Loan applications now being accepted

The Farmers Home Administration, preparing to ease its ban on granting emergency loans to farmers without crop Sunbelt Savings' Rubie Craft insurance, has instructed local FmHA offices to begin accepting loan applications, says U.S. Sen. Phil Gramm.

"The 1990 farm bill waives the crop-insurance requirement, and now FmHA is moving to reverse its policy as the law requires," Gramm said.

Specifically, FmHA's Washington office has advised its state directors, district directors and county supervisors to begin processing emergency loan applications from farmers who did not carry crop insurance in 1990.

"Clearly, FmHA intends to complete the procedure in January by revising an old regulation under which even accepting the applications

was prohibited," the senator

In fact, the FmHA directive instructs local officials to advise farmers of the waiver and for those who appear to meet other eligibility standards, to process loan applications "to the point of approval."

"Such applications will be held for final action by the County Committee and the loan approval official when the revised regulations are issued," says the FmHA direc-

The senator called the FmHA directive "a step in the right direction to help Texas farmers who did not have the benefits of federal disaster payments this year, even though the many Texas producers are experiencing their worst harvest in years."

Communitywide Call To Prayer & Solemn Assembly

7:00 p.m. Sunday, December 30

In the Old Testament times, God knew that His people would stray in their fellowship. Their hearts would lose their whole-hearted love for the Lord. Consequently, God made provision for regular times to be set aside for corporate renewal of fellowship. These times of renewal are called Holy Convocations or Solemn Assemblies.

The term, Solemn Assembly, focuses on the people of God gathered to carry on the sacred work of renewing fellowship. "Solemn" also carries a sense of its' being an annual occurrence. Holy Convocation can reference the same gathering, but it focuses attention on the summons or call of the people to come together. In essence, the Holy Convocation is a summons to a time of Solemn Assembly.

Solemn Assemblies and Holy Convocations both reference a day for God's people to come together for a sacred task. Solemn Assemblies were prescribed as times to:

- Demonstrate obedience to God and His commands and decrees.
- · Remember God's provision for His people. · Acknowledge God's ownership of all one's
- resources (time and material).
- · Offer sacrifice.
- Recognize God in His holiness.
- · Confess and repent of personal and corporate sin.
- · Renew fellowship and the covenant with God.

Historically, unheeded remedial judgments have turned into final judgments. America, as a nation, is ripe for destruction. The evangelical movement in this country is characterized by an arrogance that is almost beyond belief. The neglect of prayer, the involvement in Philistine methodology, the moral evils and the doctrinal corruptions that characterize the movement are sufficient to cause Sodomites to wonder at God's justice



in destroying their city while sparing the **United States.**

If the youth of the nation are to live out their lives in a land of freedom and opportunity, their parents had grace sufficient to humble themselves, pray, repent of their sins and seek God's face in Solemn Assemblies.

Obedience is still better than sacrifice. Joel's call requires prompt response. "Consecrate a fast, proclaim a Solemn Assembly; gather the elders and all the inhabitants of the land to the house of the Lord your God, and cry out to the Lord."
