His wife, Eva, hopes to return to school to take some college classes now that their daughter, Charity, will be going to school. The Beavers also have a son, Jerry, 13.





Home canning tips given

Home canning is an enjoyable and sometimes moneysaving hobby, but every year there are people injured because of canning accidents.

Rochelle White, Parmer County Entension Agent, has prepared the following tips for home canners:

* Before operating a pressure canner, read the manual thoroughly and follow the manufacturer's directions.

* Keep rubber gaskets clean and free from grease. Stiff bristle gaskets (rubber rings) should be replaced. (Usually these are available at stores offering canning equipment or from canner manufacturers.)

* Keep openings of petcock, pressure gauge and safety valve clean. If openings become clogged and remain so during canning, dial or slide gauges may not register correct pressures, all air may be driven out in 10 minutes, or safety valve may fail to work when pressure becomes too high.

Clean petcock and safety valve openings frequently by drawing a string or narrow strip of cloth through them. Never use sharp tools that may nick or damage openings. Occasionally remove petcock and safety valve and soak in vinegar for a short time to remove any corrosion.

* Never immerse lid with dial gauge in water. Wipe with a soapy cloth and then with a clean damp cloth. Dry well.

* Store canner with lid upside down on canner to protect dial gauge. Clean thoroughly before storing. Place crumpled

newspaper in canner to absorb off odors.

* Have dial gauges tested once a year for safety and accuracy. Call Extension office for this service.

* To insure safe processing, all types of pressure canners must be vented 10 minutes before they are pressurized.

* When processing is complete, do not force- cool the canner. Cooling the canner with cold running water or opening the vent port before the canner is fully depressurized will cause loss of liquid from jars and real failures.

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


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
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Chastain, Doolittle wedding vows said

He adds that the Texas Department of Health has authorized seven hours of credit toward operator water licensing requirements for attendance at this seminar.


