
# It's been a good year

# remembered

(Editor's Note: The following article comes from the December 1988 issue of "Dairyman's Digest,' Southern Region Edition)

Tom Mesman was a dairy farmer and Young Cooperator from Farwell. At 25, he was in business with his father and had chosen dairying as his life's work. On Oct. 3, 1987, he married Teresa Morris and they set to work to help build a better dairy operation.

On the morning of Oct. 19, 1987, Teresa went out to talk to her husband, who was operating the bale processor before feeding some hay. She found him lying on the ground with a severe head injury. The lid of the big machine apparently had fallen on him, knocking him from the ladder.

The tragedy was a severe blow to his new wife and his family and friends.

Tom had attended the Young Cooperator (YC) seminar in September 1986, and was excited and enthusiastic about the program and its benefits for young dairymen.

Teresa and Tom's family decided to honor his belief in the YC program by providing an annual award and plaque to a YC couple each year. The award will be called the Thomas J. Mesman Award and will include recognition and a plaque to be presented at the Southern Region YC Seminar each year. The recipient will be selected by YC contest judges who are named each year from professional agricultural workers and leaders.

Also, a perpetual plaque has been donated, which will hang in the reception area at the AMPI Southern Region headquarters in Arlington. The names of each year's winner will be inscribed on this plaque as they are awarded.

1 can tomato soup 1 (8 oz.) pkg. cream cheese 1 pkg. unflavored gelatin 1 c. mayonnaise 1/2 c. chopped onions 1/2 c. pecans 1/2 c. chopped bell pepper 1/2 c. chopped celery Soften cream cheese. Heat cheese with undiluted tomato soup to mix; then cool the mixture. Dissolve gelatin in

1/3 c. warm water. Mix all ingredients. May be used as a dip.

1 no. 21/2 can sauerkraut 1 c. minced celery 1 med. onion, minced 1 green pepper, minced 1 1/3 c. vinegar

1 1/4. c. sugar ( sugar substitutes may be used by diabetics)

Wash and rinse sauerkraut. Drain, Add celery, onion, green pepper, and pimento.

# 3 hours of daylight !?!

Helle Carstens is looking forward to the holiday season in Farwell even though she will miss her family and friends in Denmark. She is living with Mr. and Mrs. Jerry Monk in Farwell this year.

It may not seem like Christmas time to the Texico-Farwell Rotary Club exchange student because she is accustomed to long, dark days in December. Her hometown, Padborg, Denmark, is about as far north as Hudson Bay. They enjoy only about 3 hours of daylight each day from about noon until 3 p.m. at this time of the year. Also, the thermometer hovers near the freezing point in Padborg from November on. So, sunny skies and mild temperatures may keep her from feeling like it is really the holiday season.

The holiday season does not start with Thanksgiving in Denmark because they do not celebrate this traditional American holiday. But, it does start with a round of social gatherings and parties with family and friends in December. Sometimes the Carstens get together with friends for cross country skiing or for dinners during this time.

Christmas vacation normally begins a couple of days before Christmas and lasts through New Year's Day for Danish school children. But the Carstens children find time for school work and for parties, too.

About a week or so before Christmas, the Carstens family and a group of their friends all gather for a picnic in the woods. Each family selects and cuts a fresh green Christmas tree. Then they enjoy a picnic of brown bread, sausages, ham, cheeses, and hot punch or hot chocolate. Santa Claus brings candy and cookies for the children. Everyone dances around the tree and has a good time.

The Carstens family, like most Danish families, has a real Christmas tree. They do not bring it into their homes until Dec. 23. That evening, the adults in the family decorate the tree with holiday ornaments and real candles. The little children do not get to see the tree until late on Christmas eve when all of the candles are lighted, and all of the presents are under the tree.

The Carstens home is always decorated for the holidays with Christmas wreaths, pine boughs, and holiday ornaments. Some of the traditional ornaments are made of colored paper, and some of them are made of straw. Hearts and stars are popular shapes. The tree is always the centerpiece of the holiday decor. It is always a tall tree that dominates the living room which has a high pitched roof.

On Christmas Eve, the Carstens family gathers together for the holiday. Aunts, uncles, cousins, and grandparents all come together early on Christmas Eve.

After dinner the family goes to the living room where the Christmas tree stands glowing with all of the candles lighted. Everyone gathers to dance around the tree. Then Helle's grandfather passes out the presents one by one to each person present.

"My sister and I get things for when we have apartments of our own. We get dishes and knives and things, and we get clothes."

Helle's sister Line, who will be 15 in January often, makes her gifts. She makes wooden items in woodshop at her school, or she paints pictures.


