Three county gins honored

Three Parmer County cotton gins have been honored by the National Cotton Board.

The winners are: Farwell Gin, Friona Farmers Coop Gin, and the West Hub Gin Corp.

The Cotton Board recently presented its Distinguished Service Award to 663 gins that processed 5,071,039 bales of cotton during the 1987-88 crop year. The annual award is given to gins and growers participation levels above 80 percent in the Cotton Research and Promotion

"This program's objective is to maintain and expand markets for the U. S. Upland Cotton Growers," said Cotton Board chairman Jim Hanse. "With consumer purchases of cotton products at a record level, both in percentage share of fiber and in absolute value, there is no doubt that cotton's self-help program is working.


"These gins, and the growers they serve have done a tremendous service for the cotton industry with their outstanding support for Cotton Incorporated."

The gins that achieved a support rate above 80 percent represent approximately one-third of all gins across the cotton belt. Of the 663 award-winning gins, 127 were first- time recipients.

"By their own dollars and their own direction, cotton producers established Cotton incorporated to put the competitive edge back on their product," says Hansen. "Their investment is paying big dividends and every segment of the cotton industry is in their debt for the tremendous support they have shown for a research and promotion program that is achieving solid, verifiable results."

Through the first 9 months of 1988, cotton commanded a 51 percent share of the retail apparel and home furnishings market, more than it has at any time since the 1960's when the market development program was created.

"Thanks to the belief that a continuing investment in this program is the most viable way to hold cotton's competitiveness in the fiber industry and the fashion world, these gins are helping make this goal a reality," says Hansen.

Potential groundwater contamination topic

Local government representatives are invited to attend a seminar discussing potential groundwater contamination caused by leaking underground storage tanks on Jan. 26, at the South Plains Association of Governments office, 1323 58th Street in Lubbock.

Underground storage tanks, usually located at existing or former service stations and convenience store sites, pose an important issue for many cities and towns that depend entirely on groundwater for their potable water supplies.

According to the Environmental Protection Agency, approximately 84 percent of the nation's underground storage containers are constructed of bare steel, which can easily corrode and cause chemical leakage into underground water supplies.

In December, the Texas Water Commission ordered the City of Hereford to remove a five-year-old underground storage tank because of possible gasoline seepage into a nearby

water well. Potential problems associated with underground contamination from leaking underground storage tanks have been reported in Quanah, Seagraves and Anson. Representatives from the High Plains Underground Water Conservation District No. 1, the Texas Tech Water Resources

Center, and the Texas Water Commission will discuss regional groundwater quality and highlight the potential danger to potable water supplies caused by leaking storage

Procedures for detecting storage tank leaks and sources for help, should towns and/or cities encounter a contamination problem, will also be discussed.

Texas High Plains cotton producers in 1987 produced the area's first billion dollar cotton crop. And they've hit that mark again, and probably topped it, in 1988.

So says Plains Cotton Growers Inc., the organization that represents producers in the 25-county area included in the calculation.

While the final 1988 bale count isn't in, virtually all

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responsible estimates range between 2.9 and 3.1 million bales. In its estimate of crop value, PCG uses the more conservative figure.

The crop volume compares to an official 2,668,550 bales reported for 1987 by the Texas Agricultural Statistics

Service and would rank as the area's third largest crop, behind 3.5 million in 1981 and 3.2 million in 1977. Using an estimated 50 cents

per pound average price, PCG puts lint value of the 2.9 million bales at \$696 million. Seed, at a season average of about \$108, is estimated at \$125 million.

Target price deficiency payments, figured at a minimum 19 cents per pound of program payment yield on planted acres, are expected to add another \$249 million. The total, \$1.07 billion, is \$64 million above the \$1.006 billion estimated on the 1987

Should the more optimistic 3.1 million bale 1988 estimate materialize, the value of the crop would rise to \$1.127 billion, PCG figures.

Until 1987, the previous high dollar mark for the High Plains' No. 1 cash crop was reached in 1973, PCG estimated the gross return from that year's 2.9 million bale production at \$900 million.

That figure, at that time, meant much more to farmers and to the area economy than the bilion dollar plus crops of 1987n and 1988. according to Texas Tech economics department, it takes about \$2.60 in 1988 to equal the buying power of \$1 in 1973.

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
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Steers go 2-1 in district, 20-3 overall
