Here's how folks voted on the 21 amendments

Here's a look at how Farwell, Lazbuddie, Oklahoma Lane and Parmer County voted on the Constitutional Amendments in Tuesday's election:

No. 1 - Raising the salaries of the lieutenant governor, speaker of the house and legislative members: Parmer - 237 yes, 613 no; Farwell - 80 yes, 125 no; Laz - 21 yes, 35 no; OL - 13 yes, 32 no.

No. 2 - Allows issurance of another \$500 million of Texas water development bonds: Parmer - 432 yes, 406 no; Farwell - 114 yes, 85 no; Laz - 30 yes, 25 no; OL - 17 yes, 26 no.

No. 3 - Allowing the state to finance development and production of Texas products and businesses: Parmer - 406 yes, 424 no; Farwell - 103 yes, 98 no; Laz - 29 yes, 26 no; OL - 16 yes, 28 no.

No. 4 - Allowing the legislature to exempt property of nonprofit veterans' groups from ad valorem taxes: Parmer - 480 yes, 351 no; Farwell - 111 for, 90 against; Laz - 22 for, 18 against; OL - 14 for, 28 against.

No. 5 - Allowing ad valorem tax exemptions for certain property in Texas only temporarily for the purpose of as-

sembling, storing, manufacturing, processing or fabricating: Parmer - 532 yes, 312 no; Farwell - 117 for, 94 against; Laz - 43 for, 12 against; OL - 20 for, 23 against.

No. 6 - Okaying hospital district board members to serve four year terms: Parmer - 441 yes, 402 no; Farwell - 124 for, 82 against; Laz - 29 for, 27 against; OL - 21 for, 22 against. No. 7 - Requiring state officers and legislators to sign an

oath saying they didn't bribe anyone to obtain their offices: Parmer - 527 yes, 311 no; Farwell - 149 for, 57 against; Laz 32 for, 22 against; OL - 21 for, 23 against.

No. 8 - Allows issuing general obligation bonds for prison and mental health facilities: Parmer - 499 yes, 332 no; Farwell - 126 for, 73 against; Laz - 34 for, 22 against; OL 20 for, 24 against.

No. 9 - Combining various state agencies that deal with criminal justice: Parmer - 488 yes, 329 no; Farwell - 130 for, 66 against; Laz - 29 for, 23 against; OL - 22 for, 22 against.

No. 10 - Allow courts to inform juries about the effect of good time and eligibility for parole guidelines: Parmer - 620 yes, 211 no; Farwell - 154 for, 46 against; Laz - 43 for, 12 against; OL - 29 for, 14 against.

No. 11 - Allow legislators to deduct per diem from taxes: Parmer - 287 yes, 538 no; Farwell - 90 for, 106 against: Laz - 16 for, 36 against; OL - 12 for, 31 against.

No. 12 - Use permanent school funds to guarantee bonds issued by the state for aiding school districts: Parmer - 435 yes, 389 no; Farwell - 108 for, 88 against; Laz - 24 for, 28 against; OL - 18 for, 25 against.

No. 13 - Providing a bill of rights for crime victims. Parmer - 555 yes, 284 no; Farwell - 134 for, 71 against; Laz - 31 for, 21 against; OL - 29 for, 16 against.

No. 14 - Dealing with the Fort Bend County District Attorney's election process: Parmer - 390 yes, 344 no; Farwell - 96 for, 77 against; Laz - 19 for, 26 against; OL -15 for, 22 against.

No. 15 - Requires legislature to allow raffles for charity by certain nonprofit group: Parmer - 457 yes, 373 no; Farwell -107 for, 92 against; Laz - 26 for, 27 against; OL - 21 for, 23 against.

No. 16 - Allows creation of hospital districts in a manner independent of the legislature: Parmer -,574 yes, 245 no; Farwell - 142 for, 57 against; Laz - 34 for, 20 against; OL -22 for, 22 against.

No. 17 - Allows the state to provide scholarships, grants, loans and financial aid to local fire departments to buy equipment and to provide training: Parmer - 608 yes, 230 no; Farwell - 125 for, 73 against; Laz - 35 for, 19 against; OL - 27 for, 17 against.

No. 18 - Eliminates certain time limits on the issuance of Texas agricultural water conservation bonds Parmer - 433 yes, 373 no; Farwell - 96 for, 92 against; Laz - 31 for, 23 against; OL - 19 for, 22 against.

No. 19 - Allowing local governments to invest their funds as provided by law. Parmer - 401 yes, 409 no; Farwell - 125 for,

70 against; Laz - 29 for, 25 against; OL - 21 for, 22 against. No. 20 - Abolishes the office of county surveyor in 7 counties: Parmer - 492 yes, 241 no; Farwell - 123 for, 49 against; Laz - 25 for, 16 against; OL - 23 for, 15 against.

No. 21 - Allows issurance of general obligation bonds as college savings bonds to provide educational loans to students: Parmer - 440 yes, 384 no; Farwell - 105 for, 93

The Lady Spikers will meet Magdalena in its first game in the state tourney 1:30 p.m. on Nov. 9 at Goddard High School in Roswell, Magdalena is the Region C Champ.

According to coach Michael Littlejohn, Magdalena boasts one outstanding player, and the team serves very well.

The winner of Thursday's game will meet the winner of the Capitan-Roy game at 3:15 on Friday. The winner of that game will play for the championship at 6 p.m. on Nov. 11 at Goddard High. The loser will play at 1:30 p.m. on Saturday at Goddard High.

More vegetables being grown

"We've been growing more vegetables locally," said County agriculture extension agent Gary Patterson. "But the percent of agriculture acres planted in vegetables is still very

The vast majority of agricultural acres in our area are planted in grains - wheat, corn, milo.

According to Patterson, corn vields are down about 1,500 lbs. per acre from what farmers anticipated earlier this growing season. "We just didn't get the moisture we needed. Even though we have irrigation, corn is very a high moisture crop. People don't realize that humidity is important during the pollination period as well as for plant growth."

Patterson indicated that due to government programs, there will be stable prices for corn. "It's not great, but you know what you are going to get," he summed up.

Patterson said that dry land wheat is distressed from lack of moisture.

Late planted milo has been hurt by the freeze, but the milo harvest should be about

average. The grains produced locally are used to feed cattle and to feed humans, depending upon the variety planted. Much of the locally produced grain winds up in the stomachs of locally grown cattle which account for the largest producers of agriculture dollars in Parmer County.

"Fat cattle prices are high now, but it is a high capital investment business. There is a good turn around on dollars now, but it can change quickly," said Patterson.

Currently, food corn for human consumption goes to three local plants - Frito-Lay, Valley Grain, and Azteca where it is processed to

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


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Farwell Schools set tax hearing

"This represents 16% of our tax base," said Farwell school Supt. John Grigsby. "We have got to hold this hearing and take action."


The board will consider the reinstatement of the practice of taxing personal vehicles and automobiles.
