Who killed Kennedy?

A book review today, folks: I got a Christmas gift entitled "Contract on America: The Mafia Murder of John F. Kennedy," by David Scheim.

I almost wish I hadn't read it. Because it pretty much conclusively shows that Organized Crime was responsible for Kennedy's death.

What hurts is that our government, which we try to believe, went out of its way to blame the deed on Lee Harvey Oswald, who apparently was just a pawn in the situation.

I first heard of Kennedy while watching the 1956 Democratic convention on TV. Presidential nominee Adlai Stevenson let the convention pick his running mate. I was rooting for Tennessee's Estes "Coonskin Cap" Kefauver, who got the nod, but only after several Southern delegations supported a young senator from Massachusetts named Kennedy.

Then came 1960. As with most young people, I supported JFK all the way. What a race that was; there never will be a better one. To be honest about it, the election was stolen in the Chicago Democratic precincts. Nixon was the real election winner and credit should be given him for not contesting the results, which would have caused a real upheaval in our society. Anyway, it wasn't the first stolen election (remember LBJ in '48?).

I thought Kennedy did some great things in his short tenure. He also had some failings, as is true of most humans. Regardless, I think it's safe to say that most Americans were shocked when word went out of his assassination in Dallas. You do remember where you were when you first heard, don't you?

In listening to the news-casts and reading the papers, there was no question in my mind that Oswald had acted alone. It was only in succeeding years, especially taking into account the famous Zapruder tapes, that I began to consider other gunmen as possible. And we all read about how strange it was that so many witnesses involved on that day in Dallas died mysteriously.

Then the special House Committee in the '70s announced that it indeed had been a conspiracy - but stopped short of saying what group or groups were involved. Gutsy, weren't they.

It took until now - 27 years later - to fully understand the situation. Certain Mafiosa - namely the Louisiana mob run by Carlos Marcello, on the run under the attack of Attorney General Bobby Kennedy, decided to counter-attack. By killing JFK, a new president (Johnson) would rein in Bobby. And that apparently is what happened, claims Scheim.

Scheim's book notes in great detail the connections Jack Ruby (who killed Oswald) had in the Mob. That stunned me because I remember clearly that 1963 commentators said Ruby was merely on Organized Crime's fringe. False.

Ruby was a gangster. The "coincidences" that placed him at the Dallas jail when Oswald was being brought out were carefully plotted out.

And why did it take until now to learn this? In my opinion, it's because the connection between the Mafia and politics is lot more smug than we want to believe. The politicians - from Presidents on

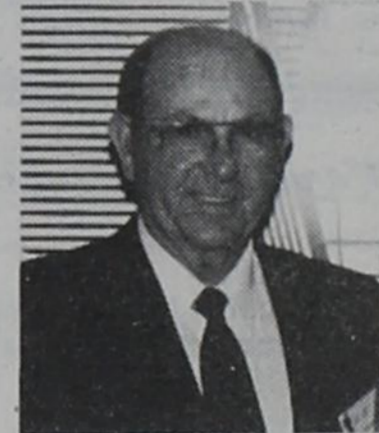
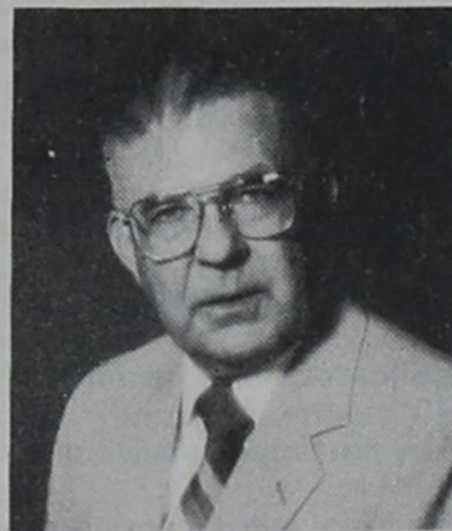

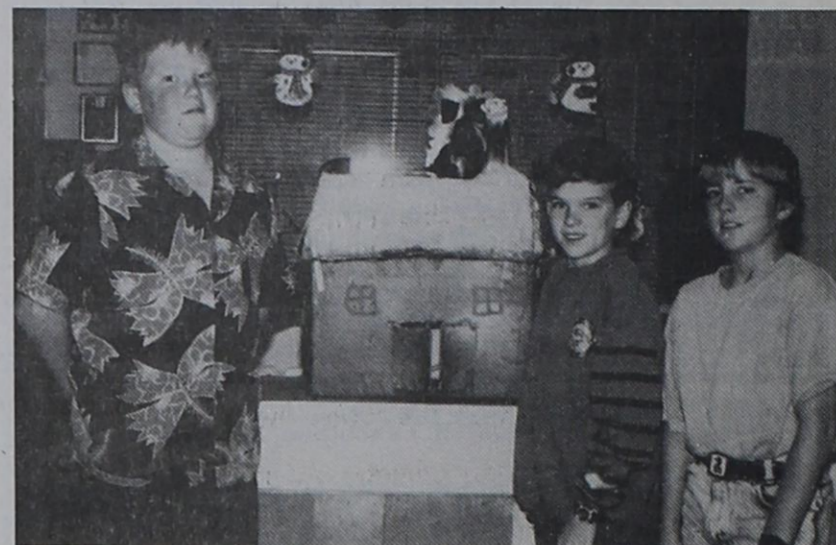
Texico conducts Christmas contests


