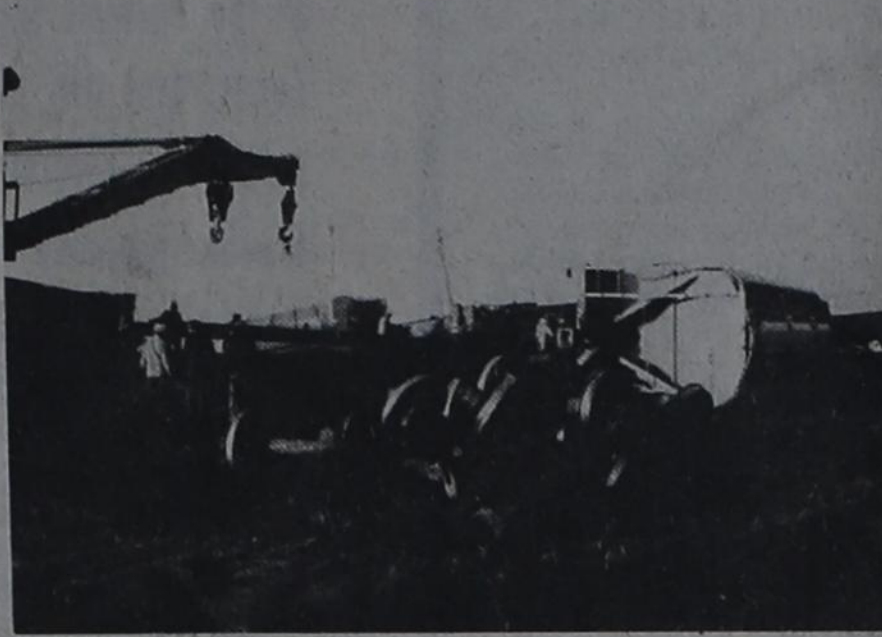
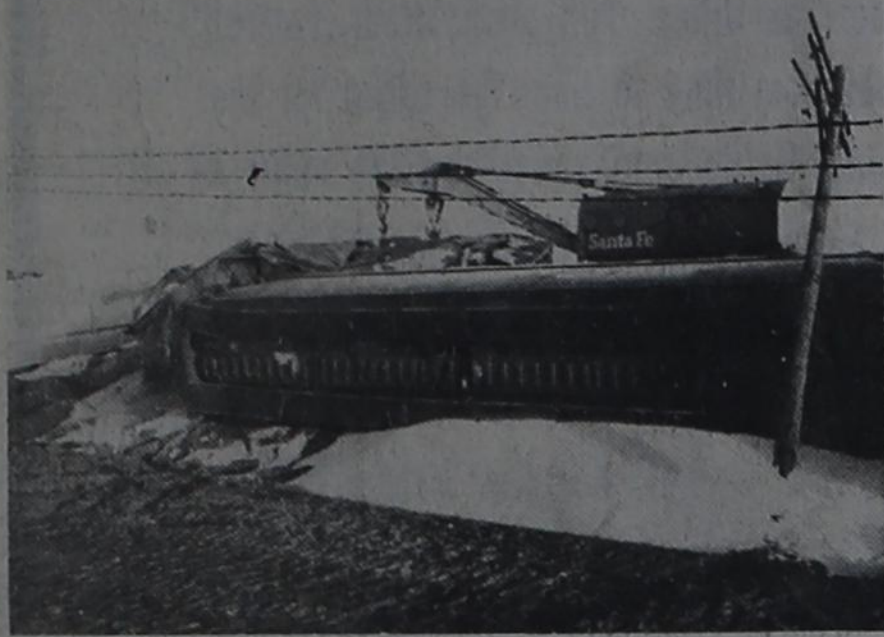


# Scenes From Saturday's Santa Fe Train Mishap



21 Cars Leave Track - -

## Santa Fe Derailment Under Investigation

Cause of the derailment which sent 21 cars of an 89-car Santa Fe train astray is still under investigation by company officials.

The accident of the west bound train occurred Saturday night about 8:20 p.m. between Farwell and Wilsey incurring estimated damages to equipment, track and signals of \$137,000. There were no injuries reported.

According to Susan Metcalf,

director of public relations for the Amarillo office of Santa Fe, the main line of the track was reopened Sunday morning at 10:10 a.m. (CDT), 14 hours after the accident.

"Our first worry is getting the main line track open after an accident like this," said Miss Metcalf.

"The train was traveling at a slow rate of speed since it was approaching a structure," she said. It was not immediately

determined exactly how fast the freighter was traveling.

Miss Metcalf said that the train was loaded primarily with grain and was bound for California. It was carrying a total of 6,050 tons.

In spite of the report that one car was loaded with a corrosive substance, Miss Metcalf said that the car was not punctured and presented no hazard. The corrosive substance was sodium hydroxide.

According to Tony Mendoza, Texico station agent, the car containing the corrosive will be lifted upside down into another car to be removed.

Mendoza says that the clean-up is continuing into this week but is scheduled to be completed by mid-week.

Several trains delayed by the accident were rerouted through Lubbock, according to Miss Metcalf.

One thing we can say is that our Congressional District is represented by a man who reflects the conservative views of his constituency. Kent Hance has a typical conservative Texas attitude on most pieces of major legislation.

Hance has actively spoken out in opposition to the so-called "windfall profits tax." Says Hance, "The only thing to be accomplished by these two pieces of legislation will be higher fuel bills. Neither will solve the energy crisis even though they are being promoted as major parts of an energy plan. They are simply revenue producers for an already over-spending federal government."

At this writing a Federal District Court came to the rescue of the American gasoline user with a ruling blocking the implementation of this administration boondoggle. In the Judge's opinion we feel the good jurist was on firm constitutional grounds in denying the President the power of Taxation.

This is exactly what the bill was, a devious method of TAXING the citizenry through an import tax scheme. The levying of taxes is a function of the United States House of Representatives - not the Oval Office.

However, do not cheer too wildly for judicial common sense just yet, the government attorneys will probably take it to the Supreme Court for a final decision. In recent years this august body has not shone with Constitutional brilliance. They have more often than not opted for social interpretations rather than strict legal opinions.

Our only hope if the Supreme Court sides with the administration is for Congress to overturn the decision with appropriate legislation. We are sure Representative Hance will be in the thick of that battle.

## Multi-Million Dollar Rain Falls In County

Parmer County and surrounding area last week received what has been termed a "multi-million rain" by Agricultural Stabilization and Conservation office County Executive Director Prentice Mills.

"It was wonderful," said Mills. "If it stays pretty we will get the cotton up."

According to Mills, the county received a little hail but not enough to do much damage.

In isolated areas south and east of Farwell heavier hail damage was reported to young cotton and corn crops.

"The moisture more than made up for it," Mills said. "The rain saved a lot of wheat farmers in the county."

Seth Ralston, county extension agent, said that the rain will be very beneficial to the wheat crops. It will help some of the cotton, but some of the fields got packed pretty severely from the rain, according to Ralston.

"It would have been better if it had fallen slower," said Ralston. "It rained pretty hard."

## Sheriff Reports Robberies

Parmer County Sheriff Charles Lovelace reports several separate incidences of batteries being stolen from vehicles around the county in the past week. Big Tex Grain Company in northeast Parmer County reported about \$800 worth of batteries stolen from trucks, tractors and pickups Sunday night. West Friona Grain Company reported about \$150 worth of batteries stolen the same night as did Parmer County Implement Company who had an undetermined number stolen. There were also several farmers in the county who reported batteries

stolen from their vehicles the same night, according to Sheriff Lovelace.

In other action, Johnny Stewart Motors in Farwell reported a 1966 four-door Chevrolet stolen from its lot on Tuesday. The owners feel that someone had the keys to the car, according to the sheriff.

The Dale Widner farm, about four miles southwest of Friona, reported a barn robbery on Friday, May 16. According to Sheriff Lovelace, about \$1000 worth of tools were taken from Widner's barn.

J.J. McDonald, manager of Farwell Gin, reported that

someone broke into the gin office Sunday night. Lovelace says that all that appears to be missing are some empty cola bottles and possibly some full ones.

Lovelace reports that someone attempted to break into the post office in Bovina Monday night. They didn't get into the office but quite a bit of damage was done, according to Sheriff Lovelace.

In other action, Clyde Redwine, who farms about five miles southeast of Bovina reported a CB radio stolen from his tractor cab Monday night. Estimated loss is \$100.

## Guilty Pleas Heard By Judge

District court jurors scheduled to appear this week in the court of Judge Pat Boone Jr. were dismissed when guilty pleas were entered by the defendants in the criminal cases on the docket, reports Parmer County Sheriff Charles Lovelace.

Jerry Ortiz pled guilty to charges of forgery, was given three years probation and ordered to make restitution of over \$500.

The case against Robert Julian and Millard Bergland on charges of burglary was postponed to a later date because they did not have counsel. The court was to appoint counsel for the two men.

Sammy Sandoval pled guilty to a reduced charge on possession of marijuana, was fined \$250 and was sentenced to one year in county jail with the sentence being probated. The charges were reduced because of the way in which the evidence was secured, according to Sheriff Lovelace.

Jesse Trevino was given four years probation after pleading guilty to cattle theft. He was also ordered to make restitution and to pay court costs.

Johnny Tofoya waived grand jury action and pled guilty to burglary of an automobile. He was given four years probation and ordered to make restitution of more than \$1100.

Ronnie Robinson, charged

along with Tofoya, is awaiting grand jury action and will be tried later.

At a hearing for Joe Pat Medford on violation of probation the judge ordered continuation of Medford's probation. He has been turned over to the Swisher County Sheriff's office to face charges there, according to Sheriff Lovelace.

Zenon Gutierrez was returned here from Phoenix for a hearing on violation of probation. Since he had no counsel the hearing has been postponed. Also awaiting a hearing on probation violation is Arthur Costillo. Costillo and Gutierrez are both in custody at this time.

hosted nearly a half million visitors from throughout the nation.

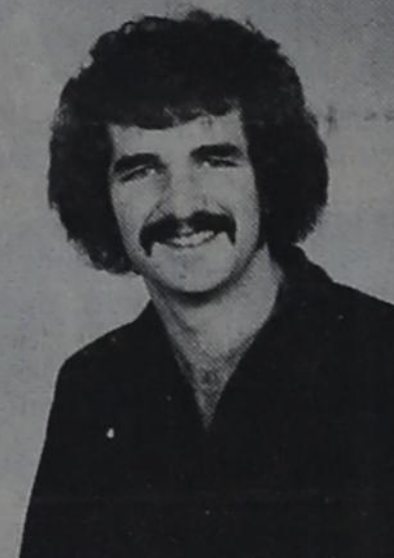
General Manager Ray Williams said the park's entertainment lineup is being bolstered for the summer months, with particular emphasis on nighttime entertainment.

Williams said the park's new, wooden roller coaster, Judge Roy Scream, has carried more than 375,000 thrill-seekers since its March opening.

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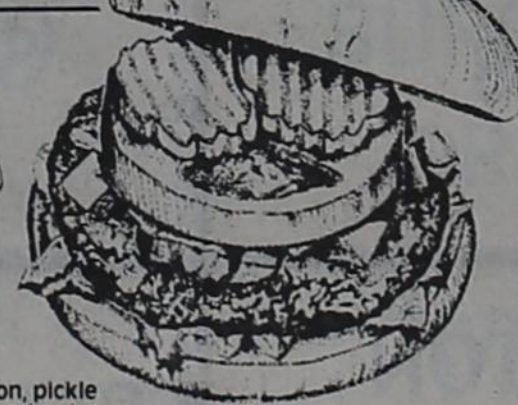

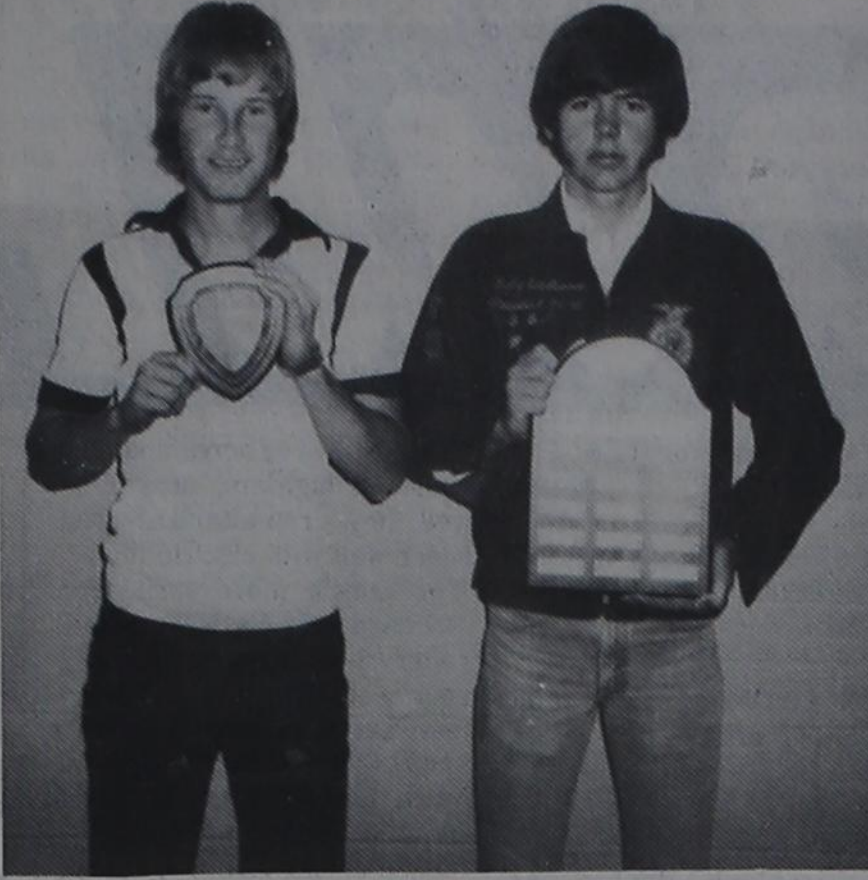
menu.

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# Gardening News

## Annuals Eye-fuls Out Of Eyesores

If your yard or garden has a "hot spot" — a location that never seems to look anything but awful — then don't despair. Annual flowering plants can come to the rescue and can turn an eyesore into an eye-ful.

While many annual flowers do not thrive in hot, dry locations, the exceptions will provide unceasing bloom in this most inhospitable environment, points out Dr. William Welch, landscape horticulturist with the Texas Agricultural Extension Service, Texas A&M University System.

Verbena and vinca are two annuals which will perform colorfully in a hot, dry garden environment. And plant breeders, conscious of the worth of hardy annuals, have developed two new varieties for the 1980 growing season, says Welch.

Premiering in seed catalogs and as started plants at greenhouses and garden centers this spring are "Little Rosie" vinca and the All-America award winner, "Sangria" verbena.

"Sangria," recipient of a bronze All-America award for 1980, boasts a rich wine-red color unique to the verbena family, points out Welch. Other outstanding qualities of this new introduction include a uniform height and increased resistance to heat. The spreading trailer will extend 2 to 3

feet in the home garden setting.

Use "Sangria" as an edging plant, to add summer color to the rock garden, or try it in a hanging basket, suggests the horticulturist. It's warm burgundy overtones will enhance a variety of landscape settings, plant colors and forms.

"Little Rosie" vinca is a material for sun and hot weather. The compact 8- to 10-inch plants produce deep violet-rose flowers, however hot or dry the summer. This newest addition to the "Little" series of vinca boasts the same lustrous green foliage and hybrid vigor found in "Little Blance," "Bright Eyes," "Pinkie" and "Delicata." All are ideal as bedding plants in the most droughty and sun-sizzled locations, contends Welch.

While vinca and verbena can both be started from seed, many gardeners find these species somewhat exacting to germinate indoors, notes the horticulturist. They can be readily purchased as bedding plants at garden centers and nurseries.

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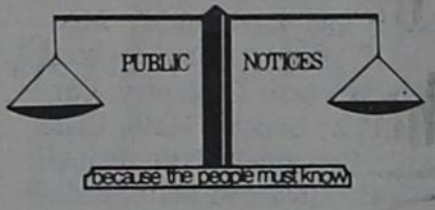
clamation coincides with an ongoing nationwide campaign, conducted by the National Mental Health Association, designed to help the American public understand stress and learn to reduce and manage it.

**THE RIGHTNESS OF GOD**

There are many theological words which most people — even most Christian people — do not understand. Among these is the Bible word "righteousness." Actually, though, this word is very simple and we ought to understand about God's righteousness even before we learn of His love.

Righteousness is simply an old word for RIGHTNESS. When we say that God is righteous, we simply mean that what He does is always RIGHT; that He will not and cannot do anything that is not RIGHT. This is why Paul declares in Romans 1:16, 17:

"I am not ashamed of the gospel of Christ, for it is the power of God unto salvation to every one that believeth... FOR THEREIN IS THE RIGHTNESS (THE RIGHTNESS) OF GOD REVEALED..."

We are proud to proclaim the gospel of the grace of God because it emphasizes God's RIGHTNESS. The gospel does not tell us that God will overlook our sins or wink at them and smuggle us into heaven. It doesn't tell us that He will forgive us if we are sorry enough or do enough good deeds to counterbalance our sins. By no means.

The "gospel of the grace of God" is based on His RIGHTNESS. It is the wonderful message that "Christ died for our sins," that He paid for them Himself so that He might justly offer us forgiveness and declare us righteous.

Romans 3:26 puts it beautifully. There the apostle declares that since our sins were paid for by Christ at Calvary, God can now "be just — and the Justifier of him who believes in Jesus."

For centuries religious people have said to each other: "We must be truly sorry for our sins and do all the good we can and surely God will forgive and accept us." But this is not the gospel. The gospel gives us more solid ground to plant our feet upon. It says to every man, woman and child: "Your sins were PAID FOR by Christ at Calvary. Trust in Him and you will be saved." This is gospel [good news] indeed, for it is based on the just payment of the penalty for sin.

Memorial Day weekend is traditionally a time for families to begin their summer outdoor activities. Trips to the lake, camping, and picnics are all summer-fun things to do.

Picnics remind us of beautiful sunny days and delicious foods. Be sure to plan meals that are made up of foods that don't spoil. Fresh fruits and vegetables, cupcakes and cookies are good selections.

If you must take highly perishable foods, such as mayonnaise, eggs and meat; pack them in well-insulated containers. Remember, keep hot foods hot and cold foods cold. Be sure to use ice or reusable cold packs. Don't depend on cold foods staying cold just because it's in an insulated bag - especially on a

warm day.

For a quick chili pie, do this: Prepare your favorite chili mix and put in a vacuum bottle. Put grated cheese in a container so it will stay fresh. Now all you need is a spoon and an individual bag of corn chips. When ready to eat, simply cut the top off the bag, spoon chili over the chips and stir in the bag. Spoon grated cheese over the top - and eat out of the bag.

Hot dogs can also be prepared at home, packed in a wide-mouth vacuum jar. Carry along your mustard, buns, grated cheese, chopped onions, etc. When you are ready to eat, your franks will still be hot.

Whatever your summer plans, be sure you plan for food safety.

**Census Underway**

Census takers in this area are completing the first follow-up operation of the 1980 Census, which involved contacting households that had not returned their census questionnaires by mail to the census office.

According to William E. Soule, District Office Manager, census enumerators in each county have been gathering the necessary information from households where the Census Bureau did not receive a mail response. This includes those which did not return their census questionnaires by the April 11 mail deadline as well as some households that did not receive a census form in the mail.

Census manager Soule explained that in many rural areas and small communities, census questionnaires were not delivered by mail on March 28 to some persons holding post office boxes or with a General Delivery address. Because the Census Bureau uses the "enumeration district" or physical area in which a household is located as its basis for counting, all questionnaires must have a code number showing this location. Where it was not possible to pinpoint a residence's location using only the post office box, forms could not be coded or mailed.

In those cases where census forms were not delivered by mail, a census taker should have called on the household during the first follow-up operation. Any persons who have not yet been contacted by a census taker, and who did not fill out the 1980 census questionnaire, are urged to call the district census office in Amarillo at 806/335-2877, giving their names, address and phone number. A census taker will then call to assure that every individual is counted in the census.

A second follow-up phase of the 1980 census begins at the

end of May and involves contacting households that returned incomplete questionnaires, additional checks on residences that had earlier been reported as "vacant" and further attempts to reach households not already counted. Because Census Day was April 1, all information given to the Census Bureau should show the status of the household on that date.

Soule also added that jobs as census takers are still available in many counties. Pay averages \$4.00 per hour and persons will be asked to work a 40-hour week for several weeks, including evenings and Saturdays. To qualify for a position as a census taker, applicants must take a simple written test on basic skills.

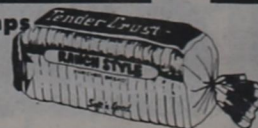


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
