Local pheasant hunt to start

The Theta Rho chapter of Epsilon Sigma Alpha sorority will sponsor its seventh annual pheasant hunting preserve located in Parmer and Bailey counties, for pheasant and duck hunting through the pheasant hunting dates, Dec. 10-25.

This is a fund-raiser for the group's philanthropic projects. In the past this has included \$15,000 (over three years) to the Community Center; money and equipment for the New Mexico Girls Ranch; the establishment 'of the Rosa Roberts Educational Fund with Opportunity Plan, Inc.; playground equipment for the Farwell City Park, along with donations to such worthy causes as the Texico- Farwell Rotary Club polio project, Hodges Cancer Center, St. Judes Children's Hospitaland the Parmer County Child Wel-

Sorority members make sure that all areas of their preserves have plenty of cover

for birds to hide in so there will be some birds there for the hunters. They talk to the landowners to get permission for the use of their land and pay a fee to the Texas Parks and Wildlife Department to establish a shooting reserve. Then the land is posted as

After the land is set up, the sorority estimates the number of hunters who can safely hunt in each area. They patrol the preserves to make sure there are no unauthorized hunters.

To hunt on the ESA preserves, one must be a licensed hunter and purchase a permit for the preserve. All permits are good from the date they are issued through the closing day of the season. Permits are good for any or all land secured by the sorority. Each participating landowner is given one or more complimentary permits.

All permits are good from the date they are issued through the closing day of the season.

They may be purchased at Hughes True Value starting Dec. 9. The permit sales will move to the Farwell Community Center at 6 p.m. on Friday, Dec. 9 and will continue until 10 p.m. Friday night. On Saturday, Dec. 10, the permits will be purchased at the Community Center from 5 - 10 a.m.

The ESA permits cost \$75 if they are purchased Dec. 9 or 10. Those purchased Dec. 11-17 are \$50, ant those purchased Dec. 18-24 are

Texas hunting licenses may be purchased locally at Hughes and at the Parmer County Clerk's office. This is located on the first floor of the Parmer County Courthouse.

If it becomes apparent ESA cannot accommodate a hunter because the quota has been filled, his deposit will be returned. Deposits may be mailed to Altha Herington, P.O. Box 542, Farwell, Texas, 79325. Her phone number is 481-9351.

When making reservations. hunters should indicate whether they will hunt with dogs. The preserve land will be posted and open only to hunters buying ESA permits. Each hunter will be given a map of the posted land

and will be free to hunt on any of the preserve land. The preserve will be patrolled so that only those having permits will be allowed to

In conjunction with the hunt, there a contest for the longest Pheasant tailfeather.

Local VIP's tour bases

The U.S. Air Force invited several local VIP's to spend three days learning about the Air Force by touring bases in California and Nevada.

Farwell mayor Chris Gikas, Texico mayor Steve Chancey, and Farwell school Supt. John Grigsby were part of the group that went Nov. 16, 17, and 18.

Many of the members of the party were members of the Committee of Fifty in Clovis.

"Each of us had to pay for our own trip," said Grigsby, but he noted that the price of \$125 was nominal for a three day trip to California and Las

"We flew from Cannon Air Force Base to McClellan Air Force Base near Sacramento, Calif. the first day." He noted that the flight was on a converted Air Force tanker. "It was comfortable but not plush."

At McClellan, the Air Force has a large research and development installation. Air planes and equipment are tested, and the results are carefully recorded there. All of the purchasing of spare parts goes through McClellan so that the Air Force can discover trends or patterns of equipment breakdowns.

Sometimes parts must be manufactured from scratch for planes that are 20- 30 years old, but are still too good to junk. There are facilities to manufacture entirely new parts right there.

"They are also doing a lot of electronic research there," noted Grigsby.

"The Air Force is also replacing all the wires in

the communications network with fiber optics," said Grigsby The hair-like wires can carry more messages than copper wire without the danger of the wire being cut or broken. "We watched one guy tie 5 knots in a fiber optic cable, and it worked just fine after that," said Grigsby.

Grigsby said that the group learned a lot about the F111 while they were on this trip. " The F111 is a fascinating piece of machinery. Everywhere we went they stressed that the F111 is the only one of its kind to the mission it is designed to do."

From McClellan, the Clovis group went to Nellis Air Force Base near Las Vegas. The 3 million acre installation houses the fighter pilot

Another part of the base houses a NATO training center. "We saw pilots from West Germany and France training there," said Grigsby. The pilots simulate coordinated action in the event of emer-

"They really kept us busy on this trip, and they showed us a lot of things. And, they really made an effort to answer all of our questions," said Grigsby. "Of course had to ask what they meant a few times, they use so much specialized jargon that it was sometimes hard to understand the answers."

As an educator, Grigsby noted that the trip reinforced some impressions of the military that he has held for the past several years.

Farmland rental with crop- share leasing agreements is widely accepted in Texas. Crop- share rental agreements result in a tenant and landowner sharing the risks of farming. Crop- share rental ratios in most areas of the state are set by tradition and may not promote fairness or economic efficiency under every condition.

Farm leases are negotiated agreements between tenants and landlords. Differences in situations and bargaining strengths allow individual agreements to vary considerably. The Freedom to negotiate terms can serve to allocate land among tenants in a way that contributes to economic efficiency in agriculture.
