Lazbuddie, Friona fire dept's 'celebrate'

The Lazbuddie and Friona volunteer fire departments got special Christmas gifts last Friday.

At the Parmer County Commissioners' meeting, commissioners Ernest Anthony and Thomas Ware authorized \$10,000 apiece to the Friona fire department toward a new pumper - if the city of Friona matches the grants.

Also, commissioner Raymond McGehee asked \$2,000 for the Lazbuddie ambulance service and another \$2,000 for the Lazbuddie fire department.

The Friona and Lazbuddie totals were approved.

These are in addition to the normal funds each county fire department gets from the commissioners each year.

The commissioners also noted that under the new Farm Bill, some funds will be available for fire departments to help fight CRP land fires.

Commissioner Robert White said the Farwell area precinct doesn't have extra funds available currently for the Farwell fire department, which approached the Farwell city council last month for funds for a new pumper. He said

the Farwell fire department hasn't asked him for help toward the truck, which is estimated to cost about \$90,000 to \$100,000.

In other business, the commissioners:

- Approved the county historical commission for 1991-92. It includes:

Hugh Moseley, Ida Jesko, Orma Flippin, Paula McBrook, June Floyd, Allo Reeve, Grace Whitefield, Roy Eastep, Micah London, Francis King, and Harold and Avis Carpenter.

- Helped 3 residents, two from Bovina and one from Farwell, with utility bills.

- Bought \$200 worth of athletic clothes and footwear for a county youth in the Children's Home in Lubbock.

- Announced that the swearing in ceremony for county officials will be at 1 p.m. Dec. 31. All were re-elected except that Bonnie Clayton replaces Porter Roberts as county judge. Roberts retired.

- Agreed to re-bid specs for two pickup trucks because extended cabs were sought instead of regular cabs. The legal ads are elsewhere in today's issue.

Loan applications now being accepted

The Farmers Home Administration, preparing to ease its ban on granting emergency loans to farmers without crop insurance, has instructed local FmHA offices to begin accepting loan applications, says U.S. Sen. Phil Gramm.

"The 1990 farm bill waives the crop-insurance requirement, and now FmHA is moving to reverse its policy as the law requires," Gramm said.

Specifically, FmHA's Washington office has advised its state directors, district directors and county supervisors to begin processing emergency loan applications from farmers who did not carry crop insurance in 1990.

"Clearly, FmHA intends to complete the procedure in January by revising an old regulation under which even accepting the applications

was prohibited," the senator said.

In fact, the FmHA directive instructs local officials to advise farmers of the waiver and for those who appear to meet other eligibility standards, to process loan applications "to the point of approval."

"Such applications will be held for final action by the County Committee and the loan approval official when the revised regulations are issued," says the FmHA directive.

The senator called the FmHA directive "a step in the right direction to help Texas farmers who did not have the benefits of federal disaster payments this year, even though the many Texas producers are experiencing their worst harvest in years."

January

Parmer County Sheriff Rex Williams said he would enforce vehicle registration laws.

Lazbuddie School Board votes to replace the school weight room after a fire destroyed it.

February

Mia Jennings of Lazbuddie was named a finalist in the Fina All-State Athlete - Scholar team competition.

Clay Lewis won the Texico geography bee.

Seth Black showed the Grand Champion Lamb at the Lazbuddie Stock Show. Shena Seaton showed the Grand Champion Swine.

At the Parmer County Junior Livestock Show, Cade Morris showed the Grand Champion Lamb. Cammy Hancock showed the Grand Champion Barrow.

The Farwell Steers ended the basketball season with a 21-5 record. The Texico Wolverines captured their district title.

Joe Schilling and Roberta Johnson said they wouldn't seek re-election to the Farwell School Board.

The Farwell School Board made more budget cutbacks.

The Grand Champion at the Texico science fair was Chad Dunsworth. Dara Jenkins was Grand Champion of the junior division.

Paul Vela showed the Grand Champion Barrow at the Texico spring hog show. Jennifer Williams showed the Reserve Champion.

March

The Texico Wolverines won

the district tourney basketball crown. Texico fell in the first round of the state tourney on a last-second desperation shot, 57-56. Texico ended the season at 21-6.

Jason Herrington and Justin Edens were chosen to represent Texico at the county spelling bee.

Doyal LaRue was elected Texico mayor. Elected to the city council were Butch Tharp, Oran Jay Autrey and Ronnie Warmuth.

The proposed DARE drug education program, supported by Parmer County Sheriff Rex Williams, drew support from area schools and city governments.

Brent Byrum resigned as Texico city marshal.

A run-off was called for in the Parmer County judge's race between Bonnie Clayton and B.K. Buske.

The Texico-Farwell Lions Club celebrated its 40th anniversary.

Honored by the Farwell Chamber of Commerce were: W.D. Howard, Farmer of the Year; Bruce White and Angie White, Students of the Year; Ed Wees, Teacher of the Year; Chris Gikas, Man of the Year, and LaMoin Williams, Woman of the Year.

Bobby Murphy was appointed supervisor of the Parmer County FmHA office.

Parmer County and the state of Texas resolved its long-running dispute over costs involved in closing the former Lazbuddie dump site. Parmer paid the state \$2,096. The \$96 was the disputed amount.

April

Fern Tharp was named to head the Texico Chamber of Commerce. Col. Peterson, of Cannon Air Force Base, was named as the speaker at the annual banquet.

At the Texico Chamber of Commerce banquet, Marie Crooks was named Woman of the Year; Steve Meeks, Man of the Year, and Byron Martin, Student of the Year.

May

Farwell's Shawn Stewart qualified for state in the 200 meter dash. He broke Farwell's record with a 21.84.

Texico City Councilman Ronnie Warmuth announced plans for a major Texico cleanup campaign.

The Texico City Council endorsed the idea of a citywide cleanup.

Parmer County Crime Stoppers had its first meeting.

June

Named as top Lazbuddie athletes were Michael Williams and Mia Jennings.

Byron Martin and Jennifer Gentry were chosen as Texico "Mr. and Miss."

Graciela Orozco won the top Texico band honor.

Paul D. Barnes and David Snider won their primaries in races for Curry County Commission.

The Texico-Farwell Rotary Club held a bicycle safety rodeo.

Texico got the 911 emergency telephone number system.

The Farwell City Council got a bid for trash hauling.

Larry Heacock was named new minister at the Hamlin Memorial United Methodist Church.

Texico teachers got 5 percent pay hikes.

The Farwell School Board handed out some raises, which varied.

July

Higher sales taxes went into effect in Farwell. James Pierce resigned as Texico school superintendent. Records showed that June 1990 was the hottest June on record. Leonard and Gloria Elliott retired at Lazbuddie Schools after a lengthy employment there. Bob Brown was named pastor at the First Baptist Church of Texico. Border Town Days queen contestants met TV actor Lee Horsley at the Muleshoe parade. Bryan Kube resigned as Texico councilman, after moving to Lubbock. Carolyn Burrows was named as his replacement. The Farwell School Board appointed Jerry Dee Owen principal for grades pre-kin-

ergarten through junior high. Gwen Corn was named to assist him at the elementary school. The 24th annual Border Town Days were held. Kaci Stephens was named Miss BTD. A record crowd of over 3,000 attended. Dick and Pearl Gerie were honored as Pioneers of the Year. R.L. Richards was named Texico school superintendent. Dr. William Green said he would be leaving the Farwell Clinic at the end of August.

August

Roy Willingham announced his resignation as Lazbuddie High principal. Joe B. Hall resigned as Lazbuddie School superintendent. Tom Jarboe was named interim superintendent. Diana Lumbrera was indicted in the deaths of three of her children in Parmer County. An accident was ruled as the cause of a fire that gutted the Farwell Clinic. Six Pleasant Hill volunteer fire department members were honored after being involved in the arrest of a Clovis man who they tracked down. The Lazbuddie School Board passed the same tax rate as last year's.

September

Pleasant Hill received a new rural addressing system. The Farwell Arena Association was reorganized with Duke Kirkland as president. The Texico City Council raised its utility deposits from \$30 to \$60. The Parmer County tax rate stayed the same. The traffic pattern at Texico Schools was changed as a safety precaution. Texico purchased the F.E. Autrey property just east of KKR Park. Parmer County Chief Deputy Sheriff Jerry Atchley was honored upon his retirement. A successful Texico cleanup day was held with over 100 residents participating. Holly Sugar announced an expansion at their Hereford plant.

Farwell and Texico school enrollments showed increases. The Parmer County Commission approved pay hikes: 3 percent for county employees and 5 percent for elected county officials. This was the same as last year. Chad Dunsworth showed the Grand Champion Hog at the Curry County Fair. The Texico City Council is seeking a dog catcher.

October

Diana Lumbrera, former Bovina resident, was found guilty in Kansas of smothering one of her children. She was sentenced to life in prison.

Area students collected supplies for the GIs serving in Saudi Arabia. The Texico City Council discussed possible annexations. Raymond Zamora was Lazbuddie Homecoming King. Stacey Hodges was queen. Shawn Stewart was Farwell Homecoming King. Amy Murray was queen. Ground was broken on the new Lazbuddie fire department building. Texico and Farwell schools stressed Red Ribbon drug awareness week.

November

The Farwell Steers and Texico Wolverines won their district football titles. Lazbuddie finished 2nd in its district. All three entered the state playoffs. The Wolverines beat Hagerman, 28-0, to win the state title. Lazbuddie lost to Ft. Hancock in the 6-Man state quarterfinals. Farwell, for the first time in its history, won its

first two playoff games before losing in the third game after injuries occurred. Paul D. Barnes and David Snider won seats on the Curry County Commission. In Parmer County elections, local office holders on the Democrat side were elected without opposition. At the state level, Parmer voters supported Clayton Williams, who lost his gubernatorial bid to Anne Richards. The Texico City Council learned that the KKR Park well in Texico was contaminated; it was immediately closed. A state grant was sought for a new well. Farwell's fire department asked the City Council for a new pumper truck. Roy King, of Texico, won the annual Area Merchants Football Contest. The Texico City Council discussed raising its utility rates. Lazbuddie Schools' new superintendent will be Phil Warren.

Parmer County Commissioners voted to give institute longevity pay for county employees.
December
The Wolverines and Steers dominated their All-District football teams with Rex Cumpston and Bruce Scroggins named as Coaches of the Year. The Texico boys won the Farwell basketball tournament. Filing for 3 Texico School Board posts were: 1 - Paul D. Barnes, unopposed; 2 - Bryon Mayfield vs. incumbent Greg Martin; and 3 - Bruce Mayfield, Hilda Montano and Debbie Autrey (Terry Winkles has held this post). The Texico City Council hired an Albuquerque engineering firm to study its well problem.

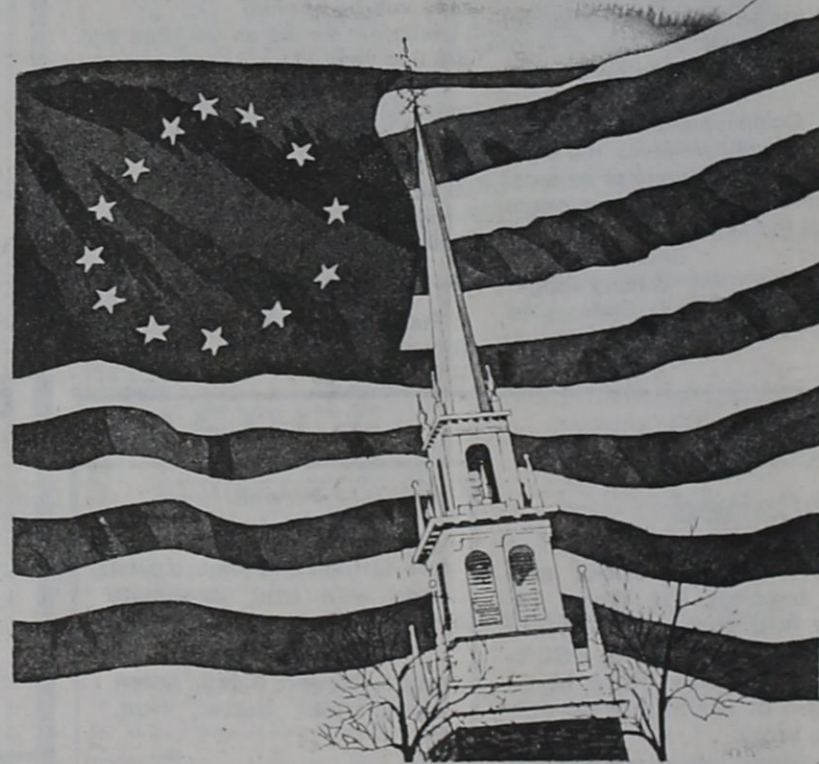
In the Old Testament times, God knew that His people would stray in their fellowship. Their hearts would lose their whole-hearted love for the Lord. Consequently, God made provision for regular times to be set aside for corporate renewal of fellowship. These times of renewal are called Holy Convocations or Solemn Assemblies.

The term, Solemn Assembly, focuses on the people of God gathered to carry on the sacred work of renewing fellowship. "Solemn" also carries a sense of its' being an annual occurrence. Holy Convocation can reference the same gathering, but it focuses attention on the summons or call of the people to come together. In essence, the Holy Convocation is a summons to a time of Solemn Assembly.

Solemn Assemblies and Holy Convocations both reference a day for God's people to come together for a sacred task. Solemn Assemblies were prescribed as times to:

- Demonstrate obedience to God and His commands and decrees.
- Remember God's provision for His people.
- Acknowledge God's ownership of all one's resources (time and material).
- Offer sacrifice.
- Recognize God in His holiness.
- Confess and repent of personal and corporate sin.
- Renew fellowship and the covenant with God.

Historically, unheeded remedial judgments have turned into final judgments. America, as a nation, is ripe for destruction. The evangelical movement in this country is characterized by an arrogance that is almost beyond belief. The neglect of prayer, the involvement in Phillistine methodology, the moral evils and the doctrinal corruptions that characterize the movement are sufficient to cause Sodomites to wonder at God's justice



in destroying their city while sparing the United States.

If the youth of the nation are to live out their lives in a land of freedom and opportunity, their parents had grace sufficient to humble themselves, pray, repent of their sins and seek God's face in Solemn Assemblies.

Obedience is still better than sacrifice. Joel's call requires prompt response. "Consecrate a fast, proclaim a Solemn Assembly; gather the elders and all the inhabitants of the land to the house of the Lord your God, and cry out to the Lord."
